Hallelujah! The Economy Is Recovering!

State Comptroller John Sharp released the sales tax figures for August on August 13, and they are good news, indeed! Receipts are from monthly filers on June sales and from quarterly filers on April, May and June sales. Donley County was up by 13.47 per cent over August of last year, and up 2.97 per cent for the year-to-date as compared to last year. Clarendon sales grew 16.86 per cent and 3.19 per cent. Hedley was down (-)26.3 per cent and (-)6.31 per cent. Howardwick was positive 24.72 and per cent.88 per cent.

Figures for the entire state were good. Of 243 counties reporting, all by 21 showed increased sales. That means that 92 per cent of the state's counties were up. Of those showing a decline, several were down by less than 1 per cent. (Some city and county figures were not comparable due to local tax increases, but the trend was clear.)

In this area, only one county--Hutchinson--had a negative figure. Hutchinson county was down on the year-to-date figure by (-)3.28, but was up by 15.89 per cent for August receipts. Hutchinson County is the home of Borger, Fritch, Sanford and Stinnett.

All other counties around Clarendon had positive figures. State Comptroller John Sharp said, "As the national economy recovers, increased consumer spending has caused sales tax rebates to increase." The state official gave several instances of growth for Texas. "Transamerica Insurance Group recently announced their relocation to Dallas, which should boost the city's employment by 1, per cent00 jobs.... The City of San Antonio continues to lead the state's major cities in economic growth. The Alamo city received the state's third largest payment, \$9.1 million, a 12. per cent percent increase over last August's payment of \$8.1 million. The Fort Worth-Arlington area is still in the midst of a very gradual economic recovery. The recently announced relocation of a large Motorola manufacturing facility to Fort Worth should breathe new life into the city's sluggish economy. El Paso enjoyed employment growth in all segments of its economy?"

In this region, Armstrong County (Claude) improved by 10.32 for August and 14.27 per cent YTD. Briscoe perked up by 38.74 and 16.47, respectively, with both Quitaque and Silverton close to the county average. Carson County chalked up an increase of 61.08 and 28.20 per cent; Groom, Panhandle and White Deer all showed positive figures for both categories. Childress County recovered with figures of 10.23 and 7.9 per cent.

Wellington has a new city sales tax, so Collingsworth County's figures are not comparable to last year's. The same is true of Pampa, influencing Gray County's figures. However, Lefors was up for the month by per cent0. per cent8 per cent, but showed a decline for the YTD, (-)9.63. The City of Memphis now has a city sales tax, so Hall County figures are not comparable. Estelline gave mixed results +43.42 for the month, but -3. per cent0 for the longer period. Lakeview sank on both figures, -12.7 per cent and -17.29, but Turkey smiled all the way to the bank: +18.4 per cent and +8.62 per cent.

Ochiltree (Perryton) climbed, 17.33 per cent and per cent. per cent9 per cent. Potter County (Amarillo) improved 18.71 per cent and 9.30. Randall County gained 16. per cent4 per cent and per cent.03.

Most of these figures are consistent with the reports of local merchants. Generally they had a lackluster summer until the middle of June.

School Prices and Policies Listed

The Clarendon school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for ECH-Grade 5 for \$1.15, 6-12 for \$1.25 and breakfast for ECH-Grade 5 for \$.75, 6-12 for \$.85. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the income chart, your children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income.

To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school. An application cannot be approved unless it is complete.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's personal use income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing your children should get free or reduced price meals.

You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Phil Barefield, Superintendent, P.O. Box 610, Clarendon, Texas 79226, phone-806-874-2062. If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

The school will let you know when your application is approved or denied.

Hedley School Lunch Policy Announced

Hedley ISD today announced its policy for providing free and reduced price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program, Community School Program and School Breakfast Program. The School Administration office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party. The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Foster children that are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits

regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

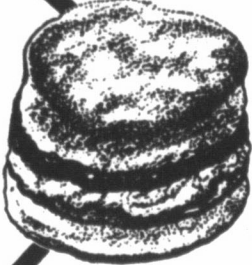





Check It Out

Have you ever "gotten into" a book which you had chosen to read for pure pleasure, and discovered it to have an entirely different theme from what you expected? Nevertheless, you continued your reading and found it to be one of the most interesting books you had selected. I experienced these feelings while reading *The Ghosts Of Palo Duro Canyon* by Robert S. Sprague. Even though I have great respect for the American Indian, I didn't intentionally seek a book strictly about these native Americans. However, it proved to be a memorable story which I will always be glad I read.

In his writing, *The Ghosts Of Palo Duro Canyon*, Mr. Sprague has intriguingly combined a fictional love story against a non-fiction setting of the Great Plains and Palo Duro Canyon. The story begins in a quaint Mexican town just prior to a Comanche raid which demolishes the whole village and its population except for a nine-year-old girl and her brother who are captured, and later, grow up in one of the villages in Palo Duro Canyon. After the girl is older, an exciting love story develops between her and the son of the Big Chief of the village. As their story unfolds, it is intertwined with authentic people who were involved in true historical places and events.

Aspects of Indian culture such as belief in the Great Spirit for protection, buffalo hunts, plans and reasons for raids, competition and friendship among tribes, jealousy between young braves and between young maidens to the extent of suspenseful revenge are interestingly related. Indian customs, the expected work of women, the war parties of men, descriptions of scenery and weather, the Battle of Adobe Walls, the power and struggles of tribes as they were driven back to make their last stand in Palo Duro Canyon against Colonel Mackenzie's troops are all vividly depicted by the author.

Elements of suspense, mystery, and romance are evident from the courtship and marriage of the Mexican captive and the Chief's son at the beginning of the book to the kidnapping of their baby son on the final pages. The Indian trial of the kidnapper and her hideous punishment is another dramatic example of Indian belief and justice.

Interesting photographs of famous Indian Chiefs such as Geronimo and Quanah Parker and others are included in this book. Photographs of military men who were instrumental in ending South Plains Indian Wars also add interest.

Incidentally, did you know the name, "Palo Duro", means "hardwood"? The Mexicans and Comancheros gave this name to the canyon because the cedar trees growing there were of special hard wood.

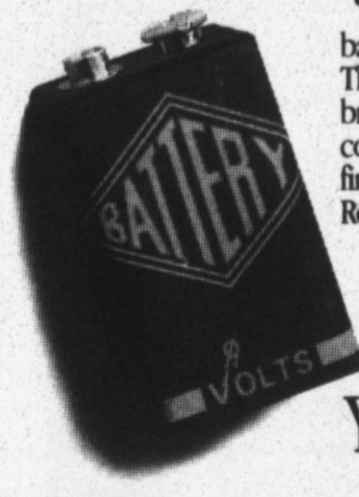

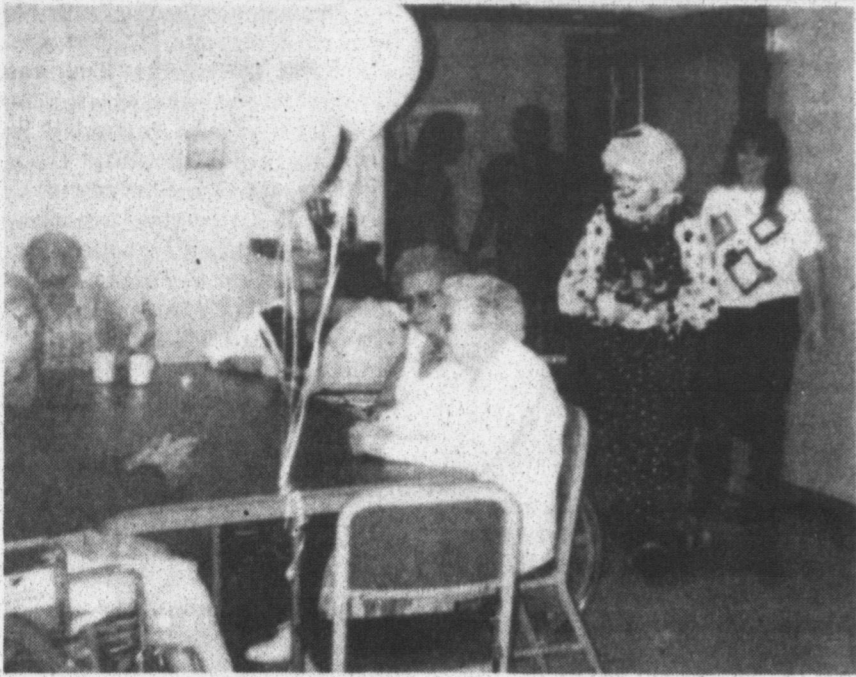

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC only have to list their child's name, food stamp or AFDC Case number and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or AFDC Case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, how often the person receives it and the social security number of either the primary wage earner responsible for the care of the child or the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If neither household member has a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy the reviewing official will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling or the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent Thomas Robertson in the School Administration Office or phone 856-5323.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer received these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

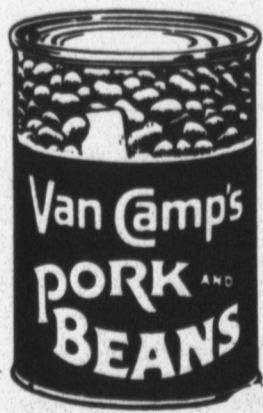
