## Schools Support Propositions

The Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees and the Hedley Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees have both passed resolutions supporting Propositions 1, 2 and 3 in the upcoming election.

According to officials from Hedley, "The Propositions are intended to help equalize funding for public schools, [and] require the state to fund future state mandates, and allow the state to issue bonds to help school districts construct new facilities."

Funding for Public School has been in the courts and before the legislature for several years. There are vast differences between the funding per student in rich districts and poor districts. Donley County schools are near the middle of the economic spectrum. Nevertheless, the Propositions are expected to benefit local schools.

The Clarendon resolution states, "...Proposition 1, the Equalization Amendment, will allow the state to shift a limited amount of funds from property-wealthy school districts and redistribute those funds to property-poor school districts to help equalize school district funding and bring Texas one step closer to solving the school finance equity crisis." The transfer of funds is virtually mandated by court rulings.

According to Hedley Board President, Ben Carson, Proposition 2 helps Texas move "...closer to adequately funding Texas' public education system by ensuring that the state helps pay for the programs it requires." In recent years, state authorities have tended to make rules that were expensive for local districts to implement, but the state has not provided much to offset the costs it mandated. The Proposition does not apply to requirements imposed before December 31, 1993. "Current state mandates, such as the 22:1 class-size ratio for certain elementary grades and the teacher salary schedule aren't affected by this proposition," Carson said.

Proposition 3 is the Facilities Financing Amendment. It would allow the state to issue general obligation or revenue bonds to assist districts in financing facilities. The courts have expressed concern that many districts are using inadequate quarters.

The Amendments are not necessarily anyone's first choice. But they are probably as good a compromise as can be developed under the circumstances prevailing in the state. The Boards' official positions encouraging voters to approve the amendment were the result of discussion and deliberation. Their recommendations will be considered seriously by area voters.

## ASCS Farm and Ranch News

1993 Farm Program Sign-up Ends April 30.

Producers have until April 30, 1993, to apply for the 1993 feed grain, wheat and cotton Farm Programs at the ASCS Office.

The acreage reduction percentages are 10 percent for corn, 5 percent for grain sorghum, 7.5 percent for upland cotton, and zero percent for wheat, oats and barley. "Farmers who meet these and other program requirements will be eligible for target price protection and price support loans on this year's feed grains, wheat and cotton." Drew Thornberry said.

Target prices protect producers' income if market prices are below the target levels. Thornberry said farmers need money to operate. Advance deficiency payments provide cash early in the year, and through the price support loan program, farmers can obtain interim financing after harvest while waiting for a better market.

"When producers sign up for the 1993 programs, they may request 50 percent of the estimated total deficiency payments in advance for program crops," said Thornberry. "The payments will be issued in cash, limited to the farmer's intended program acreage." Only producers participating in the 1993 commodity programs will be eligible for benefit on this year's crops.

Certification Deadline Is May 15

Certifications will be by appointments, so please telephone (874-3561) ahead to make your appointment. All small grains planted for harvest, grazing, zero planted or for cover on ACR and/or CU for Pay must be reported by May 15.

For farms participating in the 1993 Farm Program, all small grains must be reported. Farms not participating in the program should report their small grains to ensure the bases are protected for future years.

### Caldwell Families Honored

dedication ceremonies for Southwestern University's new \$5.5 million theater and academic mall complex.

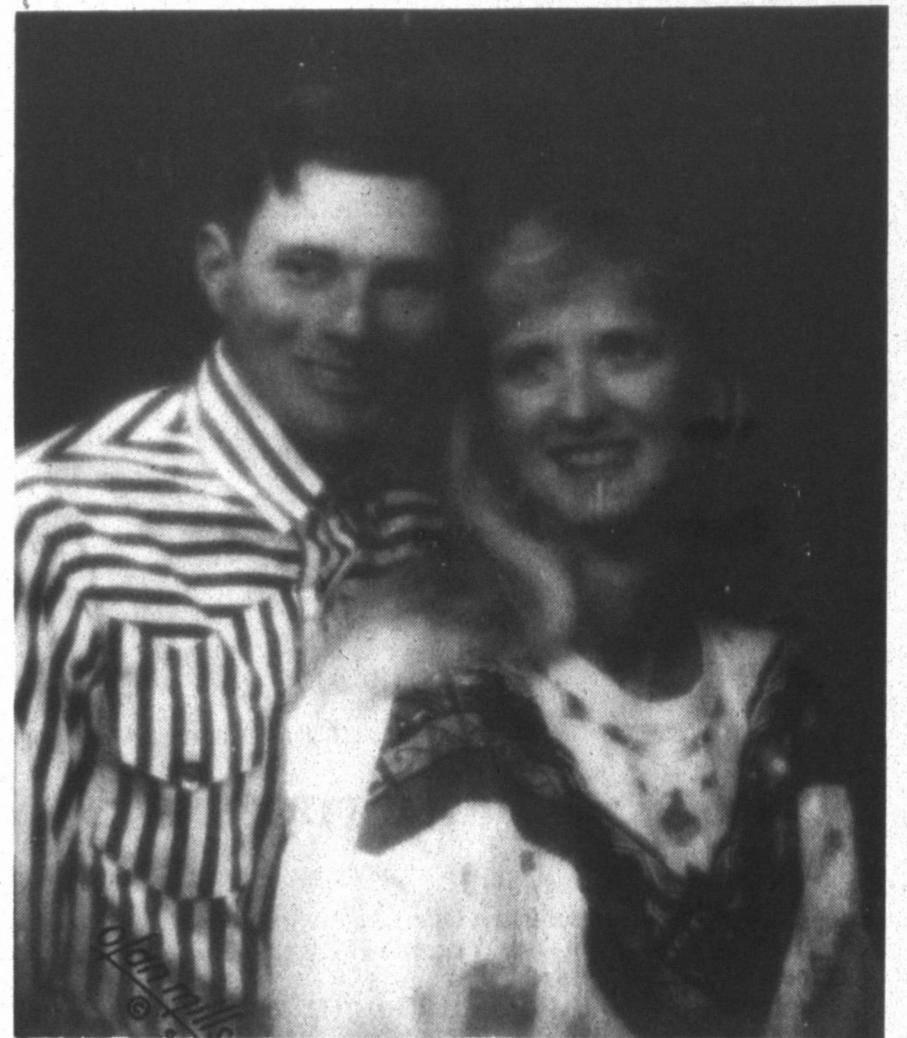
Mrs. Genevieve Britt Caldwell graduated from Southwestern in 1942 and her son Turner is a member of SU's Class of 1971. Mrs. Caldwell's sister, Louise Britt Carvey, Class of 1944, and her husband, Frank P. Carvey, Jr., Class of 1945, who reside in Fort Worth, joined the Caldwells at the dedication convocation and ribbon-cutting ceremonies on campus.

The Caldwell-Carvey families generously made possible an octagonal presentation room and a spacious new theatre lobby inside Southwestern's new \$3.5 million Jesse H. and Mary Gibbs Jones Theatre. With parquet floors and floor-to-ceiling windows overlooking the heart of the campus, the octagon will be used not only for receptions, but also as a performance space. The theater features a fully computerized lighting

board, a thrust stage, and 322 seats in a three-quarter-round, tiered seating arrangement.

The theater interior is appointed mainly in teal, with Art Deco lighting. Backstage are work areas including the Swenson Scene Shop, a costume shop and dressing rooms. The Nita Akin Green Room provides a waiting area for performers and, at other times besides performances, a gathering space for program participants. The catwalks designed by theater consultant Richard Jeter offer lighting directors and technicians an exceptional variety of positions for lighting instruments. The J.E. and L.E. Mabe Hall of Honor, where in the future philanthropists will be recognized for their generosity to Southwestern, is a skylit arcade that joins the new Jesse H. and Mary Gibbs Jones Theater with the Alma Thomas proscenium theater.

The \$2 million academic mall project at SU encompasses more than 10 acres of land and replaces old Ruterville Drive, which formerly cut through campus. Special areas of the academic mall include the Arthur and Evie Jo Wilson Chapel Plaza and the Hoblit-zelle Library Park.

Beneath the mall, an underground infrastructure was constructed that will serve the university's needs well into the 21st Century, with underground phone lines, utilities, chilled water and sprinkler systems and a complex computer cabling system.

This is just a minor sampling of the books contents.

*Caves To Skyscrapers* includes everything from country houses, pyramids to castles during Medieval life. Anyone interested in the world's most beautiful palace? You can find out about it on page 103 in Volume 5.

Other volumes concerning animals, inventions, science, technology, transportation, great leaders and capitals, art, various countries, earth's treasures, myths, and legends are available with numerous others. Volume 14 offers fantasy stories such as "Aladdin's Lamp", "Little Mermaid", "Little Match Girl", and "Red Riding Hood".

If your elementary child is needing a new approach to make those end-of-school reports a little more appealing, *Disney's Wonderful World of Knowledge* might just give him the "lift" he needs. Why not check it out?

Groups of spots can spread almost anywhere on the body. The spots quickly change to fluid-filled pustules, then to crusts. New crops of spots continue to break out so that at the height of the rash, red spots, pustules and crusts can appear in the same area.

As chicken pox can be serious, you should always consult your physician if you suspect it. Your doctor or pharmacist may recommend that your child bathe with natural colloidal oatmeal, such as Aveeno® Bath Treatment from Rydelle Laboratories. It can help ease skin discomfort. 

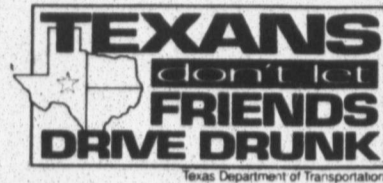

## Warning For Women: Beware of Endometriosis

(NAPS)—Knowing the facts about a disease that affects over five million American women—ages 11 to 50, of all income levels and ethnic groups—could help prevent serious health trouble, experts agree.

Endometriosis is a disease in which tissue that normally covers the inner surface of the uterus (endometrium) is also found in other areas such as the abdomen,

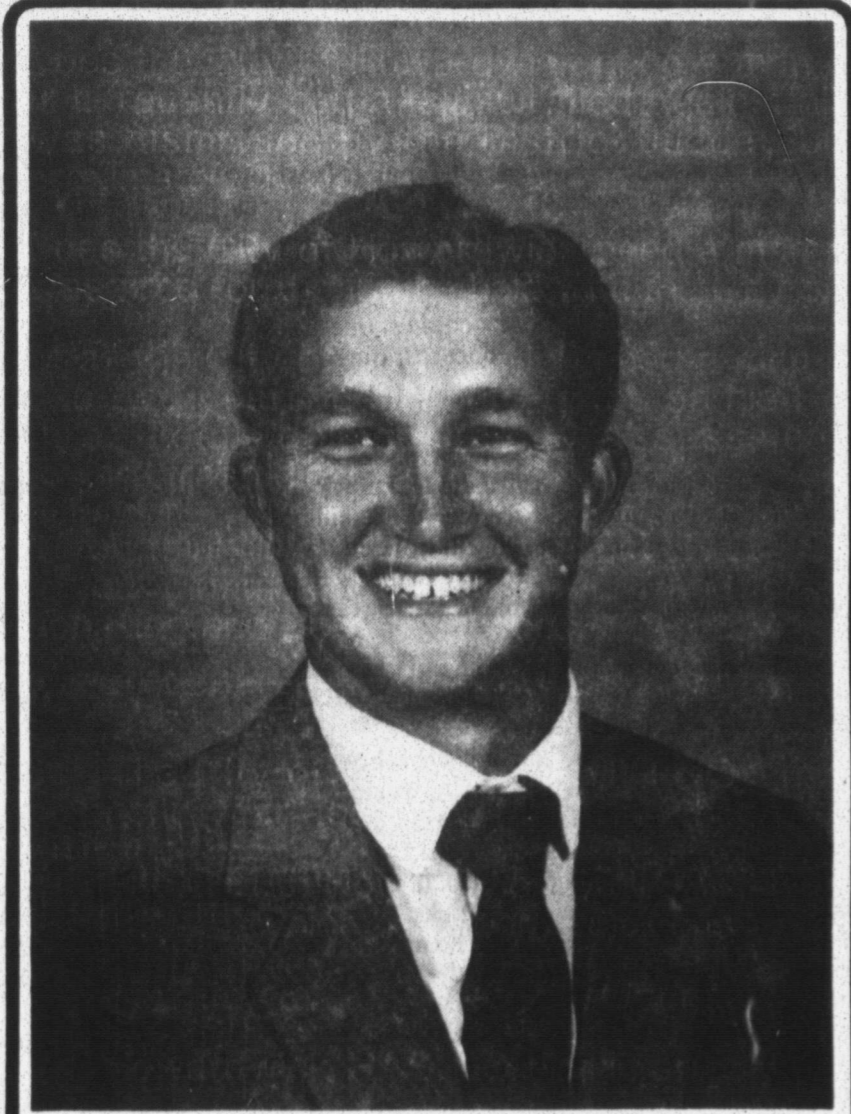

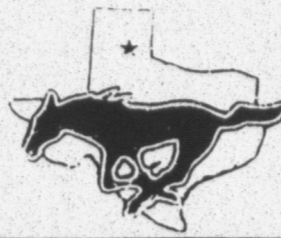

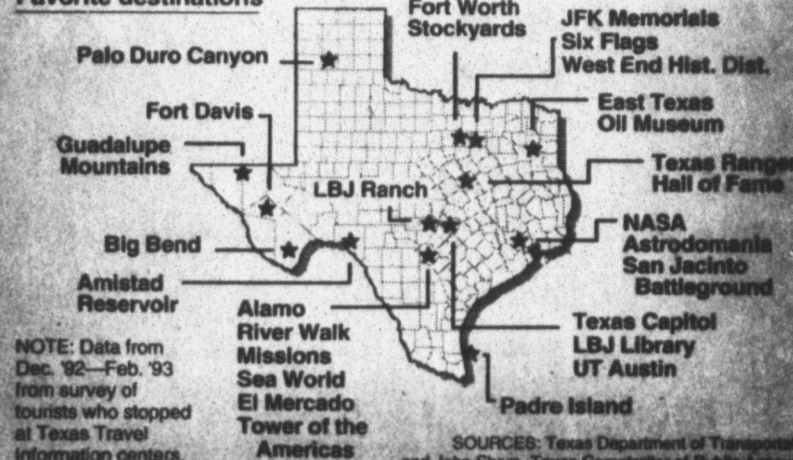

# SAFETY SENSE

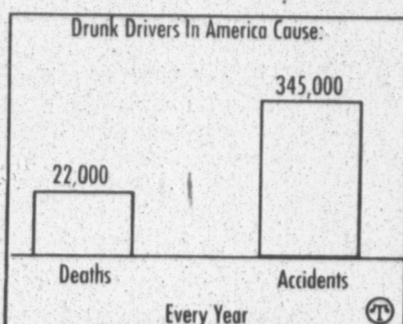
Every year in America, drunk drivers cause more than 22,000 deaths and 345,000 accidents.

There are ways you can help protect yourself and your loved ones from death or injury by drunk drivers. Aetna offers the following suggestions:

**Don't drive drunk.** Set a good example for children and friends. Before a party or a night-on-the-town, choose a designated driver who will not drink alcohol and will see that others get home safely. If you do over-indulge, ask someone else to drive.

**Help keep drunk drivers off the road.** Hosting a party? Remember it's easier for your guests to get drunk than to get sober! Don't be too generous when you pour, nor too fast to refill an empty glass. Be sure to offer non-alcoholic beverages, too. Serve plenty of high protein foods with cocktails. A full stomach will delay the effects of alcohol somewhat, but it will not prevent drunkenness. Stop serving alcoholic beverages about one and one half hours before guests depart, and never let intoxicated guests drive.

Encourage your teenagers to avoid drinking and driving situations. Statistically, teens are most often and most seriously affected by drunk driving, both as drivers and as passengers. Discuss this problem with your



children in a non-threatening manner. Find out what they think about it. Talk about how they can help when friends drink too much.

Be sure they know if their school offers programs such as Students Against Drunk Driving or Safe Rides. Instruct your children never to enter a car with an intoxicated driver and be certain they know you want to be called—whatever the hour—if they need a safe ride home.

In the long-term, you can help prevent alcohol-related deaths and injuries by supporting effective deterrents in your state. Through letters and petitions, urge local officials to adopt and enforce drunk driving laws, and get involved with a group that has a successful program in your community.

## IRS Says, "Come Back"

According to Gary O. Booth, IRS District Director for Dallas District, "If you haven't filed past years' tax returns, the best gift you can give yourself is an appointment at the Amarillo office this Thursday, April 29, 1993. The Amarillo IRS office (205 E. Fifth Street, Room 119) will be staffed between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. to help taxpayers get right with their government."

This is an ongoing effort sponsored by the IRS to help taxpayers who have failed to file past years' returns. Booth commented, "What struck me about those who have come in for help is the sense of tremendous relief they expressed."

"One young couple hadn't filed for three years and that fact alone had been a source of considerable anxiety in their marriage. When they saw that they owed taxes for 1988, they weren't very convinced that they were doing what was best for them. Yet, as their assistant worked through tax years 1989, 1990, and 1991, refunds wiped out that first year's liability, and they even wound up with a small refund."

"A trucker stopped filing in 1989, the year his wife had to have emergency surgery. Filing his tax return was not his first priority. While his wife recovered and he got his affairs in better order, he was afraid to file subsequent tax returns because he thought for sure he'd be going to jail. We helped him, too. He worked out an installment plan to pay off what he owes, and he's still trucking."

## Outdoor Precautions Can Help

As Texans increase their outdoor activities with the coming of spring, they need to be mindful that some of nature's creatures, specifically ticks, not only can cause discomfort, but also may cause serious illness.

Julie Rawlings, of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Zoonosis Control Division said, "In recent years, Lyme disease, transmitted through tick bites, has become a growing health in the Texas outdoors. The disease has been reported among pet owners, campers, hunters and others who work outdoors or with animals." Infection occurs when ticks or cat fleas transmit a corkscrew-shaped bacterium called a spirochete.

Although several species of tick can carry the disease, the Lone Star variety, which enjoys biting humans, often is the suspected vector. Rawlings said that about one percent of Lone Star ticks tested carry the Lyme spirochete.

The disease, first identified in Lyme, Conn., in 1976, has become widespread in the U.S. of the 1,362 possible Lyme disease cases reported in Texas since 1986, at least 361 have met all case criteria of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's definition of the illness.

Rawlings said, "Of the confirmed Lyme disease cases in Texas, all but a small percentage have occurred in the eastern half of the state."

Lyme disease' symptoms often mimic those of other diseases, except for a characteristic reddish rash which sometimes surrounds a tick bite. If untreated with antibiotics, Lyme disease can advance from flu-like symptoms and rash to painful-even permanent-damage to joints and nervous system.

"To help answer most people's questions about the disease, its symptoms, testing and other concerns, I invite the public to call the TDH Lyme Disease Information Helpline (512/458-7228) in Austin. We have condensed the most frequently south information into recorded messages," Rawlings said.

While Lyme disease is treatable, knowledge of the disease and a few easy precautions can greatly reduce the likelihood of exposure to it.

When outdoors, especially in wooded areas or tall grass:

- \* Wear long sleeves and long pants, with pantlegs tucked into socks or boots. Tuck shirt tails into pants and use tape to seal the area where pants overlap socks or boot tops.
- \* Wear light-colored clothing to make ticks more visible.
- \* Use insect repellent containing "DEET" or "permethrin" on clothing and footwear (not on skin).
- \* Avoid high grass and foliage when possible, since ticks wait on vegetation to "hitch-hike" on passing animals.
- \* Keep pets out of infested areas, and inspect them often for ticks. Dogs and cats, too, are susceptible to Lyme disease.
- \* After being outdoors, wash all clothing worn and inspect yourself and your children's bodies for ticks. Remove any attached ticks with tweezers, grasping as close to the head as possible, tugging until the tick is freed. Avoid crushing the tick's body. The less time a tick remains attached, the less likely it is of transmitting Lyme disease.
- \* Live ticks removed from humans can be tested at a TDH laboratory to determine whether they carry Lyme disease.

Booth says that taxpayers who owe IRS returns owe it to themselves to get back into the system. "For many, it is fear that creates a barrier. We see our jobs as making it as easy as possible for taxpayers to comply. Many may have paid in withholding or estimated tax payments which are held in credit to their accounts. And if they owe us, we can work out payment arrangements to bring them square with us."

"This time of year puts us all in the frame of mind for a fresh start. I want to assure taxpayers that we sincerely want to help. Our experience has shown that most people want to file overdue returns and settle their affairs with the government," Booth continues, "and from our own vantage point, if we can help people back into the system on their own, we will not have to focus on more costly enforcement efforts later."

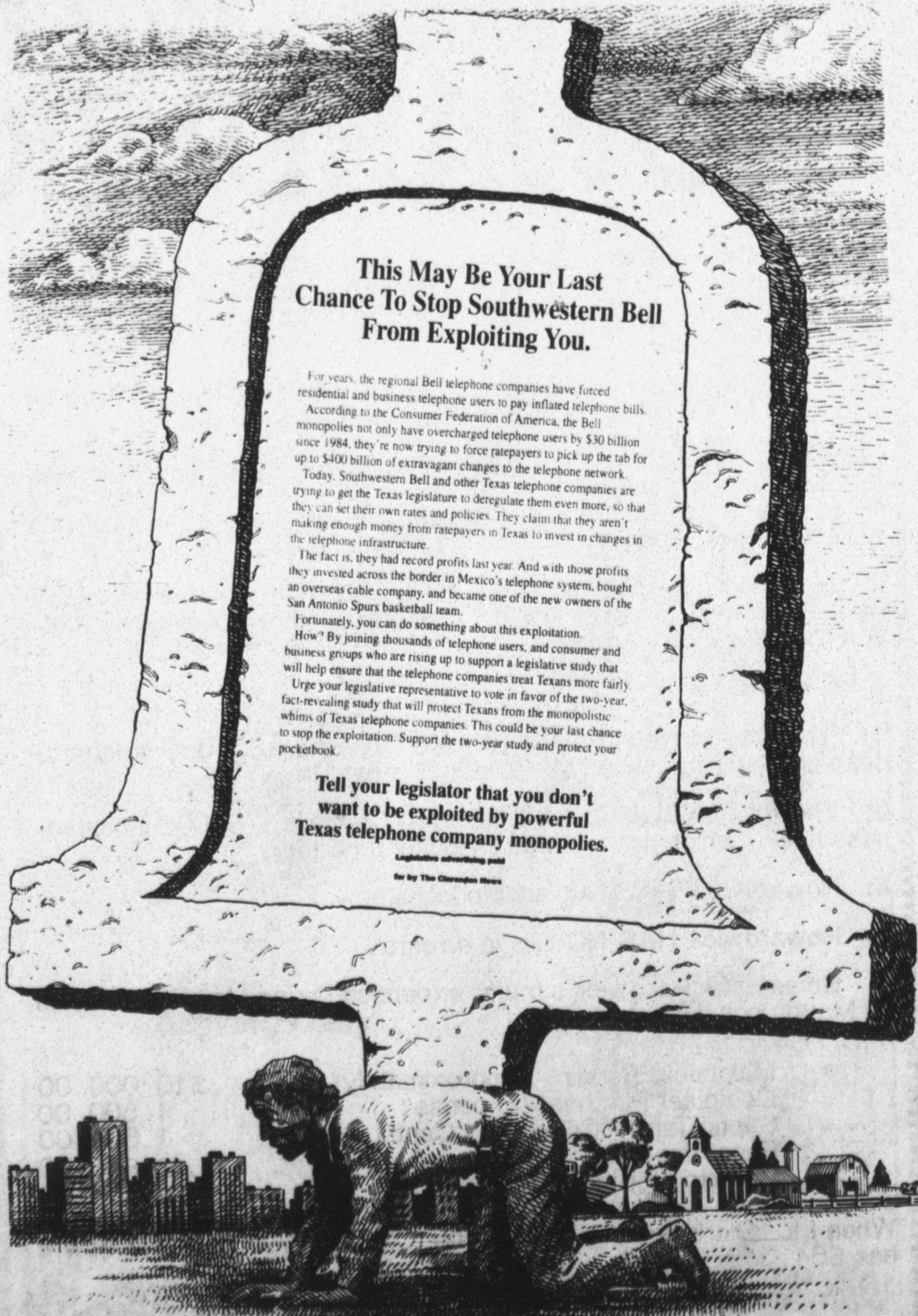
