Donley County Receives \$150,000 FHA Loan For New Country Club

The Leader was authorized by the office of Senator Ralph Yarborough Tuesday to release the following statement: "The Farmers Home Administration notified Senator Ralph Yarborough today that it has made a loan to Donley County. The amount of the loan is \$150,000 and is to be used to improve the Clarendon Country Club and the recreational area for the community."

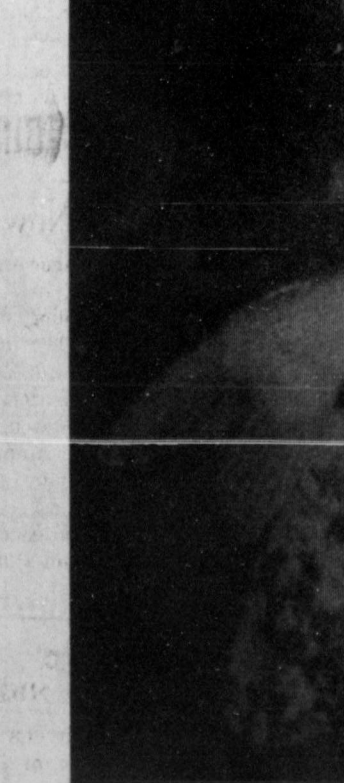

The annual Teenage Safe Driving Road-E-O sponsored by the Clarendon Jaycees will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. on the parking area in front of City Hall. Competition is open to all persons who have not reached their nineteenth birthday on or before August 1, 1968. The individual must not be married or ever been married, must have a driver's license, and not be found guilty of a moving traffic violation by a competent court within a six month period prior to competition. Ira Kuhlman, local Jaycee Chairman for the Road-E-O this year, asks that any teenager who meets the qualifications and who would like to enter this year's competition, contact any member of the Jaycees and they will see that you get an entry blank. We suggest you refer to this ballot and study it before you go to cast your vote. There are three referendum propositions also placed on the ballot and again you are reminded to place an X in the box when voting FOR a candidate or proposition. In Precinct

elections only the candidates for your Precinct will be listed to avoid confusion. Only one candidate is listed for U. S. Representative, 18th Congressional District. He is Dick Brown. The race for Governor of the State of Texas is wide open with 10 candidates seeking that office. As to which candidates will reach the run-off, anybody's guess is good. Three candidates are listed for Lt. Governor of the State with Ben Barnes appearing to hold somewhat of a lead state-wide. Referring to the Sample Ballot you will see the various names appearing as candidates for other state offices. On the District level, contesting races are for Court of Civil Appeals, Seventh Supreme Judicial District where three candidates are listed: James A. Joy, Bruce Miller and Jack Hazelwood. It appears that to scatter representation and give balance to the Court over the area, people from surrounding locales give Joy the edge. Jack Boone appears to be running very strong locally in his campaign for District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District. Within the county the most talked of race is the Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector office. Lonnie (Bill) Cornell, candidate for re-election, has served the people of the area and managed his office efficiently during his term working in harmony with all areas of law enforcement and county operation. His opponent in the race, Frank Tyler, is a newcomer in politics. He has lived in the area for some years and has been a devoted worker in the Baptist Church. The only other contested races in the County is in Precinct 3 where Junior Hill, incumbent, opposes Bill Cooke III, and Precinct 1 where Clarence Reynolds is contested by Hubert Rhoades and Vance Gray. Voters in town will cast their ballots at the following places: all living east of main street will vote at the Youth Canteen; all living west of main street will vote at Lions Club Hall. Precinct votes will be cast at their usual voting places. 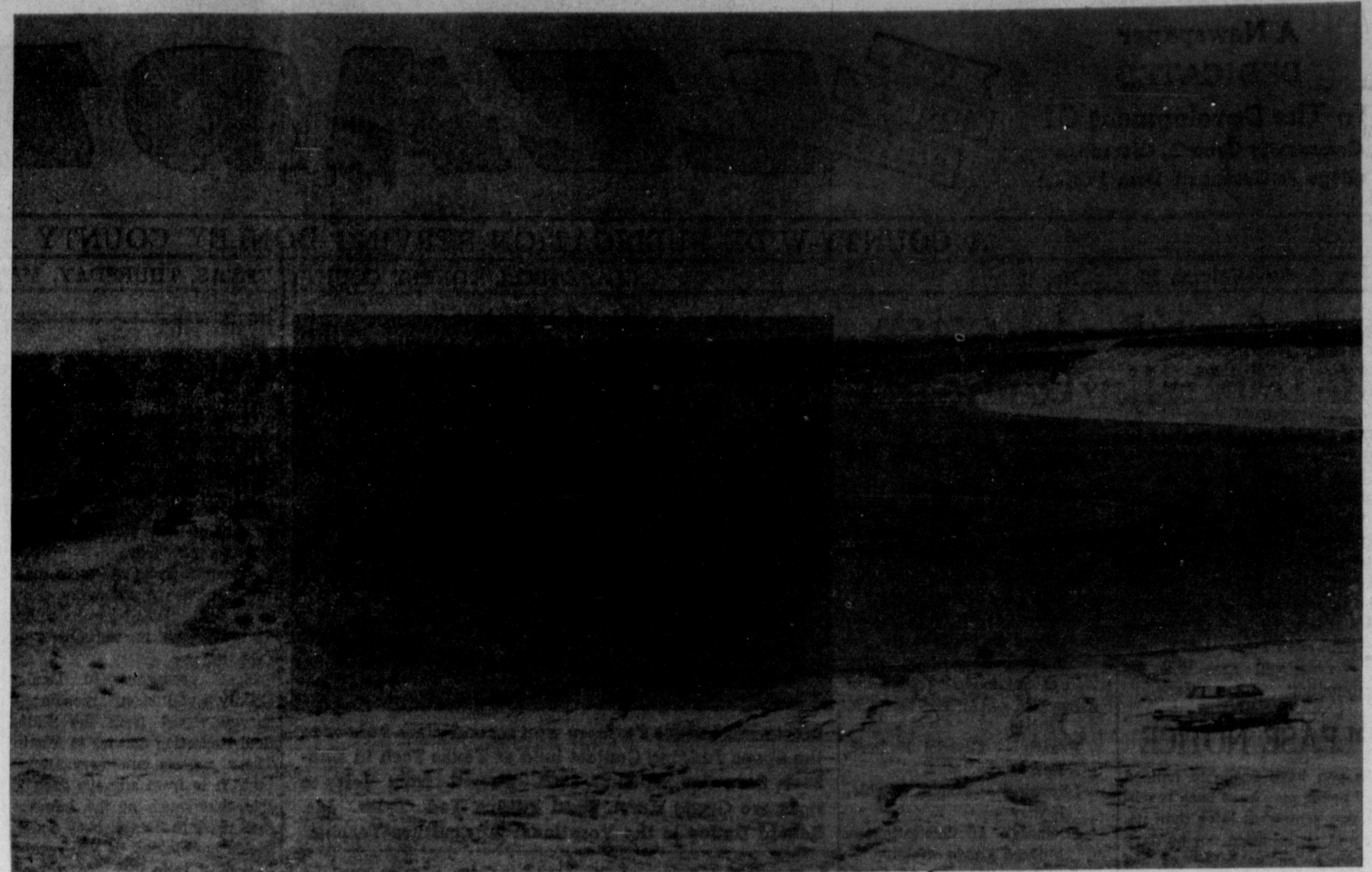

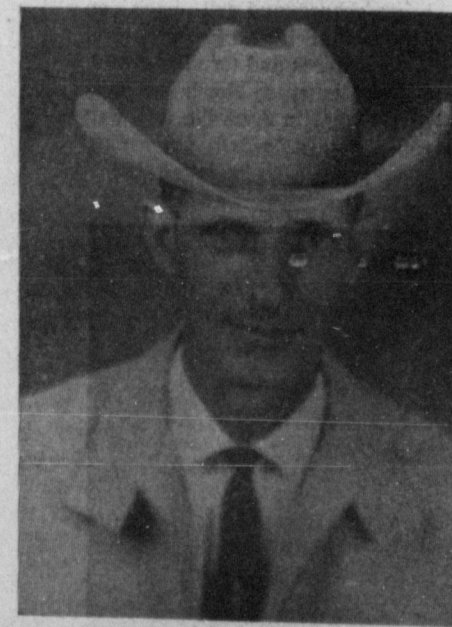

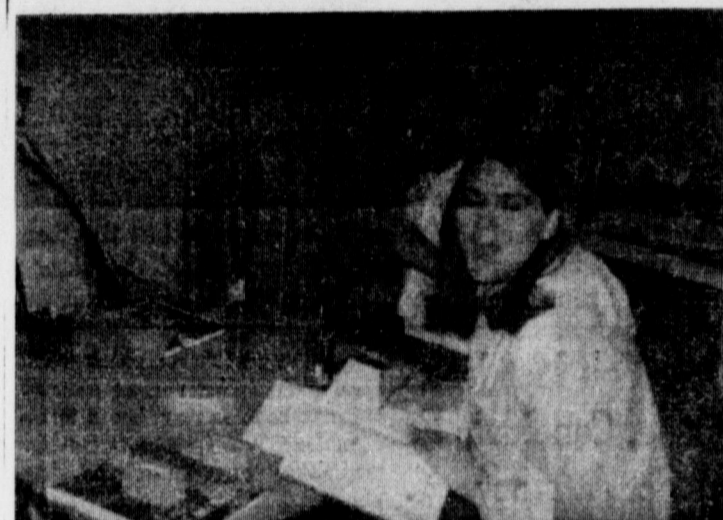
DIABETICS LAY SOCIETY PLANS MEETING TUESDAY

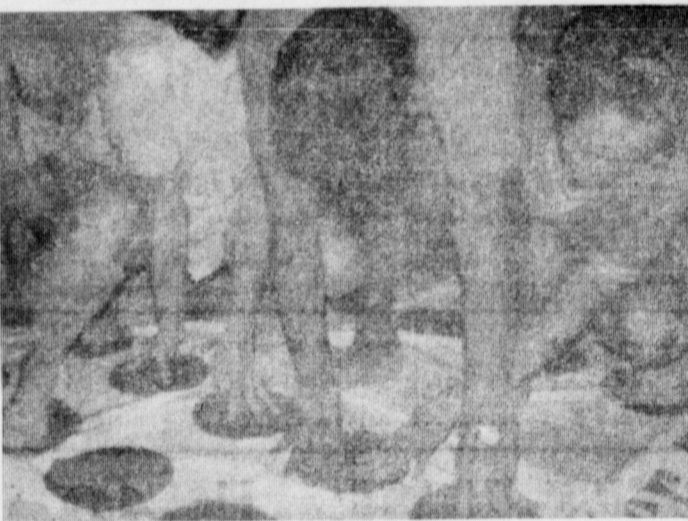
