What may prove to be one of the most important meetings ever held in Callahan County was held Tuesday night at the County Court House with business and social leaders from every area of the county in attendance.

The meeting, arranged by County Agent Travis Allen, was for the purpose of organizing the Callahan County Program Building Committee. The committee is charged with the responsibility of evaluating existing conditions in the economical and social life of the county, and to form plans of action whereby the entire county can combine efforts to make it better in both areas.

Jack Scott, prominent Cross Plains newspaperman, was named chairman of the new organization. Jerry Loper of Baird and Mrs. Blain Odum of Baird were named vice-chairman and secretary, respectively. The committee officers were to meet Thursday at 1:30 p.m. in Baird to name members of the executive committee to aid them in the study and planning.

County Agent Allen was in charge of the meeting. He presented Garland Marshall of the extension service of Texas A&M College, who was the speaker for the meeting. Mr. Marshall

quoted figures to show a steady decrease in population and in the social and economical structure of rural areas in general and Callahan County in particular in showing the need for a concerted effort to stop and reverse the trend.

Similar action as was planned Tuesday night, he said, had worked in many areas, and would work in Callahan County if all people of the county worked at the job. He pointed out that the success of the program depended on county-wide initiative, county-wide participation and county-wide co-operation. He stressed the importance of vision, initiative, determination, enthusiastic support and a positive attitude.

At the meeting Thursday, the committee was to begin work on the evaluation and study of the problems facing the county, and to establish priorities for immediate work. The public will be informed at all times of the work of the various segments of the committee.

Chairman Scott called upon all 35 county business, civic and social leaders who attended the Tuesday meeting, to work together for the betterment of the county, and he promised a campaign to enlist every resident of the county in the work at hand.

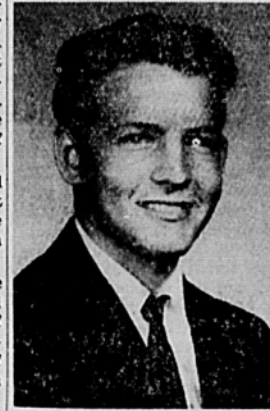
The club also voted to have a "Homemade candy sale" just before the Christmas holidays.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD, TEXAS, that the City of Baird does hereby offer and shall from henceforth offer and pay a reward of TWO HUNDRED FIFTY (\$250.00) DOLLARS for the apprehension and conviction of any person or persons found guilty of committing the crime of ARSON by setting fire to any house or building or property of whatsoever character within the corporate limits of the City of Baird. This reward is a standing offer, and shall be paid out of the GENERAL FUND of the City of Baird, Texas.

Dear Mike and Stevie.

Nice to hear from you fellows. But I think you are a bit on the inquisitive side. Well I tell you some of the answers but all the questions are not Kosker. Dig? This great event occurred on a small sandy farm in Callahan County about three miles as the crow flew those days. I walked the distance many times. Bet I could almost beat the crows some times.

November 29th, 3:30 a.m., night was cold and dark. The one coal oil lamp in the small 3 room box house was moved often. You could see the flash as some neighbor lady hurried from room to room.

Oh yes, great excitement in that house that night, two saddle horses tied to the fence awaiting the call to go after the Dr. and another lady to assist in this great event, so I have been told by the family later.

The hounds running around barking. Thinking they were go-

ing hunting, the possum and the coon, perhaps a bob cat or ring-tail.

I have been told by a lady that was there, that the father of this house was some hunter even down in the river bottoms of the old Trinity in Kaufmann County. And to tell the truth I rather think had the dogs went out in the woods and bayed that he and my uncle would have been there shortly.

How they ever rode a horse through all that timber I don't know. For I'll swear it was so dense the birds could not light on the ground. Fact is, there was birds in that timber that had never saw the light of day. See they fell from the nest while trying to fly the first time and never could get out. Oh, I helped make trails through there years later, that's why you see so many road runners out there now. They just never learned to fly. Why kids the cotton tails rabbits wore fire flies on their tails as guides those days, truth. The cotton tails got their first puff ball from a cottonwood tree that was shedding its balls of cotton. They did tell that after a few years the cottonwood trees all died and the rabbits were hard put to find a white puff ball. That is until the settlers went to growing cotton, then they laid in a supply and forever after had a puff of white on their posterior.

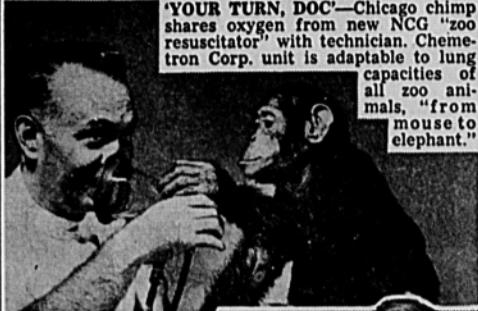
When the dogs would tree at night we always went to them, and it was music to hear old Bell and King bay, and the pups a running and yelping at the feet of the old dogs. Torches were always made and ready, oh, we never had lanterns and flashlights in those days when we were young at Baird.

Some times the dogs would find a possum in the trail and he would sul and hiss. Putting a stick in his mouth with a loop of string for a handle we toted him about until time to go home, putting our catch in the cages that were ready, then to the shucks or feathers if you were of the lucky class.

And the Bob Whites we trapped, ah. You should have went with us to those hog pen traps with a figure four trigger slide at the top. Since we had to place the traps where any stray stock might not get into them, we were in the dark shadows some time and could not see the breed of birds we had. Some times we had Mr. Pole Cat, we knew we had him though. Opening the slide in the top gently put your hand in after your birds, lad if you had a red bird you let him go if possible. A little old red bird could sure dig in on your hand and hang on.

In the winter we made dead falls around the feed lot. Tie a string to a trigger and watch, soon several bob whites would come in after the grain you laid out for them, some times four at a time. Run get them and reset your trap and make for the house, clean your birds and roast over the fire in the large fire place. In all truth, that's all the good I ever saw in a wood burn-

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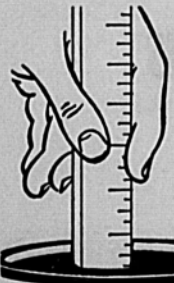


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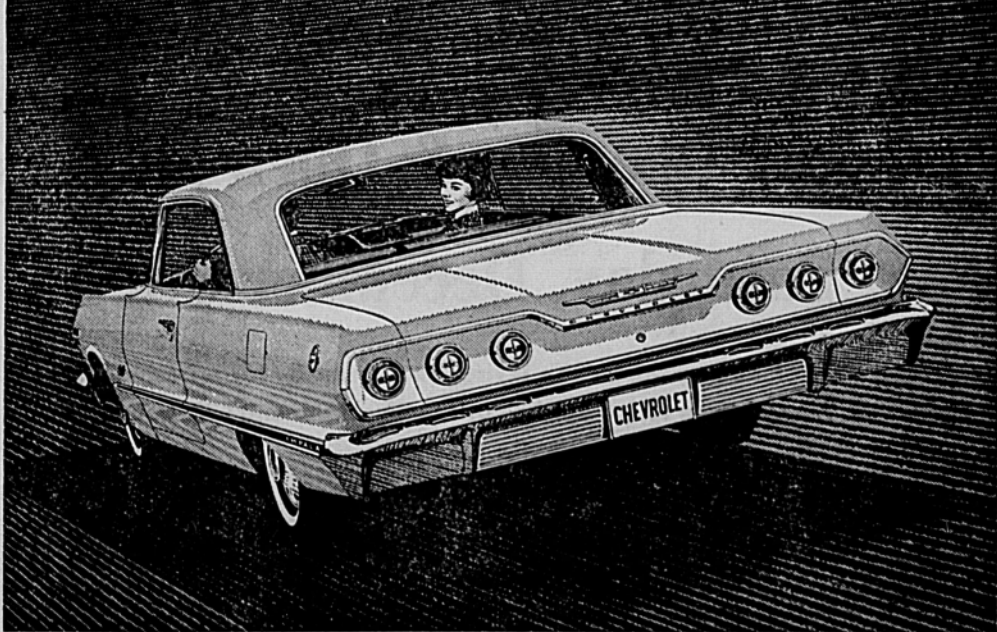
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Area-Wide Singing At Clyde Church

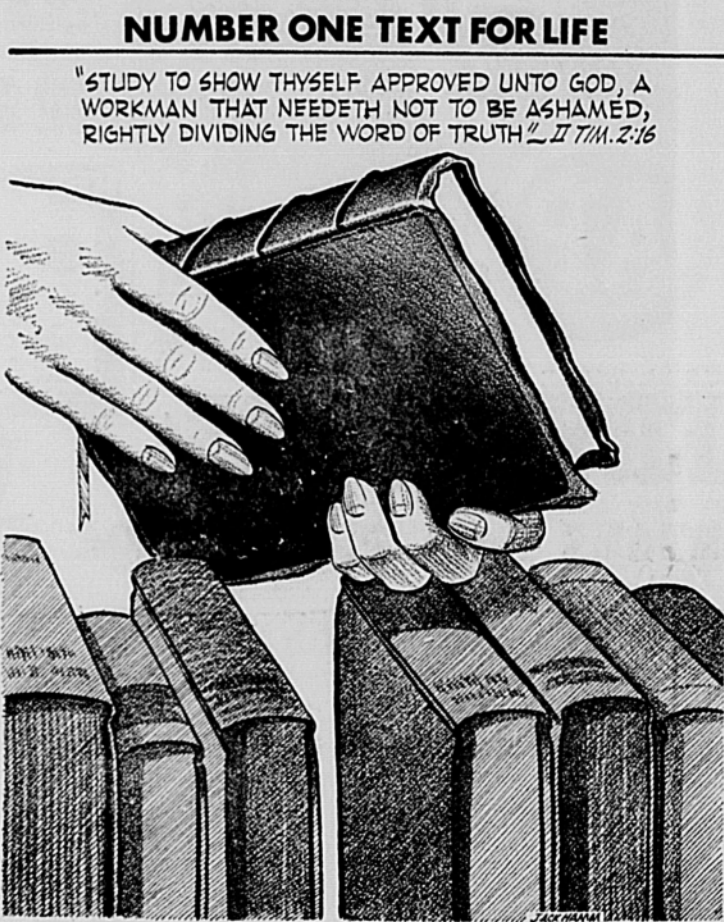

About Your Health . .

Thousands of years ago, the
cave dwellers had a simple solu-

Sponsored with the coopera-
tion of refuse equipment manu-
facturers and the host cities,
engineers from the State Health
Department's Sanitary Engi-
neering Division organize and
conduct demonstrations as well
as notify everyone in the area
who should be interested in re-
fuse disposal procedure.
The list includes nearly every-
one associated with municipal
sanitations - mayors, city com-
missioners, city managers, health
officers, county officials, mem-
bers of civic organizations, sani-
tarians, sanitation superinten-
dents, public work directors,
city engineers and citizens in-
terested in community sanita-
tion and public health.
Highlight of the meeting is a
demonstration of collection
trucks and sanitary landfill
equipment and the correct meth-
od for using the equipment.

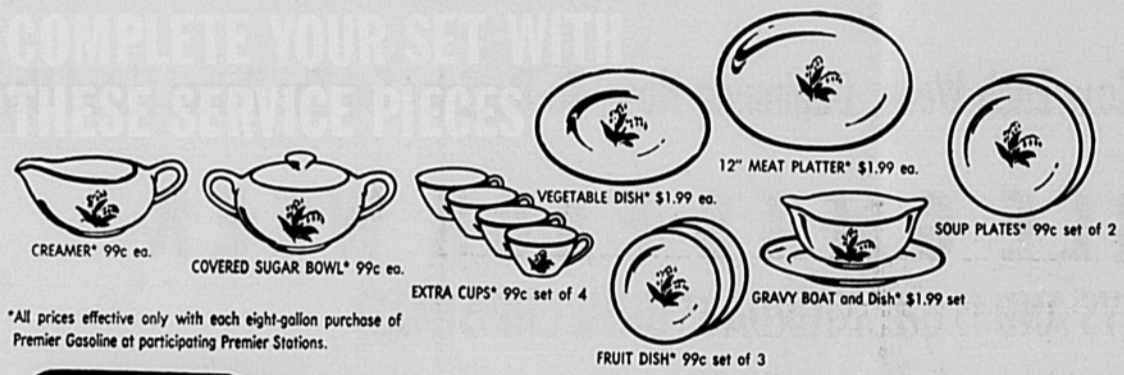
