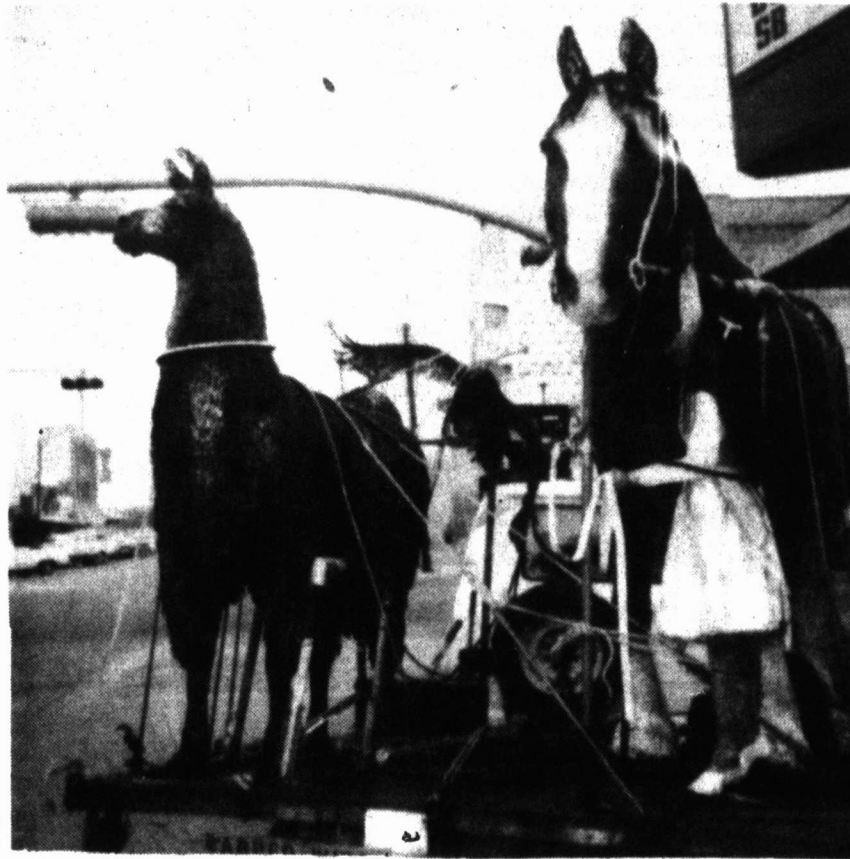

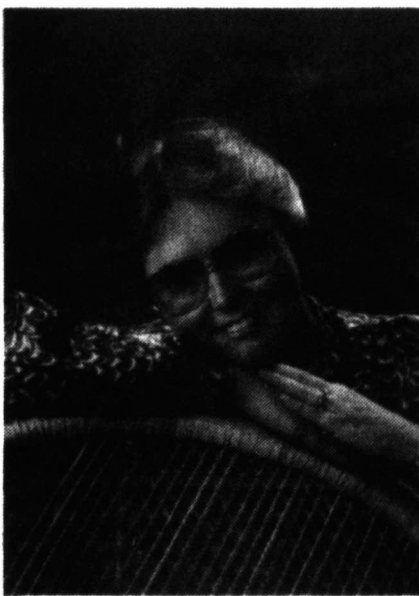

Christmas Tree Season Begins

The day after Thanksgiving traditionally marks the beginning of the Christmas season, a time when forests of Christmas trees start popping up on street-corner lots.
Some folks will drive out to a choose-and-cut tree farm for Texas-grown Virginia pines and Afghans. Besides these varieties, retail lots will offer fir and spruce from the North. Some nurseries also will be selling trees with roots intact to plant outside after Christmas.
Whatever the variety, buying the right Christmas tree and keeping it fresh for the holidays requires some thought and planning, said Jim Chandler, forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
Before making a selection, he said, determine where in the home the tree should go.
"The tree will look smaller at the (choose-and-cut) farm than at the house," Chandler said. "Take the advice of the farm operator and use some type of measuring pole to determine the height of the tree."
Once the tree is home, cut the bottom quarter inch off the trunk. This keeps the trunk from being sealed off with sap and allows the tree to continue drinking water.
Place the tree in a water-holding stand right away. If the tree is not going to be decorated immediately, place it in a bucket of water in a cool space such as a garage, he said.
"The tree needs water at all times," Chandler said. "A normal 6- to 8-foot Christmas tree can drink up to a gallon of water in the first 24 hours."
Keep the tree away from heat sources, fireplaces, or television sets, he said. Make sure lights and electrical connections are in good working condition to avoid fires.
Do a freshness test when buying a cut tree from a retail lot, he said. The needles should be resilient.
Hold a branch about six inches from the tip and pull your hand toward the tip, allowing the branches to slip through your fingers. On a fresh tree, the needles shouldn't fall off in your hand.
Then, lift the tree a couple of inches off the ground and let it drop on the stump end. Examine the needles that fall.

Cotton Loan Deficiency Payments

Cotton producer should check with the Donley County ASCS office before they sell their cotton. Failure to do so could cause the loss of income in the form of Cotton deficiency payments.

When the AWP (Adjusted World Price) for upland Cotton falls below the loan rate, cotton becomes eligible for a Loan Deficiency Payment. The AWP for the week is announced each Friday and remains in effect until the following Thursday Midnight. LDP rate is equal to the difference between the national loan rate and the higher of (1) the loan level for the cotton multiplied by 70%, or (2) the AWP. On Friday November 29, the loan deficiency rate was 6.7 cents per pound. Before you sell you cotton, be sure to check with us to see if the loan deficiency payments are applicable.

All Cotton produced on a participating farm is eligible for a loan deficiency payment. The day the warehouse receipts are presented to this office and all signatures on the applications are received, the LDP rate will be locked in.

Some of the provisions are:
(1) The producers must still have control and have a beneficial interest in the cotton.
(2) Warehouse receipts and class cards must be submitted to

the county office.

(3) Cotton receiving loan deficiency payment will not be eligible for loan.

(4) Eligibility requirements are basically the same as for cotton going into loan.

(5) LDP's are available from the date loan rates are announced through May 31 after the calendar year in which the crop is planted.

"There should be a few old brown needles that have died, but if you have a lot of green needles fall from the tree, that's a sign that the tree has dried out," he said.

A good fragrance and a green color also indicate freshness.

Trees that will be planted outside after Christmas should be handled differently. Since they are living plants, they cannot be kept indoors as long as cut trees.

"They'll dry out from central air-conditioning and central heating. They shouldn't be left in the house more than a week."

Chandler had a word of encouragement to those dismayed at the disposal of so many cut trees during Christmas.

"Remember, for every Christmas tree cut, there are two to three new seedlings planted to ensure that we will have Christmas trees for the future," he said.

Additionally, many cities have started recycling projects for Christmas trees. In some urban areas, trees are chipped and used in landscaping. Some coastal cities are using the trees to hold back erosion of coastlines. Cities near major lakes are sinking trees into the water to provide habitat for fish.

DPS Stresses Holiday Safety

There is probably no other holiday that gets people in a more festive spirit than Christmas. With all the gift shopping, holiday music, and the excitement of having the family all together, it's no wonder this is a favorite holiday among Americans.

But, for some Texas families, this will be a special holiday, one to be remembered forever. Not because it was such a good time, but because they have lost a friend or loved one in a traffic accident.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety stated, "Last year 27 people lost their lives on Texas street and highways during the Christmas holidays." This year with the holiday period falling during the middle of the week, most Texans will have three days off during the holiday. So, the potential is going to be less than last year, but we have to be just as careful as ever.

"Historically, speed and the drinking driver have been responsible for most of these holiday fatalities," Major Cawthon added. Each year approximately 20,000 people die in this nation because of speeding, and that many or more will be directly or indirectly related to alcohol. Once again, extra Department of Public Safety Troopers will be on the roads watching specifically for these and other traffic violations to keep the roads a safer place for you and your family.

Please don't become one of this year's highway death statistics. Slow down, don't drink and drive, and make sure everyone is buckled up.

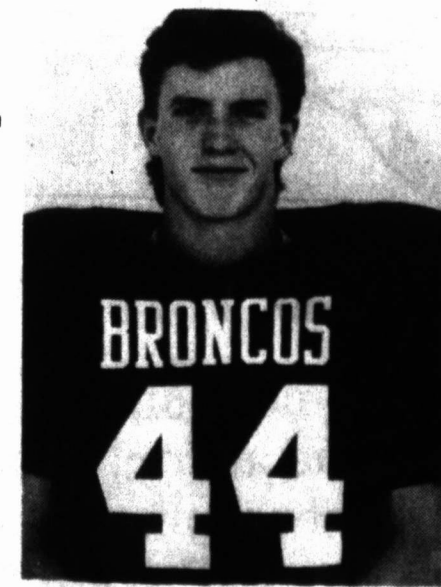

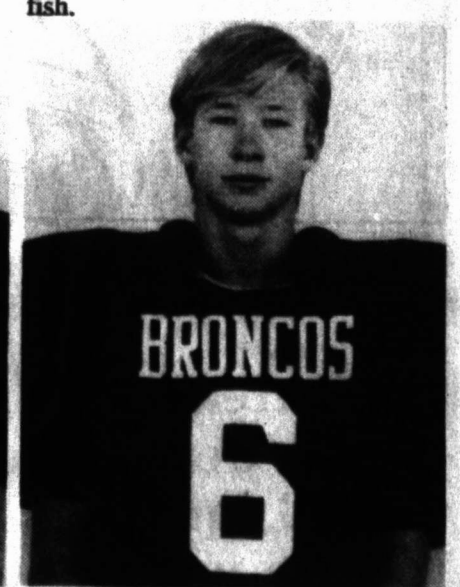

All District Football Team Announced



Sciatica: Pain of the Back, Hip, and Legs

Sciatic pain occurs more frequently in men and involves pain of the legs and lower back. Sciatic pain can result from pressure on the sciatic nerve, the largest nerve in the body. Actually there is more than one sciatic nerve. These nerves branch out from the spinal cord to the buttocks, the sex organs, and the lower extremities. Any condition that affects the sciatic nerve that runs down each leg can cause pain all the way from the lower back to the toes.

Typically, sciatica is sensed as a burning pain that shoots down the hip along the back of the thigh. Coughing, sneezing, or trying to bend the back may worsen the pain. The pressure on the sciatic nerve is thought to occur when one of the discs of the back bone breaks and presses on one of the roots of the sciatic nerve. A narrowing of the opening in the vertebrae from arthritis of the spine is another cause of sciatic pain.

Treatment of sciatica consists of bed rest and limiting movement of the extremities. Heat from a heating pad or hot water bottle applied to the hip and legs may provide some relief of pain. Nonprescription pain-relievers such as aspirin, ibuprofen, and acetaminophen may be helpful. If the pain persists, treatment of underlying causes may be necessary. Surgery may be required to correct an abnormal spinal condition.

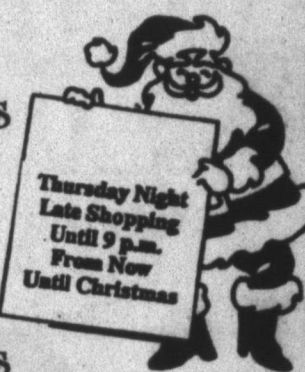

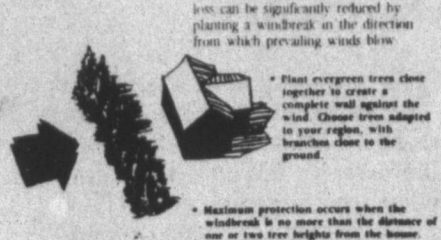
• **Summer:** Because the sun is directly overhead at midday in summer, trees on the south side will cast shade the longest when they are planted very close to it.

Slowing the Wind...



• **For an average frame house, an obstacle from wind can cause about one-third of the winter heat loss. Heat loss can be significantly reduced by planting a windbreak in the direction from which prevailing winds blow.**

• **Plant evergreen trees close together to create a complete wall against the wind. Choose trees adapted to your region, with branches close to the ground.**

• **Maximum protection occurs when the windbreak is no more than the distance of one or two tree heights from the house.**

Where Will It Land?



• **For greatest shade, plant fast-growing trees close to the house, as well as slower-growing, long-lived trees a short distance away. The fast-growing trees can be removed after the more desirable species have matured.**



• **DO NOT plant large tree species under utility lines, or where their roots may interfere with power lines or other utilities. A small sapling may eventually reach heights of 60 feet or more, making even one tree an equally large size.**

• **DO plant trees to shade an existing temperature with a one-increase cooling efficiency as much as 10 percent. If you're using an evaporative cooler, this alone doesn't apply. They need the sun to operate efficiently!**

Tree Windbreaks Benefit Livestock

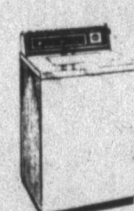
Well planned tree windbreaks can significantly reduce stress on livestock and feed requirements. This result in better animal health, lower mortalities, and lower feed costs.

Recent research information has been compiled and released by the National Technical Center. The research points out that the effect of cold temperatures on animals is basically one of an increased need for energy. Animals must increase their intake of food as temperatures fall below certain critical temperatures or windchill indexes to get the energy to keep their body temperatures within a specific comfort range. The Kansas State University also did a study and showed a savings of 28% in feed or maintenance energy costs when sheltered by a tree windbreak as compared to a similar case in the open without shelter.

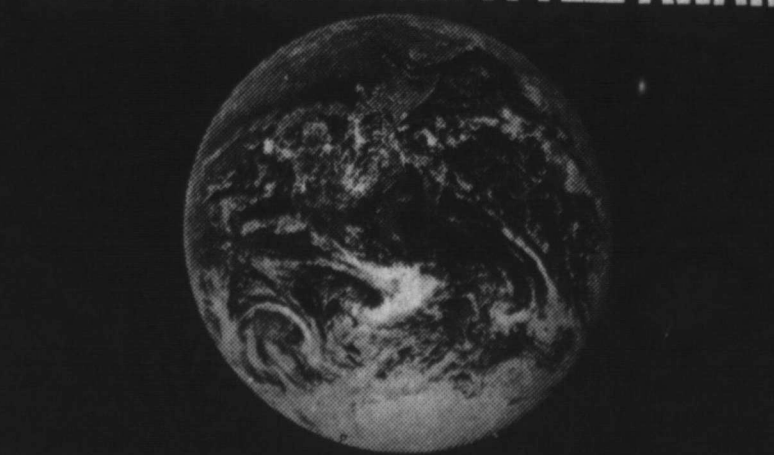

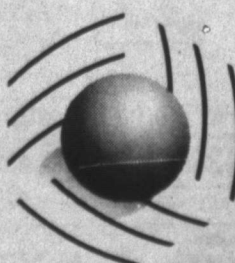
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Bronco Basketball

Members of our community will especially be interested in *History of the J.A. Ranch* as colorfully told by Montie Ritchie. Well-known names such as Adair, Goodnight, and Walsh are only a few of the many that Donley County citizens will recognize. 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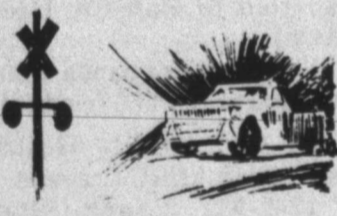

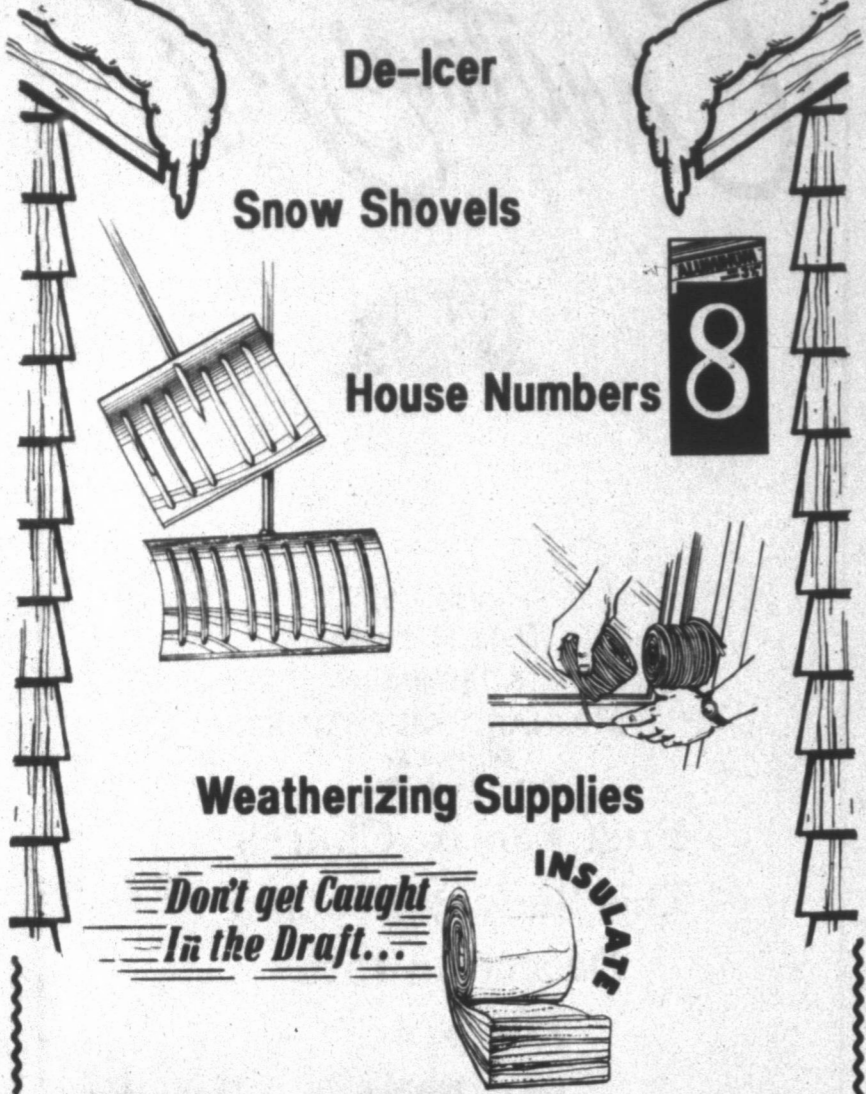

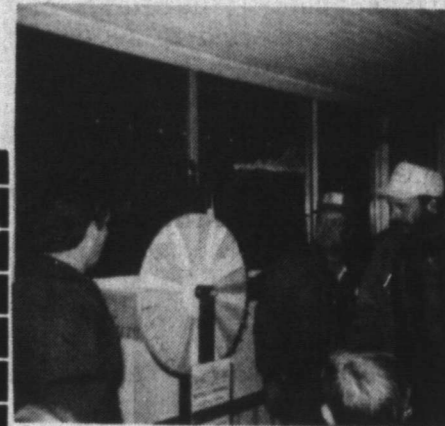

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Estlack Entered Meet

Claremore, Oklahoma, was the site of the American Bantam Association's National Annual Meet for 1991. Since Russell Estlack didn't figure that a national meet would ever get any closer to Clarendon, he decided it was time to go to the city and see the elephant, as the cowboys use to say.

The Verdigris County Fair Grounds and the Sooner Classic Poultry Association hosted the show on November 22-24. There were birds from Central America, New Zealand, Australia, Canada, and forty two states. The National Bantam Show is the location for the National 4-H - F.F.A. Poultry Show. The main exhibition building had over 4,000 birds exhibition in the open show while a second building housed the National 4-H - F.F.A. Show and the Waterfowl Show. A third building was reserved for birds that were for sale.

Russell carried 14 birds to Oklahoma; seven were entered in the 4-H - F.F.A. Show while the other seven were in the open competition.

The first day, the 4H-FFA Show was judged while five judges worked on the open show. In the 4H-FFA show Russell had two silkies which were placed 2nd Cock and 2nd Hen. His two black Cochins ranked 1st Cock, Reserve Breed; 1st Hen; Best of Breed, and Reserve of Variety. The three Black Breasted Red Old English Game were 1st Cock and 1st and 2nd Pullet. The first place pullet was also judged Best of Variety, Best of Breed, and Champion Old English of the Show.

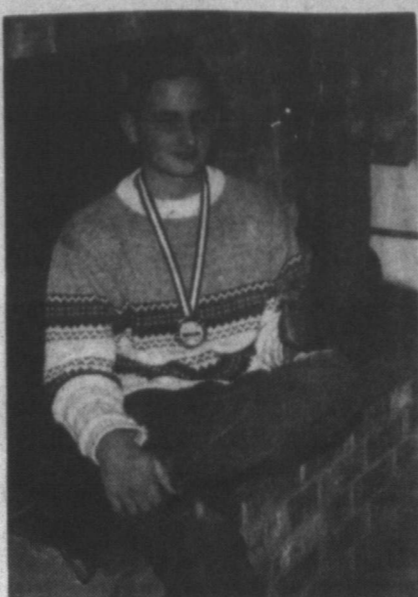
After watching the judges work in the open show for nine hours on Friday, Russell was glad when they finally looked at one of his birds.

His Silver Sebright Hen, according to the judge's notes, would have been sixth, but they only placed five birds in each class.

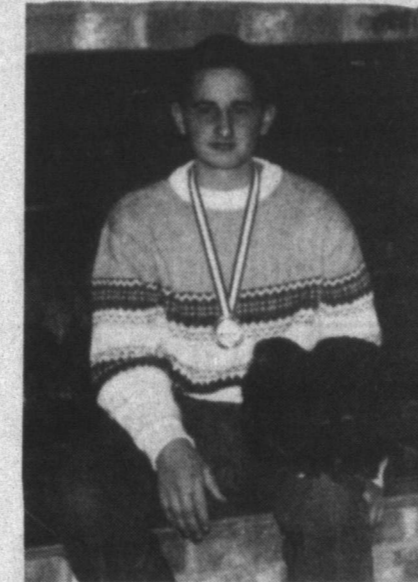
On Saturday the judge was suppose to start at 8:00 am. When the first people arrived to open the show barn, they found water running out both ends and one side of the barn which housed the birds. Sometime during the night someone had broken into the building and had taken birds and carrying coops which were for sale. Then the vandals opened the one inch freeze proof faucets and proceeded to flood the remaining birds which were in coops sitting on the ground. As soon as exhibitors arrived, there was a mad scramble to save as many birds as possible.

While Allen helped in the sale barn, Russell groomed his birds for the rest of the Open Show. His four Blackbreasted Red Old English were judged 2nd Cock, 4th Hen, and 3rd Pullet. The two Black Cochins placed 3rd Cock and 1st Hen.

At 5:00 pm the buildings were closed for the day with the judges still working inside. At 7:00 pm a banquet was held, the annual meeting of the American Bantam Association was conducted and Champion and Reserve exhibitors received their awards. The awards were Olympic style medals and each recipient was called to a stair step in an Olympic style ceremony. This was the largest chicken show Russell has ever attended and to be an Olympic Champion was a real thrill.
