

19th Hole

Well, Abilene golf professional Charles Coody came about as close as possible last weekend. In the prestige-rich Masters at Augusta, Georgia, Coody led by one shot going into the last three holes only to finish with three straight bogeys and finish two shots behind winner George Archer, a former Texas Tech golfer. The pressure on those last few holes must have been tremendous. Players were rising and falling from the lead left and right. Charles Coody is a fine player who has been having his problems thus far this year, but maybe the Masters was an indication of things to come for him. I'm sorry Charles didn't go all the way in the Masters, it couldn't have happened to a nicer guy if he had won.

Seems I'm always talking about the rules of the game of golf and also our local rules at Shady Oaks. Once again, I urge everyone to become familiar with the local rules and regulations at Shady Oaks. Fivesomes and sixsomes will absolutely not be tolerated at Shady Oaks on Saturday or Sundays. During the week you must obtain permission from the clubhouse before playing more than a foursome. This rule will be strictly enforced in the future as our play is increasing in leaps and bounds. Two people may not play out of one set of clubs. Each player must have a bag and a set of clubs.

If you see that your are delaying the group behind you on the golf course, stop, step aside and allow them to play through. Playing behind a slow group who will not allow you to play through can be very frustrating, so don't allow yourself to be the guilty party. Hitting pitch shots from more than five yards away from the putting green is not allowed. We hope to build a practice pitching green in the area of the driving range in the near future for this purpose. Please remember the practice putting green should receive the same care as the regular green on the golf course. Do not pull carts or drive electric carts onto or near the putting green.

We are still having problems with our golfers pulling carts and driving electric carts too close to our tee boxes and greens. Thus, this week, we have roped off certain areas on the course. Please observe and use the ropes as guidelines as to where you should take your pull and electric carts.

Also a few guidelines of golf etiquette - Never step in the line of a putt. The footprint takes a few minutes to heal and leaves a print in the grass temporarily, making putting difficult. Do not talk nor walk nor move around while someone is trying to hit a shot or putt. This can be very distracting. Do not hold the flagstick on the ground behind the hole when tending the pin. Hold it loosened but not out of the hole. Pull the flagstick out of the hole as soon as the player hits the putt.

Sometime during the course of the day Sunday, someone changed the tee markers on the golf course. They moved most of them way up to the front to their liking. Those tee markers are where they are for a purpose and are not to be moved. Variety is part of the game of golf and if the game is played the same every day with tee markers and cups in the same old place on the same old greens day after day, the game would soon grow dull.

Baird Gets HUD Recertification

The U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has announced recertification of the Workable Program for Community Improvement for Baird. Baird was among 15 communities throughout the United States receiving recertification.

HUD's recertification means that the community remains eligible for the several types of Federal aid which became available to it when it received the original Workable Program certificate.

Certification of a Workable Program is necessary before a community can receive Federal loans and grants for urban renewable projects and low-rent public housing, and liberal FHA mortgage insurance to assist in the private redevelopment of project areas and for rehousing misplaced families.

Such recertification does not constitute approval of any specific Federal aid. The Workable Program is a showing by the community of how it intends to use its own public and private

resources to eliminate and prevent slums and blight. Once its program is approved it can apply for the Federal aids to supplement local resources as needed. The community must show reasonable progress during the 2-year certification period under its Workable Program to obtain recertification and remain eligible for these Federal grants.

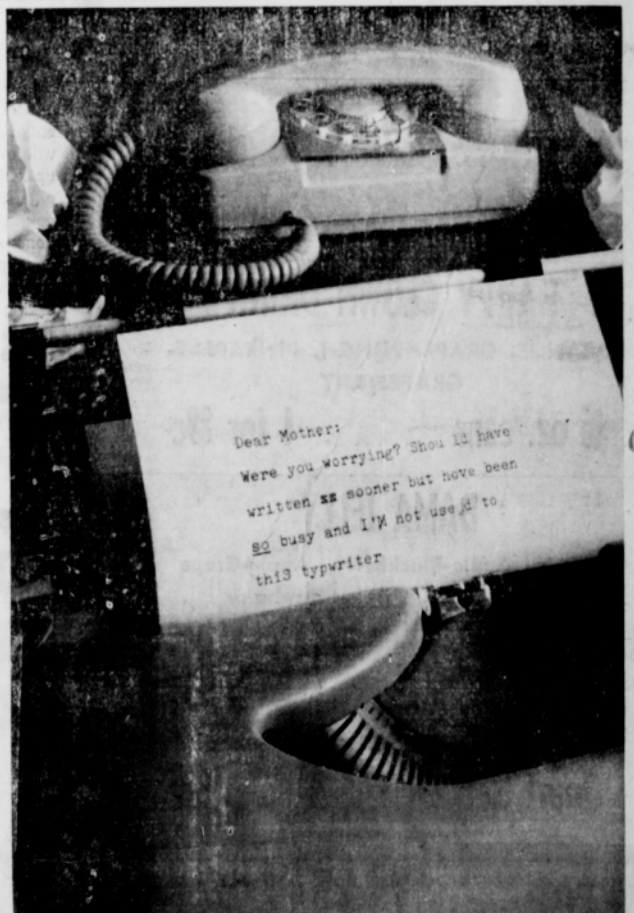
