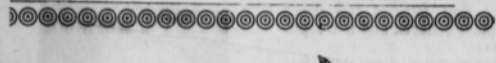

## Safety Group Praises New States Adopting Safety Requirements

WASHINGTON — The Tire Industry Safety Council today praised seven new states for furthering the campaign for greater highway safety by outlawing the use of bald tires on vehicles traveling their highways. The seven states adopting requirements this year are: Colorado, Florida, Iowa, Maryland, Texas, Utah and Washington.

"We still have a long way to go in the campaign to get cars with bald or worn out tires off the road," said Ross R. Ormsby, Chairman of the Council. "At present, there are 12 states which have no requirements of any type against unsafe or bald tires even though there are nearly 13 million registered vehicles in those states."

Ormsby said there are 29 states which have now a specific minimum tread depth requirement.

The Council also said there are nine states which require

tires to be in a "safe operating condition," but fail to specify a minimum allowable tread depth. These states are: Arkansas, Hawaii, Idaho, Louisiana, Maine, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri and West Virginia. The District of Columbia has a similar requirement.

"Surveys show that while tires are involved in less than one percent of all highway accidents in more than half these cases the tires were bald or worn to the cord," said Ormsby. "Any tire with a tread depth of 1-16 inch or less in two or more adjacent grooves should be removed immediately."

"When your tires are worn down to a tread of 1-16 inch, it is time to replace them. Bald tires endanger not only you and your family, but every motorist you pass on the road."

## Department of Public Safety Offers Personal Identification Card

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that effective September 1, Texans will be able to obtain a special personal identification card.

The card, which was authorized by the 62nd Texas Legislature, is laminated and contains a color photograph of the holder. It is the same size as a Texas drivers license.

Information appearing on the card will include the holder's date of birth, height, sex, and eye color. Each card will have a special identification number issued by the DPS.

Speir said the cards should be of value to those persons who do not hold a Texas drivers license, but who need some sort of official card to help establish their identity.

In order to obtain a personal identification card, the applicant must appear at a DPS drivers license field office on or after September 1, execute a special application form, present a birth certificate or other documentary evidence of identity and date of birth, be fingerprinted and pay a statutory fee of \$5.00. The special cards, which will be mailed from DPS Headquarters in Austin, will be dated to expire four years from the applicant's next birth date.

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1972, in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.  
The law further states that all such brands and marks must be recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.  
The owner shall have the right, during this six-month period, to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.  
It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.  
When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.  
There is no limit to the number of brand and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law. 35-6-c

## Information Center on Economic Actions Is County ASCS Office

BAIRD — All residents of Callahan County may obtain answers to questions on operation and interpretation of the Presidential order of Aug. 15 on prices, rents, wages and salaries from the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office, according to Tommie Harris, Chairman of the County ASCS Committee.

County ASCS offices throughout the United States have been chosen as information centers to answer questions from all citizens on President Nixon's Executive Order, which is designed to stem inflation and strengthen the national economy.

The Callahan County ASCS Office is receiving official answers to questions concerning the President's action, and any person in Callahan County who wants or needs precise information should get in touch with the County Office, Mr. Harris said.

The Callahan County ASCS Office is located at the Courthouse. The mailing address is Box 909, Baird, Texas 79504. The telephone number is (915) 854-1049. In charge of the office is J. C. Earp, Jr., County Executive Director. The office has a staff of three other persons.

"Ours and all ASCS offices throughout the nation, will function as information centers

in all locations outside of highly urbanized areas," Mr. Harris said.

County ASCS offices are not to handle complaints or appeals, he said. They will serve only to provide official information. Persons with complaints will register them with the most convenient district or sub-district office of the Internal Revenue Service. Their location is Post Office Building, 3rd & Pine, Abilene, Texas 79601 - phone (915) 677-9146.

"Neither will interpretations or guesses be made by ASCS county office people. They will answer only those questions for which they have been supplied answers. If they don't know the answer to a specific question, they will say so. If a member of the public wants the county office to obtain an answer, the question will go by phone or mail to the nearest IRS district office," Mr. Harris said.

Normal functions of ASCS county offices is to administer farm action programs of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the local level. County Committee Chairman, Tommie Harris, said ASCS service to farmers will continue without interruption.

"Our county office people welcome the opportunity to serve their country and are happy to make the extra effort in this crucial period," he said.

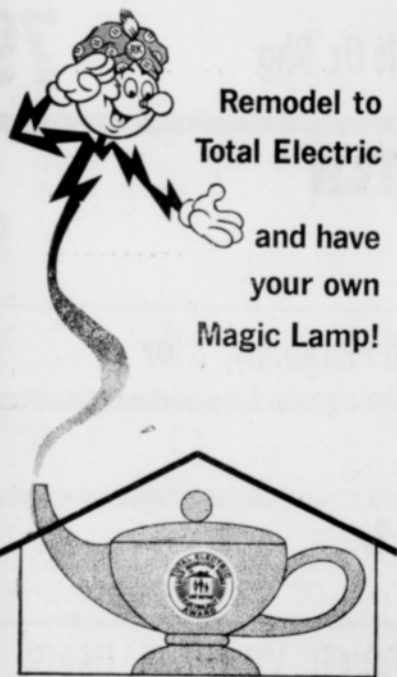
