With hits were Lupe Rosales, Don Long, Mickey Long and Joe Salinas. Losing pitcher for Littlefield was Joe Torres.

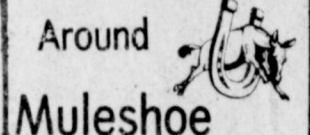

Soil Stewardship Week Is Planned

Soil Stewardship Week, which had its origin more than 1,500 years ago, will be celebrated in Bailey County and throughout the United States and its territories on May 20-27, according to an announcement by Doug Bales, chairman of the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District.

The theme for the 1979 observation is "Interdependence", a concept endorsed by President Carter in his foreword to the descriptive Soil Stewardship Week Booklet. The booklet and accompanying Soil Stewardship Week material is distributed by Conservation Districts to clergymen, lay readers, civic and educational organizations and individuals interested in participating in the unique celebration, said Bales.

"Americans have always understood the value of working together to achieve common goals," President Carter said. "We have learned that unity of purpose and mutual dependence are essential to our growth as a society of self-governing people."

"It is especially fitting, therefore, that interdependence...of city and country, of Americans and their resources, and of man and nature...is the theme of Soil Stewardship Week in 1979," the President observed. "Our nation can be thankful for our progress in repairing the damage we have done to our environment. But that is only a start, because to achieve greater harmony with nature, we

### Police Busy Here Friday During Day

Friday will be remembered as a busy day for local city and county law enforcement officers.

At 9:34 a.m. Friday, an ammonia tank overturned three and a half miles north on the Y-L road, with ammonia spewing from the overturned tank near the Kenneth Hanks home, traffic was discouraged until the leakage could be stopped.

Also Friday morning, a truck loading crossties west of Muleshoe on highway 84, struck a high voltage line, dropping it near the highway. Again, officers had to divert traffic while the line could be moved.

A report was received, but unconfirmed, that an airplane had struck a light pole east of Lazbuddie, dislodging the electric pole.

Around mid-afternoon Friday, a trailer came loose from a pickup and overturned in the middle of the highway in front of the Muleshoe City Hall, resulting in no injuries.

### Golf Course Construction Will Begin

As lights come in during this week, the Muleshoe Youth Activities Committee Inc. plan to begin construction on the miniature golf course which will be constructed adjacent to, and across the street east of the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum.

Following a noon meeting Wednesday, Keith Pate, president of YAC, said it is hoped to have the golf course constructed and ready for dedication and grand opening on July 4th, in conjunction with the July 4 activities.

It was announced that the lights alone for the golf course are costing \$1,400, with another \$900 for poles and \$128 for crossarms. At this time, the YAC is beginning to solicit aid from the various civic clubs and social organizations who have indicated they will take a financial interest in the project.

Total cost of the lights for the miniature golf course, including lights, poles and wiring is expected to be around \$3,000.

Also, it was announced that T.L. Timmons of State Line Irrigation has contributed 200 feet of one inch pipe and 200 feet of two inch pipe to enclose the underground electrical and water lines for the golf course.

Plans for the combination ticket office / concession stand/storage and restroom building to be constructed on the north side of the golf course will be drawn up shortly.

Actual construction is expected to begin before mid-week, according to Pate.

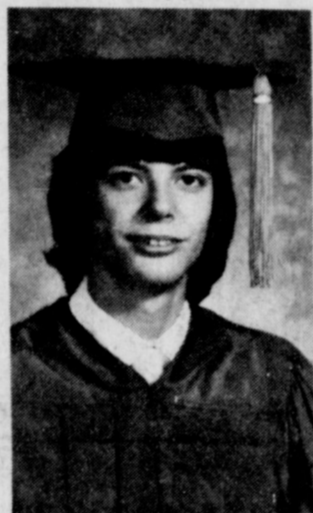

Senator Bob Price says rural school district will be able to pay their teachers a salary more in line with districts in the large urban areas in the state as the Texas Senate approved a 7% teachers pay raise bill Friday.

"The bill, by Senator Oscar Mauzy of Dallas, was amended several times. I supported several amendments offered by Senator Pete Snelson which raised beginning salaries and improved the salary schedule. I think by changing the formula there will be a fairer distribution of the state's funds for education throughout the state," commented Senator Price.

"I am especially pleased that the amendments passed by the Senate will serve to balance the salaries of the teachers over the state. I feel that a teacher in our area should be paid the same as any other teacher in the state who is serving the same amount of students," said Senator Price.

**TSTI Approves Price Boost For Dormitories**

TSTI Board of Regents met in Waco on April 23, 1979 and approved raising the Dormitory and Housing rental rates at all four campuses 20 to 30 percent. Dorm rooms for couple occupancy will cost \$120. Two bedroom duplexes used for housing married students will rent at \$160 a month. In the TSTI housing area, rental rates will range from \$185 to \$245 per month depending on the size of the duplex or house. Most of the TSTI housing area include renters that are staff and faculty of TSTI and employees of various businesses and industry surrounding the campus area. The new rental rates will become effective September 1.

In other business, Regents authorized the reinstatement of building 3500 as an educational and training facility. The building, located on the southeast side of campus, has been used as part of TSTI's industrial lease property. It will now house the Boot and Shoe and Saddle and Tack Making

programs. Board members also authorized the spending of \$75,000 to refurbish the new leather trades facility.

Several lease agreements were also granted. Sav-a-Stop will rent building 6400 for \$400 a month. The firm will use the facility to manufacture store fixtures. Filterspun was approved a lease for building 6135 at \$600 a month and Waterman Inc. will lease buildings 9409 and 9507

for the same amount. A change of lease assignments from Danny Bucks to Tommy F. Gay for building 9506 was also approved. The facility, used to house High Plains Stripping Company was recently purchased by Gay of 405 Magnolia.

The Area I Association of FFA, held their annual convention Saturday, May 2, at Tascosa High School in Amarillo.

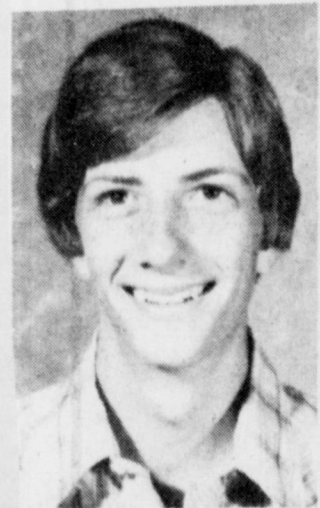

## TDA Reports Grain Stocks Have Dropped 17 Percent

AUSTIN--A 17 percent decline in Texas stocks of feed grains, including corn, oats, barley and sorghum, has been reported by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA).  
Stocks of other grains showed even further declines, TDA officials said.

The April estimate, made by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, showed wheat stocks down 48 percent from the previous year, to 51.7 million bushels. Disappearance during the January-April quarter alone was estimated at 22.6 million bushels.  
Only grain sorghum

showed no change from the previous year, with stocks totaling 62.6 million hundredweight.  
Corn dropped 38 percent, to the 50.4-million-bushel level, while oats were down 60 percent to 2.7 million bushels.

Barley and soybean stocks were cut in half, the report showed, with barley down to 21,000 bushels and soybean stocks to 4 million bushels.  
"Poor grain production conditions in the state last year cut sharply into our crops," commented Agriculture

Commissioner Reagan V. Brown, "and compliance with federal pesticide programs dropped production even more."
