Saturday morning, July 3, several prizes were awarded to persons attending the Old Settlers Reunion. Recognition awards went to Mrs. W.R. Wilkerson of Clarendon for having the most children of all old settlers attending the reunion; Mrs. Jack Killough, oldest settler living in Donley County; and Ben Andis, oldest settler outside Donley County.

Eleven trophies were given out Saturday afternoon to entrants in the July 4th Independence Day Parade. Winner in the Buckaroo Division was Lynn Alderson of Clarendon. The division consisted of children riding decorated bicycles.

## Landfill dispute to be discussion topic

# Howardwick officials call citizen's meeting

Howardwick citizens were to meet Wednesday night, July 7, to discuss possible solutions to the current landfill stand-off between the city and officials of Sherwood Shores Corporation which developed the land later incorporated as the city of Howardwick.

Due to printing deadlines, the "Clarendon Press" will report the outcome of the meeting in its July 15 issue. Head of the Sherwood Shores Corp., George DeArmond, ordered the landfill, used as a garbage refuse by Howardwick citizens, filled in June 26 when negotiations concerning applying for a State permit to operate the landfill broke down.

According to Vernon Berry, Sherwood Shores representative at Howardwick, his company's intention was to have the city of Howardwick apply for the permit. While the permit would be in the city's name, Berry said, Sherwood Shores would continue to maintain the landfill. He said this had been agreed to "verbally" between he and city officials.

Legislation by the State of Texas requires that all such landfills be licensed by the State's Dept. of Health. Deadline for applying for this permit was April 1 this year.

Howardwick Mayor Glen Doty said he was first contacted about applying for the landfill in April by Sherwood Shores.

The Howardwick City Council voted to apply for the permit provided Sherwood Shores would continue to maintain the landfill and bring it up to state regulations. For the landfill to meet all state requirements, a fence would have to be erected around it.

According to City Councilman Will Corgill, this request was relayed through Sherwood Shore representative Berry to DeArmond. Following this request, DeArmond ordered the

landfill covered up.

If negotiations cannot be worked out between the city and Sherwood Shores, the critical question remains which of the two is legally liable to maintain any landfill at Sherwood Shores.

In a property report signed by all owners of property sold by Sherwood Shores, the company agrees to maintain streets and facilities on Sherwood Shores property. For this service, Sherwood Shores receives \$15 per year

from each lot owner. Berry estimated about 2,000 had been sold.

The landfill is not specifically mentioned as one of these facilities in the property report. It is referred to as a municipal service.

Closest reference as to liability of the landfill states, "Sherwood Shores IX and the City of Howardwick are negotiating for periodic scheduled pick-up of all refuse. Cost to the customer is not known at this time."

Other questions of liability include if Howardwick is liable to maintain a landfill if it falls within the incorporated city limits.

Mayor Doty said legal counsel would be present at the Wednesday meeting.

Concerning the meeting, Doty said, "I and the council feel that before we take any further action we ought to give the people out here a chance to state their opinions."

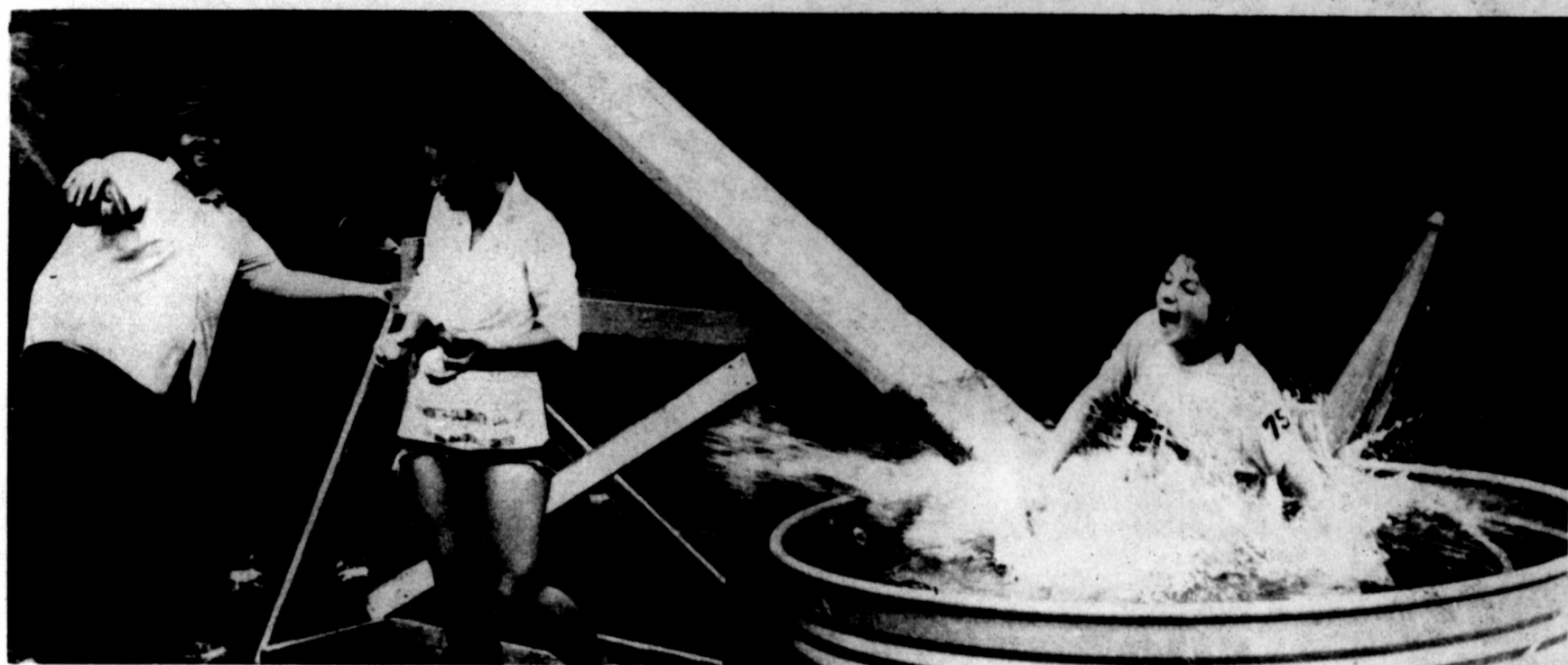

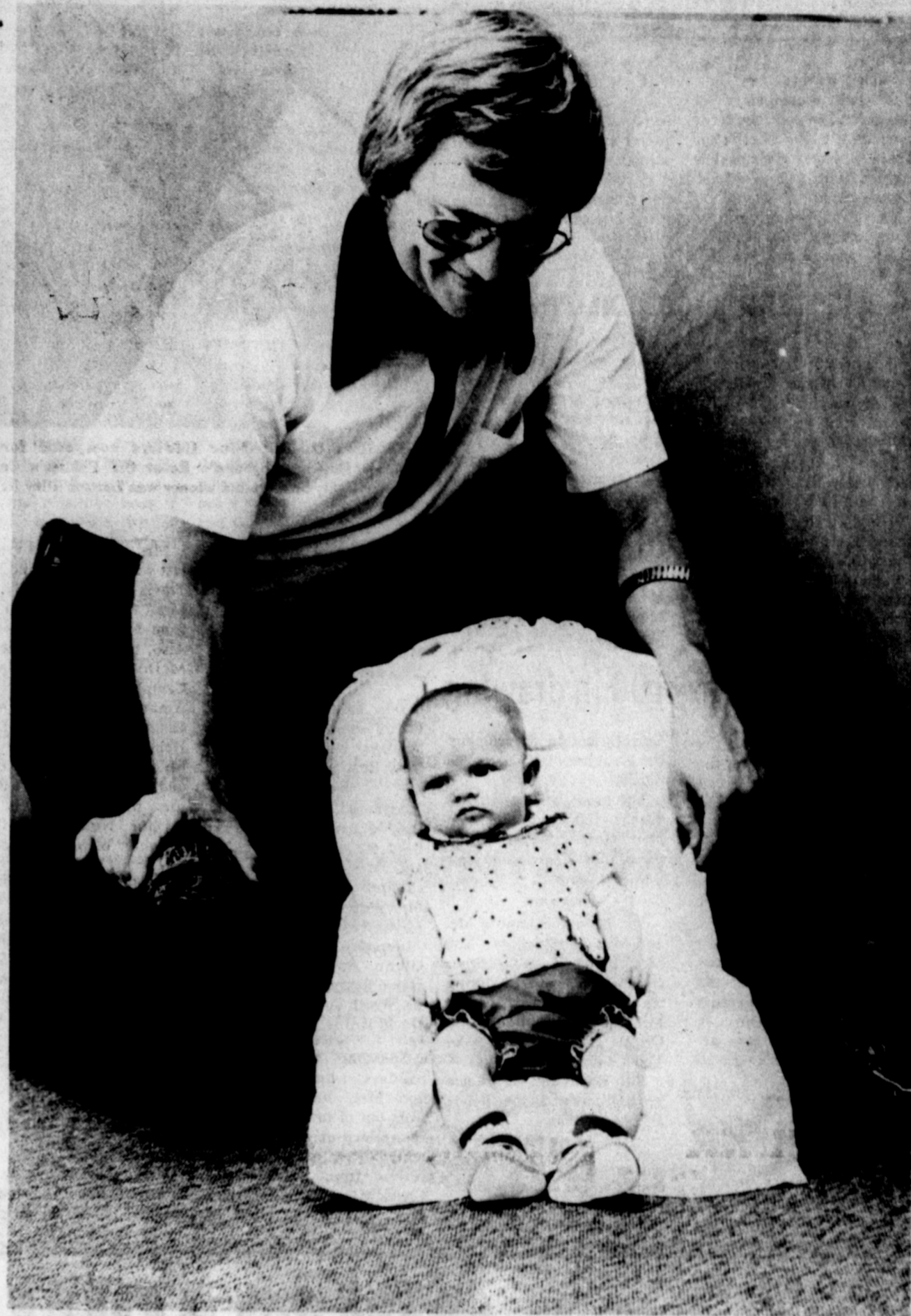

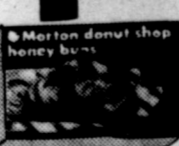
