THD MAINTENANCE EMPLOYEES SALUTED IN EMERGENCIES

A letter of from the Texas Highway Commission went to the heads of some 250 maintenance sections in Texas.

"The past few months serve to remind us of the skill, courage and dedication of you and your crews in emergency situations," the letter said.

Highway Department maintenance crews are based in almost every of Texas' 254 counties. Primarily, their job is to keep the highways in good condition, patching pavements, making minor repairs on structures, picking up litter and caring for natural vegetation and landscaping along the roadside, upkeep of Texas' 1.100 safety rest areas, roadside parks and turnouts and other tasks involved in good highway housekeep-

In the process, maintenance crews often act as Good Samaritains, coming to the aid of stalled or stranded motorists.

But in times of natural disaster, the crews put in long hours clearing snow and ice of highways, sanding bridges and putting out warning signs and fla- drinking water shortages.

The winter tested the mettle of the maintenance men, esrillo had subfreezing temperatures recorded every day for 36 days prior to Christmas and 17 more days after New Years.

Sign Owners Have Til June 30 For Permits AUSTIN - Owners of signs

along Interstate and federal-aid primary highways face a June 30 deadline to apply for a permit and a license for them. The Texas Highway Beautifi-

cation Act, in effect since June of 1972, requires owners of signs which are within 660 feet of Interstate or federal-aid primary highways and are visible from main traffic lanes to file permit requests with the district offices of the Texas Highway Department. The permit cost \$5

Before permits can be approved, sign owners must obtain a \$25 state license and post \$2,500 bond for each county in which they have a sign. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications can be obtained from Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P. O. Box 5075, Austin, 78763, or any Highway Department district office.
