Baird Junior High Tennis Tourney to be Held

BAIRD-A junior high tennis tournament will be held July 19-22 at the Baird Junior High tennis courts. Anyone that will be in the 9th grade or any lower grade may enter.

Tigers Take 4th Place In Tourney

BAIRD-The Tigers of Baird wound up fourth in the District 28 team champions Little League tournament at Cisco last weekend.

Red Sox Play For Title Thurs.

BAIRD-The Baird Red Sox will play the Clyde Cougars for the league championship Thursday night at 6 p.m. on the Hardin-Simmons baseball field in Abilene.

The two teams tied in regular season play, winning 10 games while losing two. The game was scheduled for last Friday night at Rose Park in Abilene but was rained out.

The winner of the game will advance to the regional tournament in Haskell the following week. Boys ages 13 to 15 play in this league.

Baird lost two of its first three games, then bounced back to win its next nine games to tie for the title. The Red Sox lost to the Clyde Braves, 2-1, and the Cougars, 1-0 in eight innings, before putting their winning streak together that included an 8-2 win over the Braves and 12-9 over the Cougars.

The Red Sox are coached by Norman Smith and Larry Segura.

Deel, the Tigers, lost their first game of the tournament to Coleman, 7-4, despite a fine pitching effort by Alan Tatum. Coleman then advanced to the finals.

The Tigers then bounced back to whip Clyde, 14-6, as Ben Mendez got credit for the win and Greg Holland scored three times.

The next game was against Albany and the Tigers won this time, 9-4, as Tatum got the win. However, the Tigers had to turn around and play a second game and lost to Cisco, 22-3.

Darren Price scored seven runs in the tournament for the Tigers, while Billy Deel scored six times and Greg Holland and Tatum scored five each.

The Tigers had tied for the Baird championship with the Giants, both posting 6-4 records. The Tigers advanced on a flip of the coin. Ironically, the Albany champion also advanced on a coin flip.

The Baird All-Stars are now preparing for their playoff game in Albany on July 21st at 8 p.m. The winner of that game advances to the District 28 tournament in Clyde the following week.

Mrs. Smedley and her husband, James P. Smedley, were recognized as the couple living longest in the county, and Mrs. A.E. Dyer Sr. of Baird was recognized as the oldest native born person with continuous residence in the county.

Gerngross Cited For Distinguished Service Award

COLLEGE STATION—Greg Gerngross of Baird, who has served as a Callahan County Extension agent for the past eight years, has been selected to receive the Distinguished Service Award for 1977. The award is the highest given by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents.

According to McLennan County Extension Agent Billy M. Collier, the Distinguished Service Award is presented annually to county agents throughout the nation who have improved the quality of rural living over a period of 10 years or more. Collier is president of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association (TCAA).

Gerngross is one of the eight Texas county agents to receive the award. Others include Hayden Haby, Edwards County; Albert Ware, Lamar County; Don Kachtik, Orange County; Elwin Havard, Newton County; Henry Smith, Wharton County; Juston McBride; Deaf Smith County; and Lucian McCarroll, Cottle-King Counties.

The Texas award winners will be recognized at the state association's annual meeting July 31-Aug. 3 at the La Quinta Royale Motor Inn in Corpus Christi. Presentation of awards will be at the national association meeting Oct. 2-6 at Hartford, Conn.

Gerngross began his career with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in 1966 in Falls County.



There he helped establish the Falls County Youth Fair which has been successful in helping 4-H and FFA youth exhibit and sell their livestock and other products.

His work in Callahan County has centered on the areas of range management and brush control to further benefit the beef production.

Gerngross has provided educational leadership for improving forage production rates and introducing larger numbers and varieties of horticulture crops to the county.

He is a former director of the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse.

Gerngross holds a B.S. degree in agricultural education from Texas A&M University and a master's degree in the same field from Tarleton State University.

COOPER to Attend Republican Meet

COOPER — William C. Cooper of Oplin, county chairman of the Republican Party of Callahan County, announced today that he would attend a two-day organizational meeting of the Texas Republican County Chairman's Association in Austin, July 16 and 17.

Members of the newly-formed organization, which was authorized early this year by the State Republican Party, will elect officers during the meeting.

Ray Hutchison, chairman of the Republican Party of Texas, praised the action of the SREC in creating the county chairman's organization. "We have long needed a vehicle for communication between our chairmen in this far-flung state and I believe that the interchange of programs and ideas from various areas will be advantageous not only to the county organizations, but to Republican candidates as well," Hutchison stated.

Cooper announced that speakers for the event will include such GOP notables as United States Senator John Tower, former Texas Governor John Conally, U.S. Representative Bill Archer of Houston and U.S. Representative Jim Collins of Dallas.

Any Republican county chairman who has been certified by the GOP State Chairman to the Secretary of State's office will be eligible for membership and to hold office in the Association.

CJC Accepting Beauty School Applicants

CISCO—The Cisco Junior College Beauty School is now accepting applications for places in cosmetology classes which will begin in August and September. Instructor Alta Dixon has announced.

The July classes will begin early in the month and August and September classes will begin on the first Monday of the month.

Ms. Dixon pointed out that learning to be a licensed beautician is an excellent road to a rewarding career with good earnings potential. The school accepts either men or women, and a high school diploma is not necessary, she said.

The one-year general program for beauty operators covers many subjects, among which are: shampoos, hair and scalp treatment, cold waving, chemical hair relaxing, hair coloring, wigs and hairpieces, manicuring, facials, hair styling, and hair cutting.

The cost for the one-year program is \$150 tuition plus about \$75 worth of equipment and books, the latter of which may be purchased in installments as the student takes the course. On-campus living is available for cosmetology students, which would, of course, entail additional room and board fees; but it is not necessary to live on campus. "In fact," the instructor said, "most of our students do not live on campus, but rather commute to classes from the general area served by CJC."

The school also offers specialty courses in such areas as Wig Specialist, Manicurist, Facial Specialist, Wig Instructor, Cosmetology Instructor, and upon request, a Refresher Course designed for licensed operators to learn the latest cuts and styles.

Upon satisfactory completion of the beauty course, students go to Austin to take the state exam and after passing it, they become licensed by the state as beauty operators.

The CJC Beauty School is one of the best equipped in Texas, and has all of the latest modern facilities and equipment for the training of beauticians and other cosmetology specialists. Among the equipment may be found 18 styling stations, 12 hair dryers, 12 hydraulic chairs, 5 shampoo bowls with reclining chairs, 4 manicuring stations, locker

space for 24 students, and 2 long mannequin tables. The school is also furnished with several mirrors at each teaching station.

"We invite anyone interested in the cosmetology field to come and see our

facilities and investigate the possibility of entering a Beauty School program at Cisco Junior College," Ms. Dixon said. Further details are available from her, or from Vocational-Technical Dean Gerald Bint at 817-442-2567.

Callahan County ASCS News

Acreage Reports—Producers were notified in our last newsletter that the Agriculture Committee of the Senate and House have reported out farm bills which provide that if a set-aside is implemented for the 1978 crops, the acreage to be set-aside as a condition of eligibility for program benefits may be based on a percentage of the crop acres planted for harvest in 1977. Crops that would be affected are wheat, barley, corn and grain sorghum.

We are reminding you that you should report acreage by not later than July 15 if you planted any of the above crops on your farm, regardless of whether or not you have an allotment.

There is a good possibility that wheat prices may be low enough to warrant deficiency (target price) payments for 1977. At the time you certify your acreage, we will also need to know the division of the crop for

future payment purposes.

Beef Referendum—Registration of beef producers in the upcoming Beef Referendum ended June 17. During the two week registration period 191 Callahan County beef producers registered. Voting in the Beef Referendum started July 5 and will run through July 15.

Only those producers who have registered will be eligible to vote. Voting will be in the ASCS office. Producers may vote in person or by mail. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked by July 15.

The Order to be voted on was developed under the Beef Research and Information Act adopted in May 1976. For the Order to become effective, at least 50% of those registered must vote, and at least two-thirds of those voting must vote in favor of the Order. If the Order is approved by the voters, the Secretary of Agriculture will appoint a Beef Board of not more than 68 beef

producers from names submitted by producer organizations. Funds collected through assessment of three-tenths of one percent of sales on cattle will be used by the board on a research and information program to improve and develop markets for beef and beef products.

This Order was published in the April 5, 1977 Federal Register. Copies are available from the Livestock Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Final Date To Certify Cotton and Peanuts—Cotton producers with an effective allotment (not released or leased) are reminded that the final date to certify their acreage is July 15. If cotton is planted, certify that acreage; if not planted, certify zero acreage.
