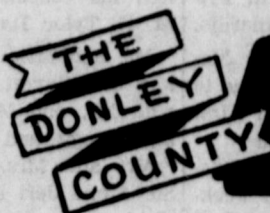

INFLUENZA VACCINE IS RECOMMENDED

Public Health Officials have again issued recommendations for influenza vaccine in susceptible individuals. Immunization is recommended in older age groups, those over 45, and particularly over 65; also patients of any age who suffer from cardiovascular or bronchopulmonary diseases, diabetes, or other chronic health problems. Other individuals may need to consider immunization because of high risk employment situations such as hospital or health service work or group or public employment.

Injections should be taken in September and preferably completed prior to mid-December.

COMMITTEE ELECTIONS

1968 Final Payments

Checks for the 1968 Cotton, Feed Grain, and Wheat Programs have been mailed to approximately 95 per cent of the producers. We expect to have all the checks mailed within the next few days.

Soil bank checks will be mailed in October.

SOIL BANK FARMS

If you have soil land which expires from contract on December 31, 1968, you may begin farming the land at anytime. However, this land cannot be grazed until January 1, 1969.

FEEDLOT BEING BUILT NEAR HEDLEY

According to Charles H. Payne, construction has started on the Donley County Feedlot, a custom feedlot about three miles west of Hedley. Working pens, working chute, and loading chute are being built at a moderate pace and work will begin on the feed mill in about 30 days along with land leveling. Some feeding pens have been staked off and ditches dug for water and gas lines. Other feeding pens will be staked in the near future.

Buying of alfalfa and other roughages has begun and a good supply of feed will be available for winter. Charles H. Payne states that they hope to be able to handle some cattle on a limited basis by the end of the year. It will probably be the first of the year before cattle will be handled on a large scale.

Broncs Drop Memphis In Season Opener

Led by QB Donnie Mooring the Clarendon Bronchos rolled past the Memphis Cyclone at Cyclone Stadium in Memphis Friday night. Mooring completed only 3 of 11 pass attempts, but 2 of the passes were for scoring strikes of 47 and 40 yards.

Junior halfback Charles Louis scored the Maroon and White's first TD on a beautiful over the shoulder reception from Mooring. Louis raced down the sidelines for a 47 yard score. Senior tackle Phillip Longan kicked his first of two extra points to put the Broncs ahead to stay.

In the second quarter, Longan put his admitted toe to work by kicking his first field goal of this young season. Longan split the uprights for a 46 yard attempt. This made the score 10-0. After the kickoff Memphis was unable to move the ball and had to punt to Clarendon. Clarendon put the ball in play on the Cyclone 40 yard line and had just time for one play before the first half expired. The Bronchos lined up as if they were going to try a field goal. Mooring took the snap from center Mitchell Martin, and rolled out to his right. He hit Jim Moore with a perfect pass, who raced untouched into the end zone. Longan kicked his second extra point of the night to end the scoring at 17-0 in favor of the visiting Bronchos.

The second half was completely dominated by both teams defenses as neither team scored. The Bronchos came out on top of this game with their archival 17-0.

Steve Land paced the Broncho rushers with 76 yards gained on 16 carries for a 4.7 average. Mooring threw for 87 yards. The Bronchos out gained the Cyclone 283-188. The Broncs made 12 first downs to 9 for Memphis.

Clarendon's next game will be the home opener of the 1968 season with the always tough Bucks of White Deer this Friday night.

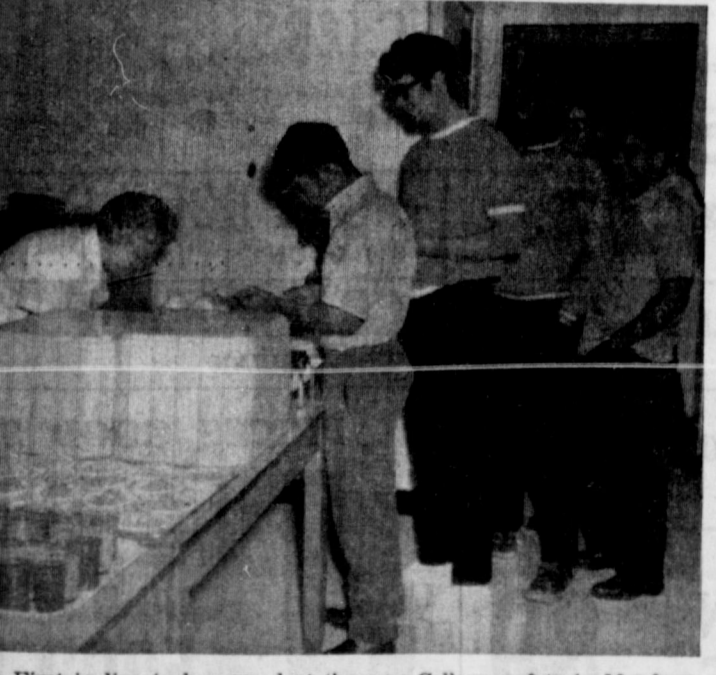
