## Disease Detectives Stalk Virus

Hantavirus, the microbe responsible for the mystery disease that recently surfaced in New Mexico and the Four Corners Area, isn't new. But like so many agents that cause the disease, the virus is sneaky.

First identified as a source of human disease in the mid-1970s, Hantaviruses cause a severe and sometimes fatal respiratory illness. Rodents appear to be natural hosts for hantaviruses. In rodents, however, hantaviruses produce a lifelong infection without apparent disease. They shed the virus through excretions. Contact with the excretions is thought to be the primary way humans become infected.

The virus does not seem to spread from person to person. The incidence of the disease fluctuates with the size of local rodent populations and the time of year humans may be the most likely to come in contact with rodents, especially airborne particles of their droppings or urine. Although any one may become infected with the hantavirus, it is most common among young adults.

Early symptoms of infection include fever, headache, abdominal and low back pain, nausea and vomiting, with facial flushing and redness of the eyes. As the disease advances, kidney abnormalities may cause decreased urine output. Circulatory problems, including shock, bleeding and fluid build-up in the lungs, occur in severe cases.

But only part of the mystery has been solved. We may never know exactly how an East Texas woman, with no known contact with rodents, became the single confirmed hantavirus case in this state to date. Texas Department of Health epidemiologists, who have been on alert since the outbreak began in neighboring New Mexico, continue to check on reports of possible cases of the disease statewide, while they and their counterparts around the globe keep watchful eyes on reports for any other disease clusters.

Epidemiologists are crucial to the understanding and prevention of the world's ever-changing diseases. They have been instrumental in the tracking, prevention, and treatment of infectious diseases, such as gonorrhea and AIDS. Now they are helping with the even more difficult task of tracking the less obvious trail of clues left by chronic diseases like cancer.

The important science of epidemiology is missing from this nation's current health care model--one that stresses treatment rather than prevention. It must be included as an element of any successful plan for health care reform.

From birth defects, to rabies, to tuberculosis, to yet as unnamed killers, epidemiologists are the key to discovering the often mysterious

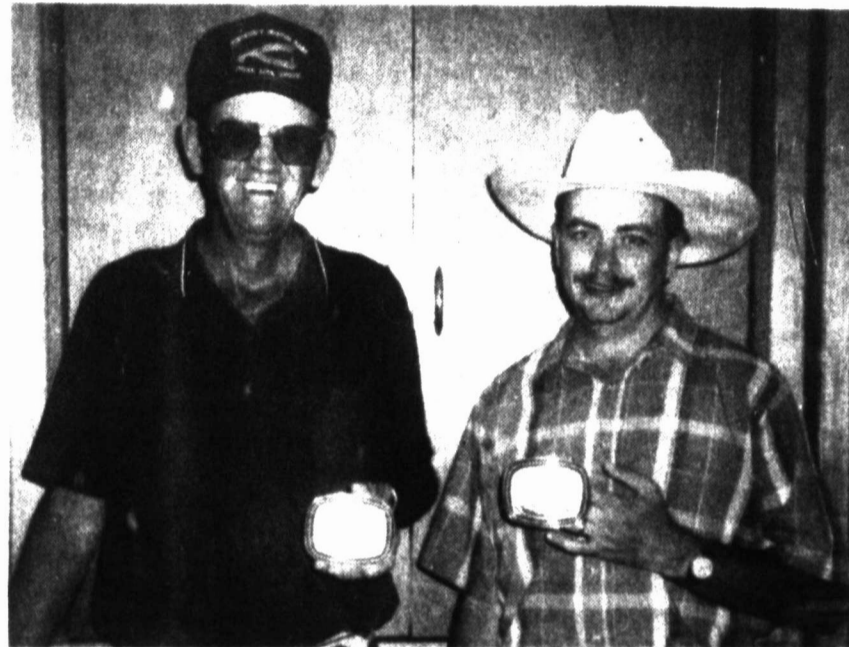
## Fund Drive Successful

By 1910, 1,359 orphaned, abandoned, homeless children along with a few poor families had been brought to Texas in hopes of finding homes; getting a fresh start in life.

Today this is an era in America's history covering 75 years (1854-1929) is known as the "Orphans Trains Era." A conservative estimate of 150,000 children were relocated from orphanages in New York City and Boston to new homes in the mid-west and south.

Only a handful of survivors remain today to talk about their lives and how the Orphan Train affected their lives.

Saturday, August 21st, a reunion of Orphan Train Riders, Their families and friends will be held in Granbury, Texas. Orohan Train Riders were, and are, America's first documented foster care children. Two major institutions were involved; the Children's Aid Society and the New York Foundling Hospital. The mass placing-out stopped in 1929 when the government passed child welfare reforms.

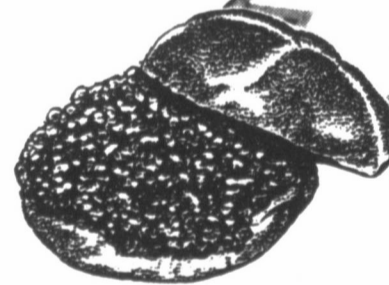

AUSTIN--The Texas Research League has released comparative figures for various school systems throughout the state.

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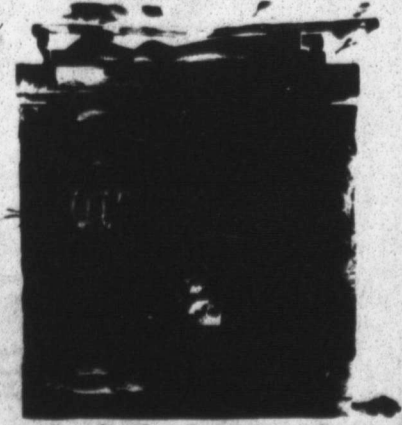
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### Clarendon CISD Loses in State Funding

After initially saying that Clarendon CISD should come out about even under the new state funding scheme, school superintendent, Phil Barefield, says that the new figures show that the district will be a loser under this plan. Barefield states that revised attendance numbers have had a negative impact on the amount of state funding the district will receive.

"The Texas Education Agency used inflated attendance figures when they calculated our state funds for 1993-1994," Barefield explained. "Using our attendance figures for last school year provides a much more accurate picture. Our true attendance is about 38 below the TEA numbers." This will result in a loss of about \$213,600 when calculated at the current combined local and county education district (CED) tax rate of \$1.07236. Barefield adds, "To make up this loss using our latest property values would require a 26.5 cent tax rate increase. I certainly do not expect rates to increase that much, even

though some increase may be required to keep from falling behind."

Senate Bill 7 was supposed to have improved school finance funding problems. Instead, most poor districts have lost state funds, while wealthy districts in our region have suffered losses as well. Though a billion dollars was added to the education budget, schools are receiving less money per student because the funding increases did not keep up with the additional numbers of students in the state. The only way a district can make up this needed revenue is through local property tax increases.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Clarendon CISD in October 1992 was \$24,879, plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$45,833, and \$29,951 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expenses averaged \$3,439 per student, as compared to \$3,690 in Clarendon. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 12.0 students in Clarendon CISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.1 to one.

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.405 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.6 per cent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.385 (\$1.405 times 98.6%) statewide. Locally, the Clarendon CISD imposed a rate of \$1.072 including \$.855 by the county education district. Property was appraised at 93.8 per cent of its market value making the true rate \$1.006 per \$100 of market price (selling price). The report points out that the calculations of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax rate on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Clarendon CISD would have been \$794. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$614. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$1,078 and \$854 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Clarendon CISD's revenue from property tax increased by 6.8 per cent for 1992-93 as compared to a 9.5 per cent increase statewide.

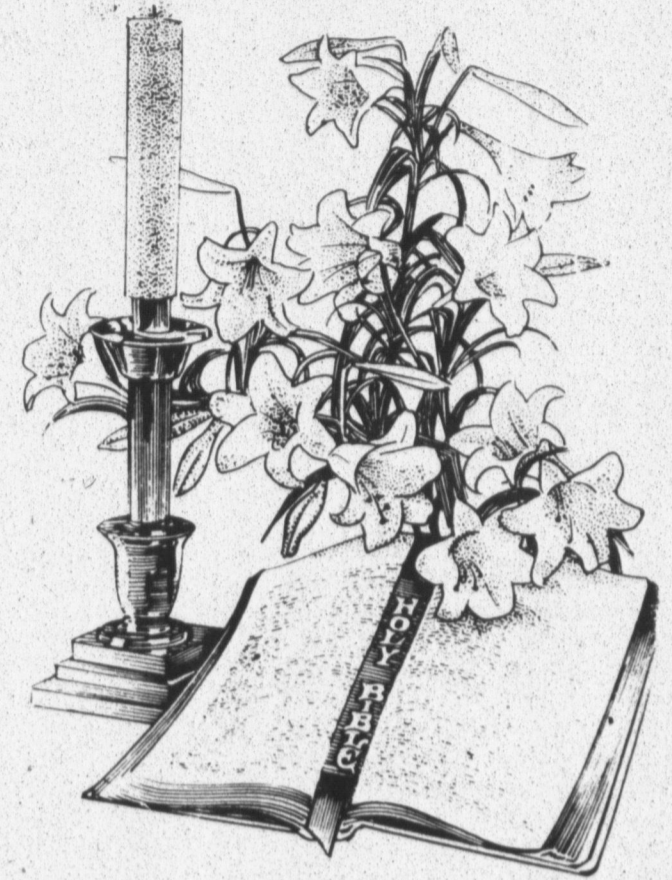
Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$5,395 per student in Clarendon CISD as compared to \$4,243 statewide.

the Hedley ISD imposed a rate of \$1.075 including \$.855 by the county education district. Property was appraised at 95.1 per cent of its market value making the true rate \$1.023 per \$100 of market price (selling price). The report points out that the calculations of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax rate on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Hedley ISD would have been \$853. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$664. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$1,078 and \$854 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

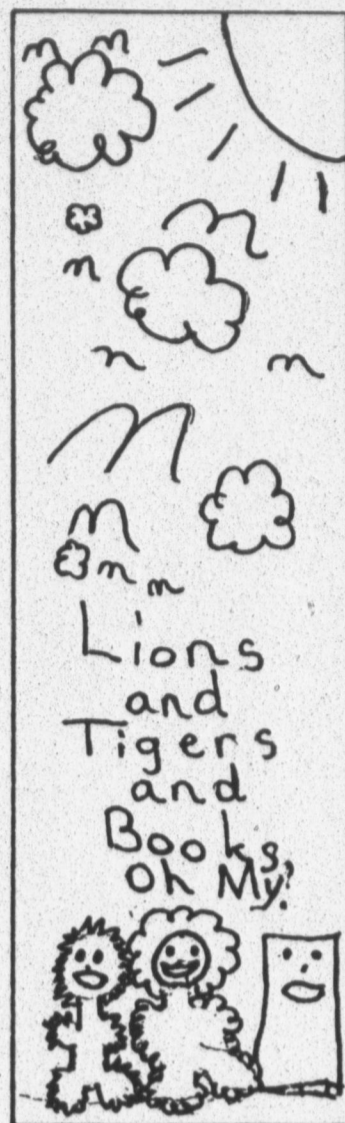

### Commerce helps companies access SBA 504 program

What is the SBA 504 program? How can I access it and how much capital does my company need to provide up front?

Texas has more than 389,000 small businesses, 99 percent of which have less than 500 employees. The majority of new job creation over the next several years is expected to come from small business expansion. Sometimes funding for expansion is hard to find. When a conventional loan is not possible, a 504 loan is the answer.

The Small Business Administration's 504 Loan Program gives small business owners the means to expand, modernize and compete in today's economy. SBA 504 loans have long terms; financing for fixed assets; low, fixed-rate financing; and low equity injection — only 10 percent down.

The key to the SBA 504 loan is a certified development company — a non-profit organization sponsored by private interests or by state or local governments. These local community experts have access to SBA loan programs through certification from the Office of Rural Affairs and Economic Development at SBA. There are 24 local CDCs in Texas, leaving 19 counties uncovered. The Texas Department of Commerce's Capital CDC was approved by the SBA to make additional expansion capital available to those counties not previously served by a CDC.

The SBA 504 program is accessible statewide and can be used in conjunction with other state finance programs. The 504 loan was designed to reward financially sound businesses who are looking to expand their operations and create new jobs. The reward is a loan bond on 40 percent of a company's project costs, locked in at 10 or 20 year terms at a fixed interest rate, typically below the market value.

Half of the funding for the loan is provided by a local bank, 40 percent of the funds are provided by the SBA/CDC, and 10 percent of the funds are provided by the company. The SBA 504 loan may only be used for real estate and machinery. Working capital and refinancing of existing debt are not eligible uses of loan proceeds.

If you're interested in applying for a 504 loan, check first with your local CDC. If your county is not covered by a local CDC, contact the Texas Department of Commerce. After determining that a project is feasible and eligible, Commerce will fill out an application for the company and take it to the Capital CDC for approval. Once the Capital CDC approves the application, Commerce sends the application to the SBA for approval and funding. This process takes approximately 60 days.

## There Are Ways To Maintain Independence

Kathleen Gilmartin, R.N. (NU) - Dear Kathleen: I am 75 years old. I don't want to lose my independence by going into an assisted-living community. I want to stay in my own home. But I'm getting awfully tired lately and have trouble driving the car. I can't even do my own grocery shopping. Isn't there some way I can maintain my independence?

Dear Mrs. Martin: Home health care companies can supply registered nurses, physical therapists and other specialists for people with medical problems who prefer to live at home. Many home health care agencies will supply "homemakers" who can come in, plan meals, do the shopping and relieve the burden of chores.

Some agencies even provide home health aides at your house every morning to assist you in your bath or shower and help you get dressed, thereby insuring the day is started right.

Several tips to the wise: Search for a home health care agency that bonds and insures all its employees and checks their references. Some agencies will send a registered nurse to your house, for free, to make an initial assessment of your needs. Also, ask if the personnel assigned to help you will be continuously supervised by a registered nurse.

## New Funding Available

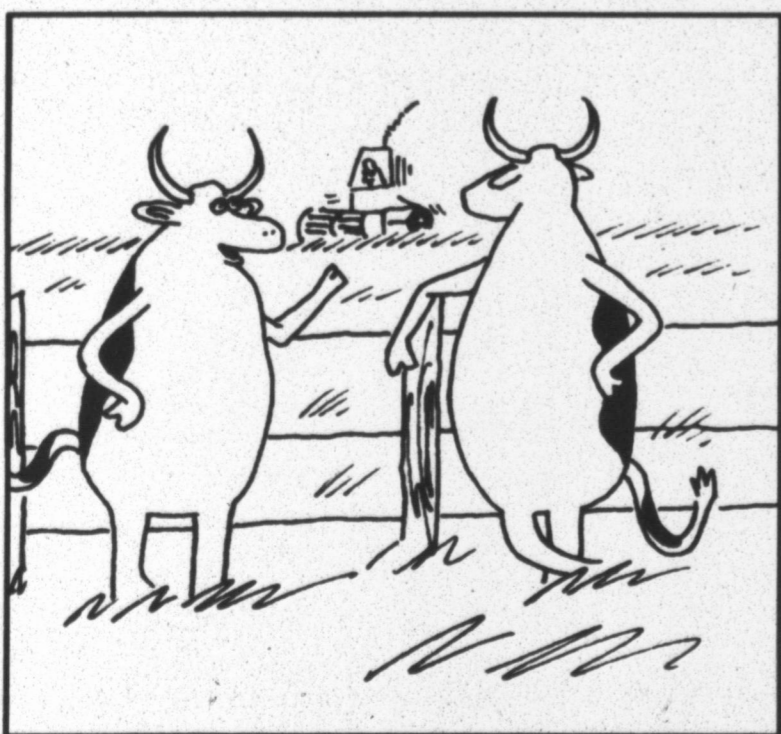
Governor Ann Richards announced a new innovative option to small and minority-owned Texas businesses today while attending the Texas Association of Mexican American Chambers of Commerce Convention in El Paso. This financing option is the first of its kind in the nation.

"For too long, small- and minority-owned businesses could not get the capital needed to do business," Governor Ann Richards said. "Today, that changes with a program tailor-made to meet the needs of these businesses without any cost to the state."

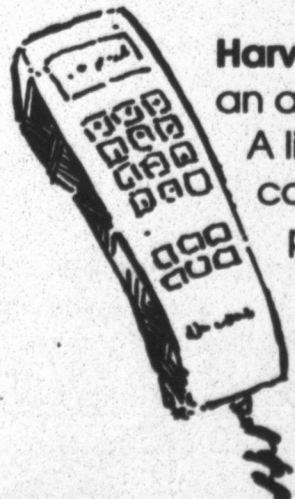
"Western Fidelity Funding has agreed to provide \$50 million per month in financing for small- and minority-owned companies holding receivables from the state, Fortune 500 companies, AA-rated cities and other approved companies. This represents a significant expansion over the \$100 million Western Fidelity Funding finances annually. This option will particularly help small- minority-owned businesses that want to do business with the state. In 1992, the state spent \$4.5 billion on goods and services. Previously, these businesses could not get the capital needed to finance their accounts receivable. Now, Western Fidelity Funding will provide financing based on the credit worthiness of the customer with which the applicant is doing business. In addition, the financing option is affordable for small business owners. Usually a finance company would require a \$100,000 minimum purchase amount which is prohibitive for small business. Under this financing option, the minimum purchase is reduced to \$10,000.

"This financing option opens the state procurement market for small- and minority-owned business, allowing them to get a bigger piece of pie. That has been an important goal of my administration," Governor Richards said.

Commerce, TAMACC and the Texas Association of Black Chambers of Commerce, and other state agencies worked together in advising Western Fidelity Funding on structuring the program. 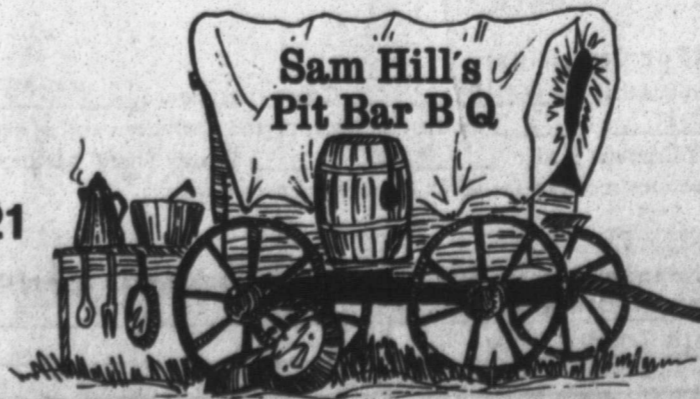

### BUG WATCH

CorelDraw 3.0

Exported TIFF files that have been created in CorelDraw 3.0 cannot be read by certain software packages. Among the programs known to be affected are all versions of WordPerfect for Windows, Ami Pro and Word for Windows.

In some cases, the images fail to appear in the destination program; in others, the destination program crashes and data can be lost.

According to a Corel spokesperson, the problem stems from CorelDraw 3.0's use of the version 5.0 of TIFF; several developers have not upgraded to this version, so their packages are unable to read files created in the versions mentioned.

Corel is currently working on a fix, which will be made available to registered users at no cost. In the interim, users should save CorelDraw 3.0 images in another picture format, such as PCX or BMP, that can be read by the destination program.
