Several factors are considered highly favorable for early eradication at this time. They include: 1. Screwworm cases are at an all-time low for the season. Less than 75 cases were reported in Texas last week, as compared to

over 5,000 in August, 1962. 2. Capability for producing sexually sterile screwworm flies is at an all-time high. More than 135 million flies per week can be released to mate with native flies and prevent reproduction.

3. Inspection stations, operating along the western edge of the eradication area, are preventing transportation of infested livestock into the area.

4. A barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, which is designed being expanded.

5. Livestock inspectors are ready to deal with any emergen-


