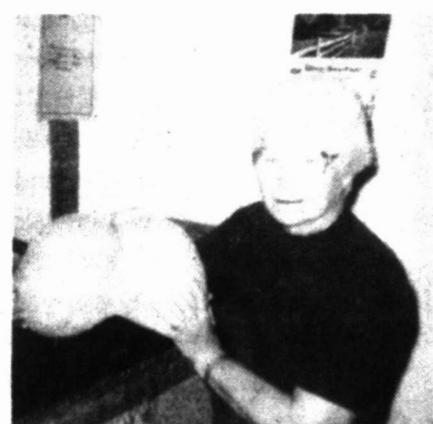

## Investigate Before You Invest

From time to time various peddlers come to Clarendon hawking all kinds of products or services. Some are legitimate. Some are not.

One of the most common commodities offered by wandering salespeople is insurance. And there are ways to investigate to see if an insurance policy is likely to be good coverage.

First, check with a local insurance agent. Most agents will be glad to examine a policy for you. And he often can give equal coverage at a lower rate. Your local agent will be here when you need him.

Second, check with the State Board of Insurance in Austin. That agency can give you the number of complaints registered against companies and the size of the company. A company with several hundred complaints on only a few thousand policies might not appear as attractive as one with a few dozen complaints but with hundreds of thousands of dollars of enforce policies.

According to the Texas Insurance Code [Article 3.70-2, sec. A paragraph 8] a person who buys insurance is entitled to a period of examination during which he can cancel without penalty. A buyer is entitled to review the policy and return it within ten days of receipt and receive a return premium.

Some travelling salespeople have legitimate goods. Others may pay only for accidents suffered on February 29th of odd numbered years. *Caveat emptor!* (Buyer Be Ware).

## Commissioners Meat-Ax Library

As a result of County budget cuts, the Clarendon/Donley County Library may be forced to close much of the time and to make drastic cuts in the services offered to patrons.

Among the services that may be cut are reference question services. Questions that the local staff cannot answer can now be referred to the Texas Panhandle Library System. That will probably not be possible after the controversial budget cuts. Patrons will not be able to find a wiring diagram for a 1965 Dodge truck or the latest bulletin from A&M on cattle vaccination.

The handicapped are likely to be especially hindered by the new budget. Large print books will probably not longer be available, and talking books would also be ended.

Adult patrons would lose the rental service by which hundreds of best sellers are available to local patrons. Farmers and ranchers would lose the current access to *Agricola* the computerized index that lists virtually every significant article on every ag-related topic. Once a significant book or article is located, it can now be imported to Clarendon through interlibrary loan. That service too, is in jeopardy.

The county's children will lose storytimes, which has done a great deal to interest children in reading. The library has traditionally offered awards to children for reading. Those incentives will probably have to be cut, too.

Details of the cuts were not available at press time, but the Panhandle Library System had scheduled a meeting at City Hall for 5:15 Tuesday afternoon. More complete information should be available at that time.

By law, the subsidized services offered to Clarendon/Donley County are contingent upon the local governments providing adequate funding. That requirement was made to prevent local governments from shirking their responsibilities and shifting the burden to state/federal funding.

The County Commissioners appear determined to cut funding for the library from the actual 1990 level support to the figure budgeted several years ago. Because of inflation that would mean estimated cut of 27 per cent in actual purchasing power for utilities, janitorial work and other expenses. Those cuts in turn will apparently result in expulsion from the Texas Panhandle Library System.

The library has traditionally been a source of pride for Donley County residents. The library is one of the best for a county of this size.

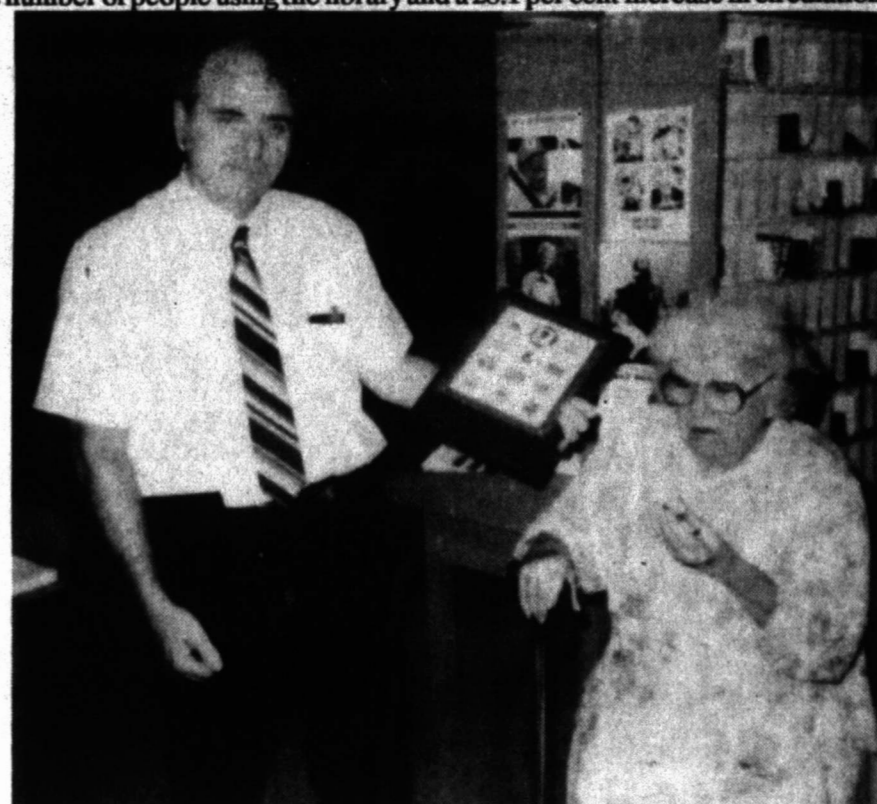
That quality is reflected in the library's use. There were over 14,838 patron visits last year, equivalent to 3.5 times the population of the county. Since 1985, circulation has increased by 45 per cent. In the last two years, there has been a 20.6 per cent increase in the number of people using the library and a 28.1 per cent increase in circulation.

## "What If the Ambulance Can't Find You?"

As of the first day of September, emergencies in Clarendon will be reported by phoning 911. That number will eventually be the standard emergency number throughout the United States. But what good will it do to call the ambulance or fire department if emergency personnel cannot find your house?

The city of Clarendon has started putting up new street signs. These are essential for rational, orderly operation of emergency services and will benefit every citizen, as well. But such signs will do little good without house numbers on each house. And most Clarendon residences lack such numbers.

It may not be easy to "get around to" putting up numbers. But the five or ten-dollar investment in time and the thirty-minute investment in time could be worth a great deal. And failure to do so might well cost the life of a loved one.

Rural residents do not have street signs, since most rural roads are not marked. But rural residences can fill out an information card giving directions for emergency crews. Like house numbers, the cards may as important as life or death in the event of an emergency. The card will be entered on a computer and will be instantly available to dispatchers as soon as an emergency is reported. Cards are available at *The Clarendon News* or the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Emergency personnel urge rural residents to get the cards filled out and turned in. "Don't wait until someone is thrown from a horse or the barn is on fire! It takes a day or two for mail and then it must be entered into the computer."

EMS personnel also remind area citizens not to move the injured. "Cover the person with a blanket and try to keep them calm, but don't move them," said Phil Vargas, Clarendon EMT. "If you move an injured person without adequate equipment and training, you may do more injury than suffered in the accident. Moving injured people often results in paralysis, and could actually cause death."

## Funding Available

Funding to help pay for child care, transportation and tutoring is available this year for qualifying vocational students at Clarendon College.

Clarendon College has been awarded a \$97,546 grant for the 1991-92 school year from the Texas Higher Education Coordination Board. The purpose of the grant is to assist student's meeting certain criteria to enter and complete courses in any of Clarendon's vocational programs.

Clarendon College offers associate degrees or certificates in Ranch and Feedlot Operations, Licensed Vocational Nursing, Secretarial Science, Electronic and Cosmetology.

Forms of assistance these Perkins funds may provide are vocational interest and aptitude assessments, special counseling, assistance for students with limited English proficiency such as translation and study groups, basic life skills training, assistance with college admission forms, child care, transportation costs and tutoring.

The funds may be used by students who are academically or economically disadvantaged, who are handicapped, who have limited English speaking and learning abilities, or who are studying for a career where jobs are usually held by members of the opposite sex.

The grant was made available through the federal Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Applied Technology Education Act.

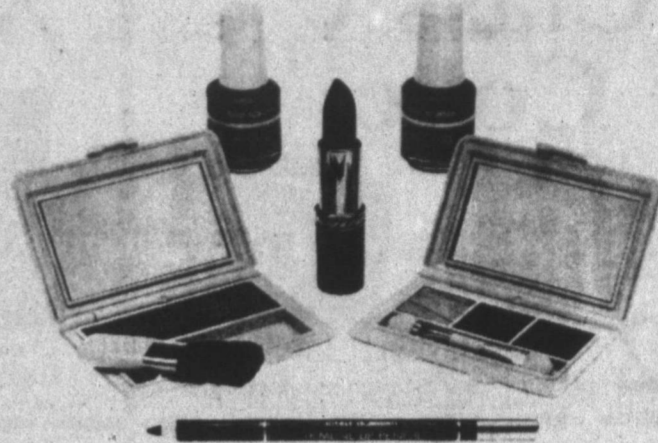

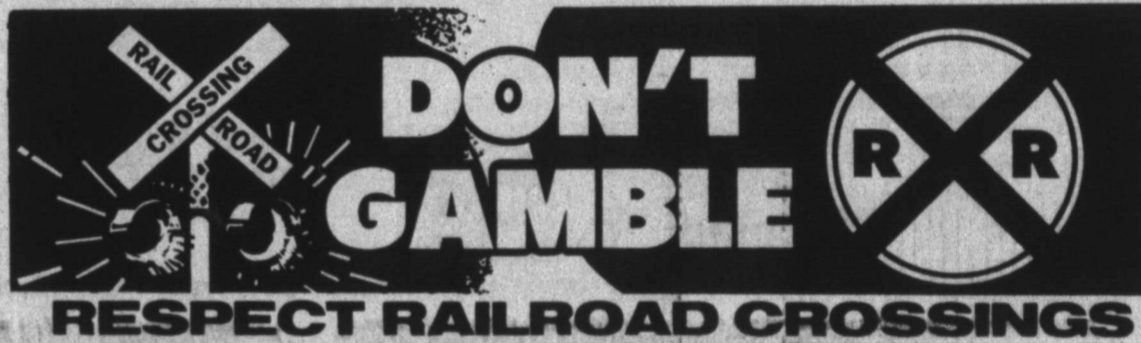

### Is Chronic Fatigue Syndrome a Disease?

Within the last few years, a condition referred to as "chronic fatigue syndrome" has been described in the medical literature. According to recent articles, there is debate as to whether or not this is a disease. The debate revolves around its cause, how to diagnose it, and how it should be treated. On one side are experts who claim that the condition may not exist at all. An equal number of experts seem to point to a health problem with sudden onset in previously otherwise healthy individuals. According to these experts, people of all ages, occupations, and income are affected, with women experiencing the condition more often than men or children.

It is speculated that some type of virus causes the victim to become very tired. Bed rest may not help. The fatigue may be so severe as to cause the person's normal activity level to be less than half of what it was for the previous six months. There may be mild fever, sore throat, muscle weakness, joint pain, and sleep disturbances. One of the most common symptoms of chronic fatigue syndrome is mental depression. Treatment of chronic fatigue syndrome varies with symptoms. Prescription antidepressant medicines have helped a number of individuals. Other treatments may become apparent as we learn more about this interesting, yet poorly described condition.

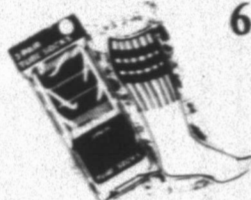



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### Clarendon and Hedley Schools Announce Lunch Fees

Clarendon and Hedley Schools have recently announced their policies for free and reduced price lunches. These are provided for children who are unable to pay the full price for meals under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Program. Both Schools have copies of the policy, which may be reviewed by anyone who is interested. Copies of the form are available at the schools for anyone who needs one.

Applicants must provide the following information so that school officials may determine eligibility: the names of all household members, social security number of the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application, total household income or the household's food stamp case number (if the household is receiving food stamps). The form must also have the signature of an adult member of the household, certifying that the information is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

The School districts receive additional funding from the state and federal sources for each child receiving free or reduced lunches.

Income must be at or below specified levels to qualify. Household size and income criteria are as follows:

### Public Notice

On July 22, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for approval of two new optional services, Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement. Exchange Connection Service will permit a customer of the Telephone Company to provide voice messaging service, telephone answering service, or other services to itself or to patrons of the customer. Customer Alerting Enablement will permit residence and business lines to receive an alerting tone (intermittent dial tone) transmitted by an Exchange Connection Service customer. The proposed effective date for this offering is September 23, and will be available statewide where facilities permit.

The calling party's telephone number and other originating network call information will be delivered to the Exchange Connection Service customer when the calling number and the called number are served by the same switch. Additionally, the caller's telephone number and other originating network call information may be recorded and stored by the Exchange Connection Service customer. Customers may be able to identify the caller before the call is answered. All Exchange Connection Service customers will be required to sign a non-disclosure agreement prior to being provided service. In the agreement the customer agrees not to disclose the calling party's telephone number unless the customer has written permission from the calling party.

The Telephone Company estimates these new services will increase its annual revenues during the first year by approximately \$1.2 million. Providers of voice messaging service and telephone answering services and their subscribers are the types of customers likely to be affected by approval of these services.

Exchange Connection Service is provided to customers in two parts: Local Serving Arrangement, which provides access to the exchange network; and Optional Service Features. The proposed rates, for both Exchange Connection Service and Customer Alerting Enablement, including installation charges, are as follows:

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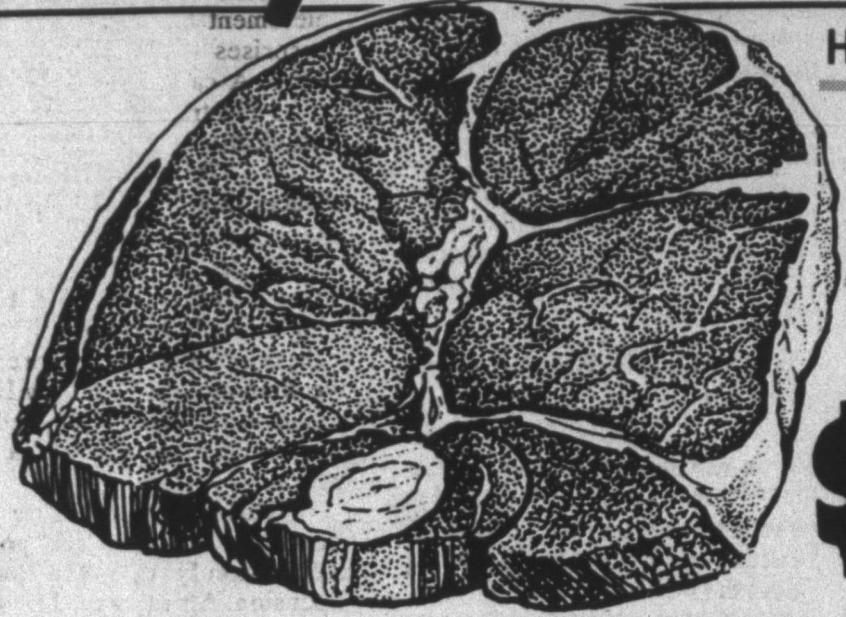

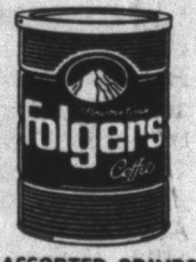

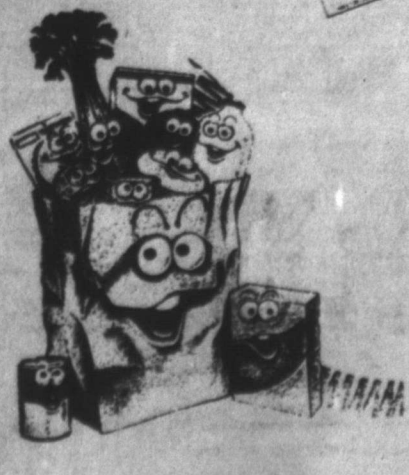

#### Get the Most From Your Ranch

Are you a successful rancher? Are you getting all out of the ranch you would like? Does the ranch support you or do you support the ranch?

Due to unique ranch resources, personal goals, experiences and environmental conditions, ranching is many things to many people. What works on one ranch may not work for the ranch across the road.

Many successful ranchers have developed goals, plans for meeting those goals, evaluation procedures for each alternative, and ways to monitor progress. The Total Ranch Management Program, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, incorporates that process to teach an approach for managing ranch resources.

The next Total Ranch Management workshop is September 10-13 and 17-20 at Towle Memorial Park in Snyder. This is the first workshop offered in the Texas South Plains.

"The workshop has been extremely successful," said Dr. Tom Troxel, extension livestock

specialist and TRM instructor.

"Ranchers who have participated have made management changes that were positive steps in achieving ranch goals. They now feel that they are now in control of their ranch rather than the ranch being in control of them," Troxel said.

TRM emphasizes goal achievement through selection of enterprises and day to day activities. A case ranch example is used to illustrate this process and its application.

The TRM approach teaches ranchers how to manage and use resources for best total ranch benefits; determine the best alternatives, enterprises and technological tools for achieving ranch goals; organize the ranch for effective management; and evaluate management decisions to reduce risk and increase their chance of success.

"This course forces its participants to set some real goals," said Preston Faris, Sutton County Extension Agent, who has seen more than 20 ranchers in his county go through the course.

"It opens their eyes to the necessity of making ranching a business."

The workshop consists of eight days of instruction and two field trips.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service honored the TRM team with the 1990 Unit Award for Superior Service. This is the highest award given by the extension service.

Registration is limited to 30 participants to allow one-on-one assistance. Registration for the first participant from a ranch is \$300; each additional ranch participant attending the same workshop pays \$150.

### Check Cotton Closely

Worm moth activity increased dramatically this past week which would indicate that many fields in Donley County will have received an egg lay and subsequent hatch this week. Worms will likely be one to five days old and somewhat hard to find. Cotton producers should be checking fields very closely to determine worm populations.

Fields that have 6,000 to 9,000 worms per acre should be considered candidates for spraying. To determine the number of worms per acre, check a row of plants 13 feet, 1 inch long and count all bollworms found in that distance. For each worm found there are approximately 1,000 worms. This should be done in at least three to four places across the field and then averaged. Small worms will likely be found in the mid to lower part of the plant in bolls and flowers. Early treatment will be the most efficient and economical.

Aphids continue to be present in nearly all cotton fields in the county. As temperatures go up and fields are treated for bollworms, special attention should be taken to watch aphid infestations even though limited success of control has been seen in the south plains area.

### School Rule Reported

In 1982, Congress enacted a bill referred to as the "Asbestos-in-Schools-Rule" which required school officials to inspect all school buildings for materials containing friable asbestos. The term "friable" means a material that can be hand pressure be crushed easily to a powder. The Asbestos-in-Schools-Rule also required that the public be notified of the inspection results.

On October 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHRA), regarding the inspection of all public and private school buildings for

materials containing asbestos. AHRA also covers the description and circumstances of appropriate response actions and implementation of appropriate response actions with periodic and surveillance. One requirement was that Management Plans were to be written and submitted to the Governor for approval no later than October 12, 1988.

On January 25, 1988, Congress passes an amendment to AHRA which allowed school officials to request an extension of the October 12, 1988 deadline. The amendment allowed the deadline to be extended to May 9, 1989 for submission of a Management Plan for approval. Upon approval, the school must begin implementation of the Management Plan by July 9, 1989.

Inspections of the building in the Clarendon School District were performed on July 19, 1988, and December 9, 1988. The inspection report was finished and sent to the Texas School Services Foundation for a Management Plan to be written. On October 12, 1988, a request for extension was submitted and subsequently approved. An approval from the State Department of Health was issued on March 13, 1990 for our Management Plan. This plan is on file in the Administration Office.

Lab results from the state indicated that the ceiling and floor tile in the classroom area contain small quantities of asbestos, less than two percent. Results also showed that the boilers and hot water tank area are insulated with materials containing a high level of asbestos. However, this area is accessible only to trained maintenance workers.

The Clarendon CISD has a trained person to assist the school in meeting AHRA regulations, and the school district is making every effort to fully comply with such regulations.

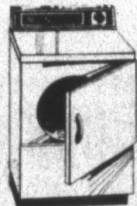
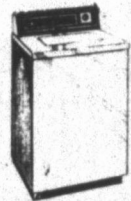
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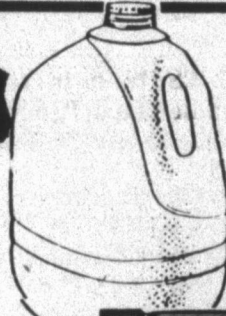


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### Thunder Junction Meeting Changed

An update meeting on the proposed Thunder Junction park, scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday (August 22), will be held in the cafeteria at Clarendon College instead of Bairfield Coliseum, as previously announced, according to Bright Newhouse, president of the corporation board. The public is invited to attend.

Location for the meeting, sponsored by Yesterday's Children and the Thunder Junction board, had to be changed due to a construction delay on the coliseum, Newhouse said.

Newhouse, along with Pat Kaiser, president of Yesterday's Children, will give a progress report on the status of the park and information about how area residents can help. Several artistic renderings showing preliminary plans for the park will be on display, Kaiser said.

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### Beneficiaries Reminded To Update Earnings Report

Social Security beneficiaries can work and still receive all their benefit checks up to an annual earnings limit. However, when earnings go over the limit, a portion of the check may be withheld, according to Jim Talbot, District Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office. The amount withheld depends on the age of the beneficiary.

Social Security beneficiaries who are under 65 can earn up to \$7,080 and get all their benefit checks. If earnings go over that limit, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 in earnings. Beneficiaries who are 65-69 can earn up to \$9,720 and still get all their checks. If earnings are over the amount, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$3 in earnings. Beneficiaries who are 70 and older are not subject to the annual earnings limits. And different rules apply to people who get disability benefits and go to work.

Questionnaires go out this month to about 1 million working Social Security beneficiaries nationwide asking them to update their earnings information on Social Security's records. The purpose of the questionnaire is to get current earnings estimates in order to prevent overpayment due to work.

The questionnaires sent this month ask for estimated 1991 earnings. Beneficiaries who earn over the exempt amount and receive some benefits are required by law to file an Annual Report of Earnings by April 15th of the year after the year in which they earned over the exempt amount. A penalty can be imposed for failure to file this report on time.

The questionnaires are sent out each year to beneficiaries who earlier estimated that they would earn over the exempt amount during the current year and those who earned over the exempt amount the past year. Some beneficiaries receive questionnaires even though they haven't provided a current year estimate.

SSA officials have estimated that similar reminders sent in the past 2 years have saved the Social Security trust funds as much as \$55.9 million. While most of the overpayment that were prevented would have been detected eventually, officials estimate a saving of almost 11 cents in interest and administrative costs for every dollar in overpayment avoided.
