Committee Will Give Advice On Debt Difficulties

Expert advice on how to smooth out debt and land-tenure difficulties will be furnished to debt-burdened farmers Monday, Oct. 6 when the Callahan County Farm Debt Adjustment Committee meets. The meeting will be held at the Court House in Baird according to James S. McKnight, rural supervisor.

Roy Kendrick, chairman, said that committee members would give debt-burdened farmers and their creditors and landlords the benefit of their experience and best judgment in working repayment schedules and land-tenure agreements that are fair to both parties.

"The committee's services are free and confidential", he states, "and we welcome any farmer, whether tenant or owner, who finds it impossible to pay his debts or get a farm for next year on a satisfactory basis."

The Farm Debt Adjustment Committee is sponsored by the Farm Security Administration as part of its efforts to help small farmers and ranchers to make a better living on the land and to increase the security of their land tenure.

County Red Cross Quota Set At 1000 Members

A meeting of the County Red Cross Committee held at the Co-Library Friday afternoon of last week pursuant to a call by C. V. Jones, County Chairman for the purpose of making arrangements for the annual roll call drive which opens on Armistice Day and continues through November. The county quota being set at one thousand members.

Miss Mary Parr of the St. Louis office attended the meeting. She emphasized the importance of greater effort in the drive this year because of the special needs of Army, Navy and other agencies engaged in the National Defense program.

Chapter to accept an increase of Fifty-Per-Cent in its quota this year. There is also a probability that more funds will be needed locally, she said due to the fact that WPA funds are being cut down and will not be available for local employment.

M. H. Perkins Attends Conference In Coleman

M. H. Perkins of Slyde, Sec-Treas., of the Citizens National Farm Loan Association who attended a conference of twenty-four N. F. L. A. secretary-treasurers in Coleman Thursday of last week says that Texas farmers and stock men are enjoying the highest price levels for their products since May 1930.

Although crops are spotted conditions are generally good. The Federal Land Bank, of Houston, reports improved collections this year. It has been able to reduce its inventory on real estate during the past 12 months due to lively demands for farms. The Land Bank has made more than forty per cent more new loans thus far in 1941 than for same period in 1940. This gain is said to be due largely to activity in land and refinancing under favorable terms and interest rates.

It was pointed out at the conference that the Federal Land Bank of Houston has extended a total of \$411,000,000 in long-term farm mortgage credit through Land Bank and Land Bank Commissions Loans in 24 years. More than a fourth of all borrowers have repaid their obligations in full proving the success the Land Banks system goal of helping framers and ranchers pay out of debt.

Mr. Perkins says the members of the conference expressed the belief that the Land Bank system has been a stabilizing influence on land values by holding basis for loans to normal, agricultural values and by judging repayment ability according to normal process.

The Association and their Land Bank are advocating a plan which permits payments on obligations in advance to build up a cushion against lean years and at this time they are able to permit an offset interest on advance payments.

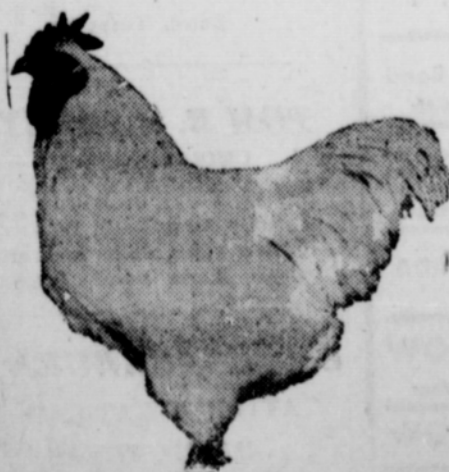

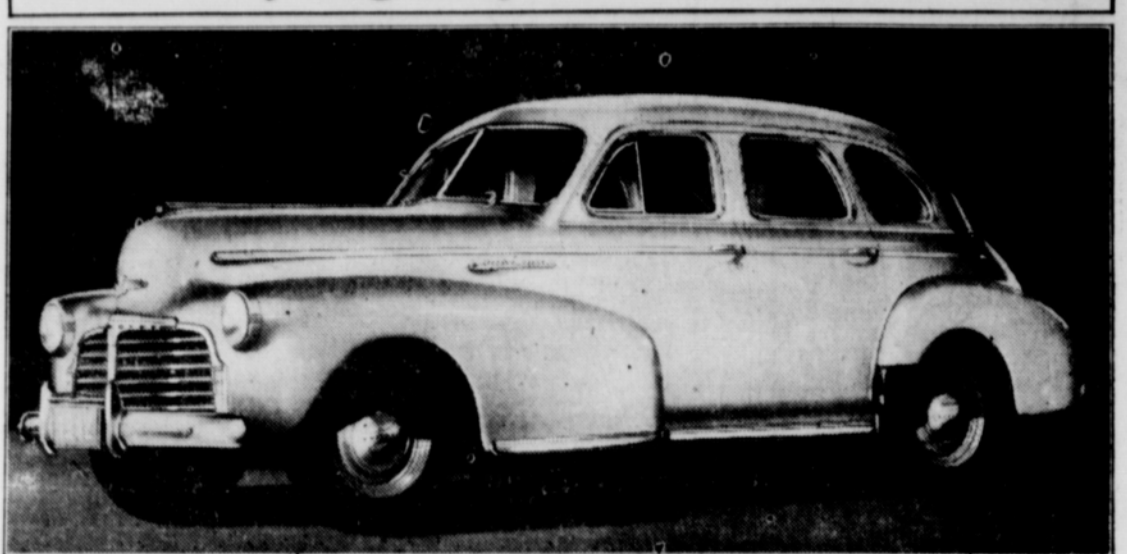
