Range Tour on New Grazing System To Be Held at Albany June 22

ALBANY - A grazing system has resulted in increased grass production, more efficient harvest, and increased livestock production will be demonstrated on a range tour to be held near Albany on June 22, 1972, at 10 a. m., according to Lendon Parker, District Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service at Albany.

The tour, which will be sponsored by the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management, the Lower Clear Fork Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Soil Conservation Service, will take place at the Lucky Ranch, 6 miles south of Albany on Highway 380. The Lucky Ranch is owned by H. R. Stasney.

"More than fifty people have traveled from across the State," Parker said, "to see this High Intensity-Low Frequency Grazing System, which with a range improvement program, has nearly doubled the stocking rate in three years' time on this ranch."

High-Intensity - Low Frequency systems on the Lucky Ranch and others at Throckmorton, San Angelo, Water Valley and Barnhart that have been in for two or more years have drawn statewide attention because they are showing such benefits as lower operating costs, easier livestock management, rapid increase in grass and beef production, reduced

internal parasite problems, and improved wildlife conditions. Because of the strong interest developing in HILF grazing systems this program has been planned to give an in-area look at these systems.

People interested in going on this tour should meet at the Albany Court House by 10 a. m. The group will go by caravan to the Lucky Ranch. There transportation will be furnished to carry people over the ranch to see this system in operation, according to Parker.

Following a catered dinner, representatives from the Lucky Ranch, Albany, the Rob Brown Ranch at Throckmorton, the Quincy Corbett Ranch, Breckenridge, and the J. W. Rhodes Ranch at Winerall Wells will speak on HILF systems on their ranches. Brown's system includes an artificial breeding program with Simmental cattle. Steers and light stocker cattle are being used in two systems, and cows are run in a three-system on the Quincy Corbett Ranch. Corbett is reporting excellent gains on stocker cattle. Dick Carey, operator of the Rhodes ranch, has a cross-breeding program. He will present data on the effects of this system on conception rates on cows. Carey has used 10 less bulls than ever before. He estimates a savings of \$5000 just on bulls alone.

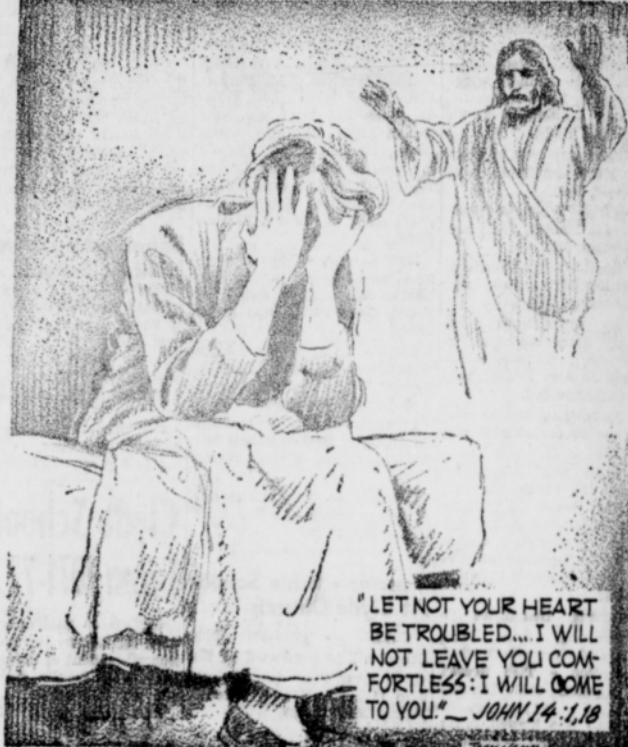

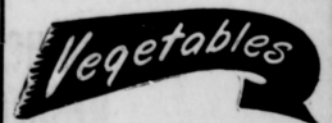
