WHAT IS A CHRISTIAN?

All people do not have the same idea of what a Christian is. Some apply the name to members of all denominations. Some use it with reference only to the most devout members of a denomination. Some apply it to non-church members who are morally good.

What does the Bible reveal to us on the subject? The name is used only three times in the Bible. In Acts 11:26 we are told that Christ disciples were called Christians. In Acts 26:28 we read about a certain King Agrippa to whom Paul preached. He told Faul that he was "almost persuaded" to be a Christian. In 1 Fet. 4:16 Peter said, "If any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed. but let him glorify God in this behalf."

What do these verses teach us about Christians?

1. That a Christian is a disciple of Christ. A disciple is a "learner", a "follower". One cannot be a Christian without learing about Christ and learning His teaching. He cannot be a Christian without following the teaching of Christ.

2. King Agrippa could have become a Christian by obeying the things which Paul taught him. A Christian, then, is one who obeys the gospel which Paul taught. This consisted of believing and being baptized (Acts 18:8). No one can scripturally be called a Christian who has not believed the gospel and been baptized as the scriptures teach.

A Christian is one who is not ashamed to be known as the Lord's disciple, and who will suffer rather than let Christ and His church be reproached.






