Electric Rates Reduced Again

Rates are being reduced in Baird in keeping with the offer made to the City Council last year.

A substantial majority of the property-owning, taxpaying citizens using Electric Service in Baird have indicated that they preferred to take service from the present source rather than a proposed politically-operated light plant.

An audited and certified survey of individual cards signed and addressed to the Citizens Protective Committee shows that the larger users in Baird readily signed this card, which, in turn, represents a still greater proportion of the total

(Above rate comparison is based on the latest report of the Federal Power Commission. Tax comparison is based on the last report of the Texas Bond Reporter).

The total rebate amounts to \$1,700, which has been held in escrow for our customers since the rate reduction first was offered. The company now is glad to return this sum and also wants to express its appreciation for the vote of confidence on which the rate reduction is made effective at this time.
