FARMERS MEET AT CROSS PLAINS

Farmers in and around Cross Plains met last Wednesday night, July 24, at the Cross Plains High School auditorium to plan for the fall planting of vetch and rye. There were 52 farmers present and under direction of O. B. Edmondson, Vocational Agriculture teacher of Cross Plains, a round table discussion of the phases of vetch production was carried on.

Securing super-phosphate and fertilizer equipment are the main obstacles facing the farmers planning to plant vetch as most of them have already secured their seed.

B. B. McPherson, County AAA Office Administrator, said the government was shipping in 40 tons of super-phosphate in the hope that this would cause the fertilizer companies to supply local dealers with sufficient quantities to meet the demand for Callahan county.

In order to get the fertilizer in the ground, the farmers will make or have made the necessary equipment since commercial fertilizer spreaders are not available. Two good suggestions from the floor were made. One was to modify an ordinary seed drill for the purpose, and the other was to use a barrel and the rear axle of a Model T or other make of car. The cost is very little. The barrel is placed above the axle and a propeller driven from the gears, underneath the barrel, broadcasts the fertilizer as it falls through holes made in the bottom of the barrel. A member was to contact a builder in Brownwood as to price and quantity he could put out.

This group of farmers plans to meet later and organize and be prepared for the harvest that is expected to be reaped next June.

S. J. R. No. 5

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE;" and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
