An Editorial:

School Has Good Plan At Hand

The Texas Association of School Boards presented a plan for selecting a new superintendent to the School Board at the December meeting. The school should be commended for considering the process.

According to Susan Muncie, TASB employee in Austin, the Association will assist local boards by holding hearings in the community, listening to parents, teachers and others to determine what the community needs and wants in a new superintendent. The Association's experts analyze the characteristics desired and develop a profile of the type of person who is needed. They send out brochures, invite applications, schedule interviews and assist with the initial screening. Of course, the local school board makes the final decision.

This process is very consistent with the policies and procedures outlined in the Site-Based Decision Making Process which was recently compiled and adopted by the Clarendon board. Such a

procedure satisfies the Texas Education Agency requirements, and just makes good sense. It is also similar to the process used by Clarendon College in selecting its current president. That president has the confidence and cooperation of the community.

Mrs. Muncie said, "The Association will come to the community and talk. The goal is to find

the best possible candidate for the job." Such an open process inspires community confidence and support. Everyone should benefit from the results.

USDA-ASCS Provide Marketing Provisions

Farmers participating in the 1992 Farm Program are eligible for loans and loan deficiency payments (LDP) if certain conditions are met. The Donley County loan rate for 1992 cotton is \$5240 per pound. The LDP payment changes every week, depending on the Adjusted World Market Price (AWP), but is currently about \$12 per pound.

Loan and LDP Eligibility: For a commodity to be eligible for a loan or a loan deficiency payment (LDP), the producer must have beneficial interest in the commodity in addition to other eligibility requirements.

Beneficial Interest: A producer retains beneficial interest in the commodity if all of the following remain with the producer: a) control of the commodity; b) risk of loss; c) title to the commodity.

For LDP's, the producer must retain beneficial interest in the commodity from the time of harvest through the date the loan is redeemed or Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) takes title to the commodity.

For loans, the producer must retain beneficial interest in the commodity from the time of harvest through the date the loan is redeemed or Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) takes title to the commodity.

Selling Equity: If a producer receives any payment that would give the buyer any share of the equity in the commodity, such commodity is immediately ineligible for a loan or an LDP. If a producer sells any equity in the commodity after it has been pledged as collateral for a loan, repayment of the loan principal and charges plus interest is required.

Option to Maintain Beneficial Interest: An option to purchase is an agreement allowing the buyer, at the buyer's option to enter into contract at a later date to buy the commodity. The option does not give the buyer an interest in the commodity and expires at a specified time.

Payments: If a producer has entered into an option to purchase the producer may receive a payment and retain beneficial interest if such option to purchase has been approved by the local ASCS office.

Sales Contract and Loss of Beneficial Interest: A sales contract gives the buyer an interest in the commodity at a time set forth in the contract or at a time implied by law.

If a producer has or will receive a payment in return for the sales contract, beneficial interest is lost when the payment is made.

A producer will lose beneficial interest upon signing any contract which contains clauses restricting the producer's decision to obtain price support from CCC, such as: a) the buyer may require the producer to obtain a loan or an LDP; b) the producer may obtain a loan or an LDP only with prior approval obtained from the buyer.

Subject to ASCS Determination: All loans or LDP's requested shall be subject to a determination by ASCS of a producer's eligibility to receive a loan or an LDP, based on a review of any option to purchase or sales contract involving the commodity.

Deadline Announced

March 1, 1993, is the deadline for applying for scholarships from the Sybil B. Harrington Merit Scholarship Fund.

Applications for the funds must reach the Amarillo College Foundation office no later than the March 1 deadline. Students applying will be eligible for up to \$3,500 in tuition, fees and book costs. The fund was established in late 1989 through the Amarillo College Foundation by Sybil Harrington.

Those eligible for the scholarship funds include graduating seniors from any high school in the 26 northern counties of the Panhandle of Texas; students graduating from Amarillo College; U.S. citizens and the applicant must enroll in 12 semester hours at the college of their choice.

Scholarships are awarded for one year only, but can be renewed if the student maintains a 3.0 grade point average. Eighty percent of the funds will be awarded for students to attend any accredited institution in Texas. Ten percent of the funds will be awarded for students planning to attend Amarillo College and 10 percent will be awarded to graduating Amarillo College students to attend any accredited institution in Texas.

Application forms are available through high school counselors and principals or through the Amarillo College Foundation office.

- provide \$62,000 of air pollution control
- generate \$31,250 worth of oxygen
- control \$31,250 worth of soil erosion
- recycle \$37,000 worth of water

By providing shade and evaporative cooling, trees affect local temperatures. Clusters of urban trees can cool ambient temperature by 10 degrees Fahrenheit, reducing local energy demand (for air conditioning) by 10 to 50%. The energy saved reduces global warming by about 15 times the amount of CO₂ absorbed by those trees.

The average American uses the equivalent of 7 trees every year. That's over 1.5 billion trees used annually in the United States.

Trees, humans, and animal life are dependent on each other. People require oxygen and produce carbon dioxide (CO₂); trees and other plants require CO₂ and produce oxygen.

Planting trees has a cumulative effect; each tree you plant will provide benefits for years to come. For example: if only 100,000 people plant a tree this year, the trees will still be absorbing over a million pounds of CO₂ annually in the year 2010. But if the same people plant a tree every year from now until 2010, the trees will absorb over 20 million pounds of CO₂ in that year.

It is estimated that each mature tree consumes, on the average, about 13 pounds of CO₂ per year.

Don't just stick a tree in the ground and ignore it. Like other growing plants, trees need a little care for the first two years. That includes water, vertical support and mulch.

Check It Out

Do you need a few more stocking stuffers for Christmas? The Children's Book Sale is still in progress at Burton Memorial Library. Beginning Monday, December 21, the books will be on sale for half-price. It's doubtful that a more worthwhile "super-value" can be found, and at the same time, encourage your child in good literature appreciation, something that can be beneficial throughout his or her life. Hopefully, you'll be able to take time to visit the library, and see the books that are being offered during this sale.

Social Security and Military Service

"If you are currently in the military or have ever served in the military, you should be aware of several features of the Social Security program," says Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo.

If you are in the military any time after 1956, you payed Social Security taxes.

The taxes you paid earned "credits" that will be used to determine your future eligibility for Social Security benefits.

If you're still in the service, you're still earning credit. The number of credits you need to qualify for Social Security depend on your age and the type of benefits you may be eligible for, but, no one needs more than ten years of work or military service (40 credits) to be eligible for Social Security.

If you were in the military before 1957, you did not pay Social Security taxes but special earnings can be added to your Social Security that may count toward future benefits.

Military personal are eligible for the same kinds of benefits from Social Security as anyone else:

1. Retirement benefits as early as age 62.
2. Disability benefits at any age for people with an impairment severe enough for keeping them from working for at least a year (or one that will result in death).

3. Survivors benefits for family members if you should die.

If you would like more information about earning credits or about Social Security benefits in general, contact your nearest Social Security office or call the Social Security toll-free telephone number, 1-800-772-1213 between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. business days. Ask for the factsheet Military Service and Social Security.

"There are special Supplemental Security Income (SSI) rules that apply to children of military personal as well," reminds Talbot. SSI is a program that makes payments to low income people

who are 65 years of age or older or have a disability.

Most people who get SSI and leave the United States for 3 days or more are no longer eligible for SSI. A special rule enacted April 1, 1990, enables children of military personnel loving overseas to continue to receive benefits under certain conditions. "Specific reporting instructions exists for children living overseas and receiving SSI who are children of military personnel," says Talbot. Any change in income, resources, or address for a parent or child should be reported within 10 days after the month it happens.

Other officers of the council include "Texas" publicist Kathie Greer as vice-president, Canadian Chamber of Commerce Manager Georgia King and Robert Jacobson, Chairman of the High Plains RC&D from Adrian as Treasurer. At-large officers members of the steering committee include Steve Dortch from Dalhart, Pat Kaiser representing Amarillo and Clarendon, Royce Jordan from Pampa, Steve Ulrey from Quitaque and Dr. Wallace Johnston of Amarillo. Crowell and Thomas L. Davey District Conservationist in Tulia for the High Plains RC&D Area Inc. will serve as advisors.

"If we enable rural communities to build a strong economic base, then we're going to encourage young people to stay in the region," Davey explained. "That not only will help preserve our heritage, but also assure its continuation."

Delbert and Ruth Trew who attended the meeting, as representatives of Alanreed and McLean made a \$25 donation in the name of the Devil's Rope Museum in McLean to help defray initial expenses incurred by the council.

The steering committee has been charged with the task of writing a mission statement, preparing by-laws and establishing guidelines for membership in the organization. Blessings of the Season

The Christmas Story

In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) And everyone went to his own town to register.

Caring For A Holiday Pet

- Don't leave stale food in your pet's bowl—discard after one day.

- Don't omit dry food from a puppy or kitten's diet; chewing is good for their teeth and dry food contains important nutrients.

Bedding:

- When choosing a bed for your puppy, set up a cage or crate with an old blanket/towel in a quiet place.

- Be sure outside kittens have a shelter—garage or porch—from the

rain. Inside kittens may like to sleep in a high-sided box lined with a washable pillow or cushion.

Housebreaking:

- Know the tell-tale signs of a puppy who wants to be walked: walking around in circles, sitting at the door and whining, making sustained eye contact, combined with a slightly anxious expression.

- Take a puppy "caught in the act" outside to finish, and praise him for his efforts.

- Watch a kitten carefully for the first few weeks—especially after sleep and meals. If he's about to relieve himself, put him in the litter box. He'll learn quickly.

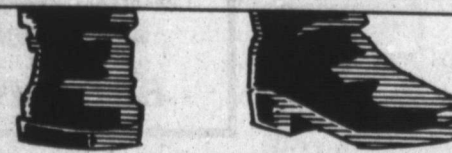

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING THE RIGHT, PRIVILEGE AND USE OF CITY RIGHTS-OF-WAY TO GTE SOUTHWEST INCORPORATED, GRANTEE, AND ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, TO CONSTRUCT, ERECT, BUILD, EQUIP, OWN, MAINTAIN AND OPERATE IN, ALONG, UNDER, OVER AND ACROSS THE STREETS, AVENUES, ALLEYS, BRIDGES, VIADUCTS AND PUBLIC GROUNDS OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, SUCH POSTS, POLES, WIRES, CABLES, CONDUITS AND OTHER APPLIANCES, STRUCTURES AND FIXTURES NECESSARY OR CONVENIENT FOR RENDITION OF TELEPHONE AND OTHER COMMUNICATION SERVICE AND FOR CONDUCTING A GENERAL LOCAL AND LONG-DISTANCE TELEPHONE BUSINESS; PROVIDING FOR CONSIDERATION; FOR PERIOD OF GRANT; FOR ASSIGNMENT; FOR METHOD OF ACCEPTANCE; FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND FOR PARTIAL INVALIDITY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. GRANT OF RIGHT, PRIVILEGE AND USE OF CITY RIGHTS-

OF-WAY FOR CONSTRUCTION AND MAINTENANCE OF TELEPHONE PLANT AND SERVICE

That the right, privilege and authority to use City rights-of-way be, and the same is hereby, granted to GTE Southwest Incorporated, hereinafter referred to as the "Telephone Company," and its successors or assigns, subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, to construct, erect, build, equip, own, maintain and operate in, along, under, over and across the streets, alleys, avenues, bridges, viaducts and public grounds of the City, such posts, poles, wires, cables, conduits and other appliances, structures and fixtures necessary or convenient for rendering telephone and other communication services and for conducting a general local/extended area and long-distance telephone business.

SECTION 2. SUPERVISION BY CITY OF LOCATION OF POLES AND CONDUIT

That all poles to be placed shall be of sound material and reasonably straight, and shall be so set that they will not interfere with the flow of water to any gutter or drain, and so that the same will interfere as little as practicable with the ordinary travel on the street or sidewalk. The location and route of all poles, stubs, guys, anchors, conduits and cables to be placed and constructed by the Telephone Company in the construction and maintenance of its telephone system in the City, and the location of all conduits to be laid by the Telephone Company within the limits of the City under this ordinance, shall be subject to the reasonable and proper regulation, control and direction of the City Council or of any City official to whom such duties have been or may be delegated.

That nothing in this Ordinance is intended to add to or detract from any authority granted by the Legislature of the State of Texas to the City.

SECTION 3. STREETS TO BE RESTORED TO GOOD CONDITION

That the surface of street, alley, highway or public place within the City disturbed by the Telephone Company in building, constructing, renewing or maintaining its telephone plant and system shall be restored within a reasonable time after the completion of the work to as good a condition as before the commencement of the work and maintained to the satisfaction of the City Council, or of any City official to whom such duties have been or may be delegated, for one year from the date the surface of said street, alley, highway or public place is broken for such construction or maintenance work, after which time responsibility for the maintenance shall become the duty of the City. No such street, alley, highway, or public place shall be encumbered for a longer period than shall be necessary to execute the work.

SECTION 4. TEMPORARY REMOVAL OF WIRES

That the Telephone Company on the request of any person shall remove or raise or lower its wires within the City temporarily to

permit the moving of houses or other bulky structures. The expense of such temporary removal, raising or lowering of wires shall be paid by the benefitted party or parties, and the Telephone Company may require such payment in advance. The Telephone Company shall be given not less than forty-eight (48) hours advance notice to arrange for such temporary wire changes. The clearance of wires above ground or rails within the City and also underground work shall conform to the basic standards of the National Electrical Safety Code, National Bureau of Standards, United States Department of Commerce, as promulgated at the time of erection thereof.

SECTION 5. TREE TRIMMING

That the right, license, privilege and permission is hereby granted to the Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, to trim trees upon and overhanging the streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the City, so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires or cables of the Telephone Company, and when so ordered by the City, said trimming shall be done under the supervision and direction of the City Council or of any City official to whom said duties have been or may be delegated.

SECTION 6. CASH CONSIDERATION TO BE PAID BY THE TELEPHONE COMPANY.

(A) In consideration for the rights and privileges herein granted, the Company's usage of public right-of-way, the temporary interference with the use of public rights-of-way, the administration of this right-of-way rental agreement by the City, and other costs and obligations undertaken by the City herein, the Company hereby agrees to pay the City during the term of this agreement a sum of money equal to two percent (2%) of annual "Gross Revenues," as that term is defined herein, collected within the corporate limits of the City ("Annual Fee"). For purposes of this agreement, "Gross Revenues" shall mean all revenue derived within the corporate limits of the City from regulated, noncompetitive local exchange transmission services that directly employ Company facilities located in the City's public right-of-way as further described by each revenue code contained in Attachment A hereto, which is hereby made a part of this agreement.

(B) Such fee payment shall be made in four (4) calendar quarterly payments. Each payment shall be due and payable on or before the last day of the calendar month following the close of the calendar quarter for which the payment is calculated.

(C) The City shall have the right to review or audit the Company's books and records which are directly related to this right-of-way rental agreement regarding any amounts paid under this agreement. The City shall give written notice to the Company of any additional amount claimed to be due to the City as a result of the City's review. Such notice shall be given no later than forty-eight (48) months following the close of the calendar year covered by such statements(s). The additional amount due to the City, if any, shall be paid within thirty (30) days following determination by the parties that such amount is due and payable.

(D) The Telephone Company shall bill, on a monthly basis, to all customers residing within the City, pro rata, the Annual Fee. The amount billed will be identified as

local tax according to tariff.

(E) In the event there is any change in the corporate boundaries of the City, whether by annexation, disannexation or otherwise, the City shall provide to the Telephone Company, within sixty (60) days following the date of final passage of any such action, maps of the affected area(s) with sufficient detail to enable the Telephone Company to determine which customers reside inside or outside the City following such action. Within sixty (60) days of receipt of such maps, the Telephone Company shall either begin or cease billing, as appropriate, customers affected by the change in corporate boundaries.

SECTION 7. PAYMENT OF CASH CONSIDERATION TO BE IN LIEU OF

ANY OTHER PAYMENTS EXCEPT USUAL GENERAL OR SPECIAL AD VALOREM TAXES

That the City agrees that the consideration set forth in the preceding section hereof shall be paid and received in lieu of any tax, license, charge, fee, street or alley rental or any other character of charge for use and occupancy of the streets, avenues, alleys, bridges, viaducts and public grounds of the City; in lieu of any pole tax or inspection fee tax; in lieu of any easement or right-of-way tax, whether levied as an ad valorem, special or other character of tax; and in lieu of any imposition other than the usual general or special ad valorem taxes no or hereafter levied. Should the City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing cash consideration shall be in lieu of the taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, and easement or right-of-way taxes aforesaid, then the City agrees that it will apply so much of said payment as may be necessary to the satisfaction of the Telephone Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, and easement or right-of-way taxes.

SECTION 8. INDEMNITY

The Telephone Company, as a condition of the grants of authority herein and in considera-

tion thereof, shall indemnify and hold the City harmless against all claims for damages to persons or property to the extent proximately caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of Telephone Company's officers, employees, or agents by reason of the construction, maintenance and operation of the Telephone Company's facilities which are subject to this agreement. This indemnity applies where, and to the extent, the Telephone Company's negligence or intentional act is either the sole or a contributing cause of the injury, death or damage caused by either the sole or contributing negligence or intentional act or omission of the City or any third party. This provision is not intended to create liability for the benefit of third parties but is solely for the benefit of the Telephone Company and the City.

SECTION 9. NO EXCLUSIVE PRIVILEGES CONFERRED BY THIS ORDINANCE

That nothing herein contained shall be construed as giving to the Telephone Company any exclusive privileges.

SECTION 10. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

That the rights, powers, limitations, duties and restrictions herein provided for shall inure to and be binding upon the parties hereto and upon their respective successors and assigns.

SECTION 11. PERIOD OF AGREEMENT

That this agreement shall be in full force and effect for the period beginning with the effective date hereof and ending five (5) years after such date.

SECTION 12. PARTIAL INVALIDITY AND REPEAL PROVISIONS

That if any section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be illegal, ultra vires or unconstitutional, such invalidity shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. All ordinances and agreements and parts of or-

dinances and agreements in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 13. ACCEPTANCE OF AGREEMENT

That the Telephone Company shall have sixty (60) days from and after the passage and approval of this Ordinance to file its written acceptance thereof with the City Secretary, and upon such acceptance being filed, this Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the date of its acceptance, and shall effectuate and make binding the agreement provided by the terms hereof.

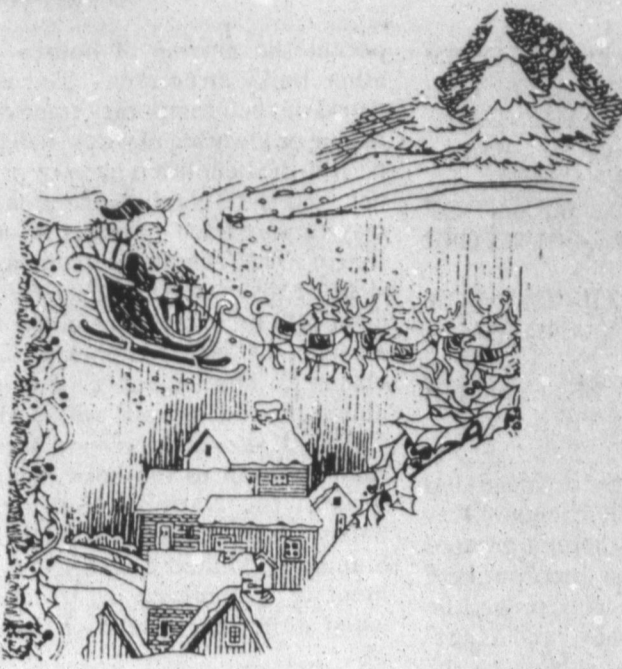
With no further business,



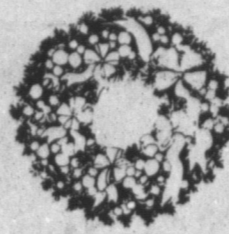
