

James C. Asbury, Native of Baird, Dies Suddenly of Heart Attack

BAIRD — Chapel services for James C. Asbury, 76, were held Monday, August 14th, at 3 p. m. Officiating were Dr. Ben H. Moore, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, and Rev. Delton Fisher, pastor of the United First Methodist Church.

Mr. Asbury died at 12:05 p. m. Saturday in Callahan County Hospital after an apparent heart attack.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Godfrey Funeral Home, Masonic graveside rites were held in Ross Cemetery, conducted by Baird Masonic Lodge No. 522.

Mr. Asbury had been secretary for the City of Baird for the past 27 years. He was a native of this city, a strong and dedicated supporter of numerous organizations in Baird where he had lived all his life.

He was born February 16, 1896 in Baird, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Thomas Asbury. He married Glyndol Elliott in Baird on May 6, 1936.

He was a veteran of World War I, and a member of the Baird Masonic Lodge, from which he received a 50-year membership pin in 1969. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Baird, served as an elder and sessions clerk. He was a member of the American Legion, and an honorary member of the Baird Volunteer Fire Department. This presentation was made to him in 1967.

Mr. Asbury was Charter President of the Mid-West Texas Firemen and Fire Marshall's Association, which he helped organize in 1939 at Merkel. He also served many years as secretary of this organization, which presented him an honorary membership for his many years of dedicated and faithful service.

Survivors include his wife Glyndol; one brother, J. T. Asbury of Monahan.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows: "Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative." Sec. 2. The foregoing

amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election." Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold his office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature." Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to those officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury." Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

Proposed
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40." Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster. Officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the

State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a non-elective State officer may hold other non-elective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law." Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949. "All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis." Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

T. R. Havin Publishes Article Of Early Callahan County History

T. R. HAVIN

BROWNWOOD — The following feature story concerning phases of early Callahan County has been compiled by T. R. Havin of Brownwood, retired history teacher from Howard Payne College. This writer has also written a book about Belle Plain, which goes on sale Sept. 1st. The address of this writer, and all other information concerning the purchase of the book will be published as soon as details are announced.

A special order of the United States Army in late 1850 brought Captain Randolph B. Marcy and a company of soldiers into Callahan County in January, 1851. Destructive Indian raids on settlements in Texas after the Mexican War compelled the federal army to take action, which resulted in the establishment of a new line of forts on the northwestern frontier. Included in the new posts were Fort Belknap, Fort Phantom Hill and Fort Mason.

The distance between Belknap and Mason was more than 150 miles. This long stretch of territory was unprotected. The need for an immediate post was the reason for Marcy's examination of the area in January, 1851.

The soldiers under Captain Marcy left Fort Belknap, near modern Graham, and entered Callahan County at its northeast corner. Veering southwestward from that point, the group reached Turkey Creek, about two miles south of modern Cottonwood, on the fifth day out of Belknap.

From the Cottonwood section they headed southward down Turkey Creek and established a

temporary base in Brown County, at the convergence of Turkey Creek and Pecan Bayou, south 15 miles south of modern Cross Plains.

With this base as headquarters, Marcy and his men examined the area in all directions. One group traversed Pecan Bayou southward to its mouth on the Colorado River. Another scouting party examined the Jim Ned Valley as far westward as modern Lawn, in Taylor County.

Captain Marcy himself made a careful survey of Pecan Bayou Valley to the source of the stream. Among numerous details included in the report, Marcy noted that many Comanche Indian campsites existed along the small river. Another detail mentioned by the observant army man related to the head of the stream. He reported that a number of springs furnished water at its source.

Although the report is silent concerning any observations beyond the springs, we are certain that he reached a point a couple of miles northeast of the present village of Eula in the western section of the county.

In his final report Marcy recommended that a permanent fort be established at the site of his temporary base near the mouth of Turkey Creek. The War Department waited several years without implementing the captain's recommendation and finally established Camp Colorado on Jim Ned Creek in 1857.

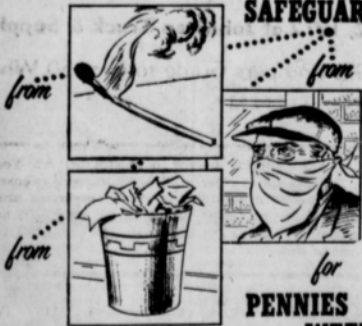

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding new Section 65 to read as follows: "Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest for which they may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from all ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

 NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)
 General Election November 7, 1972.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows: "Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission. (b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973. (c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature. (d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Women shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them. (e) The convention by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article. (f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members. (g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution of revisions of the existing state constitution."

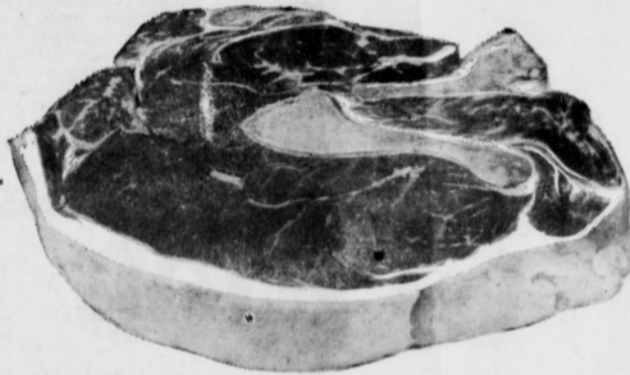

AUSTIN — Rep. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty apparently will take over the House of Representatives speakership without opposition next January.

Withdrawal of Rep. Frank Calhoun of Abilene from the speaker's race last week, after concluding that Daniel was too far out front to catch, left the 31 year old attorney from Liberty free of a major challenge.

Rep. James E. Nugent, of Kerrville, who had planned to enter the contest earlier, endorsed Daniel.

Before Calhoun's withdrawal, Daniel claimed more than 100 commitments from House members or nominees.

"So many of the old and new members had committed to my opponent before I got into the race, that my continuance in the campaign would place a burden on my supporters that I do not feel justified in causing," said Calhoun.

Daniel, son of former Governor Price Daniel, came from a long way back to emerge as the shoo-in candidate for speaker.

SAN ANTONIO — Susie Howard of Cuero was crowned Miss Texas Rural Electrification in San Antonio during the 32nd Annual Meeting of Texas Electric Cooperatives, Inc. Miss Howard is 20, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Howard, and is a college junior. She was sponsored by the electric cooperatives located in the Coastal Bend and South Texas section of the state.

The new Miss Texas Rural Electrification will participate in numerous activities during the next 12 months representing the 80 electric cooperatives in the state and will carry the Texas banner to the Miss National Rural Electric Cooperative Association Contest in Dallas next February.

their annual auto insurance policies.

Texas Safety Association has accepted responsibility for coordinating the National Safety Council course.

The course will cost about \$10 or less per person, and the resulting credit is good for three years.

Individual savings over the three-year period are estimated at about \$45 - or \$43 million statewide. Duplications are not allowed for the new course in addition to the driver training course.

In families with two or more cars, the principal drivers of each car will have to take the course to qualify for credit on all vehicles. After the three-year period, the course must be repeated by drivers to continue qualification for the 10 percent credit.

PARTIES CERTIFIED — Two new political parties, La Raza Unida and the Social Workers Party, have been certified for places on the November 7 general election ballot in Texas.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said it was his duty to certify the parties since they filed more than the required number of 22,365 signatures necessary for ballot position.

The American Party and the New Party, which did not file enough signatures, seek to get on the ballot anyway by federal

court action.

La Raza Unida is waging an aggressive campaign for governor, with Ramsey Muniz of San Antonio as its candidate. Both parties also have candidates for U. S. senator, lieutenant governor and most other major statewide offices.

SPECIAL SESSION COOLING? — Governor Preston Smith may be cooling a little on the idea of a September special session on insurance reform, but he insists the idea is still alive.

"I'm pretty flexible," said Smith. "If somebody can bring me in some facts that would serve in calling a session, I would not even pretend to be in a mood to waste \$33,000 a day (estimated session cost) of the taxpayers' money."

On the other hand, Smith said, if he could be shown that legislation to reduce insurance rates could be passed, he would not hesitate to summon lawmakers back to work.

Main business of the session, he indicated, would be a proposal for competitive insurance rates, which he said are in effect in 49 states. He seemed to be backing off his proposal to abolish the present insurance regulatory board.

"I don't know that we will attempt to abolish the board," he said. "If we come to the

conclusion it would be helpful, we will. If we don't, we won't. We'll know something (about whether to call a special session) in a couple of weeks."

TO BUILD OR NOT TO BUILD — The Highway Department, frustrated repeatedly in its plans to erect a new \$20 million state headquarters near the capitol, has asked the attorney general to clarify whether it can legally proceed with construction.

After the department was ready to advertise for bids, the Legislature called for a re-evaluation of the site, which was made. Finding: the site was the best available. After that, the Legislature appropriated \$1.5 million to the Parks and Wildlife Department to buy the building site (barren city block which served as a parking lot) and make a scenic park out of it. Governor Smith then vetoed the appropriation. That left the Highway Department confused as to what to do next. It can't desert the site without being paid for it.
