Regional Economy Down; State Statistics Up

John Sharp, State Comptroller, released sales tax figures for January (December sales), and lauded a 5 percent increase in the state figures. "January's local sales tax rebates showed a modest start for 1992 with today's payments to 933 cities totaling \$85.5 million or 5 percent more than last January's payments of \$18.4 million."

The Comptroller projected that the year would be a good one, "We have projected slow but steady economic growth for 1992 in Texas, despite the national recession, and retail sales should continue to show moderate improvement."

What Sharp did not comment upon was the fact that the western half of the state was pretty well left out of the improvement. Cities in the Panhandle area echoed the general West Texas economy.

Clarendon performed better than most regional towns. Local sales in December were off by 9.08 percent. Howardwick appeared to be off by 100 percent in the official figures, while Hedley did not report. That gave a county average of -18.28 percent.

Gray county was off 9.83 percent. Hall County edged up by a half-percent. Hardeman County (Chillicothe, Quanah) fell by 22.78 percent. Hemphill (Canadian) was down 11.1 percent. Hutchinson was up 12.71. Lipscomb slid by 21.55 percent and Motley County was off 42.13 percent. Ochiltree sagged by 15.29 percent.

Even larger counties in West Texas suffered. Potter County receipts were off 3.61 percent, so Amarillo merchants did not have much to cheer about. Randall County (Canyon) was up, but only by six-tenths of one percent.

Roberts County (Miami) chalked up an 18.38 percent decline, while Wheeler edged up by 3.58 percent. Carson County dribbled down by 1.93 percent.

Childress and Wellington were up some. The new prison and other factors pulled the Childress County figures up to a 57.65 percent improvement over sales in December 1990, while Wellington almost made a one percent improvement, scoring +.85 percent. Paducah (Cottle Co.) was off 3.47 percent.

Clarendon merchants' reports do not jive with the state figures. Most stores in Clarendon report increased sales in December, up in 1991 over 1990. Moreover, there seems to be an air of optimism in the area the contradicts the statistics.

PUC Changes Utility Bills

Customers of West Texas State Utilities may notice two new items on their electric bill beginning in January. Both result from changes required by state officials and affect every investor-owned utility in Texas. "One item will not cost consumers any more money but the second will slightly increase bills" according to Jerry Chambliss, WTU's area manager.

The first item involves the customer charge which has been part of the electric bill for several years. By order of the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas it must now be listed as a separate item. The charge includes basic costs such as reading meters and processing the bills. It does not change each month and is currently set at \$6.50 for residential customers. The customer charge has not increased and this change does not affect the amount of a customer's bill.

The second new item involves the tax increase bill passed by the Texas Legislature in 1991. The PUC recently decided how utilities should collect the new state tax. The tax will be collected for each kilowatt hour a customer uses. The total tax for a month will be listed as a separate item on the bill.

A typical WTU residential customer who uses 600 kilowatt hours will see about 30 cent increase on their monthly electric bill as a result of the new tax. The factors used to collect the tax will vary according to the type of customer. For example the amount of tax a commercial and a residential customer pays will be different.

These recent actions cap off a year of activities involving the PUC and WTU. Most of the activity was initiated by WTU and centered around reducing customer's bills or stimulating the West Texas economy.

In June and October customers received good news from the company in the form of reduced fuel factors and a fuel credit. These reductions were a direct result of the company's efforts to reduce fuel cost.

In December the company filed a request to offer three new services designed to attract new business and help existing businesses. The three new services were in the form of tariffs of rates which cover

economic development, interruptible service and curtailable service. If approved by the PUC, these services would strengthen efforts to maintain a viable West Texas economy.

WTU serves almost half a million people in a 52,000 square mile area that stretches from the Red River to Rio Grande.

Computer Course Begins

A 3-week computer literacy course will begin Thursday, January 16, in Room 203 at Clarendon College. It will meet for 3 Thursday evenings (January 16, 23, & 30) from 6:00 - 9:20. The cost of the class is \$25. (This is the same class mentioned in last week's paper. It has simply been postponed by one week.)

This is an adult vocational course designed to help adults who have no experience with computers to become computer literate. There are no tests involved. The course will be taught in a very relaxed manner. The instructor, Pam Denney, said, "an adult should not feel intimidated at all while taking this class. My goal is to explain computer concepts in a way that a total beginner can understand. It has been estimated that by 1995 almost half of all jobs will involve the use of a computer in some way. Therefore, it is important that we all become computer literate."

After taking the class, students should have enough computer knowledge to be able to:

1. Decide if they could use a computer themselves, and, if so, what type to buy.
 2. Decide if they would like to take some hands-on-type of classes to learn to operate the computer, and, if so, what type of classes.
 3. Understand more of what their children or grandchildren are talking about when they discuss computers!
- If you are interested in the class, you may register during the first class session, or you may register early at the Business Office on campus. Flu Season's Here

Flu season came early in much of North America, and a second surge may be on the way.

"People who caught influenza earlier in the season could get it again, especially if a different strain hits," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen of the Influenza Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "But people who have been vaccinated are likely to be protected. The two influenza A viruses circulating are similar to those included in current vaccine."

Flu season generally peaks in late January or early February, but an unusually early round peaked in November.

Those most at risk for potential fatal flu complications are the elderly and people with heart disease, lung disease, asthma, chronic bronchitis, diabetes, chronic kidney disease, chronic anemia, sickle cell anemia and immune system disorder.

"It is still not too late for people in the high risk groups to get flu shots," Glezen said. "Such patients can be protected by taking the prescription drug amantadine during the 14 days it takes for the vaccine to provide full protection."

Most of the influenza this season has been type A, and the systems and duration of an influenza A attack can be minimized by amantadine.

Influenza usually strikes suddenly and brings fever, generalized muscle pain, weakness and a dry, hacking cough.

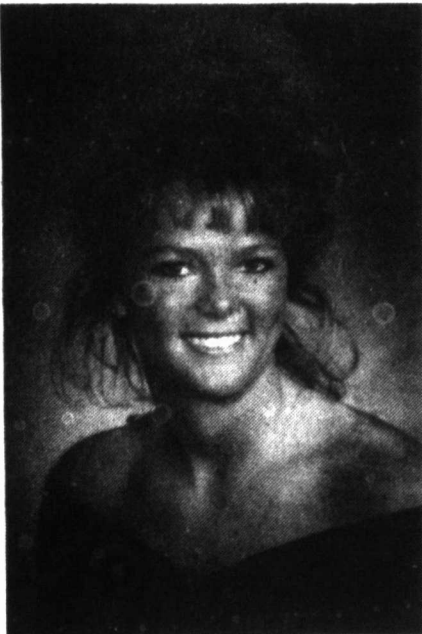
Flu sufferers should get plenty of rest and drink lots of liquids, Glezen said.

Adults may take aspirin or an aspirin substitute to reduce fever and pain, but people younger than 21 should use only aspirin free products.

Aspirin has been associated with Reye's syndrome, a flu and chicken pox complication that can cause vomiting, convulsions, brain damage and even death in children, said Glezen, an epidemiologist and pediatrician.

As bad as this current season has been, it pales by comparison with the 1918 worldwide flu epidemic that afflicted 500 million people and killed 20 million. More than half a million died in the U.S.

The 1918 epidemic killed more people in less time than any other disease in modern history. It ranks with the Black Death of the 14th Century as one of the few events in recorded history to reduce the earth's population by as much as 1 percent.

Recertify Now

Panhandle Community Services, located in the old Courthouse at 300 Sully in Clarendon, has announced that it is important that their clients start coming in Now to recertify for their commodity program.

The new year for commodities begins the first of February, and it will simplify the procedure for all concerned if clients come in before commodities are given in February to fill out the required forms.

In order to complete the required forms you must have the following items:

- Proof of income for all household members and
- Social Security numbers for all household members.

- Current monthly income for 1992 (such as direct deposit slips from the bank, award letter from Social Security, etc.) is what is needed to qualify.

Remember, the lines will be shorter and things go so much better if you come in before February Commodity day.

Carrots, sweet potatoes, cotton and peanut production will be some of the topics to be discussed at the upcoming Donley County Farm Production and Diversification Seminar. The seminar is set for January 24, 1992, and will be held at the Bairfield

Activity Center at Clarendon College. Registration begins at 8:00 a.m. and the programs will start at 8:25 a.m.

The morning session will include information on record keeping requirements for private applicators, conservation compliance, changes in commercial drivers license laws, early season cotton insect control and peanut insect control, soil testing and environmentally sound fertilizer practices, and a demonstration of PowerUp Lubricants. A free catered meal will follow for seminar participants, sponsored by PowerUp Lubricants - Ben Burney. Also, private applicators will receive two (2) Continuing Education Units (CEU's) for attending the morning session.

Two additional years at West Texas State University would be about \$10,000 with Texas Tech and Texas A&M being slightly more expensive than W.T.

It costs less to attend a college or university in Texas than any state in the United States. Young people may also be eligible for financial aid or scholarship.

The last day for registration will be Friday, January 24.

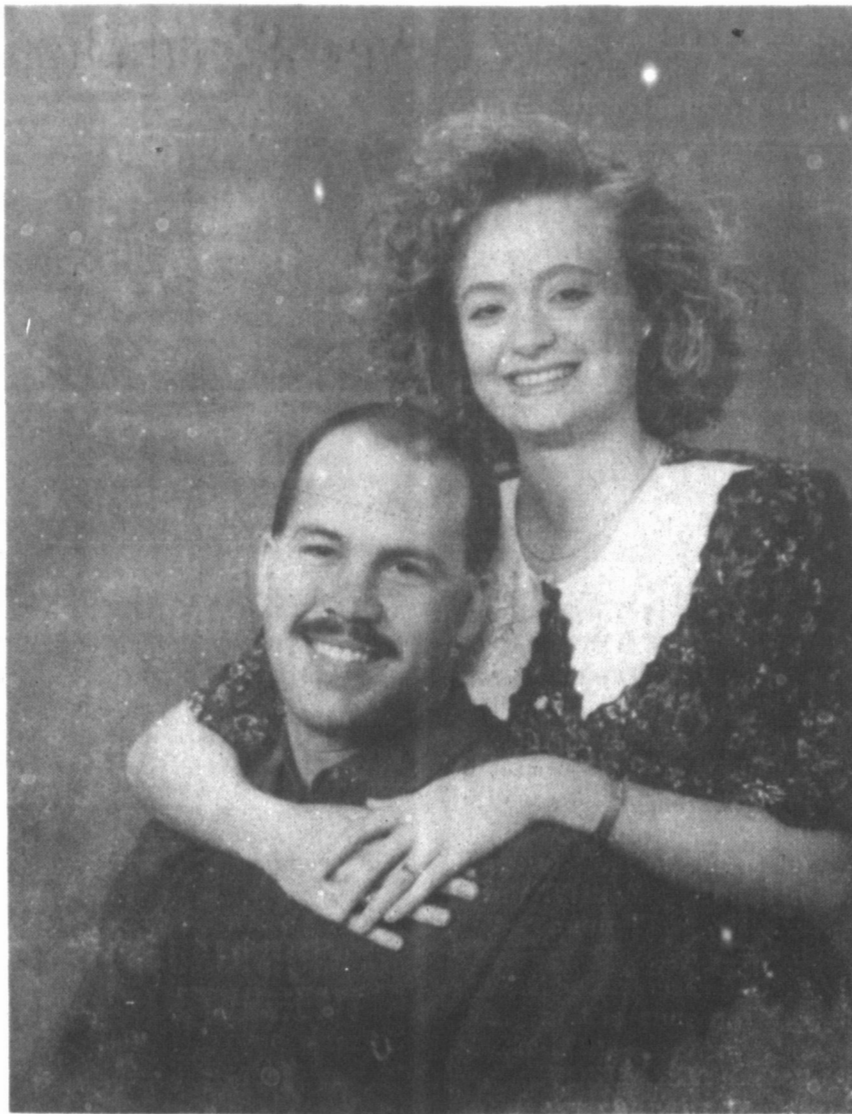

New Speed Detectors Announced

The Texas Department of Public Safety soon will be using a hand-held laser speed detector in its traffic law enforcement efforts, DPS Director Col. James Wilson said Friday.

"These laser devices cannot be picked up by conventional radar detectors," Wilson said. "Call it

Stealth speed enforcement. We think it will have a significant impact on our efforts to slow down Texas drivers. And it is well documented that excessive speed leads to traffic injuries and deaths."

The laser, which weighs four pounds and is similar in appearance to hand-held radar units commonly used by law enforcement, was donated to the DPS by GEICO Insurance Company. The device transmits a narrow beam of infrared light instead of the

microwave beam used by traditional radar units.

"We'll be using this high-tech piece of equipment at a various locations across the state," Wilson said. "We are delighted to have one, and down the road, we may eventually get more. The only thing holding us back is money: The guns cost about \$3,700 each."

Several state and local police agencies across the nation have experimented with the use of laser speed guns and have been pleased with the result, Wilson said.

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine™ Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

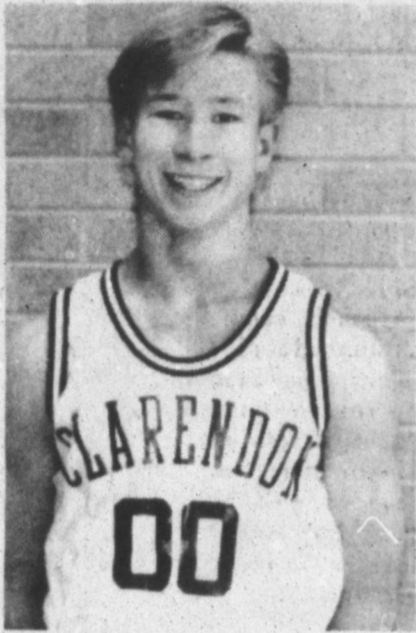
DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.
