## Acree Survey Now Under Way

This month the U.S.D.A., in cooperation with the Post Office Department, is conducting an annual acreage survey. Rural Mail Carriers are delivering 30,000 cards to Texas farmers and ranchers. The cards list questions on crop acreages and livestock. Carriers pick up the completed cards and forward them to Cary Palmer, Agricultural Statistician for Texas in Austin.

Mr. Palmer urges farmers to answer and return cards to Mail Carriers. "This survey serves as a basis for estimating the State's farm production. Every report helps to make accurate estimates."

The bill would relieve motorists of financial responsibility for livestock injured on public highways and besides holding the owner of the livestock liable it would also authorize fines up to \$200 for persons who allowed stock to roam on highways. It would also repeal the local option law which now permits open range and allow officers to impound stock found on highways.

## TS&GRA Urges 'Yes' Referendum Vote

Officials of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association have reiterated their recommendation to the state's sheep producers that they vote "yes" in the current wool referendum.

Deadline for voting on this self-help plan in the promotion of wool and lamb is September 30.

Lance Sears of Sweetwater, TS&GRA president, said that it's important that all ranchmen, regardless of the size of their operations, participate in the referendum.

This referendum, which was called by Secretary of Agriculture Benson, is of utmost importance to the sheep and wool industry, Sears said. Without the one cent per pound deduction from incentive payments from the government, which would be authorized through a favorable vote, the sheepmen would be without any kind of a promotion program. Sears said the work of the last four years would be lost to the industry and that American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., which has headquarters in Denver and administers the promotion work, would be out of business.

TS&GRA directors at a recent meeting authorized Sears and Ernest L. Williams, executive secretary, to push the association's drive toward a favorable vote. In a follow up of previous work the association has mailed out postal cards to more than 7,500 growers reminding them of the referendum and urging those who have not voted to do so immediately.

"This one cent per pound deduction is nothing more than a self-imposed tax for growers and will in no way affect other fields of agriculture," Sears said.

Outcome of the referendum will not be known until after October 1.

## Fred Foy Shows Reserve Champion Lamb At 1959 Edition of West Texas Fair



Fred Foy showed the Reserve Champion of the boy's division in Hampshire Ram Lamb Class, in the 1959 edition of the West Texas Fair at Abilene. Fred had an additional honor by having his outstanding animal place Reserve Champion of the open show which means that he competed with the top adult breeders in the state that raised Hampshire sheep.

This ram lamb came out of the flock of John Bill Oman, who lives near Avoca. Fred has previously purchased breeding stock from the same breeder - some of which will show at the Callahan County Livestock Show and some to the Houston Show.

This breed of sheep is relatively new to this part of the country. In the north and eastern part of the United States, breeders are going to a smaller, more compact sheep for market and breeding purposes. ## Nike-Hercules Missile To Be at Dyes AFB

One of the nation's front-line defenses, the Nike-Hercules guided missile will be brought to Abilene on Sept. 26 for "Kids Day" at Dyes Air Force Base. The missile became operational in four areas in June 1958. It can engage and destroy at much longer ranges and higher altitudes than the Nike-Ajax - either single, or formations of, aircraft of the present or foreseeable future.

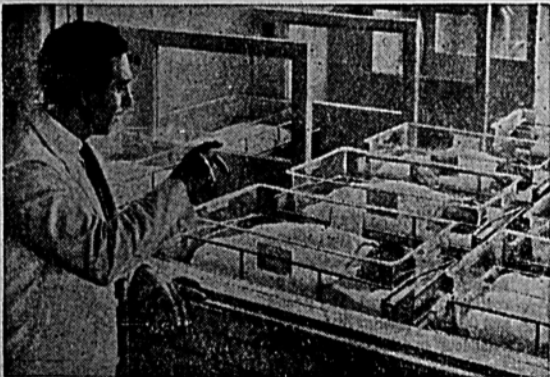
The dart-shaped missile alone is 27 feet long, the booster is 14.5 feet long.

The missile is launched by remote control and is given its initial impetus by a solid propellant booster rocket and then accelerated by a solid sustainer motor.

The atomic warhead - which, of course, will not be with the missile at Kids Day, is designed to insure that detonation can only occur at altitudes sufficiently high to prevent damage to friendly surrounding terrain.

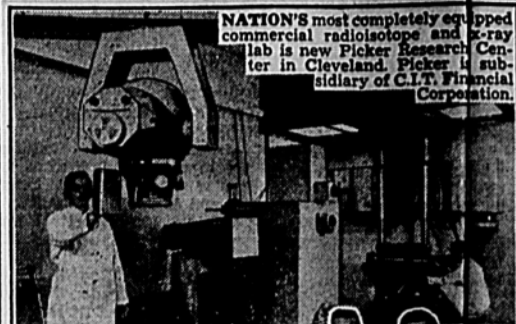

**Soil Conservation District News**

The Turkey Creek Watershed program is progressing toward construction readiness, according to D. C. Cox, Work Unit Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Baird. Cox met with the directors of the Turkey Creek Conservation District and C. M. Garrett, supervisor of the Central Colorado Soil

Conservation District, at a meeting in Cross Plains Thursday night, and reviewed steps necessary for beginning detailed surveys for design of flood water retarding structures.

The field survey work on Turkey Creek can be started sometime in November, the directors were told, if sufficient progress continues in obtaining easements and right of way for construction.

Engineering and field survey work is now being done in Coleman County on ten flood water retarding structures in Muke-water Watershed. This work will be finished by mid-November, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist of Brownwood. The field crew now in Muke-water will be available for beginning field work in Turkey Creek Watershed, if construction readiness prevails at that time.

The directors made plans for securing remaining easements at the Thursday night meeting. They need the cooperation of all local people in making ready for flood prevention construction to begin on Turkey Creek.

**School Buses Carry 2,000,000 Daily**

Texas' largest transportation system is now in full swing -- the State's fleet of more than 8,000 school buses. Furthermore, for the next nine months, these buses will carry the bulk of nearly 2,000,000 pupils to and from school each week day.

It is truly a Texas-size task to transport all these pupils -- it is an even greater task to transport them safely. No one will deny the school bus driver has a tremendous responsibility.

But, says the Texas Safety Association, motorists are also charged with the safety of our school bus riding pupils. The State law is very precise on this point and reads as follows:

**Sec. 104. OVERTAKING AND PASSING SCHOOL BUS:**

a. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus, which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not

exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

b. Every bus used for the transportation of school children shall bear upon the front and rear thereon a plainly visible sign containing the words "school bus" in letters not less than eight inches in height.

c. The driver of a vehicle upon a highway with separate roadways need not stop upon meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or when upon a controlled-access highway and the school bus is stopped in a loading zone which is part of or adjacent to such highway and where pedestrians are not permitted to cross the roadway.

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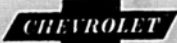

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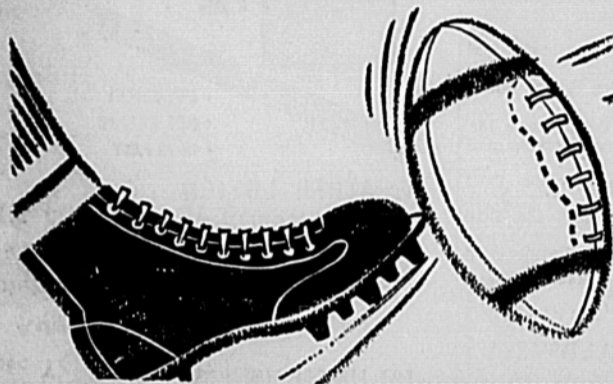
