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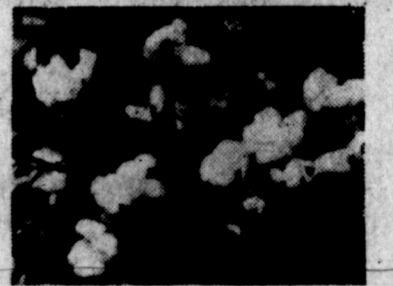

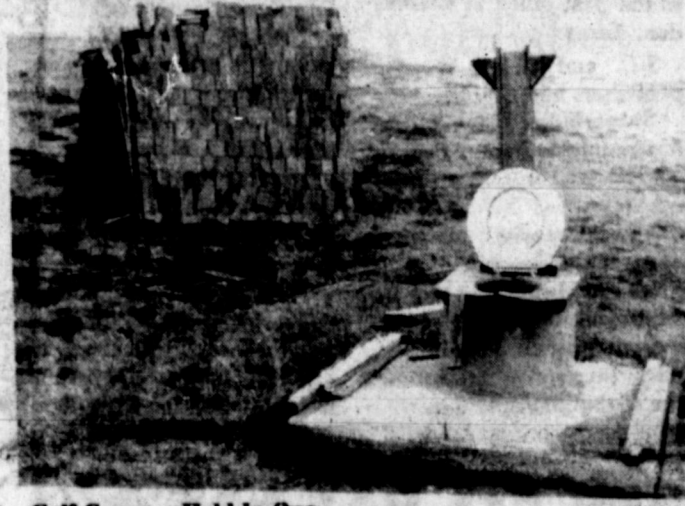
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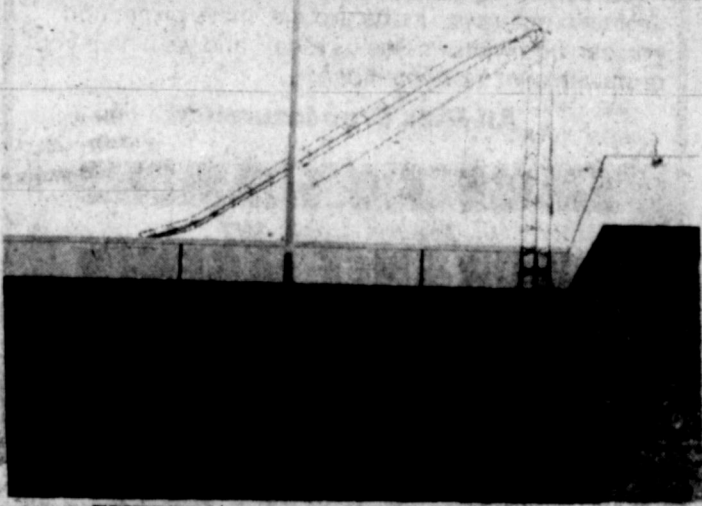

Election results

Clarendon school board elections resulted in Susie Shields and Don Thornberry taking the seats. Hedley school board results landed incumbent Billy Clubb and Ronnie Hill in the chairs.

Clarendon College Board of Regents had no contest, so Bob McCombs, Delbert Robertson and Clyde Price Jr. were re-elected.

The Hospital Board will seat Harold White in addition to the incumbents.

Highway 287 to be repaired

Work on U.S. Highway 287 east of Clarendon will get underway in early May, according to Childress Engineer Vance L. Castleberry of the State Department of Highway and Public Transportation.

In a pre-construction conference held at the local highway department office on March 30, 1982, representatives of the highway department and the contractor, Gilvin-Terrill, Inc., of Amarillo, discussed plans for the upcoming construction.

Improvements call for surface rehabilitation and re-paving on the outside driving lane of the South-bound side, from the east city limit of Clarendon to just east of Hedley. All four driving lanes thru Lelia Lake and Hedley will receive the improvements.

Decade of progress

There are hundreds of cases, some of whom have had chronic disabilities, some of whom were brought in as emergencies, all of whom have been able to receive the medical care they needed nearer home because West Texas has a medical school at Texas Tech University.

In the eight years since the medical school's ambulatory clinics opened, patient visits have increased 410%. Before West Texas had a medical school, that care either would not have been available or would have required a trip to Dallas, Albuquerque, Denver or Houston.

The medical school was created by the 61st Texas Legislature to develop a program of regional medical education and to address problems of rural health care delivery.

Creating services which have not been available is a valuable outgrowth of medical education. In the progress, the medical school has brought over 600 million in real dollars into the local

economy. The school at Texas Tech Health Sciences Center provides referral support for rural physicians and operate a rural clinic in Claude.

"A medical school complements existing health care and extends its dimensions," Interim dean Ted Hartman said. "We have made substantial contributions during this decade of progress and the best is yet to come."

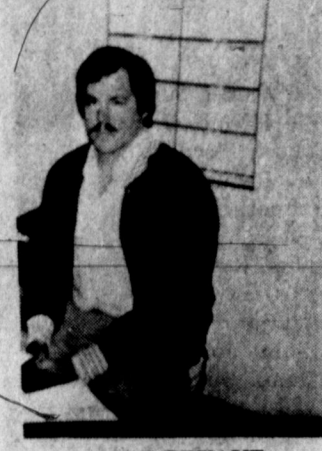

The school is supposedly run by militant American Indian Movement chief, Dennis Banks. It is located on a deserted Army base near Davis, California and is supposed to have 200 students in attendance. The school claims an enrollment of 86. Department of Education

auditors who visited the campus could find only a few dozen Indian students on campus. In one class, where 15 students were supposedly registered, auditors found no students and no teacher.

This is clearly a case where our administration could cut back, cut down and delete governmental spending. Let's send out more investigation teams for some of these questionable projects!

MR. AND MRS. BRANIGAN

Jan 15, 1982
Mike called at 7:30 this morning. We were cut off for a while. Jo Kilpatrick from Dimmitt, Texas and her sister came last night -- also a couple with a small boy, a little red-headed 2 1/2 years old, Bobby, Belinda and Hunter. You know my weakness for red hair. Hunter's a very good looking little boy and we are going to enjoy him. He's about the size of Scott. Bobby's mother came over with them to help them get here. She will be going back home in a few days. Bobbis the patient. They are from Lamesa, Texas.

Had breakfast -- Daddy and I started to the bank. The sun was shining and not too cold. Jim Drager from Palulap, Wash., near Seattle, began walking with us. Daddy turned back after two long blocks, Jim and I went on -- cashed some travelers checks, went by a fish market (we could smell it long before we saw it), bought some writing supplies (ours are in the lost bag), and some Midro-tee for Daddy.

Then we walked several more blocks just to get me familiar with the area. Jim had been here three years ago with his wife and knows the way. Started back and bought some goodies at the bakery. The wares are so attractive and such a variety -- settled for some plain cookies as they were out of do-nuts. By the time we got back, it was nearly lunch time. Have been writing cards as there is nothing else to do until we eat. B. J. does not feel too well yet, the trip was very tiring. It is now nearly 4 p.m. -- the sun is still shining on the mountains and there is a town up there on the top of one of them. Here the streets are noisy with cars and the children are playing. The sidewalks are either narrow or non-existent -- just paths, but we cannot complain. The days pass fast when we keep doing something like visiting a little after 4:30 p.m.

A couple came in last night -- staying at another hotel about a mile north of us. They are from Rockdale, Texas -- he was a coach and seemed to remember the folks there talking about our Hubert Dennis when Hubert coached there. He remembered Hubert graduated from T.C.U. The folks are Lillian and Earnie Laurence. Earnie was inducted into the Hall of Fame last summer for his work as coach. Each day they will come to our room to rest before the treatment, then rest afterwards also. Makes us feel so very good to give him a place to lie down and we will expect them.

Daddy had his treatment and we asked the Dr. if he could tell us where his trouble was -- Dr. said it was not in his bones, nor his spine, but was in his nervous system as well as the lung and brain. Also, we understood it was slightly in his liver, however, the next blood test should tell him more, which he will take next Tuesday. Hopefully, it will not be in the liver as the diet is so much more restricted as well as tell us it is spreading. Daddy did not get as flushed as long as the last two treatments.

Jan. 16, 1982
Daddy had a chill last night -- we went to eat and the bean soup did not agree with him -- I wish he would eat more. We think he ran out of food so he ate a pretty good breakfast this morning of toast and Jam -- I got him to drink some decaffeinated coffee to warm him. It is sunny again outside, but cold here in the room. While he rested upstairs, I took a cab to the airport (Olympic) to search again for the bags -- no luck yet. The cab driver took me to the Lost and Found to look some more -- they gave me a claim to fill out (did you ever try to think what would be in a particular bag?) Since one was lost before London -- they gave us directions to the British Airways terminal -- the cab driver understands Greek but little English -- At B.A. I could understand English and they directed us downstairs to the Lost and Found -- at least I could communicate. The girl called

several places but no luck there either -- she gave a number to call at 6 p.m. tonight again. Took a picture of my claim and she will keep trying especially since I told her we would be here a month without the baggage. The taxi cost 1000 dr (about \$20.00), but we will keep trying -- came back and have searched my brain for everything that may have been in each bag. Thank goodness, I made somewhat of a list in London of things I could think of then after missing the first bag.

Daddy's sleeping and I hate to wake him, however, it is lunch time here (5 a.m. at home). He coughed a lot last night. Borrowed the Moorings converter to use the heating pad -- glad we made it with at least the heating pad.

Jan 19, 1982
Daddy had his 5th treatment yesterday -- there were two additional patients to come in. I went to Downtown Athens to shop in a Department store -- they were having a sale and people were plentiful -- did find a half-price rack and after trying on about seven or eight pairs of slacks, I found one pair. At the very last, I found a pair of knee-knocker someone had tried on and left in the dressing room. I knew they were new as they had sales tags -- tried them on and they fit, so I bought the two pair at the cost of 995 Dr. which was nearly \$20.00 each. Then I looked for sweaters and found some the girls can use, also they were marked down to 1650 Dr. to 965, so I bought four of them. The mans underwear were so expensive I decided to keep washing every day -- so was the ladies things. Looked for a deck of cards. Finally outside on the street, a fellow told me to go down below the street to some shops. I thought everyone in Athens were shopping where I had been in this subway area shopping mall. Gave up on the cards as it was nearly 1 O'clock and I was afraid Dad would be concerned about my getting lost. I took a cab back in time to eat lunch just a little before 1 o'clock.

Did the wash and hemmed and re-hemmed the brown slacks. Finally got them hemmed so that they would not bag from the knees to the ankles. However, that bagging is the styles we see the ladies wear them. Today we will find out the test on my blood work which I had done yesterday. Wrote some cards to our grandchildren. Daddy seems to be retaining fluid and has not been hungry at all -- brought up some peaches, but he didn't want them right now. He will have his blood test again today and we may find out about the liver -- if it isn't there, and I pray it isn't, he can drink milk which will give him more nourishment. As he was lying down most of the day, his hands and feet jerked involuntarily which was different -- it seems every day there is something different that happens to him -- sort of like when we were at home.

Just about 9 p.m., we felt a strong tremor -- Daddy asked me why I shoved the night stand which is between our beds over against his bed but I told him I hadn't, then we realized the whole building was shaking -- so much the hangers in the closet were hitting the side with the sway. Just like we would do during tornado weather at home. I grabbed coats and clothes to be close at hand

just in case the building and land collapsed under us. We may manage to be warm. I had my purse and daddy's billfold was in his trousers. When we tune to the news at 7:30 a.m. in the morning, we may hear about it. For about five minutes, the news is in English and we try to catch it each day.

Jan. 20, 1982
Daddy did not sleep to well last night. I got up and dressed and went down to bring our breakfasts to the room. However, he is sleeping for what he missed last night. The news said there was an earth quake somewhere in Greece, but no damage, just crumbled an unoccupied house.

My blood test came back 1.8, which was below the average -- Daddy had his second test and we will find out today about his. Mike called last night about the money and the consulate, but I will wait until Thurs. before calling the bank here. Daddy asked the Dr. yesterday about the fluid and he checked his hands and said he needed more water yet-so he drank and drank and does feel better today. Also, on the way down the hall coming from his treatment, his air was cut off for an instant and he began coughing -- for the first time he began to cough up something and he coughed almost all the rest of the evening and through the night. He even ate a good lunch of pork roast, potatoes and peaches. Now he is resting before his treatment today. We spent the morning down in the lobby as there was no heat in the room. In the lobby the sun does shine through the east windows, but the sun never hits our room at any time of the day.

Tena and B.J. have the corner room which is on the southwest corner of the building and they do get a few rays through their bathroom window and it shines on the south side of the wall of their room. The radiators are working again so we will have some warmth. I talked to Mr. Jewett and he is going to try to help on the baggage -- signing off at 2:20 p.m. Same day -- 5 o'clock -- Daddy's count came down from 7.4 to 6.9 (5 points) which is encouraging -- also, since the cancer did not begin in the liver, Dr. would like to have him wait a few more days, then he can go back to some dairy products. We are very encouraged. B.J. will have his test today and we will find out tomorrow about his progress.

Jan 22, 1982 YES!! Felice called about 7:30 a.m. and we enjoyed a good talk Daddy felt like oatmeal for breakfast which was good for him -- and Mike called about the money and the luggage. Later in the morning British Airways called one bag was here. At 11:30 Tassos, the cab driver, came after moving two patients from another hotel to this one and we struck out for the bank, which was a terrible ride--the traffic was very heavy and up steep hills, inching along -- then down steep hills using the hand brake as we inched down -- it was a bit hair-raising. Finally after an hour, we reached the bank and he parked partly on the sidewalk while I went across the street to the bank -- found out I had to go upstairs to a place where there were several desks (the lady downstairs told me to talk to a man at a desk near the windows, of which there were several men and several desks) but I did find the right place. But!!

"PINK EYE"

Eye burning, itching, and discharge are some of the things noticeable with "pink eye"...properly called conjunctivitis. With pink eye, there is an inflammation of the delicate membranes that cover the eyes and the inner portions of the eyelids. There are three main causes of this relatively common problem:

1. CHEMICAL IRRITATION: wind, dust, sun glare, arc welding, and chlorine in swimming pools
2. ALLERGY: allergens in the air such as pollens from trees and grasses; usually seasonal; lasts from two to three weeks
3. INFECTION: occasionally due to bacterial infection or the sometimes dangerous herpes virus; commonly associated with the common cold; eyes are often matted together on awakening

With the exception of herpes and sometimes bacterial infections, pink eye usually runs its course in about three days. Warm, wet washcloths placed over the eyes will remove matted material and help relieve discomfort. Medicines are seldom needed. A physician should be contacted if symptoms persist for longer than a few days or if discomfort is excessive.

Fry normally hatch in about 5 days. As the yolk sac is absorbed, they feed on microscopic animals. Later, insects and small fish are consumed. During the summer, fall and winter, crappie tend to school in the deeper, more open areas of the lake. This should clue you in as to what lure or bait to use during the spring and summer.

HEATS ON

Potatoes are a terrific food because, contrary to some beliefs, they are not that fattening and don't really have that many calories. It's all the "good" stuff you add to it that makes them high in calories.

Let me give you some good potato stuffer ideas.

MEAL IN A POTATO
4 baking potatoes
1/2 C milk
1/4 C soft oleo
1 C frozen peas and carrots, thawed
1 can (6 1/2 oz) chunk light tuna in water, drained
1 tsp thyme, chrumbled
1/2 tsp salt
1/8 tsp pepper
paprika

Wash potatoes, rub with oil and prick skins. Bake at 400, 1 hour. Cool enough to handle. Slice top off each, scoop pulp from shell.

In mixing bowl, beat potato pulp with milk and oleo until fluffy. Stir in vegetables, tuna, thyme, salt and pepper until blended. Spoon mix evenly into shells, mounding tops. Bake at 350 for 35 minutes. Sprinkle with paprika. This recipe would convert to a microwave recipe quite easily.

SOUR CREAM HAMPSHIRE POTATOES
1 1/2 pounds russet potatoes
3 C water
1 tsp salt
1/4 C sour cream or 1/2 C buttermilk
2 TBS oleo
sit to taste

Peel and quarter potatoes, cook in salted water until potatoes break apart with fork. Drain and return to low heat to dry.

Scoop sour cream into bottom of pan with potatoes and allow to heat. Add oleo. Whip potatoes with mixer until light and fluffy. Season.

LOU'S CASSEROLE
1 lb. ground beef
1 small can sauerkraut (16 oz)
1 1/2 lb russet potatoes, mashed

Brown hamburger meat in skillet. Drain. Pour sauerkraut, undrained, over meat. Spread mashed potatoes over top of sauerkraut. Dot with butter. Serve.

Liability Insurance mandatory
The 90-day DPS warning period for the new mandatory liability insurance law expires this week. After midnight Wednesday, March 31, state troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers who fail to show proof of insurance when such information is requested.
The law, which became effective January 1, 1982, requires all drivers to carry minimum liability coverage for bodily injury of \$10,000 per person (20,000 for two or more persons) and property damage of \$5,000.
Drivers who fail to carry the required coverage risk being fined from \$75 to \$200 for the first offense and from \$200 to \$1,000 for subsequent violations. In addition, a conviction under the new law will result in the suspension of the violator's driver license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial responsibility for five years from the conviction date.

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FUEL-SAVING DRIVING TIPS!



Here's a list of what we feel are the simplest—yet most effective—ways of conserving fuel when driving. Since these tips are designed to modify motoring habits (rather than suggesting expensive add-on equipment), they can only save you money when they're properly observed.

- Press the accelerator down slowly when you're starting off from a dead stop, and try to avoid pushing the pedal more than 1/4 of its full travel whenever possible.
- Keep your windows closed when you drive, especially when you're traveling at highway speeds.
- Inflate your tires to their maximum recommended limit. Also, if you're in the market for new tires, consider a radial-ply design—or at least a larger-diameter tire—since such items are proven fuel-savers.
- Always obey the 55-MPH speed limit. Actually, whenever you drive above 40 miles per hour, you not only consume extra fuel but also waste even more gasoline by forcing your auto to overcome additional wind resistance.
- Try to maintain a steady road speed. The best way to maintain constant forward momentum is to avoid tailgating.
- Don't let your engine idle for long periods of time when you're warming it up, even on cold mornings. Modern cars usually require only about a minute's worth of running—at the most—before they can be driven in wintertime temperatures.
- Time your driving to avoid getting "caught" by stoplights. On many boulevards, traffic control signals are purposely scheduled to the motorist's advantage... assuring that by traveling at the correct—and steady—speed, he or she will have green lights all the way!
- If you are stuck in a stop-and-go driving situation, you can save gasoline by shifting your automatic transmission to neutral when the car is at a standstill.
- Don't allow your car to idle for more than a minute in traffic. If you know that you'll be sitting in one spot for longer than 60 seconds, shut the car's engine off.
- Be certain your vehicle is in top mechanical condition at all times. Keep it tuned and periodically check its points, plugs, and especially its air filter... to see if the components are in good condition.
- Purchase your gasoline during the coolest times of the day, when the liquid is densest. You'll actually be getting a more concentrated gallon for your money when you fill up in the chilly hours of early morning or late evening.
- Drive in a straight line whenever possible. Choose the route that offers the fewest corners and curves.
- Avoid pressing the accelerator to the floor when climbing hills if you possibly can. You will, of course, lose momentum by going "easy" on the pedal... but if you can still maintain a safe speed, do so and save gasoline.
- During the icy winter season, always scrape the snow from your auto before starting the engine and driving off. Such frozen moisture not only offers additional wind resistance, but can add as much as a hundred pounds or more to your vehicle's total weight!
- Try to keep the fuel tank filled on the "high" side as a rule. A fairly full fuel reservoir has less evaporation loss than will a nearly empty one.

Second: Send Someone For Help. This is vital, you must flag someone down if you are on the highway, or use your CB unit to call for help, but turn that duty over to someone else immediately. Your duty is to be helpful to the victim.

Remember to have One person call the ambulance. It is confusing and also creates delay if several call the ambulance at one time. The ambulance number in Clarendon is 874-3515. Do Not Call The Team Members At Home. This One number is a 24 hour monitored number and through it they will be notified and unified. If you call them at home, you may miss them, you will cause confusion and thereby create delay. Call One number, 874-3515 and Stay Alive.

Third: Turn Off The Ignition. Reach inside, if you can safely do so, and turn the key off in the ignition of the downed car, even if it is not running. This will greatly reduce the changes of a spark and it will prevent accidental jerking of the car.

Fourth: Check Leaking Fluid From Car. Smell any fluid you may see on the ground around the wreck. It may be antifreeze or it may be gasoline. If it is gasoline, you will know to be extra cautious. Regardless of what the fluid is, you must prevent All smokers from standing near the scene, help avoid any sparks such as from mufflers or even dragging metal across the road.

The important thing to remember here is, if you do detect gasoline, Leave The Victim In The Car. A car will Not catch on fire if the ignition is off and it is not already on fire. Exploding cars are mostly a thing of the movies and TV, they seldom occur in real life situations.

A car may even have a ruptured fuel line and still not catch on fire. A car will not start on fire unless you or someone nearby ignites it. Leave The Victim In The Car. more people are injured by Good Samaritans pulling them from a car they fear will explode than if they left them in. Never remove the victim from the car. You may kill a person in doing this if they

have a spinal injury or internal injury.

Some people won't wear safety belts because they fear they will be involved in an accident where their vehicle will catch on fire. If they are, there is Always time to release their safety belts. Pat Robertson has seen cars involved in accidents where the fuel line was ruptured, the car skidded, the individuals walked away from a car that was Not burning. He has also seen a car hit at 150 mph

and not explode. If the car explodes on impact, the chances of your survival are minimal anyway. It is Still Safer To Wear Your Safety Belts.

Fifth: Calm Person Down. Talk to them, reason with them, tell them that help is on the way. Try to get them

calmed down because this will help prevent their going into deep shock and it will relax them so that their blood won't be pumping so fast and increase chances of bleeding to death. It will also make it easier for the EMTs when they arrive.


Sixth: Check for Vital Signs: When you arrive and talk to the victim and get no response, you should then begin emergency first aid steps. Don't move the victim, but see if they are Breathing. Check next for excessive Bleeding and then check their heart.

This is called the ABC's of an accident because you check First for Air, second for Blood, and third for Cardiac (heart). If they are not breathing, and you know how to administer mouth to mouth resuscitation then

begin that. If there is bleeding, apply direct pressure to that area and keep it up. If the individual is conscious, let them do that, it will give them something to do and they will feel they are helping the situation.

Seventh: Keep the Crowd Back. Crowds tend to say things that will distress the victim further, their excitement will be passed along to the victim. Keep them back and give them things to do such as flag away traffic or look for the ambulance. Don't let a careless remark from the crowd set your victim into deep shock.

Your cooperation at the scene of an accident will help save lives and it will also help the EMTs do their job better. A message from your EMTs.



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

EMT survival notes

What to do if first on the scene of an accident

When you arrive at the scene of an accident and realize that you are the first person to respond to that emergency situation, there are several things you want to do and things that you should do.

First Don't park near the wrecked car. Park your car well away from the scene of the accident. The reason for this is that your car may cause another accident by blocking the view, or by being stuck out in the road. Another reason to park your car well away is so that the emergency vehicles such as ambulance, wrecker and police can pull up closer to the accident victims. Your car could delay rapid transport of the victim when it is inconsiderately blocking access to the injured. Remember to pull your car well away and clear access to the accident site, regardless of the situation or location. Use

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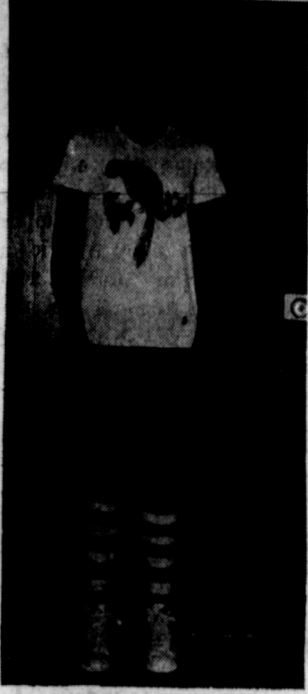

Karen gave us a microwave demonstration showing how to prepare a complete meal in only 30 minutes including dessert. We sampled the chicken breasts on a bed of green beans, the mashed potatoes and the cheese-cake with hot cherry topping.

Some interesting tips we learned included the cover-

ing of food at all times when you cook in the microwave not only to prevent both splatter and spills, but to prevent greasy build-up on the top of the oven which could (and has) resulted in the over-heating of the magnetron tube causing it to burn out. When that happens it is often cheaper to replace the oven rather than the tube.

If you have a spill over that has set and is difficult to wipe off, simply put a cup of water uncovered into the oven, bring it to a boil in 2 minutes and this will steam the mess, making it easy to wipe away without abrasives or cleansers.

The major secret for successful microwave cooking is patience. Follow the directions and if it says let something "set" for awhile after coming out of the oven, do that rather than cook it longer. It is easier to over-cook in a microwave than to undercook.

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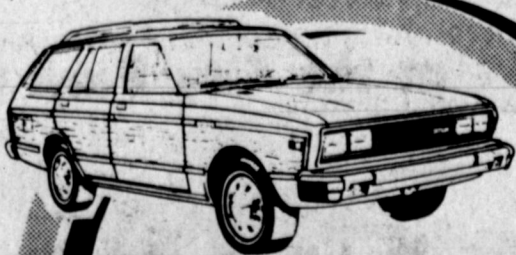

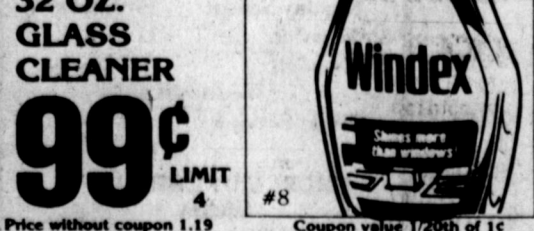

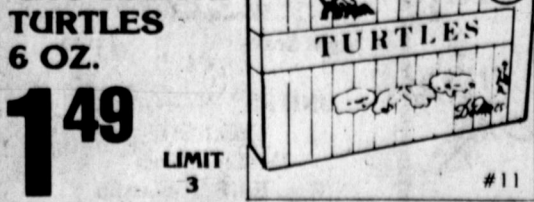
