## Voters Elect Officials

Voters in Donley County selected officials for a number of offices on Saturday, May 6th.

In city races, Jim Sharrar edged out David Davidson by a count of 192 to 152 to become the new mayor. The count for the candidates for alderman were as follows. David Pitts--224, James Kuhn--166, James Thomas--124, Scott Hand--96, Benny Osburn--62. There were two seats up for Aldermen. There were several write-in candidates who received one or two votes.

Voters gave the following count to school board candidates: Johnny Floyd--345, Phillip Fletcher--308, Venita Sharrar--267, David McAnear--189, Richard Grisham--95, Janice Barbee--94.

In the hospital race, Brian Knowles was running unopposed for Place 1, and got 456 votes. For Place 2, Lawrence Whitehead took 288 votes to Frances McCord's 206. Missy Kidd took Place 3 with 332 votes to R.D. Patton's 167.

The election at Howardwick held some surprises. There were three candidates, all running unopposed. Max Hennigh won the mayors race against four write-in candidates. Hennigh got 67 votes, Huell Bingham took three, Dan Lewis got one, "Peck" Pettit collected two votes and Henry Bland picked up one. In the race for aldermen, Joyce McCombs attracted 76 votes, Nancy McClintock drew 39, while write-in Huell Bingham had 43 votes.

Voter turn-out was relatively light in all races in the area. Many registered voters did not vote, and many more did not even register. Those who did not vote have forfeited the right to complain about what elected officials do.

## Thank You Clarendon

Clarendon had some very distinguished visitors in town, Friday. Thursday nights storm not only broke tree branches and power lines, but brought some visitors into the county jail.

Detective Captain, Roger A. Hermes Jr., from the Illinois Police Dept. from Illinois, Illinois and David Dockins Ex-Correctional officer from the Stateville Corrections Center, in Bloomington, Illinois, had picked up 6 prisoners in Amarillo, from their extradition officers from California. They had already picked up one prisoner from Kansas, and were transporting the prisoners to points in Louisiana, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Ohio and Florida.

The two officers along with their 7 prisoners had left Amarillo, when they began having car problems at Washburn. They managed to get into Claude, where they were sent on to Clarendon, to find a mechanic.

On their arrival in Clarendon, their prisoners were put in the local jail house for the night and the two Extradition Agents were taken to a local motel. K & T Garage picked up their car the next day. While the car was being repaired, the two agents visited many of the local businesses. They ate at Mary's Country Kitchen and Sam Hills B B Q. One of the businesses visited was The Print Shoppe, where owner Gary Mays, made impressions of their badges on some caps for them.

Detective Captain Hermes Jr. and David Dockins told this reporter that they had broken down

in towns before, but had never experienced the hospitality that they were shown in Clarendon, Texas. Their prisoners were well treated in the jail, which makes their job easier for them.

Detective Captain Roger A. Hermes Jr. and David D. Dockins had these words to say: "We travel throughout the United States frequently and we have never encountered the hospitality, the kindness and the help that the people that we have met has given us, and we would like to THANK everyone in Clarendon."

Roger A. Hermes Jr. is also the National Vice President of the National Association of Chiefs of Police, and also the National Committee Chairman of Counter Terrorism.

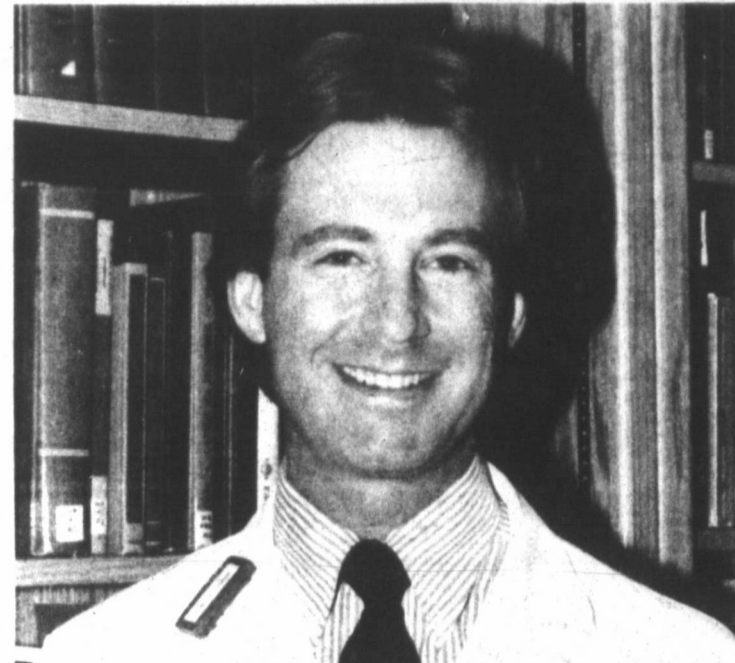

**Skin Cancer Screening Scheduled**

The Harrington Cancer Center will co-sponsor a free skin cancer screening clinic again this year in the downstairs clinic area at the Center. The American Academy of Dermatologists, the Texas Dermatological Society and the American Cancer Society will also participate as co-sponsors in the May 20th clinic open from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Amarillo and the High Plains region lie in the area of the country where skin cancer is prevalent. Being aware of the effects of sun on human skin makes it possible for a person to learn to control skin cancer by the use of sun screens, covering the exposed parts of the body and staying out of direct sunlight whenever possible.

Specific populations are more at risk for being skin cancer patients. heavy sun tanners, farmers and construction workers who spend their days in the sun and those who use tanning booth often show signs of skin cancer. Sun exposure can happen even when the body is covered if the rays of the sun penetrate light-weight or light colored clothing, or if the rays are reflected from clothing onto the face, even though the person is wearing a hat for protection.

The skin cancer screening, done in a private exam room, covers mole checks on exposed and unexposed skin areas. Physicians will

check any part of the skin for abnormalities. If an abnormality is found, the participant is referred to his or her doctor for additional examination.

The physicians will ask for a family history of skin cancer when they examine a person who participates in the free clinic. They will also check on a history of x-ray treatment for acne or other skin conditions. They will look for any pigmented spots that have changed size recently, and they will determine each participant's skin type in its ability to tan or burn.

Information on skin cancer will be provided, and registered nurses will be available to teach skin self-examination. Dermatologists will also be present to answer any questions.




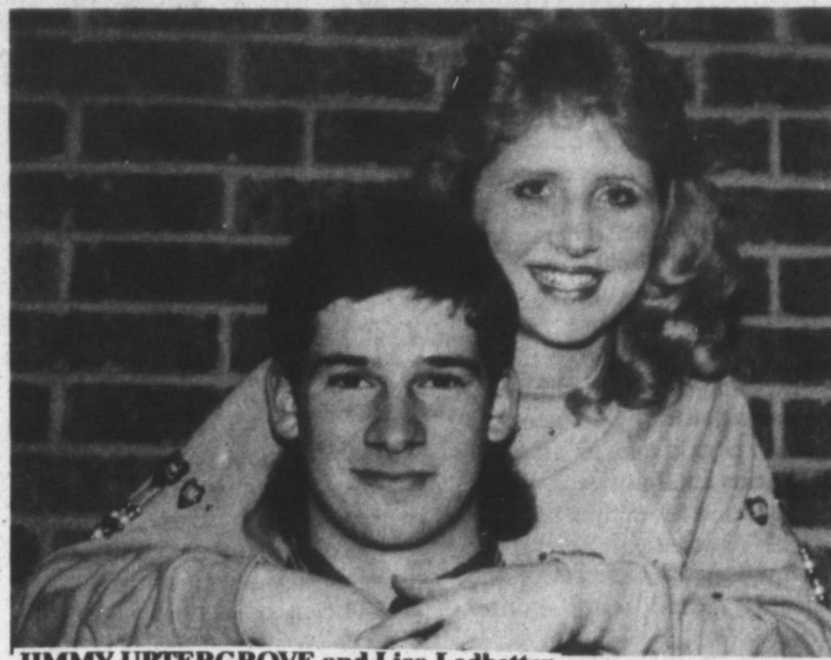

# Donley Co. Declared Emergency

Donley County has been notified that it has been approved for emergency haying and grazing on ACR and CU for pay-

ment acreage during the consecutive five-month restricted period. The land may be: 1) grazed by the producer's own livestock, 2) grazed by another producer's livestock with the enrolled producer's permission, 3) hayed, green chopped or ensiled for: a) feeding the producer's own livestock, b) feeding another producer's livestock c) current use or storage for future use.

During the five-month period (May 15th through October 14th)

that haying would otherwise have been restricted, the producer shall: 1) Not charge or receive any benefit for grazing, haying, green shopping or ensiling for another producer, 2) Be permitted to recover normal and reasonable cost for other services. Examples of chargeable services are: a) installing temporary fences, b) pumping water for grazing livestock, c) cutting, raking, baling or other haying steps. 3) Cover crop hayed, green chopped, or ensiled and stored: a) During the five-month period may be sold, but the sale price shall not exceed that amount needed to recover the normal and reasonable cost for removal. b) After the end of the five-month period that haying

would otherwise have been restricted may be sold for any price. If you intend to make use of this program, you must notify the Donley County ASCS Office of your intentions prior to any haying or grazing ACR or CU for pay acres.

Deuteronomy 6:7-9

THE LAST WORD

by Jon Leggett

Quickly, now, tell me--what is the last word of the Old Testament? Is it "God"? (No peeking!) Is it "peace"? "Amen"? No, none of these. Do you give up? The Old Testament's final word is "curse". And a quick glance at a good concordance reveals that there are dozens and dozens of references to the word, or one of its related forms, such as "cursed," or "accursed." Why is the Old Testament so gloomy? Why end on such a sour note?

Well, of course, the Old Testament is not gloomy. Just think of all the uplifting Psalms, the beautiful love story in Ruth, and the exalted vision in Isaiah of the Almighty on His throne. Even that last verse of the Old Testament actually contains a promise of blessing. Still, much is said about curses, and the patriarchs and prophets delivered their dire messages with heavy hearts and weeping. In fact, the message of the Old Testament might be summarized by the dictum, "Obey the Law or be accursed."

Over and over the Israelites foundered--no, wallowed--in disobedience, and brought the threatened curses upon themselves. They would not--they could not--obey the Law.

schoolmaster's job be to show the student how to fit into society, and become a useful part of that society? Just so, says Paul, the Law was intended to show us that man fell short, and was not yet ready for full participation in the Kingdom (verses 24-25). Or, put negatively, man needed help--he was accursed.

Praise the Lord, "cursed" is not His last word! Yes, literally speaking, it is the last word of the Old Testament. And it is the last word of the old covenant in another sense: "Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, being made a curse for us: for it is written, Cursed is every one that hangeth on a tree" (Galatians 3:13). Christ's sacrifice, His death on the cross for me, wiped out my curse of death, and under the covering of His blood made me at last acceptable, free from the schoolmaster, fit for the Kingdom! "For ye are all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:26).

What IS our wonderful, loving Lord's last word to us? Look at the final verse of Revelation: "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all. Amen."

We often act as if we think God tried, through the Law, to bring mankind to Himself, saw, to His surprise, that something was amiss, and said something like, "Hmm. That didn't work so well. Guess I'll have to try something else." Nothing could be further from the truth.

Paul tells us that the Law was like a schoolmaster who trains his student until he is responsible, until he grows up (Galatians 3:23-26). While the student is growing, wouldn't a part of the

## Dr. David Livingstone

1813-1873

He was the first European to traverse the entire length of Lake Tanganyika, and travel over the vast watershed of Lake Bangweulo.

He greatly increased the knowledge of the geography, fauna, and flora of the interior of Africa. Yet, he never lost sight of the great objectives in his life--preaching the Gospel, healing the sick, and eradicating the monstrous slave trade.

His thirty years of work in Africa were filled with tremendous physical suffering and grief. His left arm was maimed by a lion attack, his body was racked by innumerable attacks of malaria and rheumatic fever. He became half-deaf and almost blind in one eye. Livingstone lost his beloved wife Mary, teenage son, and a new-born daughter, during his many years as a missionary in Africa.

He died on his knees, in prayer, thousands of miles away from his native land and family.


We trust you will be inspired by the life, works, and words of Dr. David Livingstone. They are as relevant today as when they were first spoken, over a hundred years ago.





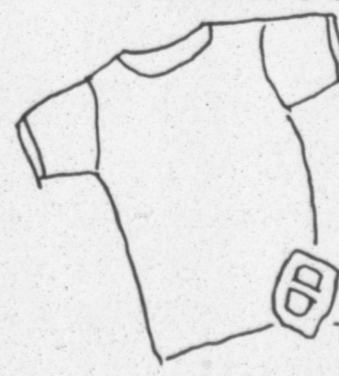
