Reservists To Stage Mark Disasters

COUNTY-Army Reservists from Abilene will conduct two civic action projects in Callahan County during their

One team of the Reservists, headed by Capt. Johnny Baugh of Coleman, will conduct Civil Defense surveys in Baird and Cross Plains, then stage mock disasters in both towns to provide training for local

The mock disaster at Baird is set for 9 a.m. Wednesday, June 8. The disaster alarm will be blown for 2 full minutes at that time. Then an emergency operation center will be activated at the Baird Chamber of Commerce.

A training session at Cross Plains will be held the following week, probably on June 14 or 15. Coordinating the efforts in Cross Plains will be O.B. Edmondson.

The training provided by a similar disaster drill which the Reservists conducted in Coleman three years ago was credited with helping save the lives of several persons when a tornado actually hit Coleman the following year.

A second team of Reservists, headed by Capt. Jim Isbell of Cross Plains, will work out a map and numbering system for all roads in Callahan County. Using aerial maps and checking the roads on the ground, the Reservists will list major landmarks. Capt. Ben Stephenson will be involved in this project

County officials said the maps can be invaluable to the various volunteer fire departments for help in finding the shortest route to rural fires.

In his civilian job, Capt. Stephenson is director of the Baird Chamber of Commerce and has been appointed Callahan County Civil Defense coordinator by County Judge A.E. Dyer Jr.

Stephenson, Judge Dyer and Baird Mayor Charles Walker recently attended a Civil Defense seminar conducted by the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin, to familiarize themselves with the roles they will play in the upcoming survey and drill.

The Reservists are members of the 490th Civil Affairs Co., headquartered in Abilene and commanded by Lt. Col. Charles Clark.



THE DESOLATE WILDERNESS

Here beginneth the account of Nathaniel Morton, secretary and keeper of the records for the Plymouth Colony, concerning those memorable circumstances of the year 1620:

"So they left that goodly and pleasant city of Leyden, which had been their resting place for above eleven years, but they knew that they were pilgrims and strangers here below, and looked not much on these things, but lifted up their eyes to heaven, their dearest country, where God had prepared for them a city (Hebrews 11:16) and therein quieted their spirits.

"When they came to Delfs-Haven they found a ship and all their things ready; and such of their friends as could not come with them followed after them, and sundry came from Amsterdam to see them shipt, and to take leave of them. One night was spent with little sleep with most, but with friendly entertainment and Christian discourse, and other expressions of true Christian love.

"The next day they went on board, and their friends with them, where truly doleful

was the sight of that sad and mournful parting, to hear what sighs and sobs and prayers did sound amongst them; what tears did gush from every eye, and pithy speeches pierced each other's heart, that sundry of the Dutch strangers that stood on the Key as spectators could not refrain from tears. But the tide (which stays for no man) calling them away, that were thus loath to depart, their Reverend Pastor, falling down on his knees, and they all with him, with watery cheeks commended them with the most fervent prayers unto the Lord and His blessings, and then with mutual embraces and many tears they took their leaves one of another, which proved to be the last leave to many of them.

Being now past the vast ocean, in a sea of troubles before them in expectations, they had now no friends to welcome them, no inns to entertain or refresh them, no houses, or much less towns, to repair unto to seek for succor; and for the season, it was winter, and they that know the winters of the country know them to be sharp and violent, subject to cruel and fierce storms, dangerous to travel to no places, much more to search unknown coasts.

Besides, what could they see but a hideous and desolate wilderness, full of wilde beasts and wilde men? And what multitudes of them there were, they then knew not: for which way soever they turned their eyes (save upward to heaven) they could have but little solace or content and respect of any outward object, for summer being ended, all things stand in appearance with a weather-beaten face, and the whole country full of woods and thickets, represent a wilde and savage hew.

"If they looked behind them, there was a mighty ocean which they had past, and was now as a main bar of gulph to separate them from all the civil parts of the world.
