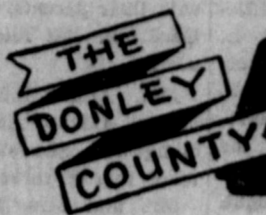

A Fine Paper For Fine People

Shall We Complete The Job?

(An Editorial)

This question will be answered when voters of the Clarendon Junior College District go to the polls and cast their ballot this Saturday, April 6 FOR or AGAINST the \$190,000 Bond Issue.

A majority vote for the issue will mean that the new college construction program on the new campus will be completed as it should be and will have the furnishings necessary for the operation of all facilities.

When the new college buildings are completed, they will represent an expenditure of over one and one-fourth million dollars. It will be necessary to vote the bond issue to provide necessary furnishings for practically all the buildings including the dormitories, as well as landscaping the grounds and providing a paved parking area and streets.

Before you vote against the bond issue . . . stop a minute and consider these points:

It will take only approximately \$12,000 a year to retire the bonds under the schedule by which they are set up. In all probability this amount will be forthcoming from increased payments from the state for new students. There is no doubt but that the enrollment will climb considerably with the new dormitories and new campus facilities. College Regents made the statement in a letter to Donley County Taxpayers this week that taxes would not be raised for the coming year. It has been their plans from the beginning to use only 10 cents of the 60 cent tax rate to retire the bonds and operate the college on the remainder plus additional funds anticipated from the state.

When our new college building program is complete with a beautiful campus, it will make you feel proud that you cast your ballot that helped make it possible.

Regardless of how you vote . . . be sure and cast your ballot. A majority should make this important decision and not a minority.

Surrounding Area Receives Heavy Rain And Damaging Winds Tues.

The area surrounding Clarendon received heavy rains and damaging winds in the first real spring storm of the year Tuesday afternoon. The Goodnight area and Brice area were reported to have received approximately 2 inches of rain with the high wind. Early Wednesday morning Greenbelt Lake was reported to have had a 2 foot rise and water was still draining in. Clarendon reported .09 of moisture for a trace but Lelia Lake reported .80 and the amount increased toward the Hedley area.

Greatest damage reported early Wednesday morning was in the area north and west of Ashtola. Electrical lines were blown down. At the SJ Ranch, machinery barns were blown away at the headquarters place and at the installations a mile away corals, barns, and out-buildings were destroyed leaving only the house in which the Howard Hills live. Residents of the house there reported seeing a hog flying through the air. After the storm passed only 4 of the more than 20 pigs were found by night time and no trace of some 400 chickens had been found, according to the report. The Leland Lewis family lives at headquarters.

Other damage may have been received over the area but at press time no details were available. Moisture total for the year in Clarendon as reported by Tommie Saye has been 4.39. The heaviest rain was reported to have fallen in the area between Goodnight and Conway.

Funeral Services Held Wednesday for Nolie G. Simmons

Funeral services for Nolie Garland Simmons, age 76, a Donley County farmer and rancher for more than 61 years were held at 4:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 3rd, in the First Baptist Church with Rev. W. R. Lawrence, pastor, officiating. Masonic services and interment was in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mr. Simmons was dead on arrival at Adair Hospital at 8:30 a.m. Monday, April 1st after suffering a heart attack at his residence 3 miles south of Clarendon. He was born July 29, 1891 in the Fairview Community near Whitesboro in Grayson County, Texas. He came to Donley County in 1907 and went to work for the RO Ranch. He married Ella Hardin in December 1914. He was a member of the First Baptist Church, Clarendon Masonic Lodge and other Masonic Bodies, Khiva Shrine Temple of Amarillo. He also served on the Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Committee of Donley County from 1936 to 1947 and was Chairman of the Committee for seven years during that time.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Ella Simmons of the home; one son, Emmett O. Simmons of Clarendon; one brother, John C. Simmons of Sayre, Oklahoma; two grandchildren, Jem and Anna Beth Simmons of Clarendon.

Bearers were Clyde T. Price Jr., H. M. Breedlove, Charlie E. Bairfield, Forrest Sawyer, Van Kennedy, Frank White Jr., Heckle Stark, D. E. Leathers.

The family requests that memorials be in the form of contributions to the First Baptist Church Landscaping Fund.

CLARENDON COLLEGE AGGIE CLUB RODEO

The Aggie Club is conducting its fourth annual Clarendon College Rodeo April 12-13th at the Donley County Fairgrounds. Events for boys will include barrel racing, bulls, tie-down calf roping, and ribbon roping. Barrel racing competition will be open to girls, and a queen contest will be held following the Saturday afternoon performance.

The show promises to be the biggest and best ever held. Contestants have entered from a large number of area high schools and colleges over the Panhandle and South Plains regions. Campbell and Cordell, producers from Childress, will provide approximately twenty-one broncs, twenty-one bulls, eighteen tie-down calves, and fifteen ribbon calves. Lawrence Overcast will serve as rodeo announcer.

The winner of each event will receive a buckle award, as will the three top averaged winners of each event for two performances. The best all-around cowboy will also be awarded a buckle. Contestants are limited to two performances in each event. The all-around cowboy contestants must qualify in both a riding and a roping event.

It gives the members of our club an opportunity to display both citizenship and leadership abilities; it gives young people a chance to compete in a challenging, exacting sport; and it provides exciting entertainment for rodeo fans. The evening performance on April 12th will begin at 8:00 p.m. Two performances are slated for April 13th at 2:00 and 8:00 p.m. Admission charges are \$1.00 for adults and fifty cents for children, age 6-12. Greenbelt Lake To Be Open For Boating, Skiing and Picnicing Mon.

It has been announced by Greenbelt Lake authorities that the Lake will be opened for boating Monday, April 8. The sale of Boating and Recreation permits will begin at the Filter Plant north of town Monday morning, April 8.

A recreation permit will also be required if you plan to ski, swim, picnic, or use the lake property.

The lake has been opened for boating and recreation at this time because of the insistent demands of the people of the area. The Safety and Health aspects of the lake are being emphasized and stressed at this time. Permanent installations and facilities are not complete. Lake water is being used for drinking purposes by several towns. It will be necessary that everyone exert caution and care in sanitation to keep the lake waters and surrounding area clean in every respect.

Roy Hunter is the Lake Superintendent and Security Officer. He will be on duty at all times to see that all rules and regulations set up by the Authority are carried out.

Inquire about these rules and regulations when you apply for your Boating Permit and remember if you plan to ski, swim, picnic, or use lake property you must also have a Recreation Permit. Fishing will be opened at a later date.

CHECK INDICATES PIKE HAVE SPAWNED

Following a thorough check this past week, employees of the hatchery division of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., reported that all indications point to the Northern Pike spawning in Greenbelt Lake. They found both female and male pike had spent but that it would be possibly 3 months before the young fish would be large enough to check with a net to see if any hatched.

The check showed the larger pike to weigh near 4 pounds with an overall average of 2 pounds. The bass are in good shape and average around 10 inches in length. Some bull-head cats showed up with the largest around 3 pounds. The channel and blue cat are not large enough to check as these species do not grow during the colder weather.

It is the hope of local fishermen that the pike will be included when the lake is opened for fishing May 29th.

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ASHTOLA NEEDLE CLUB CANDIDATE RALLY SET FOR FRIDAY NIGHT

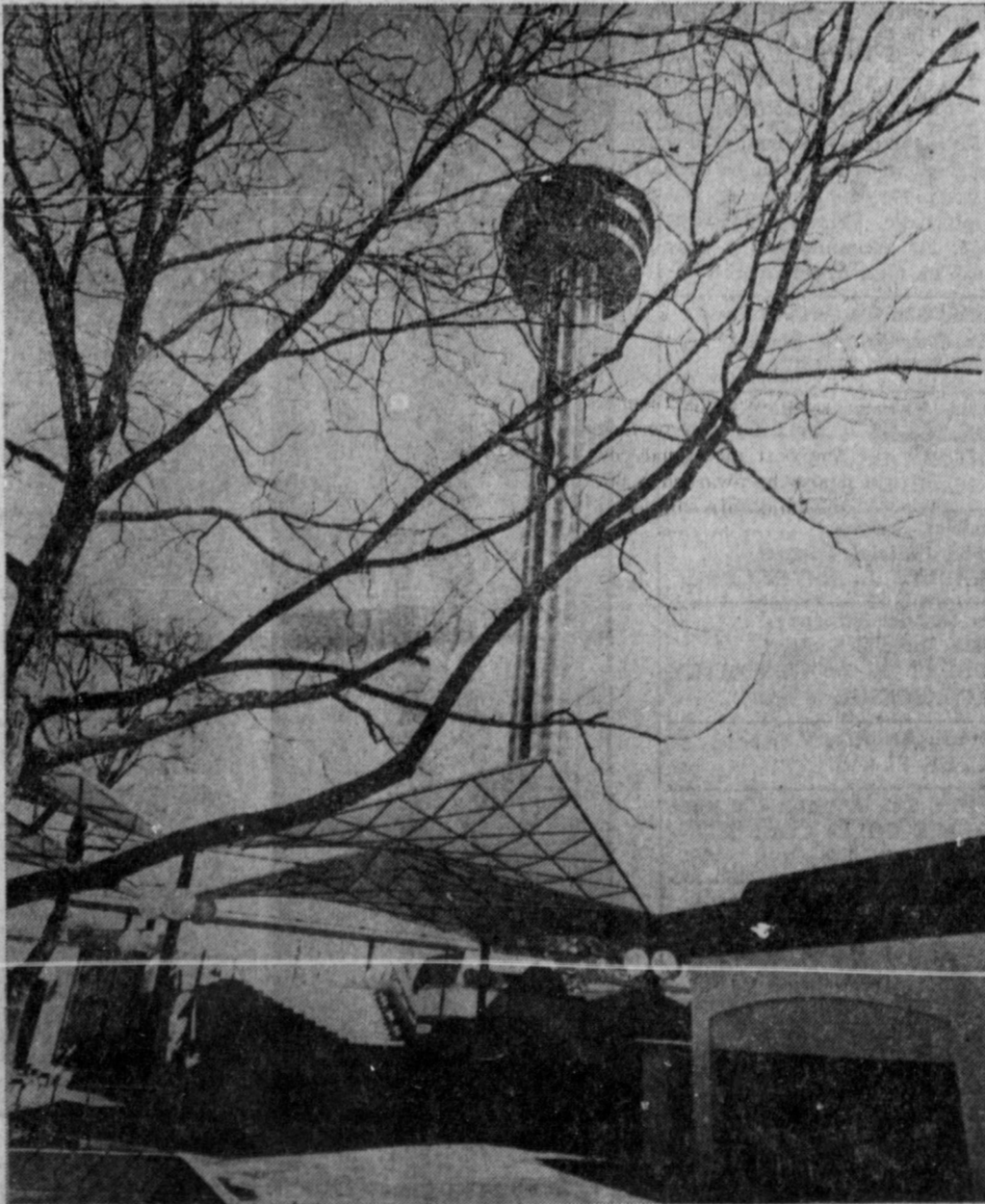

states and local authorities where it belongs. The bill as originally proposed by the President vested complete authority in the U. S. Attorney General and allocation of funds as he saw fit. That bill is still pending in the Senate because the Attorney General wants the authority back in spite of the fact that 49 of the 50 state governors have endorsed the version of the bill as it was amended by Republicans and passed by the House.
In the final analysis, crime must be controlled and prevented at the local level and that is why I believe the bill would help in state and local law enforcement.
America must wake up and do something. We are not dealing with theory, abstraction, or long-ranged theories but with hard facts. Only people commit crimes. Any immediate and effective remedy must be applied to people. Wherever possible, crime should be prevented. When committed, criminals should be apprehended, tried promptly and fairly. When found guilty, penalties should be applied with speed and dispatch.

NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price
I believe that every member of Congress knows that crime is our number one domestic problem. The fact and fear of crime stalks the nation. Major reported crimes increased by 16 percent last year. Since 1960 the reported rate of crime has shot up by 88 percent. And this alarming increase cannot be attributed to population growth which has increased by only 10 percent during that time.

Crime must be brought under control and substantially reduced. And it is encouraging to note that the President's crime message delivered to Congress last month is an indication that he, too, is concerned and finally means to do something about the problem.

A Republican Task Force on Crime on which I serve has already developed and introduced specific legislation to control and prevent crime and lawlessness and I believe our proposals offer real promise for alleviating the problems of crime.

One of our bills, an anti-riot bill was passed by the House last year and was added by the Senate as an amendment to the Civil Rights bill.
Other bills this group has introduced include an electronic surveillance bill intended for use under court supervision against organized crime; also, a bail reform bill which would allow courts more discretion in granting or denying release on personal recognizance to defendants who are found to be a danger to the community or in revoking the release of those who have committed other crimes after release.

In the District of Columbia, there is such a huge backlog of criminal cases awaiting trial that it is not uncommon for a suspect to be charged with a second or third crime while awaiting trial on bond from a first charge.
Last year the House amended the law enforcement and Criminal Justice Act by returning primary control of the funds and operation of the program to the

SMALL GRAIN COVER CROP

There has been a change in the regulations concerning small grain cover crops on diverted and conserving base acreages. These small grains (wheat, rye, etc.) must be pastured off, hayed, used for green chop, silage, clipped, incorporated into the soil, or destroyed by natural causes by April 30, 1/4 1/4.

As stated above, wheat on diverted acres may be grazed through April 30. It has been determined, however, that it must be destroyed by mechanical means as soon after that date as possible.

MEASUREMENT SERVICES

Wheat producers who wish to have their wheat measured by a county office representative, should make their applications by April 10.

Requests for the staking service for row crops and diverted acres will be accepted through April 19, 1968.

EXTRA COTTON

91.5 acres of cotton was released to the county committee by Donley County farmers. The committee also received 331.4 acres from the State Committee. This was reapportioned last week.

Revised cotton allotment notices have been mailed to all producers who asked for and received additional cotton acreage. Please remember that even though you signed up in the program earlier, you will need to sign up again before April 12 if you received extra cotton.

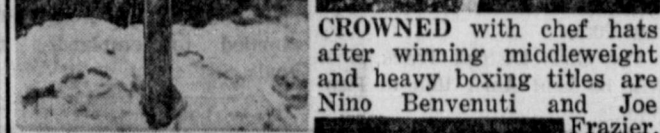

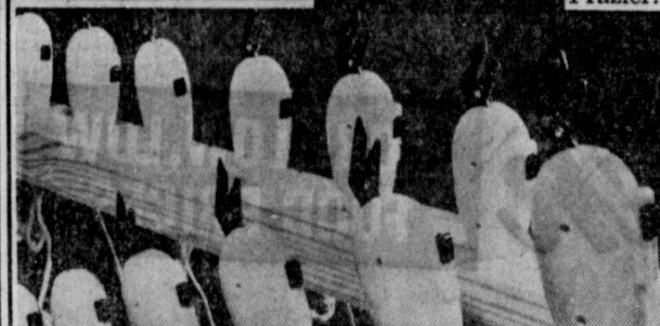

GREENBUG CONTROLS ARE OUTLINED

Methyl parathion, applied by air in a water carrier, has been found to give excellent results in controlling the greenbug, reports the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Southwestern Great Plains Research Center in Bushland.

In testing the effectiveness of ultra-low volume and conventional sprays for greenbug control, Associate Professor Norris E. Daniels of the Bushland Center, recently reported the finding of his research last year.

"Malathion and dimethoate, applied as ultra-low volume aerial sprays, were not effective in greenbug control. Methyl parathion, applied by air in a water carrier, gave excellent control. Dimethoate and malathion, as well as other insecticides, applied as water-emulsion sprays with ground equipment gave satisfactory results," Daniels said.

The greenbug, which has been damaging Panhandle wheat, was found susceptible to methyl parathion, malathion and phasphamidon insecticides applied with conventional methods, but ultra-

low volume application was found unsatisfactory in all instances, he said.

The ultra-low volume application gave insufficient coverage because the greenbugs were well protected by the plant leaves. The dosage differences seemed to make no difference in control, the specialist concluded.

At present there are no label clearances for ultra-low volume application of insecticides for wheat insect control and producers should not apply any insecticides to wheat by this method, he warned.
