## ABOUT DIPTHERIA.

Editor Star: Believing at this tume the following facts relating to the present outbreak of diptheria in our community might be entertaining as well as instructive to those having the care of children, I submit the following taken at random from that most excellent work Sajon's Annual and Anafytical Cyelopedias of Prac tical Medicine. Volume 11, begining on page 551

It is better that diptheria should be diagnosed too often than that cases of true कptheria should be overlooked.'
-The early temperature in diph. theria is not usually high.

- A high temperature in the begin. ning is therefore an indication that the case is not diphtheria.

The fact should be also recogniz ed that mild cases are quite as dangerous to others as severe ones and should, for the sake of the community, be subjected to strict quarantine.

Sex has no influence, but age materially influencee the susceptibil ity.

## Nursing chaldren are, happily

 remarkably immune.The following table of 14,688 deaths occuring in New York in ten years, tabulated by Billington, illustrates these points.

The schools have often been pointed out as the source of epidemic $f$ diphtheria.

At lumes, io a certain area of the city from which several schools drew their scholars, all the cases of diphtheria would occur in familhes whose ehildren attended one school.

A number of eptdemics have been traced to infected milk.

Other outbreaks of diphtheria have been attributed to bad drainage, defective sewers or the presence of an abundance of decomposed organic matter.
"It is also held that certain domestic animals, pigeons, cats, etc, are susceptible to diphtheria and may be the means of transmitting to man.'

Second attacks of diphtheria are rare, but do occur.

Suspected cases should be isolat. ed as thoroughly and promptly as those in which the diagnoss is settled."

Many of the mild cases of "sore throat" are in reality diphtheria and should be treated as such.
"Quarantine should last three weeks."
"Convelescence begins at end of second or in thrd week."
"Diphtheria bacilli may be found in the throats of those who, althougb
perfectly healthy, have been exposed 0 infection.

This is especially true of child ren, and in families where diphtheria is present the well children should be kept from attendance at school or like gatherings where they may possibly convey the disease to others more susceptitable than themselves."
'In the course of epidemics it is otten necessary to close all schogls before the ravages of the disease can be controlled.
'Antitoxin should be given in every case where the diagnosis of diphtheria is even probable.

No harm is done if the case is
not diphtheria."
If the patients are children, the parents find it difficult to take a serious view of an appearantly trifling sore throat, and are often unwilling to take the necessary precautions to prevent the sprend of the disease."
From Practitoners Manual, page 176: "At the outset the clinical differentiation from diphtheria is attended with difficulties, and when the latter disease is present bacteriological investigation will alone decide the question.

Editor's Note:-As most people seem to have an idea that the county health officer has power to declare quarantine, we quote from Rule 4. of the Rules and Kegulations furnished by the State Health Officer for guidance. The Commissioners' Court must declare quarantine empowering must declare quarantine empowering
the bealth officer to act, then he has all necessary power.

Upon the declaration of quarantine against any infected place, house or persons, by the commissioners court, the health officer shall have gencral executive power in all matters pertaining to said quarantine; furnish supplies, select medical assistants, guards and perform all other duties coincident to a reasonable, economic and consistent quarantine, and shall establish rules in harmony and accord with the rules prescribed by the State Health Officer.
Rule 11. Uponnotice thatsmall pox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, or oth. er communicaple disease, exists within its jurisdiction, it shall be the duty of the local health officer to placard the house in which such dis. ease prevails, by placing a flag or card not less than twelve inches long in a conspicuous place on said house. After the house is flagged, or placarded, all persons, and especially all children, all having the care of children and all going where children are, shall be excluded, except upon permit from board of health. The card or flag tor smallpox shall be yellow the card or flag for diphtheria and membranous croup, blue; and scarlet fever shall be red, with the words "Contagious Disease" printed thereon. No person shall remove or cause to be removed, any such card or flag, until a certificate is made by the at. tending physician satisfactory to the bealth officer in authority, that the disease has subsided and all danger of contagion by reason of such disease is passed, and that proper disinfection, satisfactory to the health officer has been accomplished. Any person causing the removal or mutilation of said card or flag before Fa proper certificate has been placed in the hands of the health officer in au.
thority, upon conviction, shall be subjected to the penalties of the lav Rule 13. Physicians mu port all cases of diphtheria.
Rule 14. No children fron in fected houses shall attend Public School until all regulations are complied with.

Rule 16. No person must enter or leave place infected with diphthe ria.
There are a number of other rales that apply only in case of quarantine People should be exceeedingly careful;just as though quarantine had been declared, because if the disease keeps spreading a general quarautine will unduubtedly be declared and all persons exposed will be quarantined. Your family physician can inform you what is necessary to protect yourselves and your neighbors.

And Senator "Fire Alarm" Foraker of Ohio, too, has been caught mon keying with the Standard Oil Trust His explanation is that at one time he was the attorney for the Standard Oil Co., and that part of the money recelved was to purchase an interest in a certain newspaper, but the deal fell through and the money, fifty thousand dollars, was returned to the company. This all may be true, but few people will believe it. However, Foraket's explanation is about as reasonable as Senator Bailey's of his dealinge with Pierce, head of the main branch of the Standard Oil Co. Bailey admitted he borrowed money from Pierce, but paid it all back. He admitted he received large tees from Pierce personally, also a fee of 82500. from the Standard Oil Co. direct. Like Senator Foraker, Senator Bailey claims that none of his transactions with these trust officials influenced his actions as Sebator. So far as the expose goes Bailey received far more money from the Standard Oil Co. direct and indirect than Foraker, but the news comes that the Republicans will not permit Senator Foraker to participate in the campaign, though urgently solicited a few weeks ago by Taft's friends to do so, and he had consented. They claim that his connection with the Standard Oil Co., will injure Republican prospects if he enters the cam. paign, though a candidate for re:election. Possibly Foraker has onlv done what many other senators and represestatives in congress, including some Democrats as well as Republicans, have been doing for years, but the aggression of the great corporations have aroused the people to such an extent that it is dangerous for a public official to be caught dickering with them. So long as the trusts are allowed to pay large fees, to congressmen or members of state legislatures ostensibly as attorney's fees, just so long will they be able to control legislation, National and State.
The Foraker expose will doubtless help the Democrats both in Ohio and other States. Hearst has no doubt, unwittingly, done the Democratic party a great service by exposing Foraker as the paid agent of the Standard Oıl Co. Heretofore Hearst has directed his attacks against Bryan, claiming that the Standard Oil Company is helping the Democrats. The claim is unquestionably false. These unlawful trusts had rather see Roosevelt elected than Bryan and Taft rather than either.

Turn on the light and let the peope know who of their public servant, whatever their political creed, thit are in the employ of the trusts.
