COTTON PRODUCTION RECORDS

All cotton farmers in Donley County are asked to furnish this office with their cotton production records of any cotton ginned outside this county in 1963, 1964, and/or 1965. We have records from all the gins in Donley County for these years.

These records will be considered by the ASC Committees in setting the 1967 cotton yields. If you ginned cotton in any other county in any one of these 3 years, please bring the gin records in at your earliest convenience.

DIVERTED ACRES

Some concern is being given as to the eligibility of some of the acreage being designated as diverted under the various farm programs. Listed below are some of the major requirements for the designated diverted acres.

1. Must be equal in productivity to other land on the farm.
2. Must not be grazed between May 1 and November 1.
3. Must have been intensively cultivated or under CR contract during one of the last four years.
4. Crops cannot be harvested from the acreage during the year.
5. Must be in reasonable shape.
6. Must be controlled from weeds and erosion.

WHEAT ALLOTMENT NOTICES

You should receive your wheat allotment notice very shortly. Please read all the fine print at the bottom of these notices carefully and come by the office if you have any question.

COTTON DESTROYED

Producers that have lost planted cotton due to the adverse weather conditions and do not plan to plant it back to cotton should check with this office before planting these acreages in any other commodity. You will want to find out what crops would be eligible to plant on these acres and not put you out of compliance on any other farms.

SUMMER CARE NEEDED FOR ROSE GARDENS

Don't neglect your roses if you want flower protection throughout the summer and fall, advises County Agent Ronald Gooch.

A disease and insect control program is a must. A preventive spray of folpet every 7 to 10 days will prevent blackspot and help control mildew, says Gooch.

An application of a complete fertilizer scattered over the surface of the rose every four weeks will insure continued growth and strong canes for later summer and fall flowers, says the agent. He suggests the use of one to two pounds of 10-4-6 or 16-20-0 per 100 square feet of bed area.

To conserve moisture and reduce soil temperatures during the summer months, the county agent suggests the use of a two to three inch mulch of saw dust, shavings, pine straw, cotton burrs or other organic material. As the mulch decomposes, it should be replaced, he says.

West Part Of County Receives More Rain And Crop Damage

Right now, the east side of the county has a lot of catching up to do in the moisture department. It seems that the hill east of town is the dividing line. Tuesday afternoon Willard Knox reported only .07 inch, here in town .60, Hubert Rhoades reported 1 inch at Ash-tola and Goodnight received two inches. C. C. Rich at the Country Club measured .80 and the Brice area to the south reported only a sprinkle.

While receiving good moisture in the area from Martin to Goodnight, those farmers also suffered the biggest crop losses. Hail destroyed hundreds of acres of wheat, cotton and grain on Tuesday night and the big blow Wednesday night took out additional acreage in that area and all over the county in general where young crops were growing.

Here in town our total for the month stands at 3.86 thru Wednesday noon and 7.83 for the year so far. We have received moisture on eight of the 22 days of June. More moisture is in the weather forecast and we hope the east side of the county receives beneficial moisture.

GRASSHOPPER SPRAY PROGRAM TO START IN FEW DAYS

Over 4,000 acres of grass land will be sprayed for grasshoppers in an area south of McLean in a grasshopper spray program, according to Ronald Gooch, County Agent. The spraying will start the last of this week or the first of next week depending on when the contract for this flying is let. The program will cost about \$10,500, two-thirds of it being paid by the ranchers and the rest by the federal government.

The area being sprayed will include 7805 acres in Donley, 5620 in Collingsworth, and 1040 in Gray Counties.

The Donley County Grasshopper Control Committee was organized at a meeting in McLean last week to request assistance from the Plant Pest Control division of the United States Department of Agriculture for the spraying program. Officers include Forrest Preston of Childress, program supervisor; Alfred McMurtry and Jess Kemp, secretary-treasurer. Committeemen are Jess Coleman, Buck Glass and Ronald Gooch.

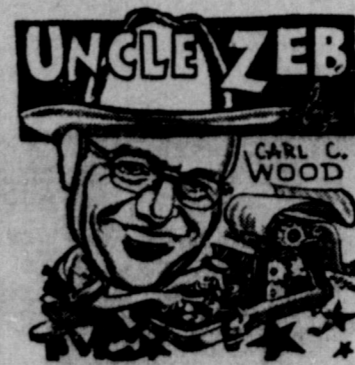

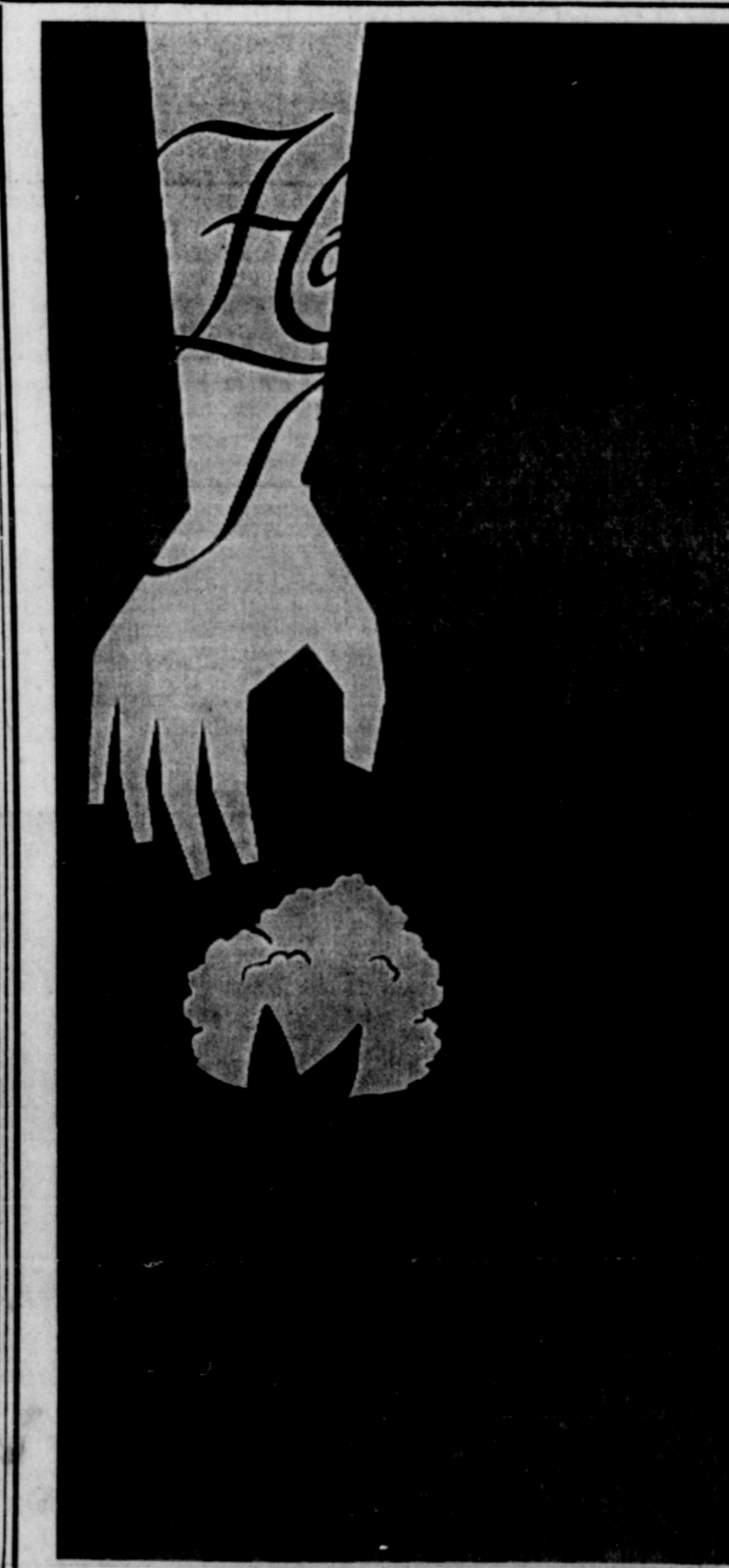
