Farm Safety Week July 23 Thru 29

County Judge R. E. Drennan has officially proclaimed July 23-29, 1967 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Donley County, according to Jay Gould, President of the county Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated that week on national and state levels as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and death.

The county farm leader said that the accidental death rate for farm residents has increased since 1961. "If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," Gould continued. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today. He also said that farm and ranch families can reduce these costly farm accidents by using some of the tools of safety, such as seat belts, fire extinguishers, and SMV emblems.

In his official proclamation, County Judge R. E. Drennan said: "All of the citizens of Donley county are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities.

"Farm and ranch accidents reap a grim harvest of approximately 150 fatalities and thousands more suffer painful disabling injuries each year in Texas, plus the great economic loss, causes profound physical and psychological damage suffered by members of farm families that are involved."

"During this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention education program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, 4-H Clubs, the Texas Safety Association, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of Texas and the Donley County Farm Bureau, with the theme "Think and Act Safely."

County Farm Bureau President Jay Gould said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week: Sunday—reverence for life; Monday—safety begins at home; Tuesday—agricultural chemicals; Wednesday—prevent falls; Thursday—rural highway safety; Friday—farm machinery; Saturday—recreation safety.

Phil Anthony Accepts Position With AAA School In Littlefield

Phil Anthony has resigned his position as band instructor with the local school system to accept a similar position with the Littlefield Public Schools. His wife Pat has accepted a position as an elementary teacher there also. They plan to move to their new home Friday of this week.

Mr. Anthony stated that it was certainly a hard decision to make as Clarendon seemed more like home to them as this was his first teaching position but the advancement to a AAA system was too good to turn down.

We have enjoyed our work in Clarendon and can certainly say that we have received full support of the citizens and school administration in connection with the band program, and we are indeed grateful for the many kindnesses extended our way, Mr. Anthony added.

Mr. Anthony has been with the local school system the past three years and during that time has made great strides in the improvement of the band program. When he came to Clarendon there were 12 students in the Junior High band and 22 in the High School Band. This coming fall the anticipated number of the high school band will be 60 and the junior high band 80.

The Leader joins other residents in complimenting both Mr. and Mrs. Anthony on the fine work they have done and wish them well in their new venture.

WHEAT CERTIFICATE PAYMENTS

A value of \$1.36 per bushel was announced by the USDA for the 1967 crop-wheat marketing certificates. Certificate payments to farmers participating in the wheat program only will begin soon. The value of the certificates is up four cents over 1966.

MEASUREMENT SERVICE

Don't forget! Friday, July 21, 1967, is the final date to request the measurement service furnished by this office. The cost of this service is \$9.50 per farm visit plus \$2.00 for each plot over one.

CERTIFICATION REPORTS

September 1 is the final date to file our acreage reports. However earlier certifications will allow us to make payments earlier this year than last.

Colorado Vacation Weather Right Here At Home

This is one year that you don't have to leave home to enjoy that cool Colorado or New Mexico mountain weather.

Up to date, we have had only one day that reached 100 degrees this year. That fact is very uncommon here but most of all is the very unusual cool weather the last of July and near the normal hot August weather time.

So far this month a low of 60 degrees has been recorded seven nights and three of those have been the past three nights. The coolest high temperature was 71 degrees Tuesday.

In addition to the cool weather, we received some beneficial moisture Tuesday night with drizzle continuing Wednesday up to press time. Here in town, we received .30 inch Tuesday night while Oscar Johnson at the Country Club reported .60, Hubert Rhoades .50 at Ashtola and Willard Knox .42 at Lelia Lake.

This .30 inch here in town brings our monthly total to 1.55 and our year's total to 8.22. In 1966 the total for July was 1.15 and the total thru the month of July was 9.75. Our prospects right now are good to catch up with that total.

A number of Leader subscribers have been in already to take advantage of renewing their subscription at the old rate of \$3.50 in Donley County and \$4.50 mailed outside the county. Others who may be interested in the saving before the rate goes up, have twelve days to bring or send in their renewal.

The rate increase to \$4 in county and \$5 out of county will become effective August 1, 1967. All who have subscriptions expiring between now and December 31st may renew at the old rate but only for one year.

This rate increase is not by choice but a necessity due to increasing postal rates which may increase considerably again within the next month, increased production costs and a decrease in advertising lineage which has heretofore absorbed a portion of the additional costs.

WE'RE LATE BUT ITS RED CHECK TIME AGAIN

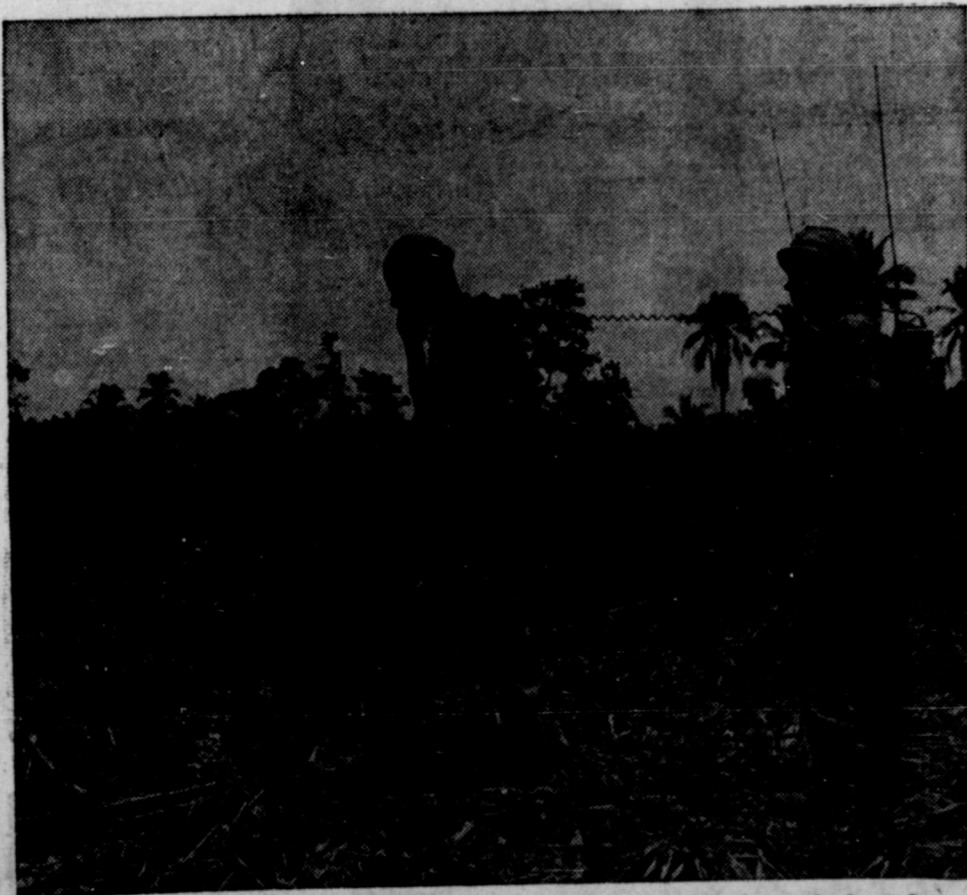
NEW DIRECTORS FOR COUNTRY CLUB NAMED

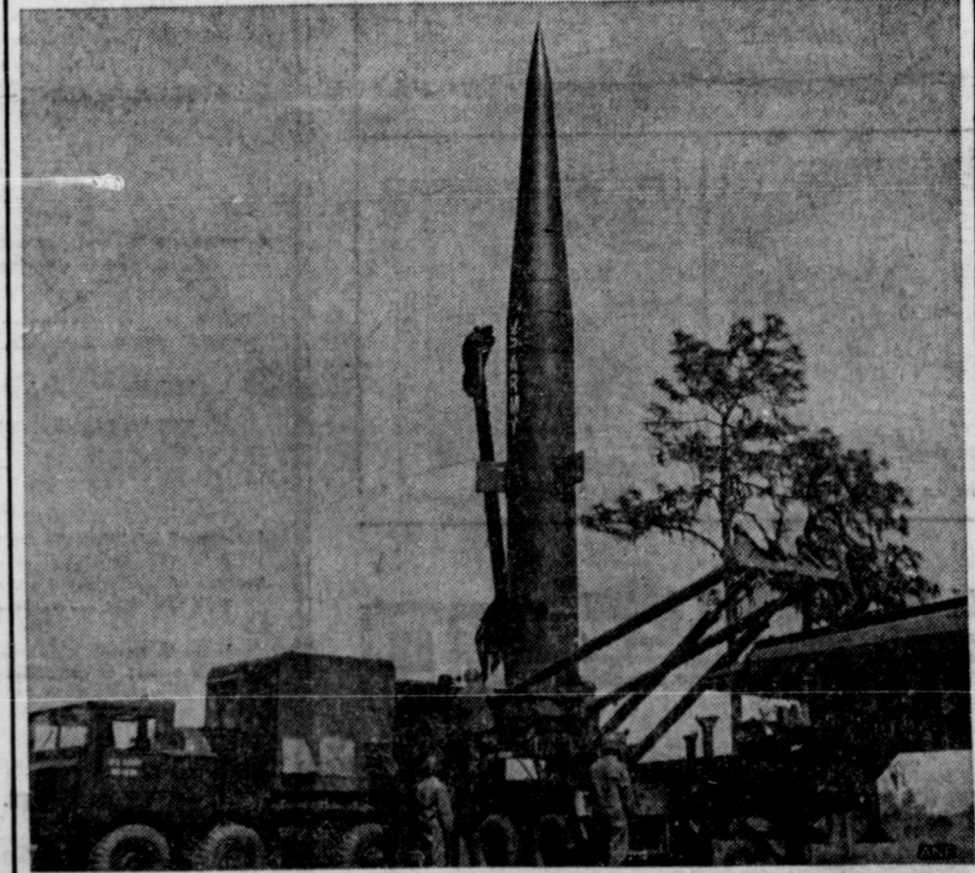
The directors are scheduled to meet tonight to elect officers for the club.

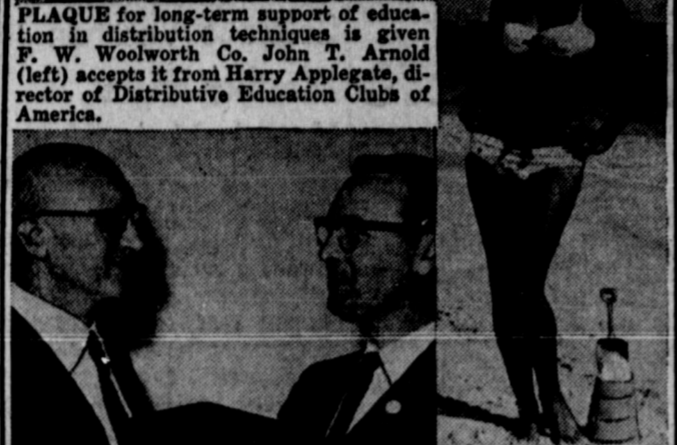

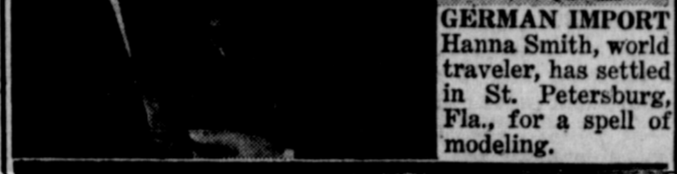

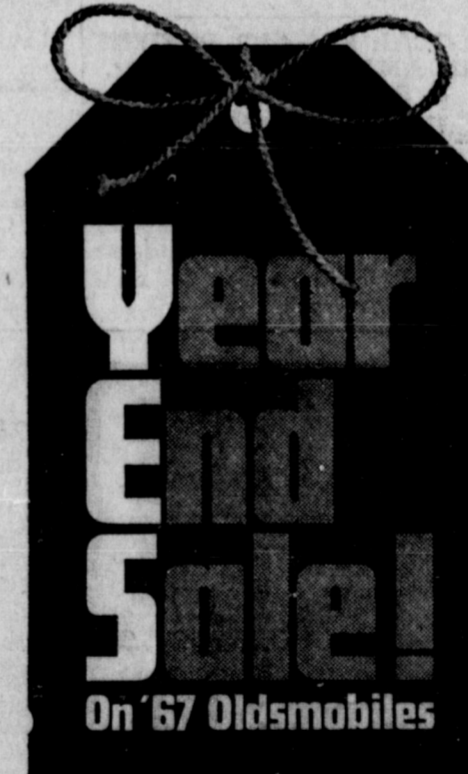

TAX MAN SAM SEZ: YOU CAN GIVE IT AWAY

If you have a Federal estate tax problem you may want to give part of your estate to your heirs. If the estate is a community estate you do not have to file a Federal estate tax return unless the estate has a fair market value of \$120,000.00 or more on the date of death of either spouse. The Federal gift tax rule allows you to give anyone—including an heir—\$3000 tax free each year. A husband and wife can give \$6000 to each heir tax free. You also have a separate \$30,000 lifetime exemption for each spouse. You can give this amount to one person or many persons. There are many ways that you can give your estate away, but you must do it three years before the date of your death to avoid IRS questioning the gifts.

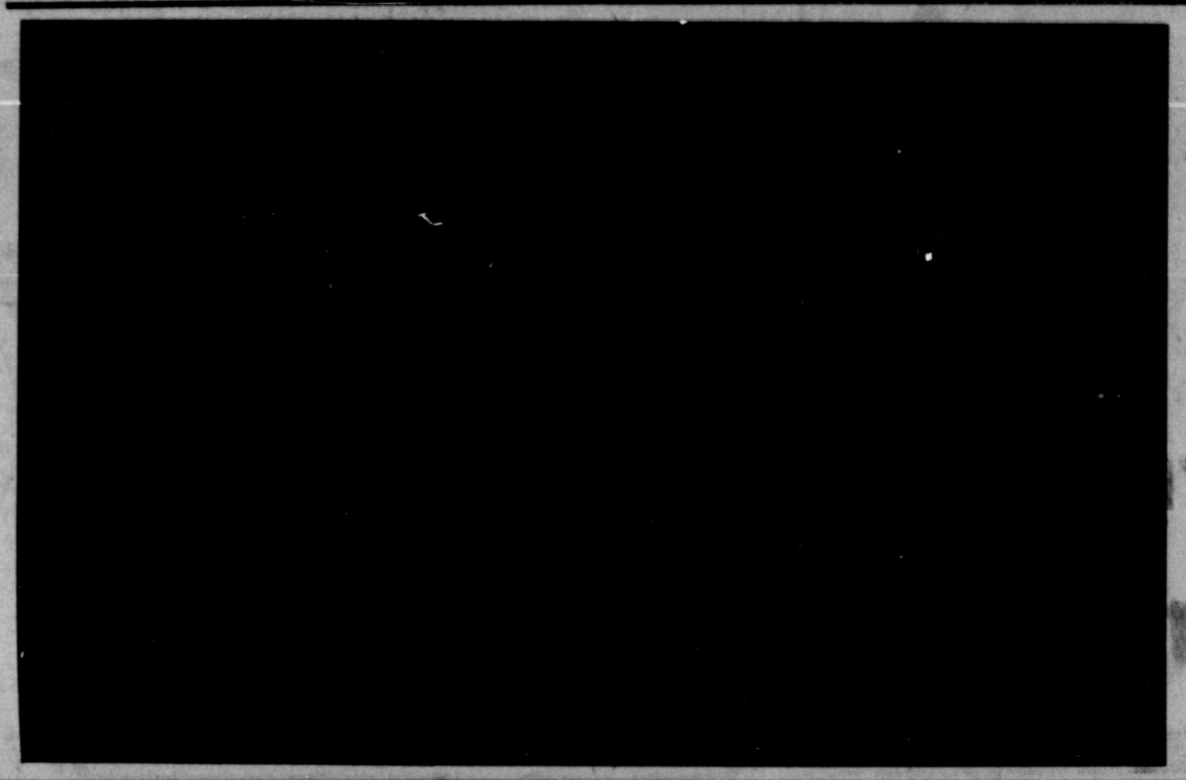

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

Within the next few months, residents of several cities in Texas may vote local sales taxes on themselves.

Some of the larger cities are considering elections under the new law which permits a community to levy a one per cent sales tax, if its citizens approve. This is in addition to the state's two per cent sales tax.

In Austin, a group of businessmen and civic leaders are urging the city council to call a sales tax election.

A statewide survey indicates that Houstonians — where the proposed tax could bring in as much as \$14,000,000 a year — will be among the first to vote. Mayor Louie Welch said the city council will be asked to call an election on the issue this fall.

San Antonio Mayor W. W. McAllister expressed support for the local sales levy and said a vote could be scheduled after September 28. Without the additional revenue, he said, San Antonio would have to reduce municipal services or inaugurate more service charges.

City officials in many smaller towns, on the other hand, indicate they have no intention of rushing into sales tax contro-

versies. One, who probably represented the views of many, said city governing bodies ought to wait on a call by citizens, through petitions or other formal requests, before setting any elections to impose new forms of taxation.

AUTO INSURANCE GOING DOWN — Starting August 1, Texans will be paying slightly less for their auto insurance on a statewide average. Some will pay considerably less, some more. But overall, the State Board of Insurance maintains that motorists will pay \$1,200,000 less in premiums. Average statewide saving will be about one per cent for all classes of coverage combined.

Board adopted, with minor changes, the recommendations of its staff as submitted at a public hearing on June 20. Changes related to commercial and miscellaneous classes for bodily injury, property damage liability and physical damage coverages.

At the same time, the Board authorized a study of so-called "good student" credit. Latter would make some reduction in stepped up rates charged young males under 25, provided they are students in the upper scholastic achievement bracket. Board

said it is strongly inclined toward allowing such a discount.

Another study will explore the possibility of creating additional statistical territories.

HUNTING SEASONS SET — Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission decided deer hunters can shoot on New Year's day next year.

But the Commission trimmed two days off the white-winged dove season.

Deer hunting for most areas will be November 11 through January 1—two days longer than last year. A special experimental season on November 18 through January 7 was set for deer and turkey in Frio County. A short, November 25 through December 10, season was retained for Trans-Pecos, but the district bag limit was increased to four deer, including an additional white-tailed buck.

Commission decided the white-winged season should be held to the weekends of September 2-3 and 9-10 this year. Reason is the 17 per cent decline in bird population, a big kill in Mexico and experimental permission for shooting in the old white-wing sanctuary along the border in Starr, Cameron and Hidalgo counties.

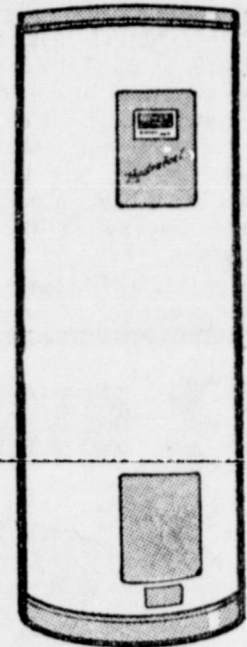

Anti-riot legislation which I, and other Republicans, have sponsored, is scheduled for action by the House of Representatives today. The bill, H. R. 421, when enacted, will impose criminal penalties traveling in or using the facilities of interstate commerce with the intent to incite a riot.

Last year in response to a growing public demand for assistance in maintaining law and order in the streets and urban centers of our land, Republican anti-riot legislation was adopted in the House of Representatives, as an amendment to the proposed Civil Rights Act of 1966, by a vote of 389 to 25. That legislation was permitted to die in the Senate. Now, as a result of continuing pressure and leadership by Republican members, this vital legislation is being brought to the House Floor as an independent measure.

The proposed legislation represents the exercise of federal

criminal power under authority based on the commerce clause of the Constitution. Historically, certain types of conduct have been prohibited by federal statute when the facilities of interstate commerce are used. For example, there is the Mann Act, the prohibition against the interstate transportation of strike breakers, the federal kidnapping statute and the Anti-Racketeering Act.

Law enforcement agencies have reported that familiar faces crop up in riots as far apart as Cleveland and Los Angeles and have concluded that an organized group of agitators either moves into an area as soon as violence occurs or moves into problem areas and encourages riots and violence. This was forcefully proven early this summer when the same crowd of agitators toured several southern states, leaving a path of dead and wounded rioters and police officers. On college campuses they encouraged students to burn their draft cards,

attack police and take over colleges. In some of these colleges where racial troubles existed, the rabble-rousers found supporters and violence erupted, including sniper fire at interceding police officers. This is the type of activity this legislation is meant to stop.

This bill is not intended to and does not limit the right of dissent and peaceful demonstration. Legitimate activities by those who travel in interstate commerce to participate in public gatherings or other lawful demonstrations are not affected. I agree with Representative Richard H. Poff, second ranking minority member of the House Judiciary Committee and chairman of the Republican Task Force on Crime of which I am a member, when he said, "We are not so much interested in punishing someone for an offense already committed as in preventing it from occurring." However, those persons who use facilities in interstate commerce, or who travel from one state to another or from a foreign country to a State, in order to incite or attempt to incite riots, violence, looting, vandalism, arson, bombing, and physical assaults would be subject to prosecution.

The bill would supplement, not supersede, local law enforcement. Certainly the most effective means of riot control rests with the State and local police. However, by assuring Federal jurisdiction over "out-of-state" inciters, State and local authorities will be substantially assisted in keeping the peace and protecting the public safety.

The proposed law would provide a new and effective law enforcement weapon in riot situations like those that have occurred in Cleveland, Cincinnati, Dayton, Boston, Buffalo and Waterloo. Many of the summertime riots have been traced to trouble-makers who travel about this nation inciting riots. It is imperative that we rid interstate commerce of these agitators and riot-mongers. The law-abiding citizen in the area where the riots occur may suffer grievous personal injury and untold property damage unless this additional protection is afforded them.
