## Farm Production and Diversification Seminar Set

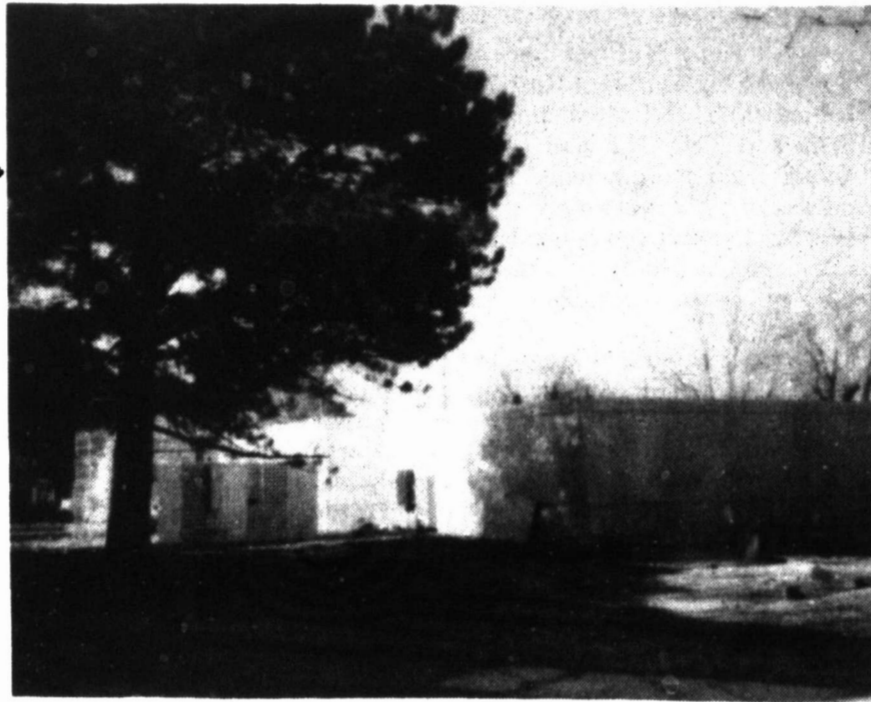
Carrots, sweet potatoes, cotton and peanut production will be some of the topics to be discussed at the upcoming Donley County Farm Production and Diversification Seminar. The seminar is set for January 24, 1992, and will be held at the Bairfield Activity Center at Clarendon College. Registration begins at 8:00 a.m. and the programs will start at 8:25 a.m.

The morning session will include information on record keeping requirements for private applicators, conservation compliance, changes in commercial drivers license laws, early season cotton insect control and peanut insect control, soil testing and environmentally sound fertilizer practices, and a demonstration of PowerUp Lubricants. A free catered meal will follow for seminar participants, sponsored by PowerUp Lubricants - Ben Burney. Also, private applicators will receive two (2) Continuing Education Units (CEU's) for attending the morning session.

After lunch, starting at 1:00 p.m., the second session will begin with carrot production and its potential for Donley County by David Hutchins, field man for M & W Carrots out of Hereford. This will be followed by sweet potato production information given by Gale Newberry, producer from Portales, New Mexico.

At 3:00 p.m., the third session will start and will include information from Leon New and Dr. "Chip" Lee on peanut production and the outlook for the 1992 season.

The seminar is sponsored by the Donley and Hall County Extension Crops Committees. Farmers planning to attend should contact the Donley County Extension Office or the Paymaster Gin by Wednesday, January 22, at noon, so that they can get a head count for the meal.

## ASCS Announces Disaster Payment Program

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood, and other natural disasters in either 1990 and 1991.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater than 35 percent," said county ASCS official, Drew Thornberry. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent."

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13. The 1990-1991 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, and upland cotton; nonparticipating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugarcane; and all commercial nonprogram crops.

Mr. Thornberry said producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. He said that farmers will receive a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. "If a producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the county ASCS Office."

Mr. Thornberry explained that a producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same for the other. "However, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm."

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program may be obtained from the local ASCS Office.

## Burglars Hit Syd Blue's

Jimmy Thompson, Sheriff of Donley County, is heading up an investigation into the burglary of a Howardwick store.

Late Saturday night or early Sunday morning, one or more people broke a hole through the back wall of Syd Blue's. The burglars took about \$1,375 from at store as well as a .357 Dan Wesson pistol with a six-inch barrel. They also took

several cartons of cigarettes. The theft was discovered late Sunday morning.

Anyone who saw anything suspicious in the area, or who has information on the crime may call 874-3533. An investigation into the crime is continuing. Few crimes remain unsolved in Donley County for any length of time.

## Grant Received

The Clarendon College Foundation has received a \$10,000 grant from the M.K. Brown Foundation of Pampa to be applied toward the purchase of new equipment for the Biological Sciences laboratory at the Clarendon College Pampa Center. "This lab is essential for the educational training of students in our nursing program, as well as other students desiring biological science credit," said, Joe Kyle Reeve, Associate Dean of Pampa Center.

During the past four regular semesters, classes have averaged 20 students in Microbiology, 25 students in Anatomy and Physiology classes. Once equipped, the new \$50,000 laboratory will accommodate these students and provide necessary facilities for the latest lab procedures in safe learning environment.

"Clarendon College is dedicated to supplying its students with the quality education they deserve. In order for us to continue supplying the high quality education to students in the Biological Sciences, we must take the necessary steps to improve our laboratory environments," said Dr. Jerry Stockton, President of Clarendon College. "Because we have no tax base to provide funds in Pampa, we must depend on private funds and foundation interests in Pampa to complete the funding to this project. We are pleased with the community's interest and support of the Clarendon College Pampa Center."

## Fire Prevention Workshops Scheduled

The Texas Forest Service and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission are co-sponsoring a series of fire prevention workshops aimed at helping local community leaders and fire departments develop a community awareness of the danger that will develop in early spring due to grass-fires. Their goal is to reduce the number of fires and the amount of lost property experienced each year in many of the local communities.

Each workshop will consist of a two-hour presentation. The first part deals with the problems associated with fire hazards and specific steps both homeowners and ranchers can take to protect their property. The second hour is aimed at developing a prevention plan followed by a distribution of free prevention materials for those in attendance.

City and County Officials, homeowners, ranchers, firemen, and any other individuals involved with fire prevention activities will benefit from attending one or more of the workshops. As an additional incentive, all participating firemen will receive two hours of certification credit in fire prevention.

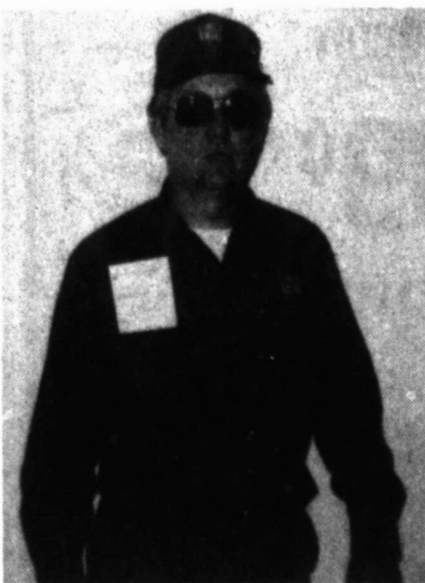

- Current monthly income for 1992 (such as direct deposit slips from the bank, award letter from Social Security, etc.) is what is needed to qualify.

Remember, the lines will be shorter and things go so much better if you come in **before February Commodity day**.



**Glaucoma Therapy is Lifelong**

Glaucoma is an eye condition in which there is increased pressure within the eyeball. The pressure results from the fluids that bathe the eye. The normal circulation and drainage of these fluids is disrupted in some manner. Although glaucoma may progress without the person noticing any changes, early symptoms may include foggy or blurred vision, difficulty in adjusting to brightness and darkness, and slight pain in or around the eye, often only on one side. If left untreated, glaucoma can lead to partial or complete blindness.

Most glaucoma cannot be corrected surgically and requires lifelong therapy with a variety of prescription medicines. Commonly used glaucoma medicines include *pilocarpine*, *timolol*, *epinephrine*, *echothiophate*, and *acetazolamide*. Most medicines are placed directly into the eye as drops. Oral medicines may be prescribed for use along with the drops.

Glaucoma medicines work by one of two mechanisms. Some agents increase the rate of *removal* of fluid from within the eye. These medicines tend to cause constriction of the eye pupil, a side effect that can impair night vision. The other mechanism is through a reduction in the rate of *production* of eye fluid. Many persons must use both types of medicines.

## CAR CARE CORNER



Motorists wanting to enjoy care-free driving and good mileage this summer should heed some simple advice from leading car maintenance experts.



First, check under the hood to see if cold temperatures have caused hoses and belts to become cracked and crumbly. Even if they look all right, it's best to change them every three years.

Next, make sure your radiator and the overflow tank next to it are filled with a fresh 50/50 mixture of water and antifreeze coolant. A premium product such as Zerex® antifreeze coolant helps to prevent overheating as well as corrosion.

Oil should be changed every three to four months, regardless of how far you have driven the car. In warmer weather, heavier weight oil like 10W30 is recommended for extra engine protection and lubrication.

Winter also puts a particularly heavy load on a car's electrical system, so the battery and alternator should be tested, especially if they are more than two years old.

Finally, remember that warmer temperatures expand the air inside your tires. Overinflated tires wear unevenly and can be a hazard. Underinflation is equally bad, causing drag and reducing the number of miles your car gets to the gallon.

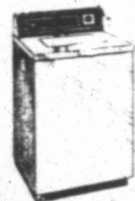

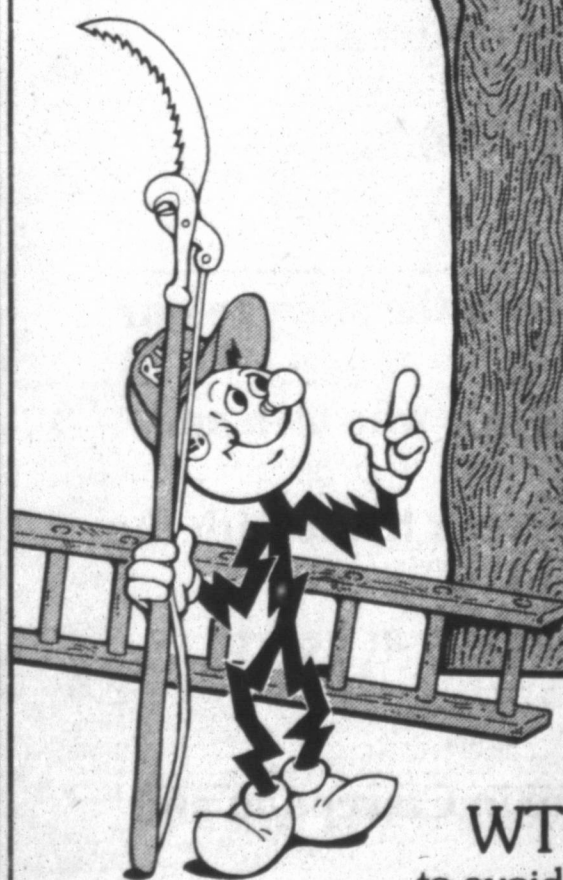

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine™ Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

Here's a real spicer-upper for your supper! Pepper rice tastes great and is very quick and easy to prepare--the whole thing takes just 15 minutes, and that includes the time it takes to chop up the peppers!

**Pepper Rice**

- 2 teaspoons vegetable oil
- 1/1 teaspoon hot chili oil
- 1/2 cup diced red pepper
- 1/2 cup diced yellow pepper
- 1/2 cup diced green pepper
- 2 to 3 cloves minced fresh garlic

- 3 cups cooked rice
- 1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt

Heat oils in large skillet; add peppers and garlic. Cook until tender. Stir in rice and salt. Cook 3 minutes, stirring constantly, until thoroughly heated. Makes 6 servings.

**Microwave Oven Instructions**

Combine oils, peppers, and garlic in 2-quart microproof baking dish. Cook on HIGH 2 to 3 minutes. Add rice and salt; cook on HIGH 2 to 3 minutes or until rice is thoroughly heated.

Each serving provides 164 calories, 3.2 g. protein, 2.7 g. fat, 31.1 g. carbohydrate, 1.1 g. dietary fiber, 588 mg. sodium, and 0 mg. cholesterol.

Tip: Use lemon juice or toothpaste to remove garlic odor from hands after mincing.

Social Security News

Working Social Security Beneficiaries Should Check Annual Reporting Requirements

If you work and receive Social Security benefits, take a look now at your final 1991 pay slips or your W-2 forms. If your 1991 earnings are over Social Security's annual limits, you will need to report them to Social Security.

The 1991 earnings limits are \$9,720 for beneficiaries who are age 65 through 69 and \$7,080 for beneficiaries who are under 65. The earnings limits do not apply to people who are 70 and over the entire year.

We used your estimate of 1991 earnings submitted you applied for benefits (or when you filed last year's earnings report) to figure out the Social Security benefits you would be paid in 1991. The purpose of this year's annual report is to enable us to compare your actual earnings to your estimate to see if you have been overpaid or underpaid. If you were underpaid, you will get a check for the additional benefits. If you were overpaid, we usually deduct the overpayment amount from your future benefits, unless you prefer to make a refund.

In addition, the report must also include an estimate of the earnings you expect to make in 1992. Again, your benefit check will be adjusted to reflect any excess earnings anticipated.

If your records show that you expected to have earnings over the 1991 limits, we will send you an Annual Report of Earnings form in the mail automatically. If you do not receive a report form by the end of February, you can call our toll-free number to have one sent to you. Instead of filling out the form, you can give us your earnings report over the phone if you choose.

You must return the earnings report to us by April 15. There is a substantial penalty for not filing an annual report of earnings on time. You can be penalized up to 1 full month's benefits for nonfiling, and also be required to repay any overpayment.

Filing a Federal income tax return does not take the place of filing an annual report with Social Security. Note that the 1992 earnings limits are \$7,440 for beneficiaries under 65 and \$10,200 for beneficiaries who are 65-69.

To file an earnings report or get more information, call Social Security toll-free at 1-800-772-1213.

Wrong Address For Social Security Beneficiaries May Stop Checks

Social Security beneficiaries who have not notified Social Security of a change of address risk having their checks stopped. It is not enough to report your address to the post office; you must report it to Social Security also. If you're receiving Social Security checks by mail, you must report it to us directly.

It is particularly important for direct deposit beneficiaries to also give us their benefits deposited directly to a bank account, they often forget to notify Social Security promptly of their new address. If we try to reach them about their benefits and are unable to do so, we may have to suspend benefits until we get a current address and validate it with the beneficiary.

Social Security will be sending out year end benefit statements (Form 1099) in January indicating the amount of benefits paid in 1991. If the Form 1099 is returned to Social Security by the Post Office, a process will begin which could result in benefits being suspended, unless we can locate you.

First, Social Security will check its records to see if a new address has been reported since the mailing. If so, the statements will be mailed a second time. If it is returned again and direct deposit is involved, the financial institution

where the check is sent will be contacted for a current address. (This is permissible under the "Right to Financial Privacy Act"). If the financial institution cannot, or will not, provide the address, the phone company and the post office will be contacted. If all else fails, a letter will be sent to the last known address of the direct depositor and benefits will be suspended until the beneficiary contacts the agency and provides his or her current address.

So, if you have moved recently and not notified Social Security, now is the time to do it.

Selective Service News

Young men who will turn 26 in 1992 will be reaching an important milestone, according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on January 1, 1992, men who were born in 1966 and were required to register with the Selective Service in 1984 will be turning 26 and no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstated. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service officials warn that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain programs such as federal student aid, job training, and most federal employment in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon. Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment, and permission to practice law.

Men ages 18 through 25, who

have not registered, can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of eligibility by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison, or both.

A man is exempt from registering while he is on full-time active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces. Cadets and midshipmen at the services academy are also included in the exemption. Members of the National Guard and Reserve Forces not on full-time duty must register unless they have reached age 26 or already registered.

Lawfully admitted nonimmigrant aliens (for example, those on visitor or student visas and members of diplomatic or trade missions and their families) are not required to register. Parolee and refugees who are aliens residing in this country must register.

Those who are unable to register due to circumstances

beyond their control, for example, those who are hospitalized, institutionalized or incarcerated, do not have to register until they are released. After release, they have 30 days in which to register. Handicapped men who live at home must register if they are reasonably able to leave the home and go into a public place. A friend or relative may help a handicapped man fill out the form if he is unable to do so by himself.

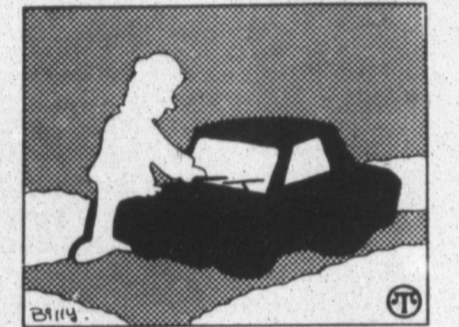

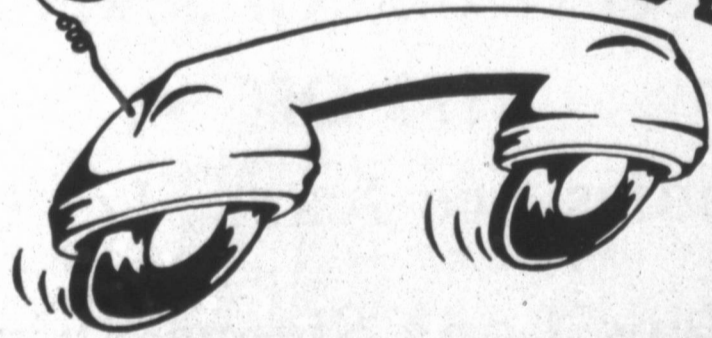


