BAIRD — Specialist 4 Harold L. Smedley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sikes E. Smedley of Mt. Ida, Ark., and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Smedley of Baird and Mr. and Mrs. W. I. Campbell of Abilene, recently received the following citation and was awarded the Army Commendation Medal.

For meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam. Specialist 4 Smedley distinguished himself during the period 12 February to 5 March 1969 while serving as an Operations Specialist, Bien Hoa Tactical Area Command Fire Support Coordination Center, 54th Artillery Group, Specialist Smedley manifested singular determination and rare technical expertise as he vectored aircraft around artillery fire during the Communist 1969 Post-Tet offensive against the Long Binh-Bien Hoa Complex. His superb coordination of artillery and air assets enable more than twenty batteries to provide intense, continuous fire support without impairing the maximum utilization of available aircraft.

Applications To Transfer Students Must Be Filed By July 15

The State Board of Education announced in a letter to all school districts, dated June 10, 1969, that all applications for transfer of students from one district to another must be filed on or before July 15, 1969. Senate Bill No. 435 passed by the Texas Legislature, changed the procedure for filing transfer requests. It is now necessary that parents file an application for transfer with the school district to which the students are transferred. It is no longer necessary to file these requests with the County Superintendent.

The July 15 deadline will be for the 1969-70 school year only. The deadline for subsequent years will be June 1. The only exceptions to these deadlines will be for extreme hardship cases. Hardship transfer applications may be filed until October 1, and they must be filed directly with the Texas Education Agency.

Applications for transfer of students are available in the

office of the Superintendent of all Callahan County schools. Parents are urged to make this application prior to the deadline because there will be no extension of the deadlines.

Sept. 1 Deadline For Recording Public Stream Water Usage

The Texas Water Rights Commission has announced that final notice of the recording deadline under the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 has been given. Everyone who is using water from a public stream who does not claim under a certified filing or a permit from the State, must record his claim by September 1, 1969. Users of water for domestic and livestock watering purposes are exempt from this requirement.

Failure to timely record the claim will "extinguish and bar" the claim of water right according to Section 4 of the Adjudication Act. All affected water users who have not already filed their claim are urged by the Commission to do so as soon as possible.

Valid claims will be recognized to the extent of maximum use of water without waste during any year between 1963 and 1967. Where the user was in the process of constructing a system or had facilities to use a larger amount of water on the effective date of the Act than he had actually used, use from 1968 to 1970 may be recognized.

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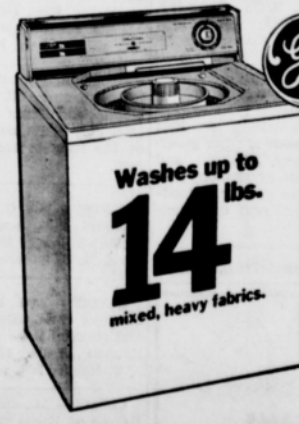

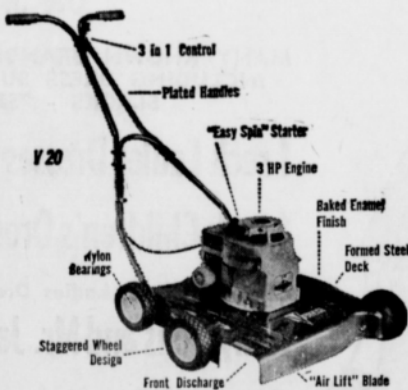

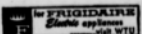

Child's Summer Job Also Helps Parents

COLLEGE STATION — A child's summer job may be a tax boon to many parents, says Linda Jacobsen, Extension Home management specialist.

Both parent and working child can get \$600 exemptions. Even though the child earns more than \$600, the parent is entitled to an exemption because he supports the child. Law permits the youth to have his own personal exemption even though the parent claims him as a dependent.

Children, however, adds the Texas A&M University specialist, must be full-time students or under 19. This is the only situation in which two different taxpayers get the \$600 personal deduction for the same person.
