





Easter is April 11. That means, you need to get going with your Easter egg coloring and Easter baking. How about a little history on the Easter Egg? Ok, since you asked..the egg has always been a symbol of re-birth since it is supposed that it is dead until it cracks and brings forth the chick. Of course, that isn't true, but that is the tradition. The bunny was a symbol of one of the ancient godesses of fertility. As you can imagine: So, ever since ancient days of the Greeks, the Easter Bunny and Easter egg have been symbols of spring. Christians adopted those symbols as well. In fact, in the beginning gold-foiled eggs, or hollowed painted egg shells were given as gifts to those held in esteem by the giver, as a sign of affection and hope for a good spring and as a sign of the Resurrection of Christ. In this manner, their Christian beliefs could be spread unobtrusively using the pagen rites as a cover.

MAPLE FONDANT EASTER

1 16 oz pkg powdered sugar 1/4 C oleo, softened 1/2 tsp salt 1/3 C maple flavored syrup 5 to 6 drops red or green food



City sales tax for March

State Comptroller Bob **Bullock Monday sent checks** totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for March.

The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collections ever distributed--29 percent over

the same period in 1981. This record payment, reflecting taxable sales made by Texas businesses in January, is the second record payment in two months, but Bullock added a note of caution.

"Record sales can be one indicator of good times, but they are not an indicator of profit margins. These taxes are based on sales price or market value. True, Texans are spending more but these figures don't tell us what the merchants or suppliers or manufacturers are having to pay for the good they buy."

City sales tax for Clarendon was \$5,740.61 down 9.93%; Howardwick was \$1,094.03 down 39.78%; Hedley was \$0.00 up 5.49%.

Control nematodes in gardens

If the roots of your garden plants are damaged or appear to be decaying, you may have a nematode problem, says Ronnie Gooch, Donley County Extension Agent.

Nematodes are microscopic, worm-like animals that feed on plant roots. Damaged plants have decayed spots and stubby roots or enlarged root tips.

While several nematodes can infest a garden, the root knot nematode is the most damaging. Plants infested with root knot nematodes will have galls or swellings on their roots, they are usually stunted and yellow in color and may die prematurely.

Using nematode-resistant varieties of plants helps, as does rotating crops of corn, onions and garlic, Gooch

While controlling nematodes by chemical means is not always effective, Gooch does recommend one method. Apply Vapam with a hose-on sprayer at the rate of one quart per 100 square feet of ground area. Then immediately wash the chemical into the soil with a one-half inch application of water. Soak the treated area twice during the next 48 hours and then leave it alone for seven days before tilling.

Wait at least two weeks after applying Vapam before planting. If the temperature is high, additional watering may be needed to keep the soil below 90 for the chemical to be effective. The best method of

controlling nematodes in your garden is to never let them get started.

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

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

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FISH TALES

bite is the official word from Greenbelt Lake. Depending on the area of the state, this panfish is also called "calico bass" or "white perch" or "sac-a-bait".

More crappie fall victim to the cane pole and minnow than all other angling methods combined. The schooling tendency of crappie provides the angler with almost non-stop action once a school is located.

When water temperatures warm in the spring, the spawning migration toward shallow water begins. Now is the time to watch for these migrations.

Crappie are members of the sunfish family, and are first cousins to the largemouth bass and bluegill. Two distinct species of crappie exist and both, the black and white, are found in Texas, and possibly both are found in our lake. It is very difficult to spot a white or black crappie. The blacks are only identified by counting the number of spines on their dorsal fins; black have 7 or 8 and white crappie have 6. You could, therefore, catch a white looking fish with 7 or 8 dorsal fin spines and your white fish would be, in reality, a black crappie! This is a tough question, but they both taste alike.

Black crappie spawn slightly before white crappie in the spring. This could be what folks are catching in the lake now. White crappie do not begin spawning until water temperatures reach 65 or 70 degrees. This difference in peak spawning periods probably serves to reduce the incidence of hybridization.

Both species build nests in water from one to eight feet. deep, usually in gravel or on hard bottom. If these types of bottoms are not readily available, tree roots and submerged vegetation may serve as spawning sites.

Mooring reports some crappie activity Saturday, but no one was out on the cold, windy lake Sunday. Walleye have been showing up at the end of lines and the big bet is trot line catfish.
