# **Theme Park Coming to** Clarendon

Yesterday's Children announced Friday that they will open a new theme park at Greenbelt Lake, near the site of Old Clarendon. The announcement was made by board president Pat Kaiser.

"Investment funds offered by private sources and community support for the project were instrumental in the decision to locate the park in Donley County," Kaiser said. The proposed site is about eight miles south of Interstate 40 near Highways 287 and 70.

"The Clarendon community has expressed a great deal of interest and support in having the park," Kaiser said. "We are impressed by the hardworking, friendly people there and their community pride and spirit."

Plans for the park, to be called Thunder Junction, are to create an authentic turn-of-the-century Western town, with workers dresses in period costumes and engaged in live demonstrations of the crafts, industries and activities typical of Panhandle life in the late 1800's and early 1900's. Crafts made at the site along with other Texas-made specialty items, including handmade quilts, art work, candy, leather goods and wood carvings, will be featured and available for sale.

A portion of the annual proceeds from the park will go into a trust fund to benefit senior citizen organizations throughout the Panhandle, said Kaiser, who is resource developer for the Panhandle Area Agency on Aging. Yesterday's Children, a non- profit corporation, is an outgrowth of efforts by PAAA to develop permanent sources of funding for senior citizen services in the future.

After touring the Clarendon area--with its rolling hills, lakes and trees, members of the developmental board of Yesterday's Children believe the Donley County location has potential for development into a quality recreational attraction to offer Panhandle, residents and travelers alike.





Early Christmas shoppers bound for the cash registers are cautioned to take it easy on the plastic.

"Consumers who wait until the last minute often don't have the extra cash to buy gifts, so they use credit cards for just about everything," said Nancy Granovsky,

family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "In the months that follow, some will find themselves juggling bills and having serious. problems, especially if they are already overextended."

Christmas is "a tempting time because people are not buying for themselves and they want to be more generous,"

said Jay Muzychenko, vice president of the National Foundation for Consumer Credit in Silver Springs, Md. "We recommend that people use only one or two credit cards and keep invoices so they'll know what they're spending.'

This method can also help credit clients who are rational spenders most of the year, but tend to overindulge during the holiday season, Granovsky said.

The credit foundation is affiliated with the non-profit Consumer Credit Counseling Services (CCCS), which help people learn money management and work out plans to pay off debts. National, over 300,000 families,--an increase of 24 percent from last year--are receiving counseling from the 550 service centers, Muzychenko said. Families experiencing credit woes can find the nearest CCCS by calling the national referral line at 1-800-388-2227.

"Many people get caught up in post holiday blues because of poor planning," Granovsky said. "There are really two ways around

the holiday financial crunch---yearround gift purchasing to take advantage of sales and putting spending limits on gifts you buy and give."

The ideal time to start planning for Christmas is January of that year, Muzychenko said. However, most people don't do that. Even starting in the summer is early enough, he said, and purchases are more likely to made with cash.

"Since it's too late for yearround shopping, families can still make a list of individuals, gifts and amounts to spend to manage holiday money," Granovsky said.

Too often gift-giving for coworkers, friends and others is forgotten when families draw up their spending plans and monthly budgets, she said, and "this may be one reason many people charge presents to plastic."

"Be careful of easy lines of credit that offer no payments until February," Granovsky said. "If you can't pay the full bill that month, additional finance charges will mount up and you may be stuck paying for this Christmas most of next year."



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

# **Dying Comfortably**

Because Christians have been divided for hundreds of years, most of us are rather complacent about it today. After all, that is the only way that we have ever known thing to be.

Perhaps we are like children raised near a toxic waste dump, children who realize that the poison in their environment may kill them, but (because that is all they have ever known) they have become indifferent to the danger.

For the apostle Paul, the danger that is inherent in division is both real and alarming. There is an urgent tone in his first letter to Corinth "I appeal to you by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree with one another so that there may be no division among you ...." That is strong language. The phrase " in the name of" might well be translated "by the authority of". Only rarely does the apostle speak so forcefully, (I Cor. 1:10).

In verse 12, he condemned the whole process of choosing heroes and forming parties. Throughout the remainder of that chapter, he contrasted the foolishness of humans with the wisdom of God. Paul was trying to strike directly at the pride that underlies factions, cliques and denominations.


We are accustomed to belonging to various denominations or "fellowships". Yet are not all such distinctions prohibited by the Scriptures in passages like I Corinthians 1:12 and following verses?

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
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


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

# **Book Review:**

# "My 50 Years In Western Swing"by Windy Wood

At long last the music fan can be treated to another book about Western Swing music and its stars. The prime star that this book covers is Windy Wood. However, also of tremendous interest to Western Swing fans is the mentioning of other Western Swing musicians and the bands that they played in during the 1950's. This book is primarily autobiographical, with some assistance from Jim Caviness. There is also a section of interesting input regarding their association with Windy and his music by people from all ends of the Western Swing music business.

This one hundred and seventy nine (179) page chronicle of this legendary West Texas bandleader is opened with a wonderful introduction and tribute by Dr. Charles R. Townsend, the biographer of a wonderful book on Bob Wills and probably the most knowledgeable person on the history of Western Swing music.

In addition to giving us an insight into Windy, his musicians and other legendary names in Western Swing music, this book helps define Western Swing music for those of us who need a further explanation to help understand this rare form of American music that lays heavily on both a love for Western music and American Jazz. The insight into Windy sketches briefly from day one until present but covers deeply Windy's years of musical involvement and his thoughts and ideas on life and the important things therein.

The book is full of rare and wonderful photographs of both Windy and other Western Swing legends and side personnel. These interesting photographs are in many instances accompanied by very worthwhile Windy Wood insights or a few informative words by these people themselves.

In addition to facts, photos and other wonderful bits from Western Swing history, Windy treats the reader to many philosophical words and some very good advice to those attempting to embark on a career in the music world. The book is closed out with an interesting and informative listing of all of Windy's commercial recordings.

This soft covered 7" by 8 1/2" book should be in the library of every Western Swing fan or any music fan desiring to learn more about Western Swing and one of its great bandleaders and patrons. It can be acquired, as can his recordings, direct from Windy at P.O. Box 546, Claude, Texas 79019, or can be purchased locally at The Print Shoppe, 116 S. Kearney, Clarendon, Texas 79226. next door to The Grocery Store, or you may call 874-2711.

Jake Roberts played the guitar, Lawrence Heckman - Steel Guitar, Kenneth Sloan - Fiddle, Kermit Sloan - Bass, Ivan Jones - Piano, and Windy played Guitar and sang. For those that remember the Old Opera House, this book is a must.

soil is not covered by mulch. Sun and wind can rob valuable moisture during the growing season. Mulches add organic matter and also furnish food for

earthworms, which are valuable in aerating the soil. The organic matter helps to keep the soil crumbly and easy to work. Farmers call this good tilth.

"To provide a source of mulch and to do something with those falling leaves, every gardener should have a compact bin, preferable two, for making compost form organic materials such as leaves," Said Donhoe. Bins can be made by attaching

ordinary wire fence or board to solid posts or open brickwork. Each bin should be 4 to 6 feet high, 3 to 5 feet wide, and any convenient length. and one side of each bin should be removable for convenience in building up the compost material and for taking it out. In late fall, a temporary piece of wire fence may be used to increase the height about 2 feet. After the material settles in March, the piece of fence can

be removed.


### "Many organic materials, such as autumn leaves, are rich in carbohydrates and low in nitrogen," said Donaho. "Usually, you will find it beneficial to add nitrogen fertilizer to the materials before applying it to mulch. One or Two cups of fertilizer high in nitrogen for each bushels of organic material is about right. To avoid burning the plants, do not let the fertilizer touch hem."

The organic material should be moistened thoroughly when fertilizer is added to the bin. Some garden soil may be added to one of the bins, about 1 inch for every 6 to 12 inches of organic material.

Pack the material tightly around the edges, but only lightly in the center so the area settles more than the edges and water does not run off.






