## Commissioners Ask For Cities Help In Securing Ambulance

COUNTY—Last Monday, the Callahan County commissioners met with Richard Cox and his son, Steve, who own an ambulance service in Abilene.

The two operators of the Abilene Emergency Service told the Commissioners they would provide ambulance service for the county for a yearly subsidy they estimated would be \$60,000.

Their proposal calls for one fully-equipped and staffed ambulance to be placed in the county to provide 24 hour service for the entire county. This ambulance would be backed-up by the operators' four ambulance units in Abilene. The Callahan General Hospital in Baird is being considered as a possible station for the county ambulance.

Both operators and commissioners stressed that the payment of the subsidy would not mean that ambulance service would be free. Those using the service would be charged.

During this meeting, the commissioners were receptive to the proposals, but said they would have to meet with the city councils in the county to seek help with the subsidy.

The commissioners met in their monthly meeting Monday, June 13, and again ambulance service was a major topic.

Judge A.E. Dyer, Jr. stated, "With present operating expenses, we can not afford to pay for the ambulance, unless

the cities will help." "If we receive no help from the cities," he said, "we will have to have a county election as to raise the tax rate to provide ambulance service."

The county collected revenue of \$147,362.71 from 1976 taxes. If the cities refuse to help in securing the \$60,000 ambulance subsidy, the commissioners can either call for an election to raise taxes or they can raise the tax value.

If an election is called and the issue passes, the tax rate would increase 50% or 40% on the \$100. For example, if a person paid \$100 in county taxes—after the election, the same person would pay \$140.

The tax value would increase 100% if the commissioners raised the value without an election, since the state would get half of the increased revenue.

Judge Dyer stated that if the cities could raise 50% of the \$60,000, the commissioners could probably scrape up the remaining \$30,000. Thus, there would probably be no need for a tax increase.

The commissioners are now waiting for the city councils to make a decision.

The Clyde city council met last Thursday, but Judge Dyer had received no word as of Monday. The Baird city council met Tuesday night, but the result of their meeting was not known by press time. The Cross Plains city council has not met.

## Mock Disaster Assures Citizens —City In Good Hands

**BAIRD**—If Baird ever has the misfortune to be hit by a disaster—whether it be a tornado or a train wreck—citizens can be assured that the city is in the hands of well qualified volunteers and others charged with civil defense.

Almost two dozen persons, from mayor to the sheriff and the Red Cross representative, found out that the city's disaster preparedness is in excellent shape on Wednesday, June 8, when Army Reservists from the 490th Civil Affairs Company in Abilene put Baird to the test.

The two-hour program involved a team of Reservists, who worked closely with Baird Civil Defense Coordinator Dick Vestal to simulate a series of mock disasters. The city's civil defense volunteers had to deal with a train wreck, a chemical spill and then a tornado only moments later.

Doubtlessly, the probability of so many things happening at once in real life is slim, but it helped put the team to a difficult test of its communications, fire, law enforcement, public works, medical, utilities and other functions which are important in such situations.

The men, along with two women, sacrificed, almost a half-day of their time to learn how they might react under conditions which the Army Reservists simulated.

One key figure was Dr. Raul Calvo, whose expertise was essential in determining how to deal with the injuries and public health problems might be solved.

Capt. Johnny Baugh of Coleman, project supervisor for the Reservists, also noted that under real disaster situations, the law enforcement role is 60 per cent of the work load, 30 per cent for the fire department and 10 per cent is shared by the remainder of those in the thick of things.

And sure enough, Sheriff Bill Skinner and Deputy Sheriff Dale Duckworth, along with Department of Public Safety Trooper David Parkhill of Baird, were drawn into almost every aspect of the problem.

It all began with the sounding of the emergency siren at 9 a.m., drawing the volunteers within minutes. The Baird Chamber of Commerce was transformed

into the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) within 10 minutes.

An opening brief was followed by an excellent film on the May 1970 Lubbock tornado. This brought the problem home to the Baird volunteers, as they recalled last year's local tornado which did several thousands of dollars in damage to roofs and the school's driver education simulator.

Then it was time for the minute-by-minute series of disasters and problems which the Army team had been planning for months with the cooperation of Baird personnel. The local residents did not know, however, just what they might be faced with.

When the 22 men and women were gathered at the tables, they were given the information that a train had wrecked at the depot, spilling butane and containers of a substance called iodine 125.

Vestal issued the first order, as he might in a real situation. Lawmen and fire department personnel were dispatched to the scene and the sheriff's office and DPS officers were ordered to work with evacuating citizens from the spillage area.

Dr. Calvo told them immediately that iodine 125 is radioactive; so regional DPS personnel were contacted to help determine the radioactivity problem.

Then the volunteers were told a large crowd was gathering (all only "on paper" of course, like the rest of the exercise) at the scene.

Mayor Charles Walker and Mayor Pro-Tem Jon Hardwick then worked with Fire Operations Chief Pat McKennon and Public Works Operations director J.G. Bennett to get roadblocks and barricades to set up, with much assistance from the private utilities representative—Alan Armstrong of Continental Telephone Co. and Bob McKennon of Lone Star Gas Co.

Red Cross Representative Alma Stephenson was drawn into the problem when injuries began to be reported—about the time a butane fire hit the train wreck and a tornado was thrown into the problem.

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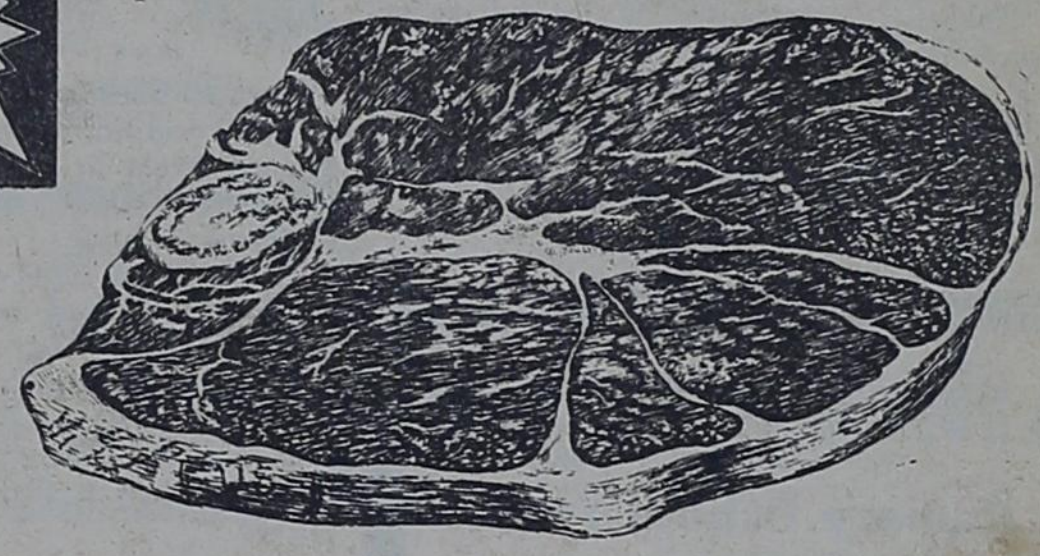

COUNTY-Jones Co. LTD OF Albany No. 1 A. S. Burt Estate was completed four miles south of Baird in Callahan County Regular Field.

# JUNE BRINGS DRY WEATHER TO ROWDEN

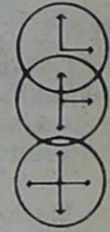

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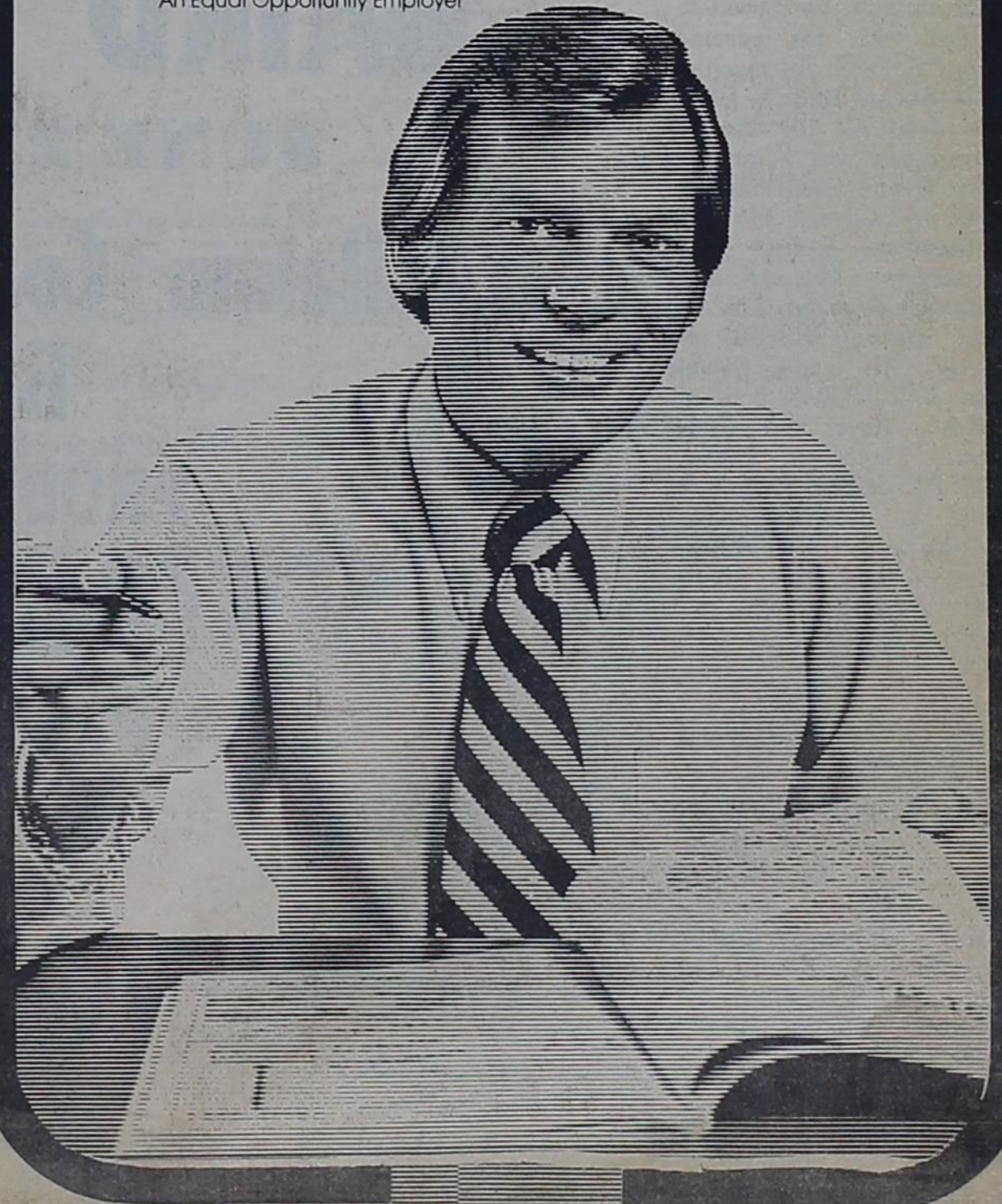

many decisions were necessary as the "disaster" scenario unfolded.

Yes, a tornado, on top of all the rest of the problems which had now consumed about one half hour. The simulated twister "moved" from northwest of Gun Road southeastward, "knocking out" some communications and "injuring" many people.

Moments later, the volunteers were told that a truck had wrecked on the interstate, blocking traffic east and west and backing up traffic 10 miles.

Hospital Administrator Emil Villafra was faced with the "injuries" which the disaster had caused by then, about the time it was learned that iodine 125 is extremely dangerous.

As the exercise ended, the team received several minor problems just to spice things up: a cat was stranded on a pole.

"Tell the woman we'll be there. . . in about 10 days," joked one volunteer, adding, "no--seriously, we'll come as soon as we can spare a truck."

They were even told that one man was at city hall, saying he would sue because he had not heard the warning siren.

Relief for the hard-pressed disaster team came by then, however, at 11 a.m., with announcement by Capt. Baugh that the test was over.

"This has been a tremendous experience," said Vestal.

Dr. Calvo commented that he belongs to a medical society east of Taylor County's and that he believes now he should contact the Abilene-based physician's group to make arrangements for medical personnel from there to help with any spillover of victims.

Maj. W.J. McMahon, of Headquarters, 5th Army in San Antonio, who is evaluating the Reservists during their annual two weeks of summer training this year, said he was impressed with the way the Baird citizens had handled the problem. "I'd like to commend you for the manner in which you responded during the exercise," he said.

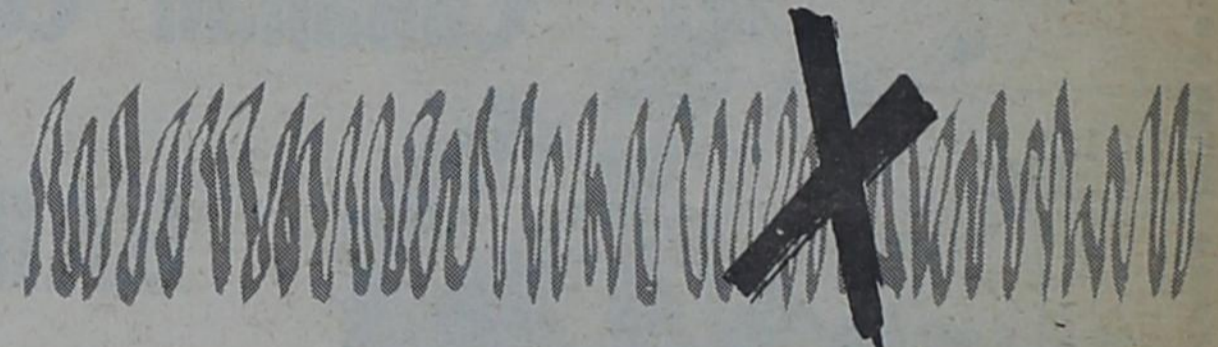
