Man must heleve in Christ and in God before he can be saved. "Without faith it is impossible to please him" (Heb. 11:6). This is not the stopping place. Man is not saved the moment he believes. "Ye see then how that by works is a man justified, and NOT BY FAITH ONLY" (Jas. 2:24). Man must repent of sins. "Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish" (Luike 13:3). Man must confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in wise perish." (Luke 13:3). Man must confess that Jesus is the Son of God. "If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved" (Rom. 10:9). Man must be baptized for remission of his sins. "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ, for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost" (Acts 2:38). Does baptism save a man? The Bible says it does. (1 Pet. 3:21)




