## Voters elect woman mayor three aldermen

Voters elected Shirley Clifford, to the office of mayor and set a precedent by making her the first woman mayor of Clarendon in the Saturday, April 4, election. Mrs. Clifford ran unopposed in the race.

Also elected were three aldermen for two positions which were expiring and one position with one year left on the term. The seat was vacated by a resignation.

Election results for the City of Clarendon are as follows: Mayor-Shirley Clifford, 146 and with write-ins-Helen Rogers, 1; C.L. Morton, 1; Dr. Tim Martin, 1; Jack Moreman, 1; and Bob Kidd, 1.

In the Board of Alderman race, Leonard Selvidge, 107 for a one year term; Richard Bell, 135 and James Kuhn, 125, both for two years terms, and Tammy Taylor 81 votes. Write-in votes-Betty Topper 1 and Paul Bivens, 1.

Four candidates ran for two places on the Clarendon School Board of Trustees with these results: Incumbents Don Robinson, 168 votes and Bob Cole with 124 votes will be returning to the board of trustees. Mary Ann Slavin, 116 and Gene Alderson with 110 votes ran a very close race for the school positions.

Three persons filed for the three positions

expiring on the Donley County Hospital Board of Directors. Serving for the next term will be Ernest Barbee, place 1, incumbent, 288 votes; Dikki Howell, place 2, incumbent, 279 votes. Place three candidate, Herman Green with 292 votes. Write-ins Willie Moore-2, Dennis Petty-1, Mike Spier-1 and Bill Todd-1 vote.

In Hedley three persons, two on the ballot and one write-in will fill the city positions and are W.B. Wiggins, Otis Holland and Shauna Monroe.

Hedley School Board of Trustees had no contest either with Martha Hill, Ben Carson and Bob White as candidates to fill the three places.

Howardwick election results were: for mayor-Walden Moore, 87 votes and Jack Dickerson, 13 votes. Moore will serve another term as mayor.

For alderman (two places) Lawrence Whitehead, 51 votes; H.L. Tipton, 40 votes; H.H. Rogers, 30 votes; Charlie Prickett, 42 votes and Willie F. Moore, 37 votes.

Whitehead, incumbent, and Prickett will serve the next term as aldermen for Howardwick.

School districts throughout Texas may soon provide these activities, if they apply for financial assistance to bring professional artists into their schools.

"The Artists-in-Education program will place professional performing, visual and literary artists in accredited school districts to bring an enriching arts experience to children of all ages," announced Allan Longacre, Executive Director for the Texas Commission on the Arts.

Deadline for applications is May 1. Assistance awards will be announced in May for the 1981-1982 school year.

Eligible sponsors may be any accredited school district, Regional Education Service Center, local government group, or a non-profit tax-exempt organization such as a museum or an arts council. Organizations may pool their financial resources and then apply to TCA for matching funds for the program

"Artist residencies may range from one week to a full school year," Longacre said. "For the short or long term, those involved learn much about self-expression and communicating creatively."

# New transmission lines and facilities installed by WTU Co.

New transmission lines and related facilities designed to strengthen electric reliability in West Texas Utilities Company's Panhandle service area have been completed and placed in service, Allen Estlack, WTU's local manager in Clarendon, has announced.

The main part of the project was the conversion of the transmission line from Childress through Wellington through Shamrock from 69 kilovolts to 138 kilovolts, which makes it as large as any line in the company's

system.

Also completed was a new substation at Wellington, and new stronger interconnections with Southwestern Public Service Company at Shamrock and north of Clarendon. The new 115 kV intertie near Interstate 40 north of Clarendon provides loop service to the Panhandle area, so that if the main line goes out, service can continue without interruption.

"This should greatly improve electric reliability to the Clarendon area," Estlack said.

At Wellington, Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, which purchases electric energy from WTU, modified its substation to accept service from the new 138 kV line. At Shamrock, WTU built a new 69 kV line from the local terminal to the co-op's substation southwest of the city.

The entire project required about 15 months to complete. A major obstacle was the Red River crossing, which was described as "very difficult" by Mike Moran of Abilene, WTU's manager of System Maintenance and Construc-

tion.

"That river bed looks firm until you take heavy equipment onto it," Moran said. "It's really a sandy quagmire. But we now have double deadend structures on the hills on both sides of the river and a fortified structure in the riverbed itself. We feel that our installation is safe."

The new 138 kV line covers 57.9 miles, and follows the route across the river of the original line, which was built in 1927.

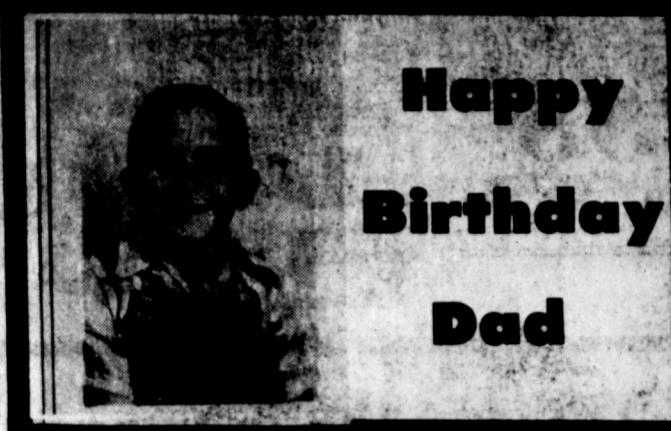

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"THERE'S ONE NEAR YOU"

Last week on Friday, Clarendon experienced some pretty gusty winds at 60 mph at times. Out on Greenbelt Lake, however, those winds were really felt in full force because there was nothing to stop the winds except some pretty yielding waves. And Patton's Landing Boat slips! Joe Kraai and his crew of Cotton Bownds, Ben Bagwell and James Parks were using one of Patton's slips to milk the walleye eggs. A Texas Parks & Wildlife truck was parked quite close to the slip and the men had a wooden workbench set up with a couple of #2 tubs used to catch the eggs. Kraai was standing in the water at the slip dipping out the fish to be milked. There were three boats tied up to the light, covered slip.

Suddenly, a particularly gusty wind lifted the slip up out of the water as it came up under the canopy, and dumped it, boats and all onto the TP&WD truck! Only one of the boats, belonging to Mr. Winkle, sustained any damage. It's bow was up in the air still tied to the upended slip and it's motor was underwater.

However, the #2 tubs were smashed into 6' tall cans, the remains of the wooden workbenches could be used for toothpicks and the truck looked like a rodeo clown's car! Yet, not a single man was injured in any way other than some high blood pressure!

Kraai was left standing alone in the water wondering where the canopy had gone. Bagwell, who had been sitting on the wooden bench, had somehow jumped clear and he reported that he never knew just how he moved or when. One of the men saw the slip coming and made a mad dash to be clear of the truck, slipped and fell and rolled under the truck where he was blocked in by the cascading roof of the landed slip. Another of the fisheries men miraculously ended up in the bed of the truck, how he got there he still doesn't know to this day. And none of them were injured.

The Inland Fisheries personnel, aside from having difficulty with getting their truck back to Canyon, are doing something particularly great here at our lake. They have been doing their yearly walleye fish milking program in which they catch the fish, milk the eggs from the females into one bucket, then milk the sperm from the males into the bucket and gently stir. These fertilized eggs are then shipped to the hatcheries where they are raised to fingerlings than used to stock lakes.

This year, one of the minnow tanks at the Mooring Bait and Tackle establishment is being used as a hatchery! Two quarts of fertilized eggs were put into the water there under the careful eye of the Mooring Egg Watching Brothers. When the eggs are hatched and raised for three days,

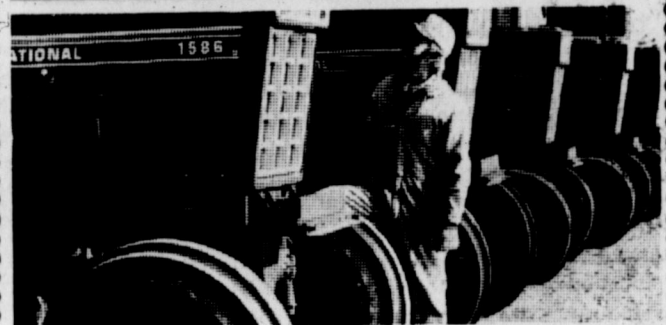
they will be dumped into Greenbelt Lake to grow.

In 1975 there were some hatch fry put into our lake by the Inland Fisheries of the TP&WD, but it takes the walleye female three years before she matures enough to reproduce. The next batch of fry came in 1977 so they were just then big enough to reproduce from the '75 hatch. Now, with those fish already in the lake, this batch of fry will help the population of walleye to expand, in three years, to a pretty good "herd" of walleye!

The fish report is fair considering the high winds lately. An 8 1/2 lb bass was caught last week, there have been some crappie reports. In fact, rumor has it that the local game warden has been seen out on the lake early on Monday to fish for those crappies, so that is a proof positive that they are moving and he knows where they are. Of course, if you decide to tail the warden, just be sure you have a valid fishing license on you or you may find yourself "in a heap o' trouble, boy".

If you are out at the Mooring Bait and Tackle, stop by and look at the walleye egg hatchery. Be sure and tell the Moorings about any walleye or pike you catch so they can keep tabs on growth of those fish. It sure wouldn't hurt to let the Inland Fisheries fellows know that you appreciate their efforts in behalf of our lake, either.

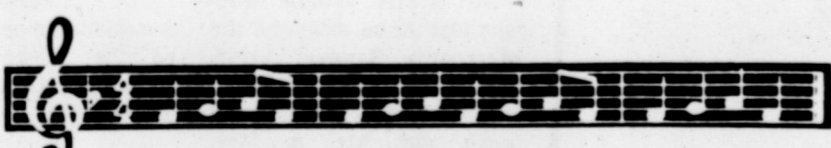

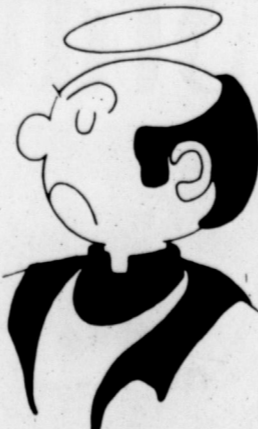
Mr. Bagby had been a resident of Clarendon and Donley County for many years. He and his wife Anne had owned and operated a farm in Ashtola Community

## BAKING SODA AS ANTACID

I frequently use baking soda for indigestion. My doctor told me to use only liquid antacids. Is there something wrong with baking soda?

Baking soda (Sodium bicarbonate) is a commonly used home health aid. Unfortunately, the white powder has two strikes against it when used as an antacid.

First, many individuals do not tolerate sodium very well. . .for example, heart patients and people having high blood pressure. The sodium in sodium bicarbonate may cause water to be retained in the body. Swelling of the feet and other body parts as well as an increase in blood pressure may result. This puts an additional strain on the heart.

Second, sodium bicarbonate is actually not a very good antacid. Shortly after taking a mixture of water and bicarbonate, the stomach produces additional acid. This is called acid rebound.

The liquids are generally preferred to sodium bicarbonate as antacids. Most are low in sodium and do not promote acid rebound.

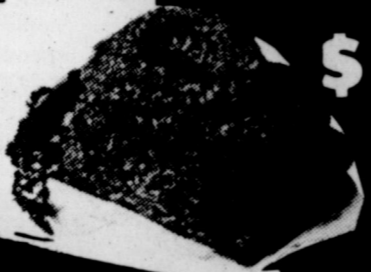

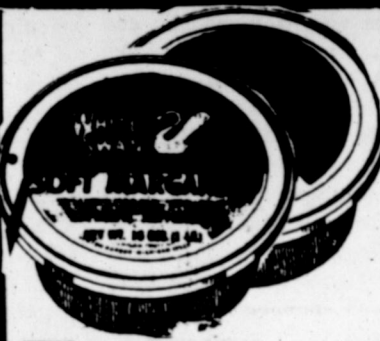

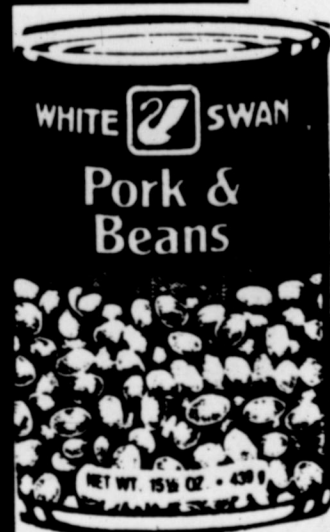

Last let us look at the chain of influence. Youngsters do things and count as all right to do those things which their heroes do. A father ought to be the hero of his children as well as a mother and if how we live does not back up our professions of faith and our commitment to the Lord then a chain has been broken. How often a witness to Jesus will find someone using as an excuse some hero who has broken the chain of influence and their life denies their profession. The hazards of broken chains are real.

**HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION AND AG USE VALUE FOR SCHOOL TAXES**

The Clarendon C.I.S.D. hereby announces that all persons are entitled to receive an exemption of \$5,000 from the market value of their residence homestead for the purpose of school taxes. In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes. Also all persons owning land that is currently devoted principally to agricultural use for at least five (5) of the preceding seven (7) years may file an application of agriculture land use. The application classifies the value of land considering the agricultural use to which the land is principally devoted and the average annual net income derived from its use.

To qualify for these exemptions, an application must be filed with the school district tax office by April 30, 1981. Application forms are available at the School Tax Office.

## County farmers can obtain subsidized crop insurance

Farmers in Donley County can now obtain subsidized Federal Crop Insurance against a partial or total loss of their 1981 crops. The county is one of 250 counties in which insurance is being offered for the first time as part of a nationwide expansion recently authorized by Congress.

Policies are currently available for corn, cotton and grain sorghum, according to Jackie Harris, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation district director.

Under the new program, the Federal government pays up to 30 percent of the insurance premium of policyholders who do not elect to participate in the separate USDA Disaster Payment program. Farmers who participate in the disaster payment program on an insured crop may purchase insurance but are not eligible for the subsidy. After the 1981 crop year, the disaster payment program will be ended.

Federal Crop Insurance is designed to enable farmers

to insure a part or all of the money they invest in their crops against loss due to all unavoidable causes. Policies can also be used as loan collateral to assure funds for payment in a poor crop year, says Harris.

Policyholders can elect to insure 50 percent, 65 percent or 75 percent of their average crop yields. They can also choose, from among three selections, the price they want to be paid for each bushel or pound their insured crop falls short of the production guarantee. Another option provides an additional premium discount when the hail and fire coverage of the FCIC policy is replaced with an equal or larger amount of private hail and fire insurance.

For information about the subsidized insurance and the protection it provides, contact the FCIC office in Amarillo or one of the local insurance agents now handling the program. Application deadlines are April 15 for corn and April 30 for cotton and grain sorghum.

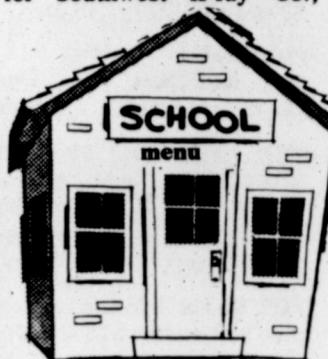

or fencing a large tract.

Currently, trespassing only a \$200 fine. Sarpalius maintains that amount is inadequate. "I know of people in our district who charge \$1200 for a mule deer lease. But the most trespassers have to pay is \$200. That's not fair," Sarpalius said.

The new law makes trespassing with a deadly weapon becomes a class A misdemeanor with a maximum of a \$2,000 fine plus one year in jail.

"Trespassers are a problem not only because they shoot wildlife but they also sometimes shoot livestock. The combination of the increased penalties and the deadly weapon provision in the bill should keep these people off our farms and ranches.

"This law also will help places like public golf courses, where people sneak on the course and steal golf balls, and play without paying the fee," Sarpalius said.

Trespassers will think twice about ignoring property lines if a bill by State Senator Bill Sarpalius becomes law. The bill, which passed out of the Senate Jurisprudence Committee Tuesday, clarifies the law of trespassing and increases penalties.

"The bill makes three main changes in the law. It increases the penalty for trespassing; it makes it illegal to cross a livestock fence and it clarifies the law of trespassing on unfenced areas," Sarpalius said.

Under present law, landowners must put up signs every 100 yards or so to keep out trespassers. The new law only requires signs at gates and entrances. Sarpalius said there were many complaints about the old law from farmers and ranchers whose land was abused by intruders, but who could not afford the expense of posting

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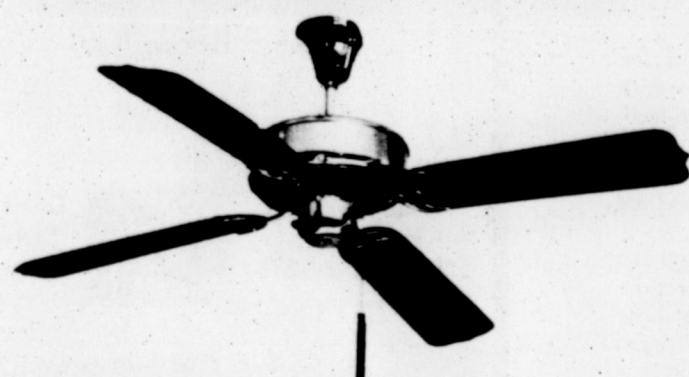

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Some people may not have liked many of the fish recipes in last week's article. So, this week, let's try some conventional ideas for cooking fish or seafood.

### Six Ways to Fry Fish

1. Season generously with Tony's Creole Seasoning (or just your favorite seasoning.) 2 C corn meal and 1 C flour. Place in paper bag. Make slit lengthwise in perch or bite size pieces of other fish filets. Add to corn meal mixture in paper bag and shake. Remove, shake off excess and drop in deep fat (375). Fry until golden brown and turn over once when the pieces float.

2. For a change, spread mustard on fish before dipping in flour and meal mix. Fry.

3. Soak fish in rich milk one hour. Drain and add to bag and shake. Fry.

4. Soak fish in beer for 10 minutes before putting in the bag to shake and fry.

5. Cut a slit lengthwise in perch and place in dishpan. Season all over generously with seasoning. I really like to use Tony's Creole Seasoning, it's really spicy hot. Add a dash of Worcestershire sauce and Louisiana Red Hot Sauce. Dip in mix of 2 C corn meal, 1 C flour, shake and deep fry.

6. Instead of dipping in corn meal and flour, try pancake batter made by adding milk to soften. Dip seasoned fish and fry.

Did you know that you can EAT those little crawfish that crawl up to the shore at night at Greenbelt lake Yes, you can and they are delicious. They can be used the same as you would crab, but here are two ideas specifically for crawfish or crawdads.

**Crawfish Blaque**  
1 lb. peeled tails (that is alot of our little crawfish)  
2 sticks oleo  
4 heaping TBS flour  
1 chopped onion  
1 stalk chopped celery  
1 chopped green bell pepper  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
1/4 lemon, sliced  
1 can tomato sauce  
1 tsp sugar  
1 can whole tomatoes  
1 TBS Worcestershire  
2 qts warm water  
1 TBS chopped green

onion tops  
1 TBS chopped parsley  
salt and pepper  
4 fried stuffed crawfish shells  
Make a roux with 1 stick oleo and flour. Use a Dutch oven for this as black iron pots will cause crawfish to darken. Remove roux and set aside.

Add the other stick of oleo and saute onions, celery, green bell peppers, lemon, slices, tomato sauce, sugar and whole tomatoes. Cook slowly for 15 minutes.

Make a mixture of roux, warm water, Worcestershire sauce, and fried stuffed crawfish shells to first mix. Season, bring to boil and cook slowly for 2 hours. Add crawfish tails and cook another hour.

Serve in soup bowls over boiled rice and place stuffed shells in each bowl. Garnish with onion tops and parsley.  
**Fried Stuffed Crawfish Shells**

24 crawfish body shells  
1 lb crawfish tails  
1 onion chopped  
1 chopped green bell pepper  
2 stalks celery chopped  
1 TBS chopped green onion tops  
2 cloves garlic  
1 small can paprika  
3 eggs  
1 C bread crumbs or cornbread salt and pepper

Chop tails and vegetables together (of course, these tails are shelled). Do not grind. Combine this mix with raw eggs, bread crumbs and season and add paprika. If too dry add a little water. Stuff in shells, roll in flour and fry in deep fat until they float. If you don't have the shells, just roll the mix in

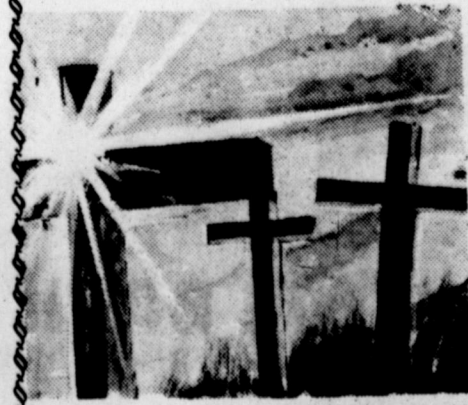

**YOUR GARDEN**

It's usually better to plow your garden in the fall. This reduces erosion, exposes heavy soils to frost, kills exposed insects, brings about decay of organic matter and generally makes for earlier planting.
