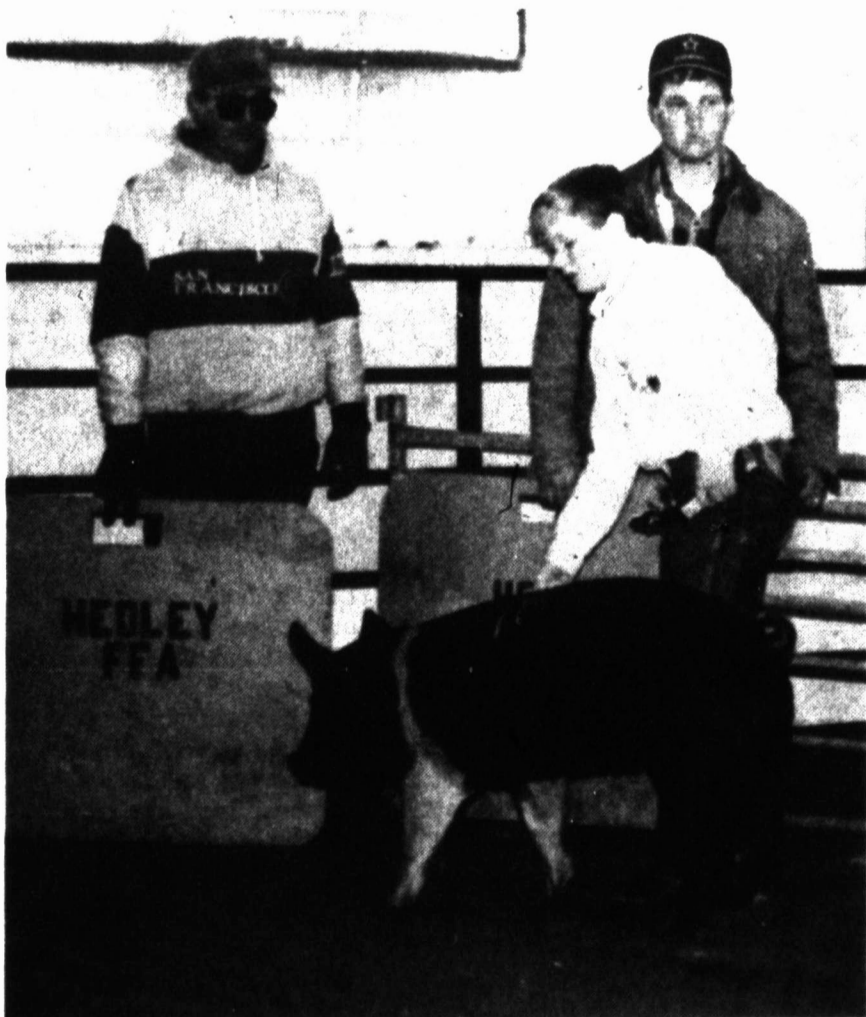

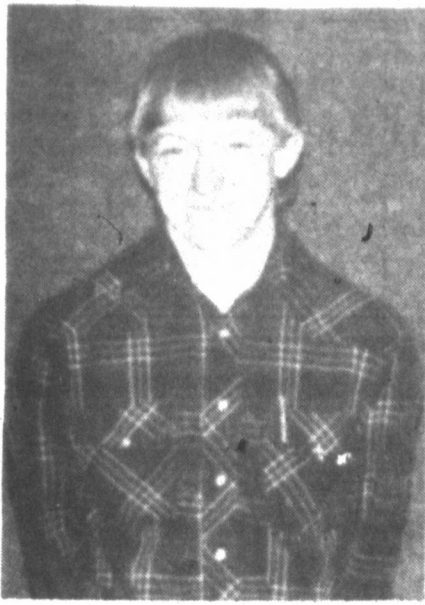

FirstCare was incorporated in August, 1985 and received its state license in May, 1986.

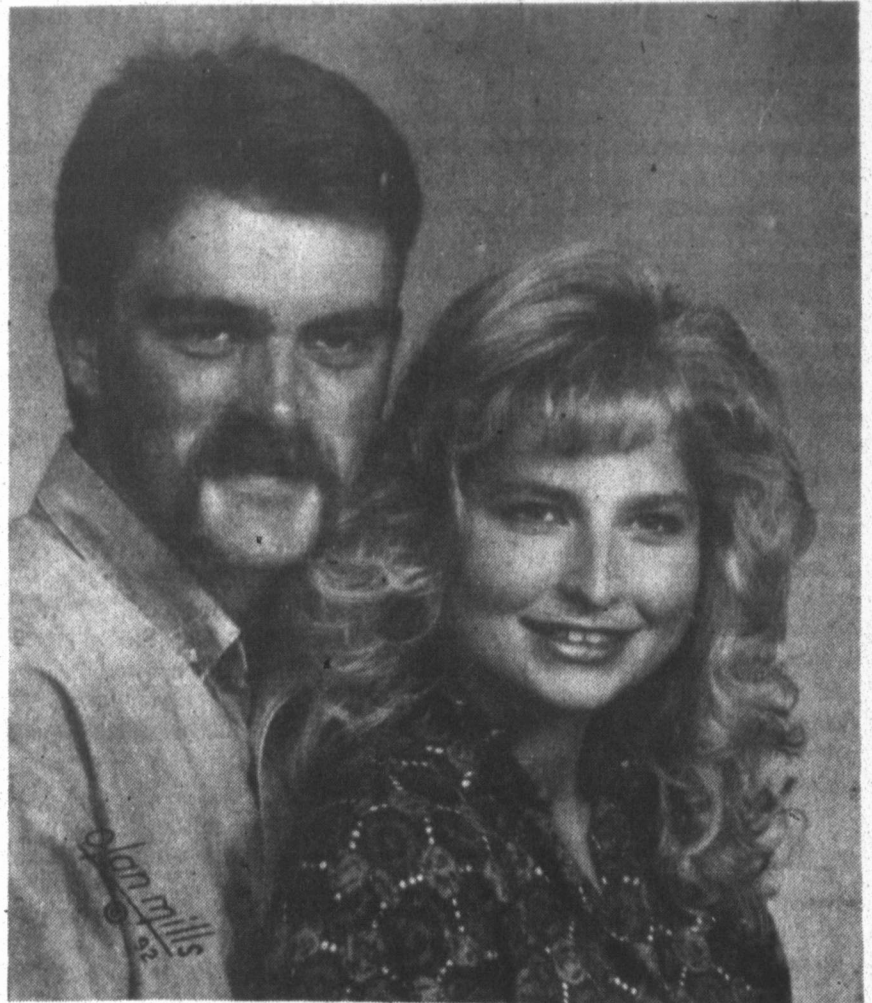
New counties that will be added to the service area include Castro, Dallam, Donley, Gray, Hartley, Hemphill, Parmer, Roberts, Sherman, and Wheeler. Coverage has been expanded in five counties (Deaf Smith, Hutchinson, Moore, Oldham and Swisher) to include the entire county. Initially, primary care sites will be located in Dalhart, Friona and Pampa. Provider contracts are currently being finalized.

### Social Security News

#### Social Security Recipients Must Report Earnings

If you worked and received Social Security benefits in 1992, you have until April 15th to report your earnings to Social Security if you earned over the annual limits. The 1992 earnings limits were \$7,440 for beneficiaries under age 65 and \$10,200 for beneficiaries age 65-69. The earnings limits do not apply to people who are age 70 and over the entire year.

The purpose of the annual earnings report is to enable us to compare your actual earnings with the estimate you provide when you applied for benefits or when you filed last year's earnings report. The benefits you were paid in 1992 were based on that estimate. If you earned less than you estimated, you may be due additional money. If you made more than you estimated for 1992, you may have to repay some benefits.

The report should also include an estimate of the earnings you expect to make in 1993. Note that the earnings limits for 1993 are \$7,680 for beneficiaries under age 65 and \$10,560 for beneficiaries age 65-69. Again, you benefit check will be adjusted to reflect any excess earnings anticipated. If our records show that you expected to have earnings over the 1992 limits, we will send an Annual Report of Earnings form in the mail automatically. If you do not receive the report form by the end of February, you should call our toll-free number to have one sent to you.

Failure to report your earnings by April 15th may result in substantial penalties. You can be penalized up to 1 full month's benefits and be required to repay any overpayment. You should be aware that filing a Federal income tax return does not take the place of filing an annual report to Social Security. Your report may be made by phone if you chose.

To file an earnings report or to get more information call Social Security's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

#### Social Security Recipients to Get Benefit Statements

"Social Security beneficiaries will receive statements in the mail in January showing the benefits they received in 1992," said Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo. This statement should be used to determine if any benefits are subject to Federal income tax.

At least 9 out of 10 of those who receive the statement - Form SSA 1099 - will not have to pay taxes on their Social Security benefits because their total income is less than the taxable ceiling. "If you receive Social Security benefits as your only source of income, you are unlikely to owe Federal taxes on the benefits," Talbot said.

An Internal Revenue Services (IRS) worksheet - IRS Notice 703 - comes with the benefit statement. "The worksheet shows you how to determine if your Social Security benefits are subject to tax," Talbot explained. "If, after completing the worksheet, you have questions about your tax liability, you should call the IRS toll-free number, 1-800-829-1040 and ask for Publication 915, which contains tax information about Social Security benefits."

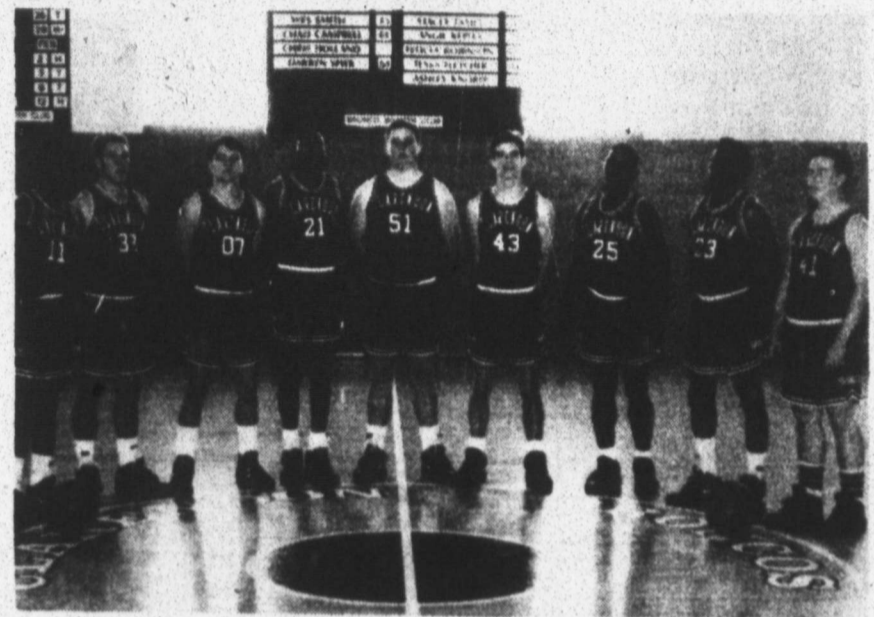

In addition to the Ranch and Feedlot Operations program, the building will also house part of the nursing program, at least for the time being.

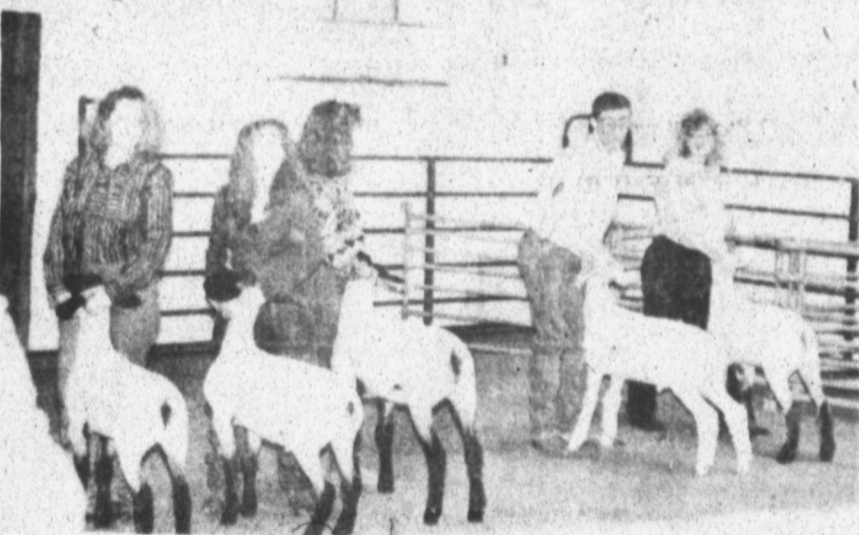
Clarendon College's Ranch and Feedlot Operations Program draws students into Clarendon from throughout the Southwest. There is stiff academic competition to get into the program.


