## Farm Safety Week July 19 - July 25

Man's spectacular advances in the field of medical research which increase life expectancy and reduce human suffering are being largely offset by his lethargy in applying simple antidotes to some of the commonest causes of death and injury, the head of the state's largest farm organization declared recently.

Citing the tremendous farm accident toll which annually takes 1,000 lives and seriously injures another 100,000 in Texas alone, J. H. West, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, called for full cooperation on the part of farmers and ranchers of the state in the Farm Safety Week observance set for July 19-25.

"We employ our best brains in conquering such killers as polio, tuberculosis and heart disease and fall to use the common sense God gave each of us for the preservation of our lives and prevention of injury to our bodies," West declared.

The farm leader said that the Farm Safety Week observance is "a concentrated effort to make the observance of safety precautions 'second nature' with all who work in agriculture." The nationwide observance was set by proclamation of President Eisenhower and in Texas by Governor Daniel.

The accidental death rate among farm people is higher than in any other major industry, and Texas has one of the worst farm accident records in the nation. West said. "Farmers are naturally susceptible to work accidents because a farmer is a 'jack of all trades.' He is a mechanic, blacksmith, electrician, plumber, carpenter, veterinarian and master of many other crafts rolled into one. All of these are hazardous jobs and the farmer is less cognizant of their inherent dangers and less likely to take precautions than the skilled worker who is familiar with them and knows what can result from carelessness."

Delegates will name outstanding members, confer advanced degrees, present scholarships and awards and elect a new president as a part of the business of the convention.

## Wheat Referendum Vote Nears

Wheat growers of Callahan County will soon be making their annual decision on marketing quotas, Chairman Tommie Harris of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee said today.

On July 23, they will join with wheat farmers in 38 other States in a referendum to decide the type of marketing control program they will have for the 1960 crop of wheat. The referendum is held at this time so that farmers will know at winter wheat planting time whether marketing restrictions will be in effect at harvest time in 1960.

The wheat program on which farmers will vote, Mr. Harris said is the same as that which has been in effect for the last several years. Marketing quotas have been proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture as required by the law when supplies are excessive. They will remain in effect only if approved by two-thirds of the farmers who comply with their individual farm wheat acreage allotments may market their entire wheat crop without penalty and are eligible for price support at at least 75 per cent of parity. A grower who exceeds his allotment will be subject to marketing quota penalties on his excess wheat except that any grower may produce up to 15 acres for harvest as grain without penalty.

If more than one-third of the voters vote for no quota control, they do not take effect and there are no restrictions on wheat marketings. Price support is available at 50 per cent of parity to farmers who comply with their acreage allotments.

Any farmer is eligible to vote who expects to produce more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1960, except a grower who participated in the feed wheat program in 1959.

## Abilene Club Makes Second Investment In Sandra Barnes' Future

"We just couldn't forget her. Helping her has been one of the most rewarding things we've done."

These are the words of a member of the Abilene Opti-Mrs. Club and she's speaking of Sandra Barnes, a pretty, blue-eyed blonde coed from Clyde.

Many Abilenians will remember Sandra as the youngster whose dream of entering Callaudet College for the Deaf came true last fall, with the help of two Abilene organizations and several individuals in the Abilene-Clyde area.

This week one of those groups, the Opti-Mrs. Club, made a second investment in Sandra's college education with a gift of \$250. Last year their \$100 check sparked other contributions that enabled the young home economics student to use her scholarship to the Washington, D. C., college.

"We just couldn't forget Sandra," says Mrs. Prentiss Adams, club project chairman during the past year. So the Opti-Mrs. members looked into their treasury and "gave all we could spare."

A graduate of the Texas School for the Deaf in Austin, where she was valedictorian, Sandra is majoring in home economics. She attended the Austin School for 13 years and upon graduation was awarded a scholarship to Gallaudet, only college in the world for the deaf.

"Sandra's goal is to teach home economics at the school she attended in Austin," said her mother, Mrs. L. W. Barnes, a widow who works as a seamstress in an Abilene decorator's shop. Sandra has two brothers, William, 18, Gary, 17, and a sister, Phyllis, 16. Two older sisters have moved to other states.

Since returning to Clyde last month, Sandra has spent her days making school clothes (she's an expert seamstress) and earnestly looking for summer employment. So far she's been unsuccessful but refuses to be discouraged, her mother reports, because she wants so much to help pay her own way.

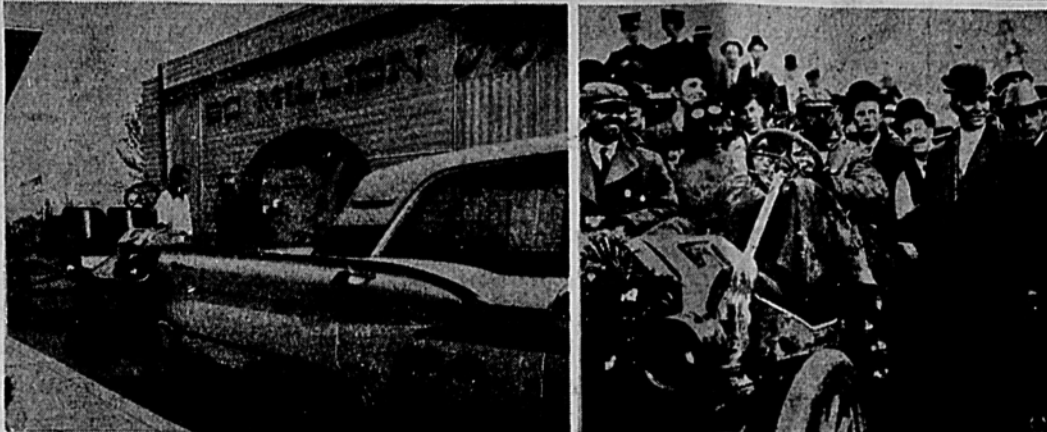

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**When The Face Of America Began To Change**



In mid-afternoon of June 1, 1909, five primitive motor-  
cars started out from New York City Hall headed for  
Seattle, Wash., in what was officially called the "Ocean-  
to-Ocean Automobile Endurance Contest."

Two of the five were Model T Fords, designated No. 1 and  
No. 2. The others were a Shawmut, an Acme and an Itala—  
names now long since forgotten in the automotive industry.

Ford No. 2 reached Seattle at 12:55 p.m., June 23, nearly  
17 hours ahead of its nearest competitor, the Shawmut, and  
was the first car ever to travel from New York to Seattle  
under its own power. Ford No. 1 came in third, the Acme  
fourth. The Itala broke down and was shipped in by freight.

The historic contest is being re-enacted this month by a  
Ford Motor Company caravan which, as nearly as possible,  
is following the same route and same day-to-day schedule  
as the original contestants.

Included in the caravan are a duplicate of the victorious  
No. 2 Ford; Ford Motor Company's 50 millionth vehicle, a  
Galaxie four-door sedan; a 1908 Model K Ford which paced  
the competitors from New York to St. Louis, Mo.; and an  
exhibit van, the displays of which show a look into the  
past and a glance at the future of the automotive industry.

**IT'S THE LAW  
In Texas . . .**

Your Child and the Doctor

It's a good idea to give writ-  
ten consent for necessary medi-  
cal care if your child leaves home  
for a visit or a camping trip,  
or if you plan to be away for  
any length of time.

For example, a summer camp  
nurse may bring a boy into a  
hospital with an acute case of  
appendicitis. But the doctor  
may well hesitate to go ahead  
and operate without the par-  
ent's consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is  
such permission just a legal  
technicality? No, he is well with-  
in his rights, though he may  
give first aid -- but only for  
emergency treatment where a  
child's health or life may be at  
stake. He is likely to put off fol-  
low-up care until he can reach  
the child's parents. A relative or  
baby sitter generally cannot  
grant consent for a child's treat-  
ment.

Even an adult must request  
treatment and grant consent to  
medical care on his own before  
a doctor can give it to him. Chil-  
dren cannot do this.

By going to your doctor you  
show willingness and consent to  
accept his treatment. Your con-  
sent is assumed also when you  
ask for a house call by the doc-  
tor, or if as a result of an ac-  
cident you come to a hospital

for emergency treatment. If you  
are unconscious, the doctor may  
well give you emergency care,  
yet later he should get your con-  
sent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medi-  
cal treatment, and except in  
dire emergencies their parents  
or guardians must give it for  
them.

The consent should not be  
broadly or loosely phrased, but  
should be as specific as circum-  
stances permit.

The principal reason for hav-  
ing the consent in writing is to  
avoid later misunderstandings.  
It is a protection both to the  
patient and physician.

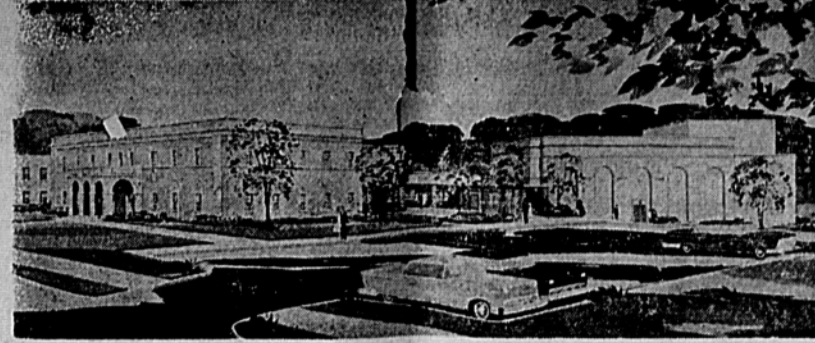

## "Creeping" Inflation

A good many people, including a few economists, seem to feel that a certain amount of "creeping" inflation is not inevitable but desirable, and makes for maximum economic growth and high employment. Indeed, a Congressional joint committee has been holding hearings on the subject, in an effort to find out if government policy should favor slow price inflation of something like two or three per cent each year.

This caused a publication of the Morgan Guaranty Trust Company of New York to observe: "There was a time when such an inquiry would have been inconceivable. Only in very recent years has it been seriously proposed that inflation could be regarded as anything but a monetary disease resulting from abuse of power over money. The Constitutional duty of Congress to coin money and regulate the value thereof was generally understood to give control over the size or metallic content of the monetary unit; maintenance of the soundness and stability of money was taken as an implicit mandate, too obvious to require specific mention."

It is obvious that such an "implicit mandate" no longer exists. As the bank's publication goes on to point out, the primary reason for "creeping" inflation has been the ability of labor organizations to obtain wage increases exceeding gains in productivity. When that happens prices can go only one way — up.

Annual price increases of two or three per cent a year may not, on the surface, seem extreme or particularly damaging. But, at the latter rate, it would erode the value of the dollar by around three-quarters in a person's working life of 45 years.

The bank's article touches on the far-reaching economic effects of this. People living on fixed incomes, of course, would suffer a steady decline in living standards. And pensioners, bond holders, bank depositors, benefi-

ciaries of trust funds and life insurance policies would be among the helpless victims — helpless because there is no real protection against inflation, especially for persons of small means who cannot afford to take risks. This means that the great majority of workers would lose under "creeping" inflation, while the chief beneficiaries would be borrowers and successful speculators — that is "those who could repay loans in cheaper dollars than they had borrowed and those affluent enough shrewd enough and lucky enough to take large risks and to guess right." People in these classifications, obviously, are comparatively few in number.

The article also terms the view that "creeping" inflation would stimulate long-run economic growth a "very dubious assumption." Instead, the swings of the "boom and bust" cycle would be stimulated rather than moderated, and economic growth over the years would be retarded instead of accelerated.

The conclusion: "To acquiesce in the general destruction of the value of money, with all the blind injustice that the process would involve, in the unwarranted hope that such a policy would stimulate economic growth over the long term, would be a strange way of administering money for the benefit of the people. A policy of accepting 'creeping' inflation voluntarily would be a tragic error. Almost as tragic would be the error of allowing it to occur by default through failure to deal decisively with the factors that cause it."

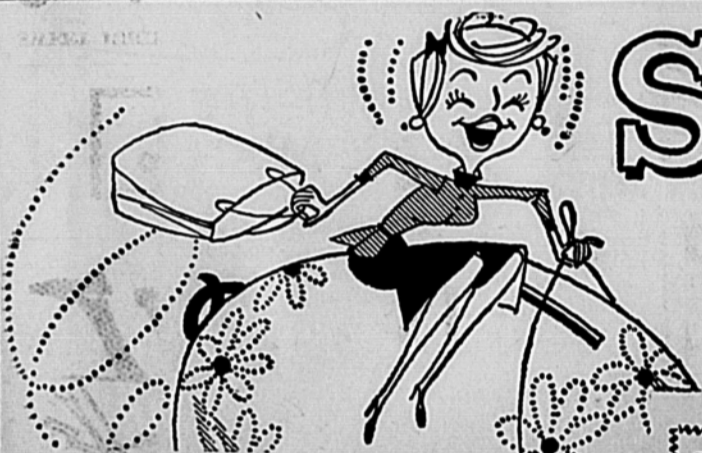
