

22 Clyde High Band Students Make All-District Band Honors

CLYDE — Twenty-two members from the Clyde band were awarded chairs in the North Central Texas All-District band last Saturday in Stephenville. Students trying out represented 19 district schools with 15 present. The schools represented in the band were Clyde 22, Stephenville 13, Comanche 7, Granbury 6, Early, Ranger and Breckenridge, 5 each, Cross Plains and De Leon, 4 each, Eastland 2, Cisco, Hico, Brownwood and Rising Star 1 each.

This is the seventh time in the past 11 years of competition that Clyde has had the largest number in the all-district band from Class A through Class AAA schools which are in the band district. Besides having the largest number, Clyde also had the largest number of first chairs. Making first chairs were flute, Frances Bodine; bassoon, Denise Dusek; contra-bass clarinet, Keith Morton; horn, Jeri Pruet; trumpet, DeNell Estes, bass trombone Richard Bade.

Others making the band were Lisa Walker, flute; Joy Huff and Debbie Day, bass clarinet; Cindy Landers, Becky Froman, Debbie Deakins, Sharla Stone and Greg Harrison, clarinet; Mike McCarty, alto sax; Judy Kniffen, Neva Warren and Tommie Tucker, French horn; Melinda Moore, Steve Harless and Johnny Tucker, trumpet and Darlene Pyeatt baritone.

Some of these students performed Monday night for the Band Booster Club and their playing was indicative of the fine musicians they are and show why they represented Clyde so well in these tryouts.

BULLDOGS STOMP EASTLAND; SHARE 3RD PLACE IN DISTRICT

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs trampled Eastland's Mavericks 31-14 in Eastland Friday night for a share of 3rd place in District 9AA.

The Bulldogs scored once in each quarter of Marty Clifford capped a 56 yard drive and James Stevens swept right end to finish out a 43-yard drive. Tommy Bailey kicked both extra points. Eastland scored twice in the 2nd quarter to hang to a 14-14 tie at halftime.

The 3rd quarter was scoreless and Bailey broke the ice in the 4th period with a 38-yard field goal. Paul Beeman scored twice on 9 and 6 yard touchdowns in the 4th quarter 17-point barrage. Bailey added both extra points.

Ruben Ramos completed passes to Jack Longbotham, Johnny Tucker, Robert Newton and Kim Harless on key 3rd down situations to keep Bulldog drives alive.

Clyde had 15 first downs and 414 total yards to Eastland's 8 and 163. Leading rusher for Clyde was Marty Clifford with 105 yards. Beeman had 65 and Stevens made 59 yards.

Band Director Bobby Brooks commented: "I feel, especially considering the fact that these students went to school all day Friday, and then to the ball game Friday night, did an especially nice job of playing the concert Saturday night. Having 15 to 17 hour days is not easy for them like getting to bed at midnight and then up the next morning at six, playing a musical instrument all morning in competition with other students, then practicing for a program all Saturday afternoon. But we know that while these students are out blowing musical instruments all day they weren't out blowing a safe, or as is so common today, blowing "grass." I surely appreciate the parents who encourage their students to work this way for the Clyde band and for their own musical knowledge."

MEMORIAL RESOLUTION BOB NORRELL

WHEREAS, the life works of BOB NORRELL were terminated by death on Monday, October 1, 1973; and

WHEREAS, he served with distinguished loyalty, dedication and devotion to the Banking Fraternity and, more especially to The First National Bank of Baird in various capacities that spans sixty-five years, the last of which he served as Chairman of the Board; and

WHEREAS, the Baird Bank began its existence in January of 1883, and, after reorganization in 1885, became The First National Bank of Baird as currently legally established; and

WHEREAS, in August of 1908, genial Bob Norrell joined the staff of The First National Bank of Baird as a struggling young progressive banker, and on January 12, 1915, he was made an assistant cashier at a time when J. B. Cutbirth was added to the Board and at that time, W. S. Hinds had become cashier, which was then the active officer position in The First National Bank of Baird; and

WHEREAS, he continued with outstanding loyalty, dedication and ability in this position until the untimely death of W. S. Hinds, at which time he became cashier of the bank; and

WHEREAS, he was elevated to the Presidency of the Bank after the death of Tom Windham, who had for many years been its inactive President, this change taking place on the 10th day of September, 1951; and

WHEREAS, on the 9th day of January, 1973, Mr. Norrell retired as President of the Bank and was elevated to the Chairman of the Board, as an inactive officer, and served in this capacity until his death; and

WHEREAS, the bank has grown from deposits in the amount of \$623,601.44 on the 29th day of December, 1922, at a time when he was beginning to be an active officer in the bank, to the sum of \$8,065,787.97 deposits at the time of his retirement; and

WHEREAS, The First National Bank of Baird has been a pillar of strength in the Baird community and its trade territory; and

WHEREAS, Bob Norrell's entire working career has included a wide variety of civic activities centered mainly around the Baird Methodist Church, the Baird Chamber of Commerce through its originator, the Baird Luncheon Club, and his Lodge Work, his primary center of activity has always been that of the bank; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Norrell's dedication to the Methodist Church was always dedicated by a Christian example being set in his daily actions in the bank; and

WHEREAS, his presence will be sorely missed;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of The First National Bank of Baird take due note of his passing and send its sympathy and respect to the bereaved family of the said Bob Norrell; and that a copy of this Resolution be executed by each member of the Board of Directors of The First National Bank of Baird and the original of this Resolution, after its execution, be transmitted to the bereaved family of Bob Norrell, and a copy thereof be recorded in the permanent Directors' Minutes of The First National Bank of Baird, and a copy thereof be handed to the news media.

LOCAL ASCS OFFICE TO ASSIST IN FUEL ALLOCATION PROGRAM

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service ASCS and the Texas Railroad Commission have joined hands in an effort to increase efficiency in the handling of the mandatory allocation of middle distillate fuels. An agreement between the state and federal agencies should speed up the program.

Beginning immediately, ASCS County Office personnel will

verify fuel needs for hardship cases on Form OOG-PAP-20 for all applications prior to their submission to the State Allocation Officer (Texas Railroad Commission).

Previously it was planned that needed verification would be obtained after the form was submitted to the Austin office. Form OOG-PAP-20 is to be used by wholesale purchasers to request emergency allocations for immediate use. The form has been supplied to ASCS County Offices throughout the State.

Also available is Form OOG-PAP-17 which is for the use of purchasers of middle distillate fuels in bulk supply to adjust their monthly allocation for the year or for obtaining a new allocation.

Further information may be obtained from the Callahan County ASCS Offices, Courthouse in Baird.

Soil Survey Information Available At Soil Conservation Office

Farmers in the Callahan Co. area who bring additional land into crop production in 1974 are being urged to use sound conservation practices.

Les Ethetton, district conservationist for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service at Baird, said conservation measures not only protect the soil from erosion but also increase production.

"Some people are predicting farmers will bring several thousand acres of former 'set-aside' acreage back into crop production in Texas in the next year," Ethetton said. "This is considered to be the best and quickest way to check food price increases.

"But it's also the quickest way to increase dust storms, sediment pollution, and other erosion problems unless sound conservation measures are installed," he pointed out.

"There is a lot of land in Callahan County which can be

used for cropland safely if managed properly. Yet there are other soils which are so susceptible to blowing or washing that they should never be used for crop production," Ethetton said.

Ethetton said he hopes farmers will use soil survey information available from his office before putting new land in cultivation.

"Soil surveys have been made on over half the land in Callahan County. These surveys show which soils are best suited for crop production and which soils are most susceptible to erosion. They can also show which soils are most productive," he said.

SCS is giving top priority to helping farmers plan conservation measures on new land brought into cultivation. For information, contact the local SCS office at Baird, telephone 854-1349.

BAIRD BEARS SHUT-OUT WYLIE TO END SUCCESSFUL SEASON

BAIRD — The Bears ended their football season for the year in winning style with a 33-0 shutout over the Wylie Bulldogs. The victory gave the Bears a 6-4 season record, and the Bulldogs wind up with a 1-8-1 season record.

Baird put their first points on the board late in the 2nd quarter after a discouraging 1st period. It was Terry Bates who ran in for the touchdown from 7-yards out. Rudy Gonzales added the extra point to give Baird a 7-0 lead at halftime.

Bates got his second TD in the 3rd quarter on a pass reception from quarterback Jay Ringhoffer that covered 17 yards. Gonzales booted the extra point. Later in that quarter, Ringhoffer hit Bates again for a 12-

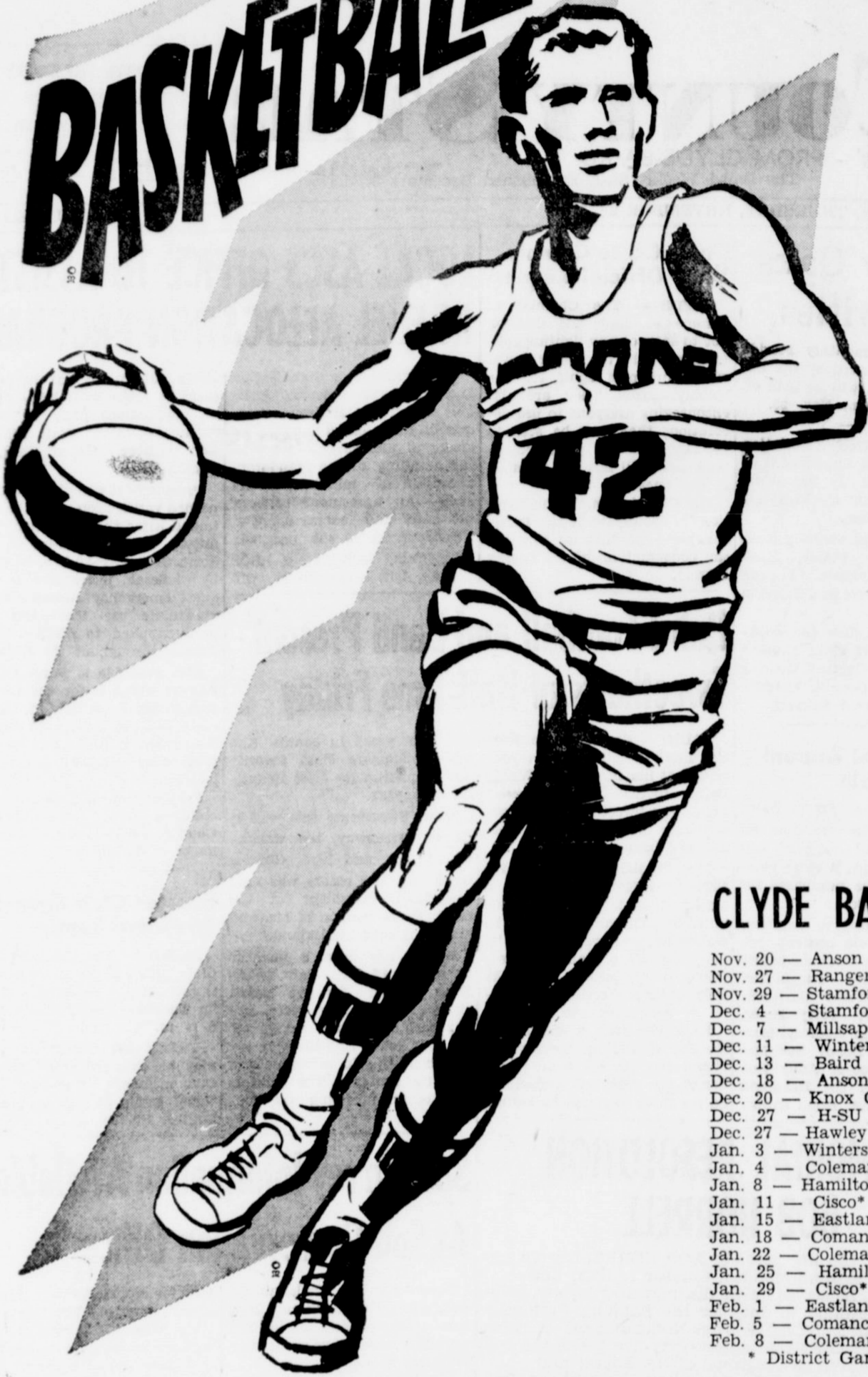
yard touchdown pass. The extra point failed.

Baird led in overall yardage with 356 yards and the Bears defense held Wylie to 116 total yards. Baird had 17 first downs and Wylie had 7. Leading ground gainer for Baird was Rudy Rodriguez with 103 yards.

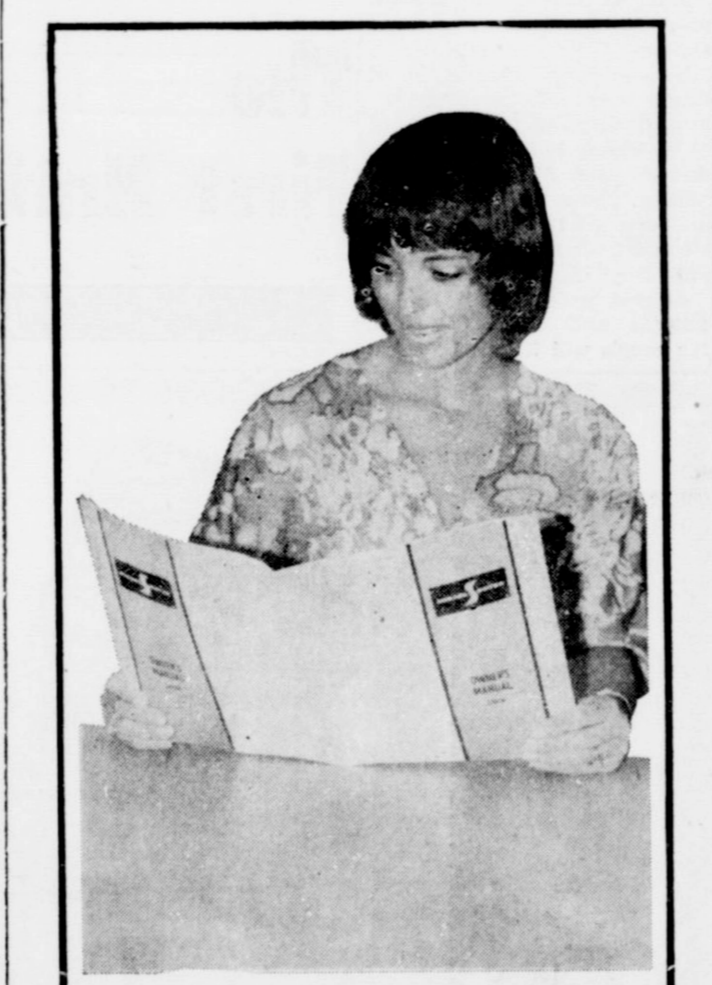

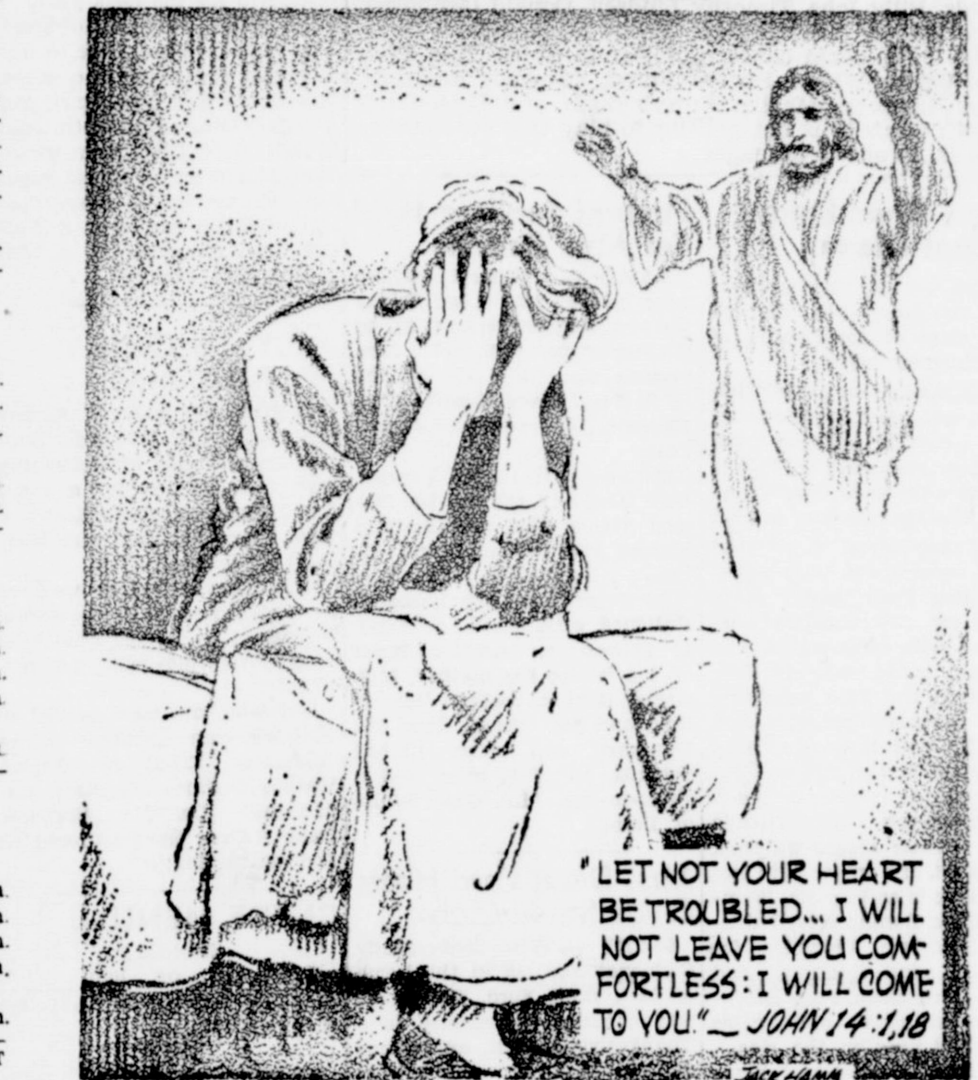

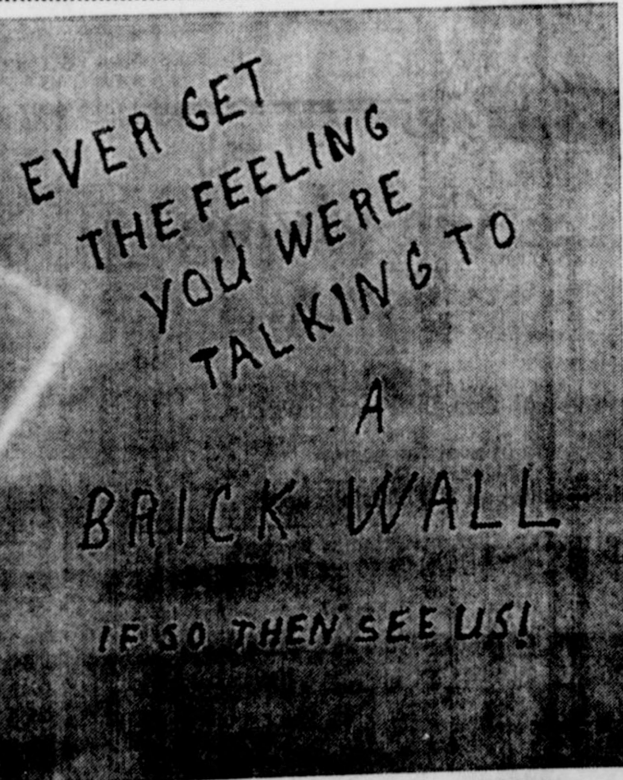
