Schools Support Propositions

The Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees and the Hedley Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees have both passed resolutions supporting Propositions 1,2 and 3 in the upcoming election.

According to officials from Hedley, "The Propositions are intended to help equalize funding for public schools, [and] require the state to fund future state mandates, and allow the state to issue bonds to help school districts construct new facilities."

Funding for Public School has been in the courts and before the legislature for several years. There are vast differences between the funding per student in rich districts and poor districts. Donley County schools are near the middle of the economic spectrum. Nevertheless, the Propositions are expected to benefit local schools.

The Clarendon resolution states, "... Proposition 1, the Equalization Amendment, will allow the state to shift a limited amount of funds from property-wealthy school districts and redistribute those funds to property-poor school districts to help equalize school district funding and bring Texas one step closer to solving the school finance equity crisis." The transfer of funds is virtually mandated by court rulings.

According to Hedley Board President, Ben Carson, Proposition 2 helps Texas move "...closer to adequately funding Texas' public education system by ensuring that the state helps pay for the programs it requires." In recent years, state authorities have tended to make rules that were expensive for local districts to implement, but the state has not provided much to offset the costs it mandated. The Proposition does not apply to requirements imposed before December 31, 1993. "Current state mandates, such as the 22:1 class-size ratio for certain elementary grades and the teacher salary schedule aren't affected by this proposition," Carson said.

Proposition 3 is the Facilities Financing Amendment. It would allow the state to issue general obligation or revenue bonds to assist districts in financing facilities. The courts have expressed concern that many districts are

ASCS Farm and Ranch News

1993 Farm Program Sign-up Ends April 30.

Producers have until April 30, 1993, to apply for the 1993 feed grain, wheat and cotton Farm Programs at the ASCS Office.

The acreage reduction percentages are 10 percent for corn, 5 percent for grain sorghum, 7.5 percent for upland cotton, and zero percent for wheat, oats and barley. "Farmers who meet these and other program requirements will be eligible for target price protection and price support loans on this year's feed grains, wheat and cotton." Drew Thornberry said.

Target prices protect producers' income if market prices are below the target levels. Thornberry said farmers need money to operate. Advance deficiency payments provide cash early in the year, and through the price support loan program, farmers can obtain interim financing after harvest while waiting for a better market.

"When producers sign up for the 1993 programs, they may request 50 percent of the estimated total deficiency payments in advance for program crops," said Thornberry. "The payments will be issued in cash, limited to the farmer's intended program acreage." only producers participating in the 1993 commodity programs will be eligible for benefit on this year's


For farms participating in the 1993 Farm Program, all small grains must be reported. Farms not participating in the program should report their small grains to ensure the bases are protected for future years.

Mrs. Genevieve Britt Caldwell graduated from Southwestern in 1942 and her son Turner is a member of SU's Class of 1971. Mrs. Caldwell's sister, Louise Britt Carvey, Class of 1944, and her husband, Frank P. Carvey, Jr., Class of 1945, who reside in Fort Worth, joined the Caldwells at the dedication convocation and ribbon -cut-

ting ceremonies on campus.

The Caldwell-Carvey families generously made possible an octagonal presentation room and a spacious new theatre lobby inside Southwestern's new \$3.5 million Jesse H. and Mary Gibbs Jones Theatre. With parquet floors and floor-to-ceiling windows overlooking the heart of the campus, the octagon will be used not only for receptions, but also as a performance space. The theater features a fully computerized lighting

board, a thrust stage, and 322 seats in a three-quarter-round, tiered seating arrangement.

The theater interior is appointed mainly in teal, with Art Deco lighting. Backstage are work areas including the Swenson Scene Shop, a costume shop and dressing rooms. The Nita Akin Green Room provides a waiting area for performers and, at other times besides performances, a gathering space for program participants. The catwalks designed by theater consultant Richard Jeter offer lighting directors and technicians an exceptional variety of positions for lighting insturments. The J.E. and L.E. Mabes Hall of Honor, where in the future philanthropists will be recognized for their generosity to Southwestern, is a skylit arcade that joins the new Jesse H. and Mary Gibbs Jones Theater with the Alma Thomas proscenium theater.

Are your children reading from the Youth section in Burton Memorial Library? If not, they are missing something.

As I started to examine the fiction, non-fiction, and other varieties of interesting reading that the Youth section provides, twentyfour volumes of Disney's Wonderful World of Knowledge caught my eye. These books are primarily an updated and enlarged English version of an encyclopedia first printed in the Italian language by Arnold Mondadori, and entitled Disney Encyclopedia. Not only is the information presented in an understandable manner to hold the reader's interest, but beautiful photographs are accompanied by cartoon pictures of Mickey and Minnie Mouse, Pinocchio, Jiminy Cricket, Donald Duck, and other Disney characters to add extra enjoyment to the wealth of learning material included in these books.

Volume 2, Natural Wonders, includes all types of plant informa-tion with intriguing titles such as "Tenderhearted Tough Guys" in which Daisy Duck describes types of nuts that are not only delicious, but are sources of oil and whose wood is used to make furniture. "The Chocolate Candy Counter" informs the readers of the origin of chocolate, how it was used by the Indians, and the fact that Spanish explorers were probably the first Europeans to see the cacao beans. This is just a minor sampling of the books contents.
















Smokey The Fireman

If he leaves them at home he's gonna pay for them, if he sends them to his inlaws he might really have to pay for them. Now while some of these here fireman have been know to drink something other than diet cola from a can at fire school, they pays for that themselves, matter of fact they pays twice sometimes. Fireman at fire school put out real fires that some demonic instructor dreams up. Who else builds a camp fire under the full propane tank.

Pointers Parents Guide To Chicken Pox

Prompt action by parents at the first sign of a skin irritation or condition such as chicken pox can make a big difference in the health of a child, skin care experts agree. Some tips to help you:

• Chicken pox is an infectious disease very common among school age children. Symptoms include general feeling of illness, low-grade fever and skin rash. Groups of spots can spread almost anywhere on the body. The spots quickly change to fluid-filled pustules, then to crusts. New crops of spots continue to break out so that at the height of the rash, red spots, pustules and crusts can appear in the same area.

As chicken pox can be serious, you should always consult your physician if you suspect it. Your doctor or pharmacist may recommend that your child bathe with natural colloidal oatmeal, such as Aveeno Bath Treatment from Rydelle Laboratories. It can help ease skin discomfort. For additional itch relief, topical products such as Aveeno Anti-Itch Cream and Concentrated Lotion can be used or oral antihis-

tamines may be prescribed.

Your doctor may recommend reducing fever and pain with acetaminophen. DO NOT give aspirin during chicken pox infection, since reports have linked it with Reye's syndrome.

To minimize risk of infection by scratching, trim child's fingernails and keep him or her comfortable and occupied. Encourage rest, plenty of fluids and use of itch relief remedies. Stress light activities (coloring, puzzles, etc.) suited to the child's age.





For the amateur bird watcher, many an afternoon is probably spent in a nearby park or zoo. But why not view these colorful flying creatures from your home by inviting them into your yard?

Watching birds in your own yard is an interesting activity that is both educational for children and relaxing for adults. Learning to identify different birds and bird songs, recognizing bird lifestyles, and learning how and what to feed them can teach children to care for and respect wild animals. And, for adults of all ages, watching birds can provide a calming end to a hectic day of work.

Attracting birds to your yard is simpler, actually, than you may think. An easy way to do it is to provide food, especially during fall and winter when natural food sources become scarce. Though not difficult to make, even a simple bird feeder can be a timeconsuming project. Ornate, large-scale birdhouses/feeders can be purchased, but the are costly and more likely to be used by longtime bird watchers.







IRS Says, "Come Back"

According to Gary O. Booth, IRS District Director for Dallas District, "If you haven't filed past years' tax returns, the best gift you can give yourself is an appointment at the Amarillo office this Thursday, April 29, 1993. The Amarillo IRS office (205 E. Fifth Street, Room 119) will be staffed between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. to help taxpayers get right with their government."

This is an ongoing effort sponsored by the IRS to help tax-payers who have failed to file past years' returns. Booth commented, "What struck me about those who have come in for help is the sense of tremendous relief they expressed.

"One young couple hadn't filed for three years and that fact alone had been a source of considerable anxiety in their marriage. When they saw that they owed taxes for 1988, they weren't very convinced that they were doing what was best for them. Yet, as their assistor worked through tax years 1989, 1990, and 1991, refunds wiped out that first year's liability, and they even wound up with a small refund.

"A trucker stopped filing in 1989, the year his wife had to have emergency surgery. Filing his tax return was not his first priority. While his wife recovered and he got his affairs in better order, he was afraid to file subsequent tax returns because he thought for sure he'd be going to jail. We helped him, too. He worked out an installment plan to pay off what he owes, and he's still trucking."

Outdoor Precautions Can Help

As Texans increase their outdoor activities with the coming of spring, they need to be mindful that some of nature's creatures, specifically ticks, not only can cause discomfort, but also may cause serious illness.

Julie Rawlings, of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Zoonosis Control Division said, 169In recent years, Lyme disease, transmitted through tick bites, has become a growing health in the Texas outdoors. The disease has been reported among pet owners, campers, hunters and others who work outdoors or with animals." Infection occurs when ticks or cat fleas transmit a corkscrew-shaped bacterium called a spirochete.

Although several species of tick can carry the disease, the Lone Star variety, which enjoys biting humans, often is the suspected vector. Rawlings said that about one percent of Lone Star ticks tested carry the Lyme spirochete.

The disease, first identified in Lyme, Conn., in 1976, has become widespread in the U.S. of the 1,362 possible Lyme disease cases reported in Texas since 1986, at least 361 have met all case criteria of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's definition of the illness.

Rawlings said, "Of the confirmed Lyme disease cases in Texas, all but a small percentage have occurred in the eastern half of the state."

Lyme disease' symptoms often mimic those of other diseases, except for a characteristic reddish rash which sometimes surrounds a tick bite. If untreated with antibiotics, Lyme disease can advance from flu-like symptoms and rash to painful-even permanent-damage to joints and nervous system.

"To help answer most people's questions about the disease, its symptoms, testing and other concerns, I invite the public to call the TDH Lyme Disease Information Helpline (512/458-7228) in Austin. We have condensed the most frequently south information into recorded messages," Rawlings said.

While Lyme disease is treatable, knowledge of the disease and a few easy precautions can greatly reduce the likelihood of exposure to it.

When outdoors, especially in wooded areas or tall grass:

* Wear long sleeves and long pants, with pantlegs tucked into socks or boots. Tuck shirt tails into pants and use tape to seal the area where pants overlap socks or boot tops.

* Wear light-colored clothing to make ticks more visible.

* Use insect repellent containing "DEET" or "permethrin" on cloth-

* Use insect repellent containing "DEE1" or "permethrin" on clothing and footwear (not on skin).

* Avoid high grass and foliage when possible, since ticks wait on vegetation to "hitch-hike" on passing animals.

* Keep pets out of infested areas, and inspect them often for ticks. Dogs and cats, too, are susceptible to Lyme disease.

* After being outdoors, wash all clothing worn and inspect yourself and your children's bodies for ticks. Remove any attached ticks with tweezers, grasping as close to the head as possible, tugging until the tick is freed. Avoid crushing the tick's body. The less time a tick remains attached, the less likely it is of transmitting Lyme disease.

* Live ticks removed from humans can be tested at a TDH laboratory to determine whether they carry Lyme disease.

Booth says that taxpayers who owe IRS returns owe it to themselves to get back into the system. "For many, it is fear that creates a barrier. 
