R.R. Starts Safety Effort

AMARILLO--Burlington Northern Railroad and Panhandle law enforcement agencies are launching a major crossing safety effort. The railroad and law agencies held a seminar in Amarillo in early November and will have other programs in the coming months.

The program includes training in enforcing crossing laws, as well as practical instruction in accident prevention. Instructors try to make police more familiar with crossing types, accident statistics, site hazards and crash prevention. Burlington Northern also allowed

law enforcement personnel to ride in the cab of some locomotives so that, with the help of colleagues in patrol cars, the lawmen could issue citations to careless motorists. The program, called "Officer on the Train" is a part of the statewide safety program called **Operation Lifesaver**.

News people from both television and newspaper have worked closely with the railroad and the law enforcement agencies. By publicizing the danger of railroad crossings and the stepped-up enforcement efforts, the participants hope to reduce the number of injuries and deaths at crossings.

Thunder Junction Signs Lease

Yesterday's Children signed a 75-year lease agreement, with option, on February 21 with Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority for land on which to build Thunder Junction.

The 81-acre site, located just east of the Greenbelt Lake dam, will serve as home to the Western heritage park that will benefit senior citizen programs throughout the Panhandle.

Action came at a meeting of the Board of Directors of Yesterday's Children, Inc., said Pat Kaiser, president. Carroll Knorpp, Greenbelt Water Authority presi-

dent, signed the agreement January 21. The water authority board approved the lease in December.

Located on a scenic bluff overlooking Greenbelt Lake near Highway 70, the site is the choice location for the Old West park, according to Don Stewart of Economic Consulting Services. ECS, consultant for such major entertainment complexes as Disney World and Circus Circus, conducted a preliminary feasibility study in January 1991 for building the park in the Clarendon area.

"We are delighted to work out an arrangement with the Greenbelt Water Authority that will allow the park to be built where it has the greatest potential for success!" said Kaiser. "We believe the agreement will be beneficial to all concerned."

Yesterday's Children has five years in which to begin construction, according to the agreement.

Low-Income Working Families Eligible For Cash From IRS

The Internal Revenue Service is giving up to \$2,000 to low-income families who qualify for Earned Income Credits (EIC) on their tax returns. The trouble is that many just don't apply.

"Many families miss the opportunity to receive this tax credit because they don't make enough money to owe taxes, so they don't file an income tax return," said Joyce Cavanagh, family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Also, people don't know the EIC is available or how to file for it."

It is believed that more than 12 million families now qualify for the EIC. It is available to working parents who earned an adjusted gross income of less than \$21,250 in 1991, and who have at least one child who has been living at home for more than six months, Cavanagh said. Both married and single parents can qualify.

The EIC is a refundable credit, she said, which means that eligible working families can receive it even if they owe no federal income tax or have no income tax withheld from their paychecks. Those who owe no income tax receive a check from the IRS in the amount of their credit.

"If a family does owe income tax, the EIC reduces the amount of taxes owed," Cavanagh said. "If the family's credit is greater than the taxes owed, the family's tax bill will be reduced to zero and the IRS will send the family a check for the remaining amount of its EIC."

To receive the EIC, a person must file a federal income tax return, either 1040 or 1040A, and a new form called "Schedule EIC." A taxpayer can fill out both sides of the form or fill out only the first side and allow the IRS to complete the rest and calculate the credit.

Cavanagh said that those families who use the "married couple filing separately" status should check with the IRS to see if they qualify to receive the EIC.

The amount of refund families receive, according to Cavanagh, depends on how much income was earned and whether they qualify for two extra EIC benefits that are now available:

-The basic EIC for 1991 for families with one child is worth a maximum of \$1,192. The maximum is \$1,235 for those with more than one child. Most families who earned between \$6,000 and \$13,000 last year should receive at least \$1,000.

-Families with a child born in 1991 can receive an extra benefit of up to \$357.

-Families that pay at least part of the premiums for a health insurance policy that includes health care coverage for a child may receive an extra credit of up to \$428.

Low-income parents with a foster child also may qualify for the EIC, Cavanagh said. However, the foster child must have lived with the family for that entire year.

The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.

2. Have a physical examination every year.

3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age 35 to 40 - One baseline mammogram.

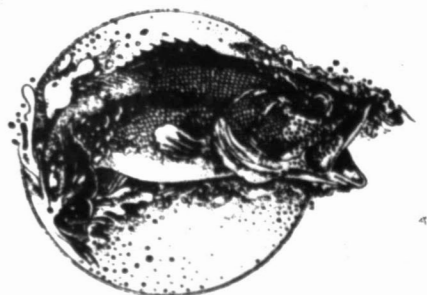
Age 40 to 50 - A mammogram every 1 to 2 years.

Over 50 - Yearly mammograms.

These include the places now occupied by Venita Sharrar (who has moved to Perryton), Phil Fletcher, Derlene Graham (filling the unexpired term of Chris Matthews), and the place now occupied by Johnny Floyd.

The Clarendon Junior College District will elect regents to fill the slots now occupied by Leo Smith, James A. McAnear, Sr., and Jiggs Mann.

The Donley County Hospital District will elect four directors, for the positions now held by Johnny Leathers, Wanda Dromgoole, Connie Pitts and Jim Cockerham.

The Hedley School Board will be electing several trustees, but details were not available at press time.

Many of the incumbents now in office may run for re-election. Citizens who would like to sign up to run for office may do so at the office of the entity that will hold the election.

Dear Editor

Recently this commission has received letters from a number of your readers regarding Mission Cable Company. Mission has notified their customers by a letter dated January 7th that discounts would no longer be authorized for early payments and that rates would increase.

In the "Letter to the Editor" section of your newspaper, Ms. Joan McAfee recently stated her

displeasure with the company and urged other dissatisfied customers to write the Public Utility Commission to "let them know what's happening."

We would like to inform you that the cable TV industry was deregulated by the federal government effective January 1, 1986. Therefore, neither the PUC nor any other state agency has any authority over Mission Cable Company, or any other operator.

The only possible avenue of appeal for these customers would be if the City of Clarendon has a contract with Mission Cable Company. If so, there would be contractual agreements as to quality of service and rate increases. These agreements could be reviewed to verify if Mission is in compliance with the contract. If there is no contractual agreement, then I know of no other form of relief for these customers.

Calcium Blockers Lower Blood Pressure

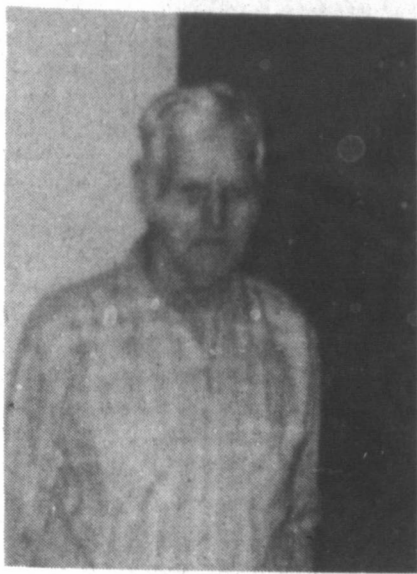
A group of prescription medicines referred to as "calcium channel blockers" was originally approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of angina and the control of heart beat irregularities. In addition, it has been shown that calcium blocker medicines, which include nifedipine (Procardia), verapamil (Calan; Isoptin; Verelan), diltiazem (Cardizem) and Isradipine (Dynacirc), are effective in lowering high blood pressure. These medicines are reported to be equally effective but differ as to side effects.

According to a recent issue of American Family Physician, calcium channel blockers disrupt the flow of calcium into certain cells. This disruption appears to prevent inappropriate heart contractions and narrowing of blood vessels. The net effect is an overall lowering of the blood pressure. One advantage of calcium blockers over other blood pressure medicines is their high degree of effectiveness in blacks and the elderly. This is thought to occur because individuals in these categories have low levels of the enzyme renin.

Calcium blockers may be used alone or in combination with other blood pressure medicines. It may take one to two weeks for the full effect of these medicines to be obtained. Some references indicate calcium blockers should be used with caution in persons who also receive beta blocker medicines.

Fruit and Nut Trees Need Dormant Oil

The prime time to apply dormant oil to fruit trees, nut trees and various landscape trees is now, according to a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Scale insects are a primary target of the oil spray, said Dr. John Lipe of Fredericksburg.

"Scale are tiny sucking insects that can severely injure or kill branches or entire trees," Lipe said.

They attach themselves to twigs, limbs, and major branches with smooth bark. Each insect seals itself under a protective covering, visible as scaly crusts. Crusts that are a dull, grayish white indicate San Jose scale, the most common scale on fruit trees. Snow white crusts indicate peach scale, while those that are dull brown indicate other types of scale.

Scale insects are especially serious on peaches, plums and other stone fruits, as well as apples and pears. Numerous ornamental trees and shrubs also are attacked. Serious scale infestations also have been noted on silver maple.

Dormant oil sprays also are applied to kill overwintering eggs of various insects and mites.

"Phylloxera eggs are a primary target on pecan trees," he said.

The dormant oil spray can be applied anytime when the tree is fully dormant and before it has leafed out or begun to bloom.

Late winter is better because the insects weaken through the cold months and become more vulnerable, Lipe said.

Trees should be sprayed when the temperature is between 50 and 80 degrees and when no hard freezes are expected within the next few days, he said. The dormant oil shocks the tree's system and a freeze is a further upset.

For the best results, an insecticide should be mixed with the oil, following label directions.

"Good spray coverage is important since it's the oil film that suffocates the scale," he said.

Air sprayers and other low-volume sprayers are not as good as handgun applicators, although air sprayers will do the job if care is taken to ensure good coverage, he said.

"Do not overapply dormant oil because that could injure a tree," he said.

Heavy scale infestations may require more than one dormant oil application for eradication. If a second oil spray is applied, wait at least three weeks after the first spray or until after heavy rains have fallen.

Oil-related tree injuries sometimes occur because of poor mixing in the spray tank. The spray tank should be agitated will immediately before and during spraying.

Check It Out

If you're looking for more good Texas Panhandle reading, it can be found in the following books and articles at Burton Memorial Library.

The interesting, well written style of Texas authors. Pauline and R.L. Robertson, are familiar to many Panhandle readers. One of their books which might be of special interest to citizens of our community is Cowman's Country. Detailed information concerning fifty frontier ranches in twenty seven counties of the Texas Panhandle, from 1876-1887, is colorfully related, making it a classic in its field. Pages 71-74 sparks special interest for me since it concerns the following topics: "Old Clarendon Saint's Roost"; "Methodist Immigration"; "Construction of the Town"; "Donley County Organized"; "Old Clarendon Moves to New Clarendon, 1887"; and "Good-bye to Saint's Roost". Photographs and names of frontier Clarendon citizens are included in this article.

Have you ever thought of Ghosts of the Old West? Probably not as much as Earl Murray who authored a book with that exact title. "Phantoms of Fort Laramie"; "Lost Trail Hotel"; "Ghosts in the Sheridn Inn"; "Mysteries of Old Garnet"; "Secret of the Desert"; and "Snake People" are only a few of the intriguing chapter titles in Mr. Murray's astonishing book.

Adventures With A Texas Naturalist by Roy Bedichek reveals fascinating information concerning the golden eagle and folk naming of other birds and flowers. What's a cedar cutter? Does a Mockingbird mock? Answers to these and many other questions make this book a favorite of Texas nature lovers.

Fredrick W. Rathjen's personal association with our area is demonstrated through his excellent regional study entitled Texas Panhandle Frontier.

Vary rare books are another item offered in our city library, and will be separately acknowledged in a future column. However, one of the rare books is appropriately mentioned now because it is a part of the "Texas Collection". Laura V. Hamner's The No-Gun Man Of Texas revolves around the picturesque life of Charles Goodnight. Since it is a 1935 adoption, and considered "rare", it may not be checked out, but can easily be enjoyed in the library by adults and other readers as young as fifth grade. In fact, it would be beneficial to encourage boys and girls who were born and are growing up in this area to become acquainted with the origin of their land by reading this delightful book.

Hopefully, you will look for more "Texas Reviews" in future articles. In the meantime, why not "check it Out"?

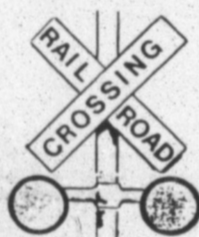

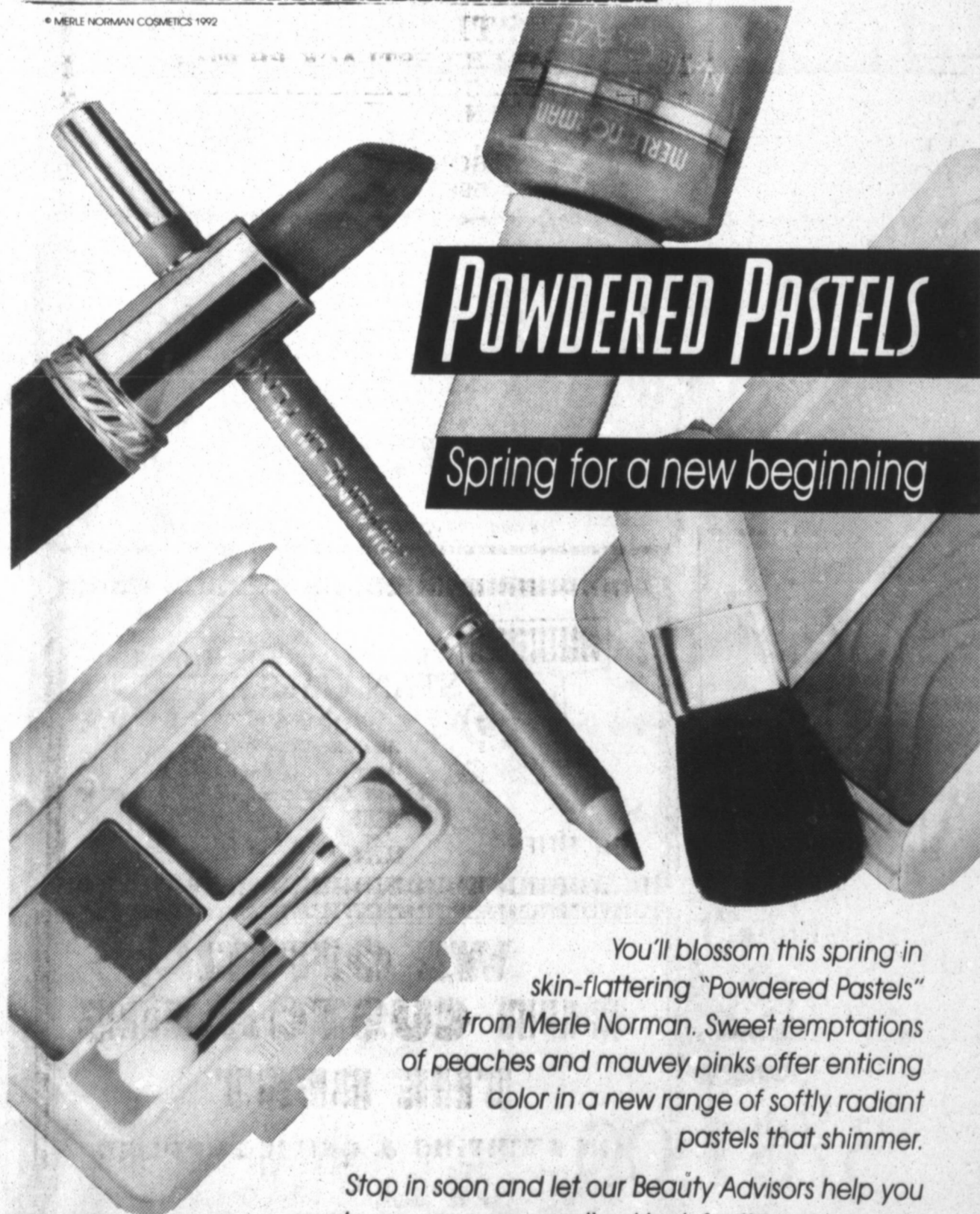

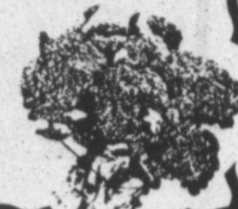
