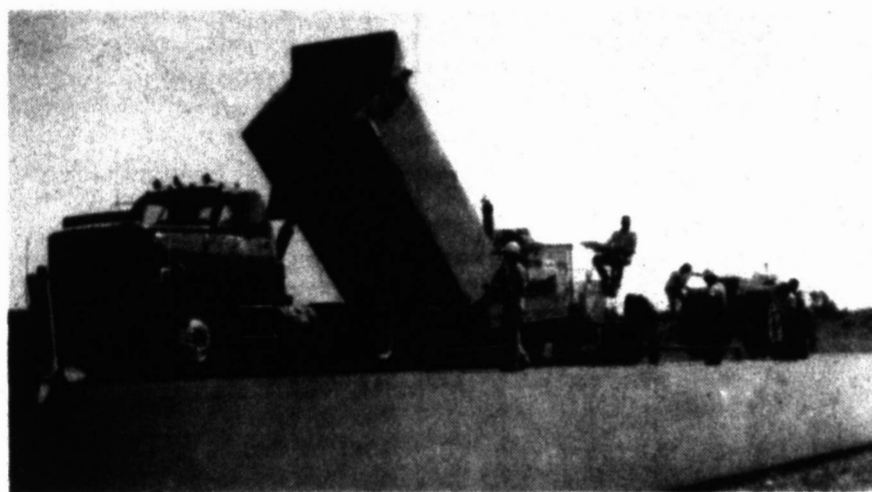

## Sexual Assault Charges Filed

William David Griffin was charged with sexual assault on July 28 in Donley County.

Griffin, a trucker, allegedly attempted to rape a young woman whom he had hired to help drive his semitrailer truck. According to reports, Griffin turned off Highway 287 onto Highway 70 South, pulled off the road, forced the 23 year old woman into the sleeper and assaulted her. She fought back and managed to escape.

The victim then ran to a white stucco house seeking help. The occupants did not admit her. The young woman then ran West down Second Street trying to find assistance. When she reached the Shamrock station, she phoned 911, but Clarendon will not get 911 service until September. Finally, with the operator's assistance, she reached the Sheriff's office, and Deputy Charles Blackburn came to the young woman's assistance. The victim was bruised, swollen and bleeding.

The Donley County Sheriff's Department notified Childress where law enforcement officers took Griffin into custody. He immediately posted bond and was released. Apparently he is now back on the road.

The trucker has been charged repeatedly with violent crimes in the past in several states, including assault and kidnaping.

## Railroad Crossings Made Safer

Texas Railroad Crossings lacking an active warning device will have reflective strips added to them under new rules adopted today by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The reflective strips will be in place by August, according to State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Engineer-Director Arnold Oliver.

"The commission adopted the rules on an emergency basis in April, and now the rules are permanent," Oliver said. "We feel that the additions are necessary to ensure travelers safety. Crossings without a bell or flashing light need this visual enhancement."

Costs for installation at crossings on and off the state highway system will be covered by the department, Oliver said.

## College Students Check Courses Before Enrolling

"Junior college students need to be assured that when they transfer to a four-year state university their academic course credit will transfer too," State Comptroller John Sharp said today.

"Students are often shocked to learn that they can not always apply their junior college credit hours towards their degree at senior colleges," Sharp said.

"Junior colleges offer many outstanding courses," Sharp said, "and while questions about the quality level of community college courses sometimes arise, there are many cases where the refusal to transfer work has absolutely nothing to do with educational standards."

"Stronger legislation should be passed, giving very specific instructions to the Coordinating Board to develop procedures that ensure that community college courses count towards degree credit," Sharp said.

Junior and senior colleges would then have to identify at least 45 credit hours from those listed in the Course Guide and offer those classes at their campuses.

"But since 1986, the annual loan volume has grown from \$12 million to almost \$80 million in 1990," Reasoner said. "The annual need is expected to reach \$100 million by 1992."

The unprecedented growth in demand for these loans has been attributed to changes in federal financial aid programs, the creation of the College Access Loan program for middle-income students, and the relatively low interest rate on the state's loans, he explained.

"The Hinson-Hazlewood program has served 200,000 students since it was created, and there is every indication that the need will increase as college costs go up," Reasoner said.

Since it was created, Hinson-Hazlewood has produced \$362 million in revenues through returns on investment, interest on loans, and federal subsidies. Of that amount, \$287 million has been used to retire previous student loan bonds, leaving the remaining \$75 million avail-

able for loans to Texas students, Reasoner said.

According to highway department officials, the paper trail and installation process normally take 16 to 18 months from approval to operating signals. However, the Burlington Northern office in Ft. Worth told *The Clarendon News* in a recent telephone interview that they hope to have the signals installed and working in about a year. "We [at the railroad] are very anxious to get this crossing guarded. Burlington Northern will do everything it can to get the job done as quickly as reasonably possible."

A project like this requires the cooperation of several agencies, primarily the Federal Highway Administration, The Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Burlington Northern Railroad. The latter two organizations seem to be working hard to get their part of the job done. The Federal agency does not appear to feel any such urgency.

Although the Federal Highway Administration finally agreed to pay for the signals in 1991, they refused to fund the project in fiscal 1988, 1989 and 1990. And there is no assurance that the paperwork will not be bogged down in administration offices in Washington. Critics of the Department of Transportation have charged repeatedly that the administration is deliberately sitting on trust funds in order to collect the interest. That interest is then used to make the deficit statistics—and the White House—look better. Air safety officials funds have also been accused of sitting on dedicated funds.

The elected officials who are supposed to oversee the Department of Transportation are those that Donley County voters sent to Washington: Representative Bill Sarpalius, Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Senator Phil Gramm and President George Bush.

Employees of Donley County State Bank and others who have written to their representatives have obviously been heard. But more letters and calls to Washington may be necessary before red lights warn drivers that a train is approaching Ayers Street.

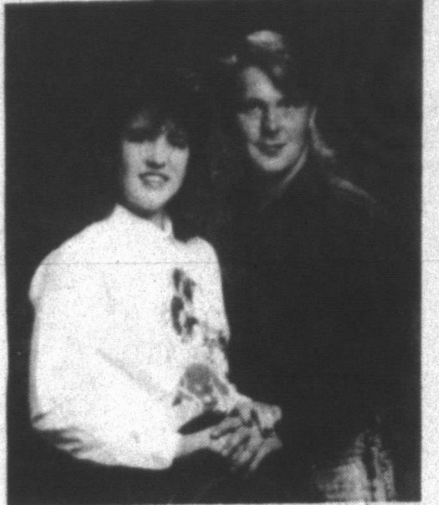

### Public Notice

On April 9, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to request that the optional feature "Call Transfer Disconnect" be available to all PLEXAR I customers by including the feature in Southwestern Bell's PLEXAR I tariff. Currently, this optional feature is available only on a customer requested basis.

Call Transfer Disconnect (CTD) is an optional feature that allows PLEXAR I customers the ability to transfer a call to another telephone number within or outside their PLEXAR I system, hang up, and permit the two remaining parties to continue with the call. The PLEXAR I user is then free to place or accept another call. CTD is not intended to be used to avoid toll charges. Therefore, CTD will not be available to PLEXAR I customers subscribing to optional Extended Metropolitan Service or Extended Area Calling Service.

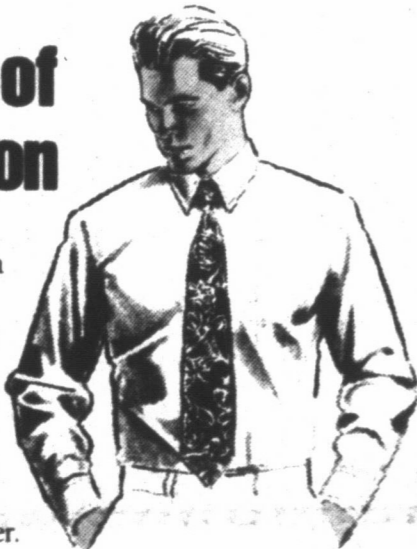
If the company's application is approved, the monthly rate for CTD will be \$4.00 for each PLEXAR I station line. Prior to the June 19, 1991, interim rate approval, Southwestern Bell was billing customers who receive the service \$1.50 for each station line equipped with this feature. In addition, under Southwestern Bell's proposed tariff, every line within the PLEXAR I system must be equipped with this feature. The nonrecurring charge for the additional lines which must be equipped with CTD will be waived for existing CTD customers. The tariffed monthly rate will apply to all existing and future CTD customers.

**Beware of Fleas**

Fleas can be a major threat this time of year, according to Lee Van Sant, Manager of the Amarillo Service Center of Terminix International.

Fleas can infest any home. They can bite your child, live on a pet, make you sick and transmit tapeworm to your dog. Many people are allergic to flea bites, and almost everyone experiences severe itching and painful irritation when bitten.

According to Van Sant, adult fleas feed on blood. They usually attack your cat or dog, but they will also bite any member of your family. And they are one of the hardest pests to control. "Fleas are survivors. They can survive months without food, and they can remain frozen for a year and revive to jump on a dog or child," says Van Sant. "Fleas have been around for millions of years, and they breed at an astonishing rate. They can jump 150 times their own length, which is equivalent to a human jumping nearly 1,000 feet."

Van Sant says adult fleas can live in your home, on your pet, and outside in your yard or kennel. Flea larvae can live in your pet's bed, in carpets and rugs, or in cracks in the floor. Once you get fleas, they are extremely hard to get rid of. Fleas keep coming back. They hatch from eggs already laid and they are brought back into the house on pets.

There are several things homeowners can do to help control fleas.

1. Follow your veterinarian's advice about bathing your pet with "flea" soap.
2. Wash all pet bedding in hot soapy water on a regular basis.
3. Thoroughly vacuum your home to remove flea eggs, larvae, and potential food sources.
4. Pay particular attention to cracks and crevices, under furniture, and underneath sofa cushions, especially in areas frequented by the pet.

ing Superintendent Tommy Robertson. He was in his work clothes and wearing a tool belt helping the custodians make repairs on the building. He is not a sit behind the desk and talk on the phone type of Superintendent.

There was a minor crime wave in Hedley last week. There was a fender-bender on one of the side streets, but no injuries. ON Friday morning, several broken street lights were discovered.

City Manager Danny Monroe reported that Constable Blackie Johnson's Chief of Detectives, Ronnie Hill, began investigating the crime immediately. By the time Donley County Sheriff Jimmy Thompson arrived, Detective Hill was able to report to Sheriff Thompson the names of prime suspects. Sheriff Thompson soon had confessions from the vandals. To protect the guilty, the names of the vandals were not released.

A truck had a wreck on 287 when he jackknifed his tractor-trailer. He was going through the construction zone and the traffic ahead of him had stopped. Fortunately, he was able to avoid causing the kind of carnage that occurred in Perryton two weeks ago, when two people were killed by a truck in a construction zone. Over the past few years many trucking companies have added phone numbers on their trucks to be called if their driver is driving recklessly. Mary Ruth and Harold White had two Grandchildren involved in the Perryton wreck. They suffered some injuries, but at last report were recovering well.

The State of Texas is having a state wide vote soon. This is an unusual time of year to be voting. There aren't any offices to be filled. The vote is primarily concerned with the proposed amendment to the Constitution that will legalize the County Education Districts. These are the proposed new districts that spread the wealth among the their members. Donley County is to be combined with Wheeler and Collingsworth counties for our C.E.D. The individual districts will share the wealth up to a point. If the proposed amendment fails, the C.E.D. plan will be unconstitutional. The courts would probably order the legislature to come up with a new plan. If not the Court will come up with a plan of its own. Both Hedley and Clarendon stand to gain from this plan.

There is also another vote that is related to the first. If the C.E.D. amendment is passed, the new C.E.D. will have to vote to decide whether or not allow some exemptions to taxation. As far as I know, all the districts already have exemptions for the elderly and homesteads. This is not really a vote on some thing new, these exemptions have been around for a while. But they must be voted on again to determine how they will be applied in the New C.E.D. These exemptions could be lost if they are voted down. Hedley taxes personal property (automobiles), while most of the other dis-

tricts don't. If the districts vote to continue as they have been, personal automobiles will not be taxed across the whole C.E.D. 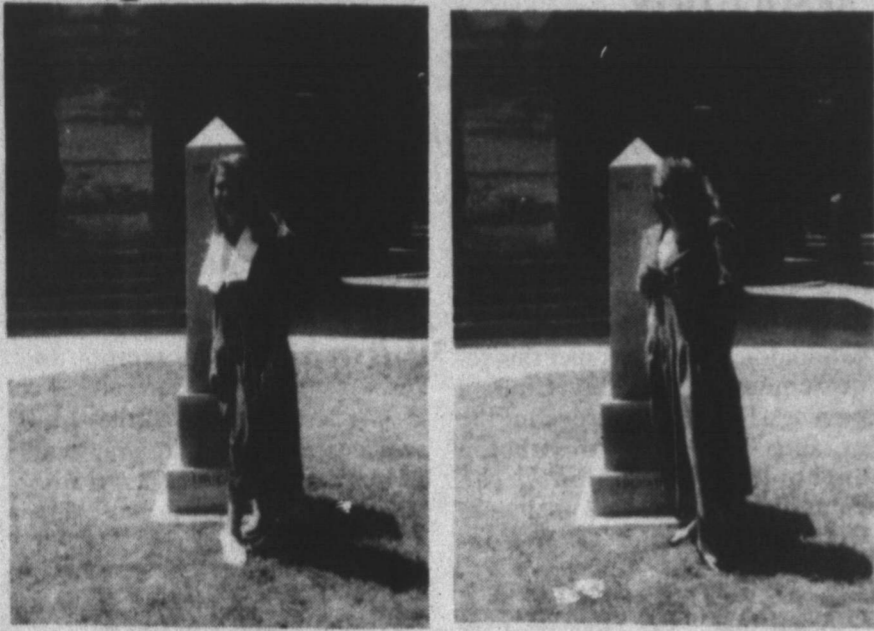

### 1992 Wheat Acreage Reduction Set at 5 Percent

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is requiring a 5-percent acreage reduction for the 1992 Wheat Program, according to Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee. This compares to the 15 percent acreage reduction required for the current wheat crop.

"This level was chosen to maintain competitiveness in world markets while balancing the risks of excessive supplies or possible shortages," Harris said.

Wheat producers who comply with the acreage reduction requirement will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel, the same as this year. Harris said the program will not have a paid land diversion.

The 1991/92 wheat crop is projected at 2.0 billion bushel, down 26 percent from last year's 2.7 billion-bushel harvest. The decline reflects an 8-million-acre reduction in planted area and lower yields. "This year, decisions to plant fewer acres were based on higher acreage reduction requirements, new flexibility provisions in the 1990 farm legislation, and lower wheat prices," the ASCS official said.

week, which would indicate an expected bollworm lay and hatch this week and/or next week.

In fields that are blooming good, producers should wait until worms reach 6,000 to 8,000 per acre range before spraying. Fields that are in the late squaring to very early bloom will need to be treated when worm populations reach 4,000 to 6,000 per acre. Producers should check fields very closely before

spraying. Treatment too early or too late can cause secondary problems and cost money.

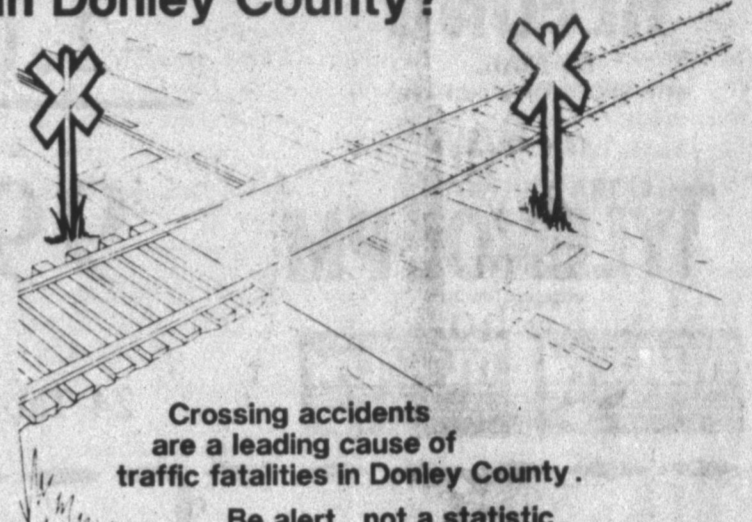

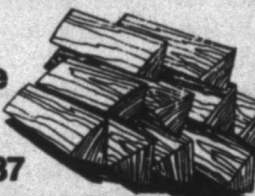
