Theme Park Coming to Clarendon

Yesterday's Children announced Friday that they will open a new theme park at Greenbelt Lake, near the site of Old Clarendon. The announcement was made by board president Pat Kaiser.

"Investment funds offered by private sources and community support for the project were instrumental in the decision to locate the park in Donley County," Kaiser said. The proposed site is about eight miles south of Interstate 40 near Highways 287 and 70.

"The Clarendon community has expressed a great deal of interest and support in having the park," Kaiser said. "We are impressed by the hardworking, friendly people there and their community pride and spirit."

Plans for the park, to be called Thunder Junction, are to create an authentic turn-of-the-century Western town, with workers dresses in period costumes and engaged in live demonstrations of the crafts, industries and activities typical of Panhandle life in the late 1800's and early 1900's. Crafts made at the site along with other Texas-made specialty items, including handmade quilts, art work, candy, leather goods and wood carvings, will be featured and available for sale.

A portion of the annual proceeds from the park will go into a trust fund to benefit senior citizen organizations throughout the Panhandle, said Kaiser, who is resource developer for the Panhandle Area Agency on Aging. Yesterday's Children, a non-profit corporation, is an outgrowth of efforts by PAAA to develop permanent sources of funding for senior citizen services in the future.

After touring the Clarendon area--with its rolling hills, lakes and trees, members of the developmental board of Yesterday's Children believe the Donley County location has potential for development into a quality recreational attraction to offer Panhandle, residents and travelers alike.

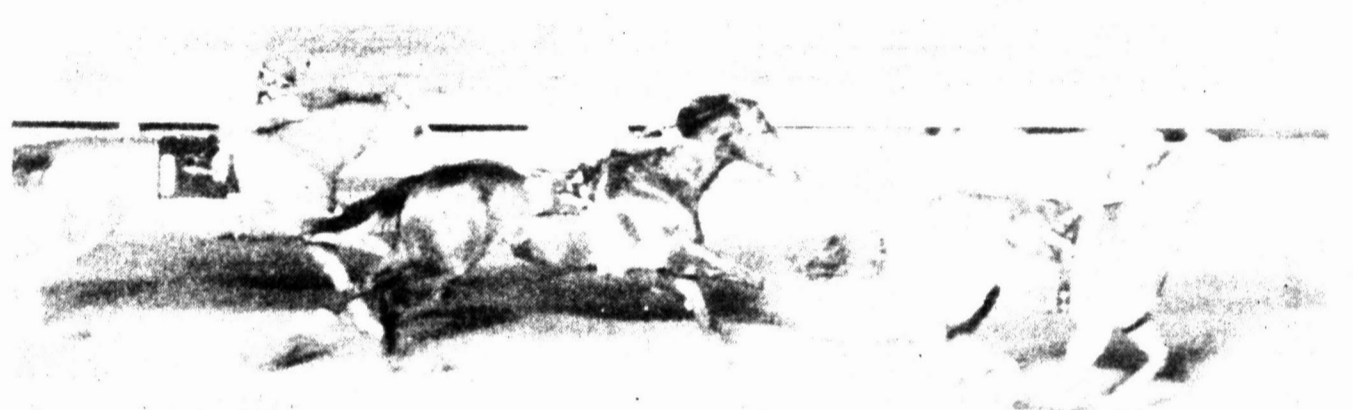
"Thunder Junction" will provide family-oriented, historical entertainment for all ages," Kaiser said. "As the oldest town in the Panhandle, Clarendon is an appropriate setting to showcase our Western heritage."

Now that this site is being considered, specific development plans can be designed, she said. With Greenbelt Lake already attracting 100,000 visitors annually, development of the park could take place in stages.

"We are now committed to a quality development, which takes time," Kaiser said, but with hard work, a good team of volunteers and the wonderful people of Donley County, our dream can be realized."

With tourism currently holding fourth place among revenue-

Tempered Glass Earns Victory

The even money favorite Tempered Glass cruised to her second straight stakes win when she posted a 1 1/4 length victory in the \$32,450.00 Lowell Dillingham Handicap, November 29, at Los Alamitos, California. Bruce Pilkenton rode Tempered Glass who captured the Breeders Sophomore Classic with an impressive win back on November 17.

Tempered Glass broke on the lead in the Dillingham and steadily drew clean under a hand ride to post the victory over Strawfly Special. Wicked Willa finished third in the field of eight 3 year olds with Serve N Notice checking home fourth.

Tempered Glass, a 3 year old Streakin Six filly, covered the 400 yards in a fast 19.67 seconds while earning her eighth lifetime win from only 15 starts.

Blane Schvaneveldt trains Tempered Glass for owners Janice Knorpp and Judy Neumayer who picked up the \$18,750 winner's share of the purse.

Runnerup Strawfly Special is trained by Marshall Ferrell and was ridden by Henry Garcia while Roman Figueroa rode Wicked Willa who also was saddled by Schvaneveldt.

The field in the Dillingham was reduced to eight when the stewards declared the longshot Will Of The Cat a non-starter when her gate failed to open properly.

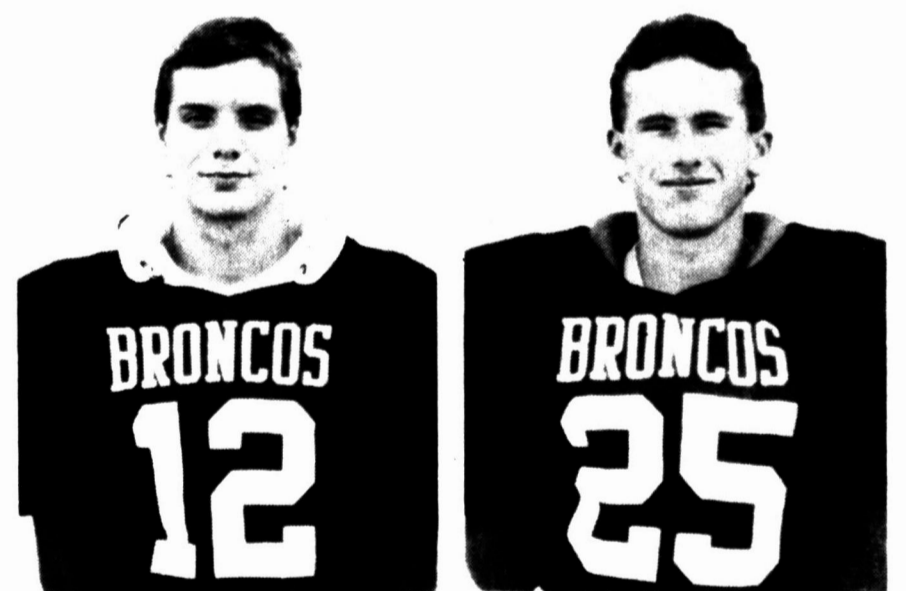
FBC Choir Presents Musical

Credit Spending May Bring Woes

Early Christmas shoppers bound for the cash registers are cautioned to take it easy on the plastic.

"Consumers who wait until the last minute often don't have the extra cash to buy gifts, so they use credit cards for just about everything," said Nancy Granovsky,

family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "In the months that follow, some will find themselves juggling bills and having serious problems, especially if they are already overextended."

Christmas is "a tempting time because people are not buying for themselves and they want to be more generous."

said Jay Muzychenko, vice president of the National Foundation for Consumer Credit in Silver Springs, Md. "We recommend that people use only one or two credit cards and keep invoices so they'll know what they're spending."

This method can also help credit clients who are rational spenders most of the year, but tend to overindulge during the holiday season, Granovsky said.

The credit foundation is affiliated with the non-profit Consumer Credit Counseling Services (CCCS), which help people learn money management and work out plans to pay off debts. National, over 300,000 families--an increase of 24 percent from last year--are receiving counseling from the 550 service centers, Muzychenko said. Families experiencing credit woes can find the nearest CCCS by calling the national referral line at 1-800-388-2227.

"Many people get caught up in post holiday blues because of poor planning," Granovsky said. "There are really two ways around

the holiday financial crunch--year-round gift purchasing to take advantage of sales and putting spending limits on gifts you buy and give."

The ideal time to start planning for Christmas is January of that year, Muzychenko said. However, most people don't do that. Even starting in the summer is early enough, he said, and purchases are more likely to be made with cash.

"Since it's too late for year-round shopping, families can still make a list of individuals, gifts and amounts to spend to manage holiday money," Granovsky said.

Too often gift-giving for co-workers, friends and others is forgotten when families draw up their spending plans and monthly budgets, she said, and "this may be one reason many people charge presents to plastic."

"Be careful of easy lines of credit that offer no payments until February," Granovsky said. "If you can't pay the full bill that month, additional finance charges will mount up and you may be stuck paying for this Christmas most of next year."

producing industries in Texas and increasing interest in the Panhandle's Western heritage, the park is projected to be a strong drawing card for visitors and contribute to the expansions of the area's economy. Additional development and marketing of current and potential attractions throughout the region could have an even greater impact.

"We look forward to working with all interested groups in the area toward the goal of increased tourism, as well as increasing the funding available to meet the needs of senior citizens in the future," Kaiser said.

Medicines Relieve Peptic Ulcers

There are a variety of medicines used to treat peptic ulcers, lesions which form in the stomach and the first segment of the small intestine.

Neutralizing Agents: Calcium hydroxide and other antacid ingredients neutralize stomach acid and, in adequate doses, relieve pain and promote ulcer healing.

Special Antihistamines (H2 Blockers): These prescription medicines which include cimetidine, ranitidine, and nizatidine, reduce the amount of hydrochloric acid that is secreted into the stomach.

Coating Agents: Sucralfate is a nonabsorbable adhesive substance that binds to and protects damaged gastrointestinal tissues. Studies show that this substance provides protection equivalent to that provided by H2 blockers.

New Ulcer Medicines: The Food and Drug Administration has recently approved two new peptic ulcer medicines. Misoprostol controls the amount of stomach acid secreted and also helps replace substances in stomach tissue that are removed by nonsteroidal antiinflammatory medicines. Famotidine, a so-called "proton pump inhibitor," acts as a long-lasting inhibitor of stomach acid secretion.

Because Christians have been divided for hundreds of years, most of us are rather complacent about it today. After all, that is the only way that we have ever known thing to be.

Perhaps we are like children raised near a toxic waste dump, children who realize that the poison in their environment may kill them, but (because that is all they have ever known) they have become indifferent to the danger.

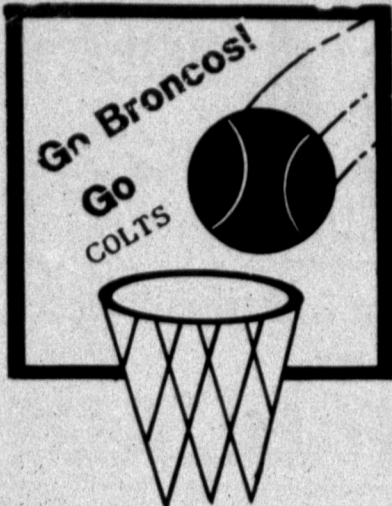
For the apostle Paul, the danger that is inherent in division is both real and alarming. There is an urgent tone in his first letter to Corinth "I appeal to you by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree with one another so that there may be no division among you ..." That is strong language. The phrase "in the name of" might well be translated "by the authority of". Only rarely does the apostle speak so forcefully, (1 Cor. 1:10).

In verse 12, he condemned the whole process of choosing heroes and forming parties. Throughout the remainder of that chapter, he contrasted the foolishness of humans with the wisdom of God. Paul was trying to strike directly at the pride that underlies factions, cliques and denominations.

We are accustomed to belonging to various denominations or "fellowships". Yet are not all such distinctions prohibited by the Scriptures in passages like 1 Corinthians 1:12 and following verses?

This ad offers no quick and easy solutions, no magic answers. But it makes this plea: "If you claim to be a Christian, look at the divided situation around us. Seek ways to recover the oneness that God desires. And, please, pray that the Lord will lead us past the divisions that separate believers from one another."

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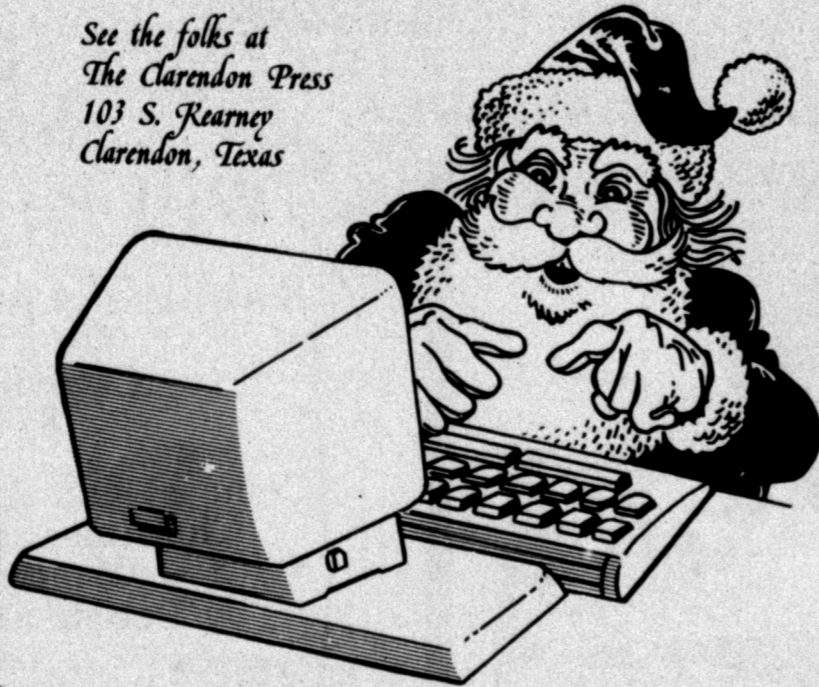
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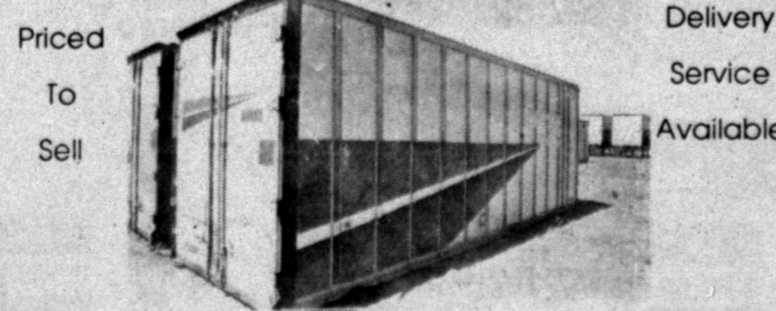
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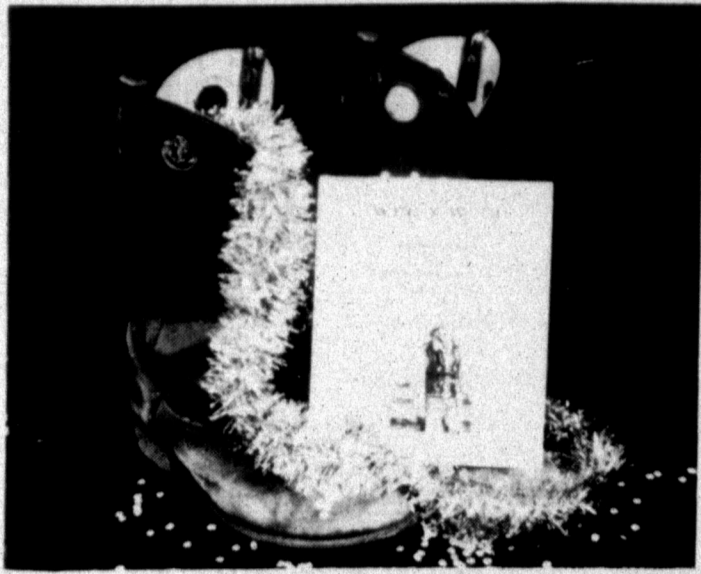

Book Review:

"My 50 Years In Western Swing" by Windy Wood

At long last the music fan can be treated to another book about Western Swing music and its stars. The prime star that this book covers is Windy Wood. However, also of tremendous interest to Western Swing fans is the mentioning of other Western Swing musicians and the bands that they played in during the 1950's. This book is primarily autobiographical, with some assistance from Jim Caviness. There is also a section of interesting input regarding their association with Windy and his music by people from all ends of the Western Swing music business.

This one hundred and seventy nine (179) page chronicle of this legendary West Texas bandleader is opened with a wonderful introduction and tribute by Dr. Charles R. Townsend, the biographer of a wonderful book on Bob Wills and probably the most knowledgeable person on the history of Western Swing music.

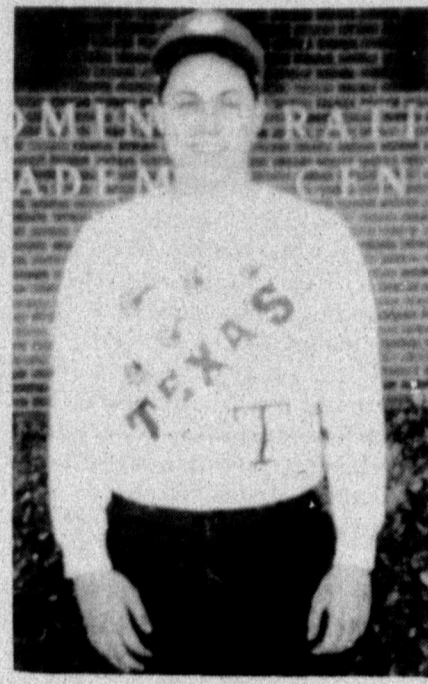
In addition to giving us an insight into Windy, his musicians and other legendary names in Western Swing music, this book helps define Western Swing music for those of us who need a further explanation to help understand this rare form of American music that lays heavily on both a love for Western music and American Jazz. The insight into Windy sketches briefly from day one until present but covers deeply Windy's years of musical involvement and his thoughts and ideas on life and the important things therein.

The book is full of rare and wonderful photographs of both Windy and other Western Swing legends and side personnel. These interesting photographs are in many instances accompanied by very worthwhile Windy Wood insights or a few informative words by these people themselves.

In addition to facts, photos and other wonderful bits from Western Swing history, Windy treats the reader to many philosophical words and some very good advice to those attempting to embark on a career in the music world. The book is closed out with an interesting and informative listing of all of Windy's commercial recordings.

This soft covered 7" by 8 1/2" book should be in the library of every Western Swing fan or any music fan desiring to learn more about Western Swing and one of its great bandleaders and patrons. It can be acquired, as can his recordings, direct from Windy at P.O. Box 546, Claude, Texas 79019, or can be purchased locally at The Print Shoppe, 116 S. Kearney, Clarendon, Texas 79226, next door to The Grocery Store, or you may call 874-2711.

Using a mulch in your flower garden may well be your most valuable garden practice. A good mulch can reduce erosion, suppress weeds, keep the soil moist and cool, and organic matter to the soil.

Mulches prevents loss of moisture from the soil by evaporation.

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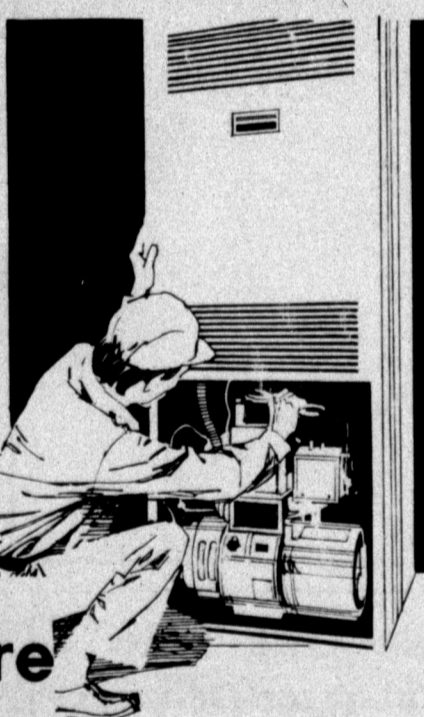
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Fishing Report

Watchdog, Sheepdog, or Mongrel?

Old Fang was a watchdog. He'd lived on the big sheep ranch for years. He knew where everyone and everything belonged, and made sure no one strayed from his place. No stranger ever appeared unannounced on the wide, shady porch of the big ranch house. Fang's snarls and growls kept visitors at the gate until they were properly invited by one of the rancher's family to proceed. Even some of the ranch hands would not approach the Big House without a family member's accompaniment.

Fang did his job. No varmint, human or otherwise, got near the house or the sheep unless Fang's master whistled him away from the interloper. Neither did the sheep forget "their place" when old Fang

was around. They dared not get near him. He wouldn't kill a sheep, but he certainly could scare them half to death.

Yes, Fang did his job well. He was needed, but he wasn't loved. Shep also lived on the ranch, a sheep dog if there ever was one. Just a glance at that intelligent, laughing face told one that Shep loved the sheep, loved his job, loved life. Look up there even now as he works the flock toward that mountain spring. See him? Look just to the west of that cluster of pines. See? Here, take my binoculars! Watch him herding, guiding, jumping. Hear that bark? It's like a child's joy-shriek as he wins the race. Is Shep working? You don't see any stray lambs, do you? Is Shep playing? Always!

"Lie down, Shep," one of the shepherds will occasionally say when the sheep are restless. The long muzzle and dangling tongue produce their characteristic "ha-ha," and Shep obeys instantly. With Shep lying among them, the flock knows that all is well, forgets its silly skittishness, and quickly settles down.

Ever know anyone like Fang in your church? So very correct, so very orthodox, so very cold! Someone who can tell you exactly what your church's doctrinal stance on any issue is. Someone who knows the proper procedure for absolutely any situation or circumstance. Someone you wouldn't ask to share your family picnic on a bet!

"Beware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves," Jesus said (Matthew 7:15). Let's not be too hard on Fang and his kind. In this frightening age when Satan makes utter horrors look and sound desirable, we need Fang and those like him to spot the fakes and keep us on the straight and narrow.

Got any Sheps in your church? I hope so. The peacemakers, the encouragers, those who spot when a brother is down, those whose laughing eyes make nonsense the babbling of the cynics who sneer at the idea of the Spirit's indwelling Presence--those are the Sheps. I hope you have huge litters of Sheps around you.

How do you serve your church? As a Fang? As a Shep? The two don't have to be mutually exclusive, you know.

Fang, go share your wisdom, your experience, with Shep, and let him give you a lift when, in

gratitude, he turns that loving, trusting, "ha-ha" face on you.

Shep, go tell that crusty old Fang (He won't bite you!) how much you appreciate his watchfulness, his determination that evildoers shall not invade your beautiful home. Tell him that you love him for his faithfulness. Go on--do it! Grouchy old Fang needs love, too!

Incidentally, there were lots of other dogs living on that big ranch--pets, lap dogs, bird dogs--but mainly just mongrels, not upsetting the ranch's routine, not contributing much--just part of the scene. Many were the times they could have helped Fang as he chased off a wolf or a big cat who came down from the rocky heights--but they didn't. Many were the nights they could have silently lain alongside Shep, easing the loneliness of his dark vigil--but they didn't.

How do you serve your church? Be a loving Fang. Be a learning Shep. Be a helpful mongrel. "...Till we all come in the unity of the faith...unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:13).

soil is not covered by mulch. Sun and wind can rob valuable moisture during the growing season.

Mulches add organic matter and also furnish food for earthworms, which are valuable in aerating the soil. The organic matter helps to keep the soil crumbly and easy to work. Farmers call this good tilth.

"To provide a source of mulch and to do something with those falling leaves, every gardener should have a compact bin, preferable two, for making compost from organic materials such as leaves," Said Donhoe.

Bins can be made by attaching ordinary wire fence or board to solid posts or open brickwork. Each bin should be 4 to 6 feet high, 3 to 5 feet wide, and any convenient length, and one side of each bin should be removable for convenience in building up the compost material and for taking it out. In late fall, a temporary piece of wire fence may be used to increase the height about 2 feet. After the material settles in March, the piece of fence can be removed.

"Many organic materials, such as autumn leaves, are rich in carbohydrates and low in nitrogen," said Donaho. "Usually, you will find it beneficial to add nitrogen fertilizer to the materials before applying it to mulch. One or Two cups of fertilizer high in nitrogen for each bushels of organic material is about right. To avoid burning the plants, do not let the fertilizer touch them."

The organic material should be moistened thoroughly when fertilizer is added to the bin. Some garden soil may be added to one of the bins, about 1 inch for every 6 to 12 inches of organic material.

Pack the material tightly around the edges, but only lightly in the center so the area settles more than the edges and water does not run off.
