Homeowners and Elderly Can Get Tax Relief

Charles SoRelle, Donley County Appraisal District, reminds taxpayers that there are options available that may reduce their school tax bill. Homeowners who have not already done so may apply for a **homestead exemption**. An exemption lowers the calculated taxable value of a home. For example, if a taxpayer's home is valued at \$50,000, the exemption would lower the valuation by \$5,000. He would have to pay taxes on \$45,000 instead of \$50,000.

Homeowners who have previously applied for a homestead exemption do not have to reapply.

Taxpayers 65 years old or older will qualify for at least one additional homestead exemption and possibly more. These exemptions are in addition to the homestead exemption. Senior citizens get an additional \$10,000 exemption. Combined with the other exemption, this would reduce the taxable value of a \$60,000 house to \$45,000.

Elderly taxpayers may also benefit from a **ceiling on school taxes**. In other words, school taxes cannot go up unless there are additions or improvements made to the house.

Taxpayers who are 65 or over can also postpone paying their property taxes through a **deferral**. Under this provision, taxes will not be collected on a home as long as the elderly person owns and lives in it. Taxes, penalties and interest continue to accrue on the property, however, and must be paid when title to the property is transferred. In other words, if the owner dies, his estate must pay the taxes.

These provisions can benefit elderly taxpayers, particularly those on limited or fixed incomes. But senior citizens need to apply for these aids. The taxing entities have no way of knowing that a property owner qualifies unless that person applies.

Donley County Wins Five State Jackpot Show

Donley County 4-H member James Lee Potts of Hedley took the top prize at the Five State Jackpot Market Swine Show in Liberal, Kansas, on August 18, 1990. James' two hundred and twenty-five pound crossbred barrow was the Grand Champion market swine at the show, and was exhibited by Brad Williams from Clarendon. James Lee will also take the pig to the Amarillo Tri-State Fair in September, followed by the Lubbock South Plains Fair.

Area Pronghorns Are Down

AUSTIN--Recent aerial pronghorn antelope surveys conducted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department indicate a continuing population decline in the Panhandle and Trans-Pecos areas.

Danny Swepson, TPWD Panhandle district leader in Amarillo said buck numbers are down 25 percent compared to last year in the 56-county Panhandle district, while the fawn crop is about the same as last year--21 percent this year compared to 18 percent a year ago.

"The fawn crop is about the same this year as last: very poor," he said. "That's what we saw on the ground (in July). What we saw on the ground is not necessarily what will enter the herd."

Swepson said recent rains will help survival. There are many small herds of 25-30 antelope north and west of Amarillo and as far south as Snyder. Most of the population, though, comes from Dallam, Hartley and Oldham counties. Oldham and Potter counties show the worst numbers, he said.

These results were not encouraging, including results from northwest Donley County.

The Trans-Pecos was equally bleak. "The Trans-Pecos population is down 3 percent overall from last year," said Tim Bone, TPWD wildlife biologist in Alpine.

County Records Are Changing

COLLEGE STATION--A new law being implemented over the next five years is expected to transform local government record keeping

from bound books of paper and ink to computer disks and microfilm.

Michael Heskett of Austin, representing the local records division of the Texas State Library and Archives Commission, said the Texas Local Government Records Act is designed to protect permanently valuable records of all local offices and to allow disposition of records of a more temporary nature.

"The act also supports efficient, cost-effective record keeping in local government offices through a standardized management system," Heskett said. "Often this involves the use of microfilm, electronic record keeping and other forms of automation."

He said full implementation of the act can save the state millions of dollars and can free office space now occupied with records.

"I envision an annual savings of about \$23 million across the state as county government offices begin to clear out old records and adopt the new automated technology for greater office efficiency," Heskett said.

He said people needing certified copies of permanent records and deeds should be able to obtain these documents more quickly by using the new systems.

Heskett said counties are in different stages of implementing the act. About 100 of the state's 254 counties have converted their records to microfilm, he said. The act requires that all record inventories be completed by local government officials by January 1995.

"Costs of this program to individual counties that during the five year [implementation] period

Sheriff Wants 18% Increase From City

The County has informed the City of Clarendon that the fee for having the Sheriff's Department enforce the law in the city has been raised by \$10,000, from \$57,000 to \$67,000.

The County maintains that the additional cost is necessary due to increased expenses.

The City Aldermen have requested that in return for the increase, the department should report more closely on enforcement activities and especially on traffic law enforcement.

The City currently pays more than half of the reported \$102,324.97 that the Sheriff's Department budgets.

City residents already pay more than 1/3 of the taxes that the county receives. Several of the Aldermen feel that city residents are being asked to pay twice for the same protection.

Aldermen have received complaints that the traffic situation is deteriorating. Some residents worry about the trucks speed down Highway 287 and ignore the traffic lights. They do not want to wait until someone is killed before trying to remedy the situation.

As of the first of the week (August 27th), Aldermen and Commissioners had not reached any agreement on the issue. The Aldermen will meet again on Tuesday night (August 28th) at 7:00 p.m.

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Corns: A Common Foot Problem

Corns are raised accumulations of dry skin that occur between a bony prominence on the foot and the shoe. Corns most often result from wearing shoes that fit too tightly. Narrow-toed and high-heeled shoes should be avoided. Women also should avoid using hosiery that fits too tightly. Because the small toe experiences the most pressure, it is the site of many corns. Although corns are not the source of major health problems except in diabetics, they often produce a great deal of discomfort and can impair one's ability to walk or run.

There are several nonprescription drug products that, when applied directly to the skin, aid in the partial or complete removal of corns. Liquids, lotions, and creams are available. Small adhesive discs or pads are designed to be placed directly on the corn. Most of the corn "removal" products contain salicylic acid. This ingredient dissolves the dead skin of which the corn is composed. Using the pad on or around the corn eventually decreases shoe pressure and relieves the pain.

Persons who have diabetes or circulation problems should not attempt to remove corns with over-the-counter products. Damage to the skin could lead to tissue damage and severe infection.

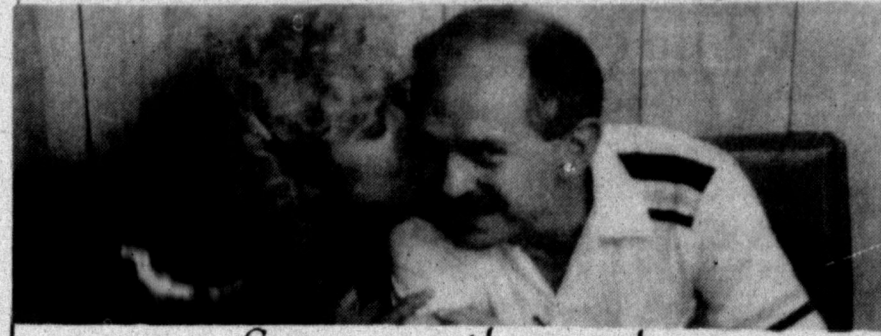
Private interment was in Sylvan Cemetery in Sacramento on Wednesday, August 8, 1990. She was a member of Capitol Christian Center in Sacramento.

State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that has stopped to load or unload children to stop and remain stopped until one of three things happen. The bus driver signals you to go on by or they turn off the flashing red lights, or the bus itself goes into motion. This law applies whether you are meeting the bus or whether you are going in the same direction as the bus. It also applies inside the city limits, as well as outside the city limit. The only exception to the law is that drivers on the other side of a divided highway (roadways separated by a physical median) are not required to stop. Motorist who fail to stop for a school bus can be fined up to \$200.00.

"We, as drivers, should realize the dangers involved and do everything possible to prevent these needless deaths and injuries involving our school children," Major Cawthon stated.

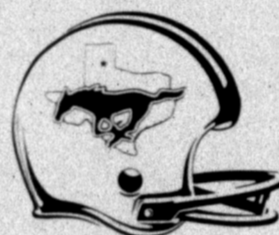

Clinic To Be Held

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community breast cancer clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal for cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast

exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are: Learn and perform breast self examination every month. Have a physical examination every year. have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age: 35 to 40, one baseline mammogram; 40 to 50, A mammogram every 1 to 2 years; over 50, Yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Clarendon on Friday, September 21, 1990 from 10:00 to 3:00 at the Clarendon Medical Center Clinic. Exams are done by appointment only. For information about the clinic or to make an appointment, please call the Harrington Cancer Center at our toll free number 1-800-274-4673. The Price of Sin, or Reflections Upon a Fleabag Motel

On the second evening of a recent vacation with loved ones, we arrived at our planned destination, a pretty little town nestled in a remote mountain valley, just about as far from shopping malls and the bustle of the city as one can get in the continental United States. The town is so far off the beaten path that most of the fast-food and big motel chains have yet to discover it. I had been there on at least three other occasions, and each time had found the community's several motels all but empty.

Even though it was still fairly early, we had difficulty finding accommodations. In near-desperation, we rented what was just about the only thing left in town—a filthy, run-down, depressing dump of a room. Furthermore, it cost considerably more than anything else we encountered on the trip.

We turned on the TV, hoping that the night would pass quickly, and we could move on. We wept together as we watched the story of a California church group which was helping to minister to pre-school-aged AIDS victims in a Rumanian hospital. One nurse sobbed as she related the number of wee ones they had buried—about forty—in the past three months. One infant near death was a ghastly eight- or ten-pound skeleton too sick to even whimper.

We discovered why our roach motel (literally!) was so expensive. A German television production company had rented most of the town's rooms, and was filming several episodes in one room of our flattrap. As we went to supper, the room where they were filming was wide open, and the director was yelling at everyone in sight—including us—to be quiet. They had moved virtually all the furniture out of the room except the bed, upon which their cameras and floodlights were focused. It didn't take much imagination to figure out what sort of program they were filming.

Babies dying of AIDS, and a loud, half-drunken, carousing TV crew and cast filming a dirty movie. (Two females in the group embraced, and engaged in a long, passionate, on-the-lips kiss in full public view.)

My brother was almost beside himself with anger. God's innocent little ones die; Satan's guilty hellions revel. He was furious!

No, those particular people were not directly responsible for the death of those particular babes. But we were suddenly reminded that the price of sin goes far, far beyond an outrageously-priced dump.

And it suddenly occurred to me how few people in our day would have cared at all, much less been so outraged at sin, as was my brother.

Are we shocked at sin's horrors? Do we even notice? Many of those little ones are now safe in the presence of Jesus. Where will those filth merchants be on the Day of Judgement? I can't say what is in their hearts of hearts. But I know that the writer of Hebrews says, "It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God."

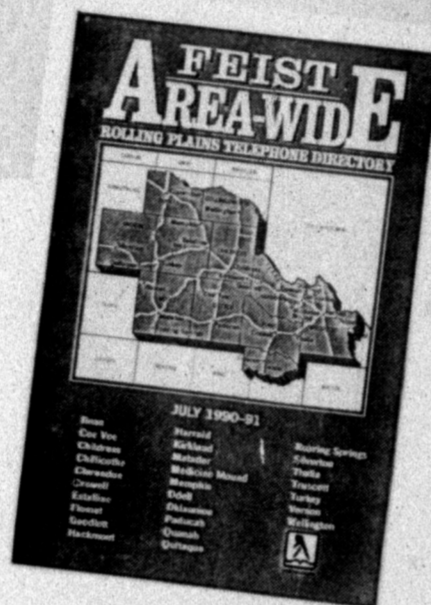
God bless you, gentle, loving, compassionate brother! God rest you, sick, dying, helpless little ones! God have mercy on you, cancer-spreading minions of Satan!

Call Trace - enables the customer to initiate a trace of the last incoming call received. The number, date and time will be recorded by Southwestern Bell Telephone so that the call's origin can be identified.

Selective Call Forwarding - enables the customer to forward incoming calls from specified telephone numbers (maximum of three) to another telephone number.

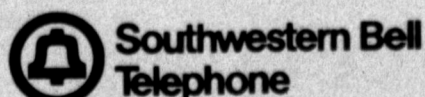

Pack A Safe Lunch For School

More than 23 million American children will start taking their lunches when school opens soon, and whether the food is safe to eat may depend on how it's prepared.

A nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that food-borne illness is a bigger problem than most people think. Between 24 and 81 million cases of this disease are reported each year.

"The best defense against food-borne illness is safe food handling practices," Dr. May Kinney Sweeten said. "This means taking precautions every time food is prepared."

Sweeten advises those who pack lunches for school, work, trips or other events to follow these tips:

-Keep everything that touches food clean. Stop and wash utensils, bowls and counter tops--everything that touches food--in between working on each dish.

-Use a fork, not your hands to mix meat, macaroni, egg, tuna or green salad. Your hands continually pick up bacteria and other germs that get into fingernails and in the creased skin of the hands. Only vigorous washing with hot, soapy water prepares hands to safely deal with food.

-Cook food thoroughly. For complete safety, raw meat, poultry or fish should be thoroughly cooked, following pack age or

cookbook directions.

-Refrigerate lunch fixed the night before. Pack your bag with perishables--meat or poultry sandwiches, hard-boiled eggs--and refrigerate it. Add chips and cookies and cold drinks the following morning.

It is always best to refrigerate your lunch, but since most children have no way to refrigerate their lunch at school, Sweet en suggests following these tips to keep food cool:

-Put something cold in the lunch bag. This could be a frozen cold drink, a small, plastic refrigerator dish filled with water and frozen, or one of the new commercial gels. Also, some lunch boxes now come with freeze pack inserts.

-Freeze sandwiches. This works best with coarse, textured breads that won't get soggy when thawing. The sandwich thaws in time for lunch, and keeps everything else cool in the meantime. Sandwich extras--lettuce, tomato and mayonnaise--don't freeze will. Pack them separately.

-Use a thermos to keep milk or juice cold, or try the new fruit juices in wax paper cartons that need no refrigeration.

-Keep your lunch in the coolest place possible. Never leave it in direct sun or on a warm surface.

Sweeten said some foods are safer to take along for lunch than others. Commercially prepared and ready to eat meats, such as corned beef, salami and bologna, are good lunch box choices because they keep well.

"Canned meat and poultry, which can be opened and eaten immediately, are also good choices," she said. "Before you buy these, make sure the cans are properly sealed and not rusted, bulging, or badly dented."

Fruits and vegetables go well with any lunch, Sweeten said. Wash them before packing to remove soil, bacteria, viruses and insecticide sprays.

"It's also important to take care of your lunch container," Sweeten said. "Wash lunch boxes and laminated totes thoroughly every night to keep bacteria from growing inside." A weekly wash with baking soda eliminates odors.

Use only new, clean bags, Sweeten said. Bags that have carried groceries can pass insects or bacteria from other food to your lunch. Wet or stained bags carry a lot of germs.

will vary," Heskett said. "Many will train and use citizen volunteers, so some costs should be minimal."

"The Local Government Records Act modernizes current statutes and removes restrictions that require records to be kept in 'well-bound' books, allowing officials to use more modern systems."

He said the act, HB 1285, also provides for establishment of a permanent committee of local government officials to review and approve retention periods for local records and set rules for use of electronic record storage.

Heskett spoke to 570 clerks at the recent 18th Annual County and District Clerks' Seminar here. The training was offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, as part of the ongoing efforts of the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, in cooperation with the County and District Clerks' Association of Texas.

Presidio County dropped 27 percent.

Pronghorns in the San Angelo area seem to be doing a bit better. Lee C. Miller, TPWD wildlife biologist, recently flew about 269,000 square miles of antelope in range in Reagan, Irion, Sterling and Glasscock counted and counted approximately 10 percent more antelope than last year. "Most encouraging was the 73 percent fawn crop observed, which indicates the pronghorn herd is making a comeback from low reproduction the past two years," Miller said. "Antelope range conditions have improved due to recent rainfall and the antelope appear to be in good physical condition."




