

#### **Nursing Home** 'Open House' **Slated Today**

Today, Sunday, in con-junction with Nursing Home Week, the Muleshoe Nursing Home will conduct open house from 2-4 p.m. Hostesses for the occasion will be members of the Muleshoe Hospital and Nursing Home Auxilied remodeling of much of the Nursing Home facility, adding carpet and a fireplace as highlights of the renovation.
