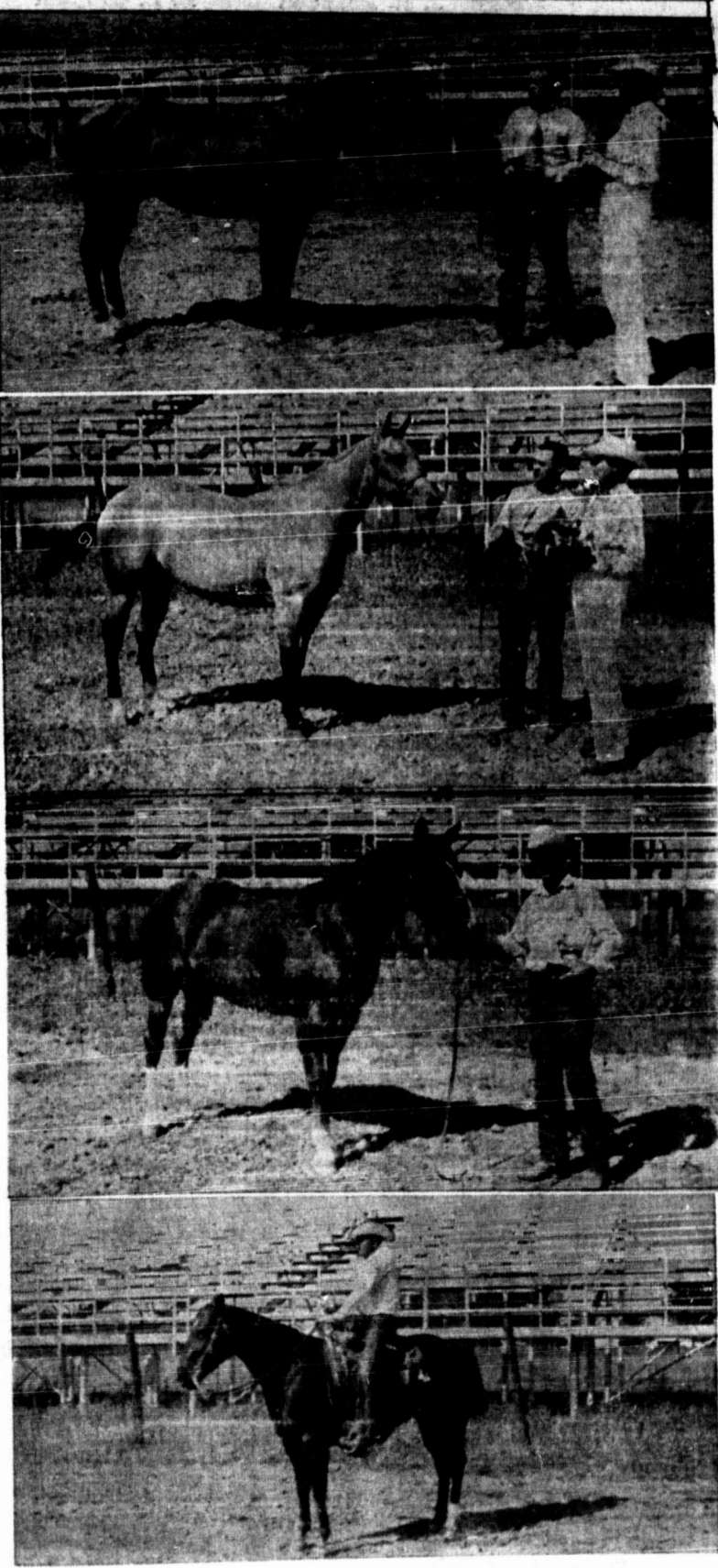

Cover Crops

Cover cropping is using close-growing grasses, legumes, or small grains in a cropping system primarily for summer or winter protection. Cover crops usually occupy the land for a period of one year or less. The purpose of cover crops is to provide a protective vegetative cover on areas subject to erosion during periods when the major crops do not furnish adequate cover and to maintain or improve the condition of the soil.

Cover cropping is applicable on all cropland, and orchard areas where a protective cover is needed to reduce soil and water losses. Such crops may also be used as green manure, for soil improvement between periods of regular crop production, or interseeded with cultivated crops.

All small grains, winter peas, millet, clover, and sorghum are suitable for cover crops.

Now is the time to be thinking about getting your cover crops in the ground if conditions are favorable to do so. The Donley County Soil Conservation Service is at your service to help and advise you on any assistance you might need. Feel free to call on us at any time.

Many of you may be interested in constructing dams for the storage of livestock water. Many have sites for dams that would meet storage requirements for livestock water after allowing for losses that are inevitable due to seepage and evaporation. Many of the dams constructed this summer have caught 16 to 20 feet of water. The reservoir sites with sufficient clay in the fill material will hold water best. The watershed area must be large enough to contribute surface runoff in amounts sufficient to replenish the supply for stock water, and totake care of evaporation and soil infiltration. A good spillway is required or drop inlet spillways must be provided.

There is a great need for more dams for livestock water in bring about the proper utilization of grassland, plus the added benefit of erosion control. Waterskiing and fishing on some of the small lakes in Donley County are some of the added benefits from dams constructed in recent years. Also, some irrigation water has been stored for use in extremely dry periods like the one we have experienced this summer.

Contact your local SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT if you plan to construct a farm or ranch pond in the future.

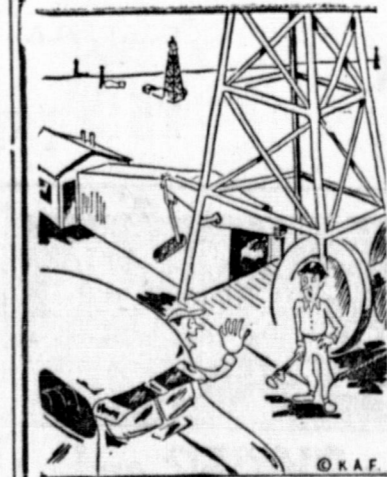

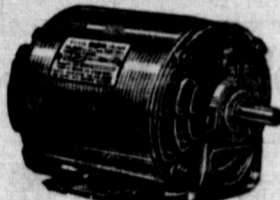

Regardless of news reports you may have read or heard, such use of this acreage without prior approval of the ASC County Committee is a violation of program regulations for which specific penalties, forfeitures and refunds apply.

Permission has been granted for soil bank grazing to extend until October 31, 1963, with a possibility of that date being extended later. A deduction for the value of the grazing or haying will be made from your program payments if this permission is granted.

built near the center of Donley County on the Salt Fork of Red River, due north of Lelia Lake at what is known as the "twin gates crossing."

The reservoir will have a capacity of 90,000 acre feet, including an appropriate allowance for reservoir siltation. The lake will have a surface area of 2,920 acres at service spillway level, which is 4.56 square miles of lake surface. The lake will extend more than four miles up Salt Fork of Red River and about four miles up Saddler Creek, with a width of about one and three-fourths miles just above the dam.

The average depth of the entire lake is 31 feet with a maximum depth at the dam of 75 feet. The effective drainage area above the dam site is 423 square miles.

The Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, presently comprising the cities of Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis, Childress, Quanah, Paducah, and Wellington, was created as a governmental agency of the State of Texas by the Legislature in 1954. The Authority was created as an organization for financing and construction purposes to supply surface water for municipal and industrial use by the member cities and such other cities as may be annexed by the Authority. Memphis does not own its water distribution system and probably will not hold an election at this time. Wellington is interested in the Collingsworth County project and probably will not hold an election. Because of the cost of the pipeline to Wellington, it appears that it would be more economically feasible to Greenbelt Authority for Wellington not to participate. Crowell will be voting to be added to the Authority in the next few weeks. Other than cost, the critical consideration with reference to

the water supply reservoir on the Salt Fork has always been the quality of the water with respect to the gyp content. Some 10 years of chemical analyses of daily samples of the flow of the Salt Fork, taken at State Highway 70 north of Clarendon, at the mouth of Whitefish Creek, and at U.S. Highway 83 north of Wellington indicate that the 90,000 acre foot reservoir at the present Greenbelt site will catch all of the runoff of the upper Salt Fork which is of good usable quality for municipal and industrial purposes.

Concentration of gyp content after evaporation from the lake has been the main problem. Reservoir operation studies show that at the present Greenbelt site, gyp content after concentration by evaporation will average only 160 parts per million as compared with the limiting standard for municipal supplies of the U.S. Public Health Service of 250 parts per million.

The proposed reservoir will have an estimated dependable yield of 13.7 million gallons of water per day even during critical drought periods, which is 2 1/2 times the presently estimated requirement of the entire Authority of 5.84 million gallons per day in the year 2000.

The total estimated cost of the project is \$9,818,000, comprising \$4,000,000 as the cost of the dam and reservoir, \$900,000 for the water treatment plant, and \$4,918,000 for the pipe line system.

The recent amendment to the State Constitution and the enabling act passed by the Legislature in the current session, permits the Texas Water Development Board to purchase storage space in a reservoir where such purchase will insure the maximum development of a reservoir site and where the sponsor cannot afford the maximum development. The Texas Water De-

velopment Board appears to be willing to purchase an undivided 57 1/2% interest in the Greenbelt Reservoir, which will be \$2,300,000, leaving the Authority's share to be \$1,700,000. The Texas Water Development Board cannot purchase a share in the water treatment plant or the pipe line system, but it can finance all the Authority's estimated cost of the project of \$7,518,000 with revenue bonds, which will be backed by the water sales contracts to be voted on September 28th. Thus there will be no tax bonds and no possibility of any taxes ever being levied for the payment of the project.

The financing of the project through the State will result in comparatively reasonable charges for treated and delivered water. The estimated cost of treated water delivered into the elevated storage at Clarendon and the other member cities is 30 cents per thousand gallons.

From the best engineering sources available, it appears that it is presently costing the City of Clarendon over 83 cents per thousand gallons to produce, pump, and treat their water ready for sale. Purchasing the treated water delivered into the elevated tanks at 30 cents per thousand gallons would be more economical to the City.

In purchasing the water from Greenbelt Authority the City would cease operating the water wells now in use. The City would however, continue to own the wells as their own and would continue to maintain them on a standby basis and for peaking purposes. It is specifically pointed out in the proposed contract to be voted on, that the entire cost of maintaining and pumping the wells owned by the City would be at the expense of the Greenbelt Authority, and the City would be reimbursed for all its pumping and maintenance

expense.
The City must of course sell the water which it purchases at a higher sum than its cost to defray the expenses of maintaining and paying for the bonded indebtedness on the present water distribution system, and other operation expenses which the City has customarily paid from water sale receipts. On the basis of engineer reports and recommendations of financial experts on water sales by cities, the City of Clarendon has adjusted their water rates to go into effect at the time that the City begins purchasing their water from the Greenbelt Authority, which will probably be in 1966. It is anticipated that such rates could not possibly be any higher and may be lowered at the proper time, but for financing purposes it was decided to establish the following rates:

0-2,000 gallons (min.) \$3.50
Next 8,000 gallons at 60 cents
Next 10,000 gallons at 55 cents
Next 10,000 gallons at 50 cents
Next 10,000 gallons at 45 cents
All over 40,000 gallons at 40 cents

Hedley and Quanah have set the exact same rates as Clarendon, and Childress has set a higher rate commencing at 75 cents for the first five thousand gallons. Paducah rates have not as yet been set, but their rates will have to be 7 1/2 cents per thousand gallons more than the other member cities because of such added cost of delivering water to them.

Under the contract which will be voted on, Clarendon will be obligating itself to purchase in the first year of operation in 1966 an average of 490,000 gallons of water per day. This appears to be no obstacle as the City has been using an average of 530,000 gallons per day during the past ten years. With the anticipated increase in population, there should be no problem in

Clarendon using all of the 490,000 gallons per day average beginning in 1966.

The vote on September 28th is the culmination of over 20 years of effort on the Greenbelt reservoir. Don't fail to vote on September 28th for new prosperity for Clarendon.
