

PRISONER COLLEGE PLAN OFFERED

Prison inmates at Ramsey Unit will be the first in the U. S. to be offered a chance at four-year college degrees through the University of Houston at Clear Lake City.

Junior college associate degrees have been available since 1965 through special programs. Thirty-to-60 students will begin classes at Ramsey Unit in June. Next fall, Stephen F. Austin University is due to extend courses to inmates at Coffield Unit near Palestine.

"The more education a man has, the less likely he is to return to prison," said State Prison System Director W. J. Estelle.

CONTRACT AWARDED — A contract for the first modernization of property tax laws since 1925 has been awarded by the Legislative Property Tax Committee.

Law Research Corporation of Texas, an Austin group, received the maximum \$25,500 — cost recodification contract.

LPTC abandoned a plan to conduct an intensive school property tax survey on a totally-random-selection basis. The 35 school districts will be re-selected to insure a geographic spread in five regions.

COURTS SPEAK — Power of city governments to regulate extended area telephone rates was approved by the State Supreme Court.

The High Court turned down a Houston woman's appeal in

a lawsuit in which she has unsuccessfully claimed \$635,000 in damages against a doctor due to an unusually-large appendectomy scar.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a San Saba murder conviction because the jury didn't decide a sanity question.

Murder conviction of a Dallas man who set fire to a car in which another was asphyxiated lost an appeal from a life sentence.

Attorneys for former House Speaker Gus Mutscher, appealing a conviction for bribery conspiracy, argued before the Court of Criminal Appeals that no conspiracy was ever proved and the principal witness was not asked about it.

new state program offering toll-free telephone service has contacted 861 families, relaying messages on runaway children, Governor Briscoe reported.

Since last September, Briscoe said, the program, "Operation Peace of Mind," has received 1,890 calls from runaways in 42 states. The national hotline enables the runaways to relay messages to their parents from a round-the-clock, volunteer-manned center in Houston.

State Capitol Highlights and Sidelights
By BILL BOYKIN

It's show and tell time for political candidates, and many of them don't have as much to show as they would like to for their fund-raising efforts.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe ran second to Republican gubernatorial candidate Jim Granberry in campaign spending up to March 25, according to the first contribution - spending reports filed with the secretary of state.

Granberry reported contributions and loans of \$171,425 (including \$22,500 of his own money) and spending of \$171,425 since last summer when he began his race.

Briscoe's spending — including a \$120,000 loan of his own money — was pegged at \$153,754.

Frances "Sissy" Farenthold reported some \$40,865 in expenditures and debts.

The effort is far below that of 1972 when Briscoe spent nearly \$1.6 million in the primaries, and Mrs. Farenthold spent \$672,441.

Comptroller Candidate Bob Bullock has reported spending of about \$60,000 in his Democratic race, and Hugh Edburg said he has outlays of about \$12,900.

Edburg acknowledged he is using about \$7,000 of his own money. Bullock said he has used \$12,600 from his own resources, and has \$38,300 in loans from his business partner, Ken Wendler of Austin.

One of the big-spending groups so far has been the Texas Citizens for Parimutuel Horse Racing, which reported a \$7,000-cost campaign to get the issue of legalizing race track betting on primary ballots.

NEW CONVENTION GOAL — With the Constitutional Convention in recess, President Price Daniel Jr. has a new goal: he is aiming to wind up the revision task by May 31.

Actually, he conceded the first or second week of June is a more realistic target.

Perhaps you will see in the Cross a threefold frame of reference that spells out the meaning of the death of Jesus Christ in God's plan for the salvation of sinful men.

There was the final and ultimate revelation of God's divine love. This love was characterized by sacrifice, suffering and death. God, in sparing not his only Son, and the Son's offering himself as an obligation and a substitute for sinners made the supreme gift for our salvation. John tells us that if we will accept him and his sacrifice we become sons of God (John 1:12) and, as sons of God we become joint heirs with Christ Jesus in the kingdom of God (Romans 8:17). But the significant thing to accept is that Christ's death on the Cross was God's supreme act of love by which He offers redemption and reconciliation to his children.

The Cross of Christ was the measure of divine judgement on sin. It brought death to the Son of God. We too often wish to think of death as a normal part of the natural order of life. What we often call normal death, that which is due to age or perhaps in some cases to illness, can be accepted as the normal process of the natural order. However, we often ignore that frame of reference of the cross which declares that some deaths are the ugly facts which are the inevitable, just, and logical consequence of sin. I cannot, I do not accept much death such as occurs in time of war, auto accidents, etc., as a normal consequence of life. Where there are externally contributing influences by the actions of man, that causes death there is the influence of sin and evil at work to dominate human existence. This can be seen specially in the events of Calvary.

But, a final frame of reference is seen in the Cross of Christ—that of pardon and forgiveness—"Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34). Here only, then the sinner finds forgiveness of sin, release from sin's penalty, which is death, and deliverance from the power of sin, eternal damnation (read Luke 16:19-30). Therefore, this frame of the Cross brings hope to the heart of man. THINK ON THIS: It may take a crucified Church to bring a crucified Christ before the eyes of the world. Wm. E. Orchard.

Household Workers Quarterly Wage & SS Reports Due April 30

Quarterly wage reports and social security contributions for household workers are due by April 30, according to Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo, Texas.

"People who pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any 3-month calendar quarter must send a report of the wages, along with the social security contribution, to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter," Briggs said.

Quarters are January - February - March, April - May - June, July - August - September, and October - November - December. Wage reports and social security contributions for the first quarter of 1974 are due by April 30.

People who employ household workers may file the wage report on a form available at any Internal Revenue Service Office - "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees (for Social Security)."

The 1974 social security contribution for a household employee is 5.85 percent of covered wages, and the employer pays a matching amount. "Some household employers may prefer to pay the full 11.7 percent contribution," Briggs said, "and this is also acceptable."

Social security contributions help build retirement, disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for workers and their families. People who employ household workers can get a free copy of the leaflet, "Social Security and Your Household Employee," at Amarillo Texas, social security office at 317 East Third St. Briggs said.
