Sen. Rogers Attacks Lewd Literature

Senator Andy Rogers this week asked a crackdown on lewd literature traffic in Texas, aimed at cutting out sale of magazines glorifying sex crime on newsstands.

Rogers introduced a Senate Bill Wednesday (Feb. 4) which would make illegal the sale or distribution of any type of lewd publication, picture, or movie devoted to immorality and lewdness.

Striking at newsstands selling immoral literature, Rogers urged the "striking out" of all sales and barter of such magazines.

"It's time for a crackdown on this type of thing," he urged. "Everyone knows that such books are printed and illustrated to prey on our teen-agers, who will at one time or another buy one of the books as long as it is so easily available."

The bill brought many comments from members of the State Senate and, though, the opposition will be strong, most agreed that it is time for action on the situation.

"There remains but one solution to this problem," Rogers stated, "Legislative action. Yet two bills urging that such literature traffic be stopped have already been proposed in the Texas Legislature in recent years—both have been defeated."

Rogers' bill is the first to propose such a powerful crackdown on lewd publications traffic.

"The growth of traffic in immoral publications has become a menace to the moral welfare of

the citizens of Texas," he declared.

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## Gov. Shivers Says School Teachers Need More Pay

FINDING THE MONEY IS THE BIG PROBLEM

(NOTE: The Governor of Texas says our school teachers must have a cost-of-living increase in pay. The problem is finding the money. His plan, as presented to the Legislature recently, will be outlined in a series of articles of which this is the third.)

The crisis of our schools is that we need more teachers.

The crisis of our teachers is that they need more money.

The crisis of our State is that it must remain on a sound financial basis in these pressing times.

In two previous articles I have pointed out that the public school teachers of Texas deserve a raise and that I am for it.

But, instead of setting a definite figure for a raise and then trying to find the money, I think we need to locate the money first.

That is the only way to operate on long-range principle that will be to the best interest of all Texans, including the teachers.

We cannot measure educational values solely in terms of dollars. At the same time, we have a limited number of dollars to translate into educational values. A dollar misspent means the lack of a dollar where it is needed.

My proposals for obtaining the money for increased teacher pay are: (1) transfer part of the available school fund, which goes to all districts on a strict per capita basis regardless of need, over to the Gilmer-Aikin minimum foundation fund, which guarantees a decent standard to the less prosperous schools, and (2) return to the original proportion of one local dollar for every three State Dollars of Gilmer-Aikin support.

That first suggestion, which I already have explained in detail, boils down to a switch of part of our State school money from one pocket to another. The pocket that pays for the Gilmer-Aikin program of State help to needy schools ought to have a little of the money from the pocket that shells out its contents to "haves" and "have nots" alike.

As for proposal number two—local support of the State aid program to public schools—it is both

a matter of simple mathematics and a question of fundamental policy.

Mathematically, it is clear that nobody's money goes as far today as it did in 1949 when the Gilmer-Aikin concept was put into operation. Yet the total contributions of Texas school districts toward the minimum foundation program have remained exactly the same—\$45 million—from year to year. This has left it up to the State to bear the rising expense of the Gilmer-Aikin plan.

If \$45 million was a fair share for the local school districts in 1949, it is no longer a fair share. I feel that it would be fair for the local districts to continue to contribute at the original rate—25 per cent of the expense of the minimum foundation program.

Policy-wise, the districts need to pay their part as a means of insuring that local schools remain under the control of local people. As the State government paid more and more of the minimum foundation bill, it would be natural for the State to begin assuming more authority in the local schools. That would be an unwholesome situation, contrary to the independent traditions of Texas.

When we discuss the contributions of local school districts, one

of the first questions to arise is the ability to pay. The Gilmer-Aikin plan includes an "economic index" formula designed to place the financial burden equitably. This index takes into account elements like assessed valuation of property, school-age population, and local income. A few inequalities have become apparent because of disasters, droughts, and other economic factors in various parts of the State. But these can be corrected to a great extent by averaging experiences over periods of several years in order to compensate for unusual conditions.

The ability-to-pay idea should continue to be practiced in all phases of public school education in Texas.

The Texas Department of Education has made a study of 20 representative counties to see how the payment of one local dollar for every three State dollars toward the Gilmer-Aikin fund would affect the average community. Briefly, the conclusion was that the local people can pay 25 per cent of the minimum foundation program cost just as easily NOW as they could in 1949 when it was started. That is because of higher incomes and the increased value of property. For example, total county assessed valuations in Texas in 1948 were about \$6 billion. The 1952 valuations were

\$8.4 billion.

The below-average districts that really can't stand more expense would not be assessed any higher payments.

Over-all, however, the total contributions of the school districts of Texas must be raised if we are to give our teachers better pay without increasing State taxes.

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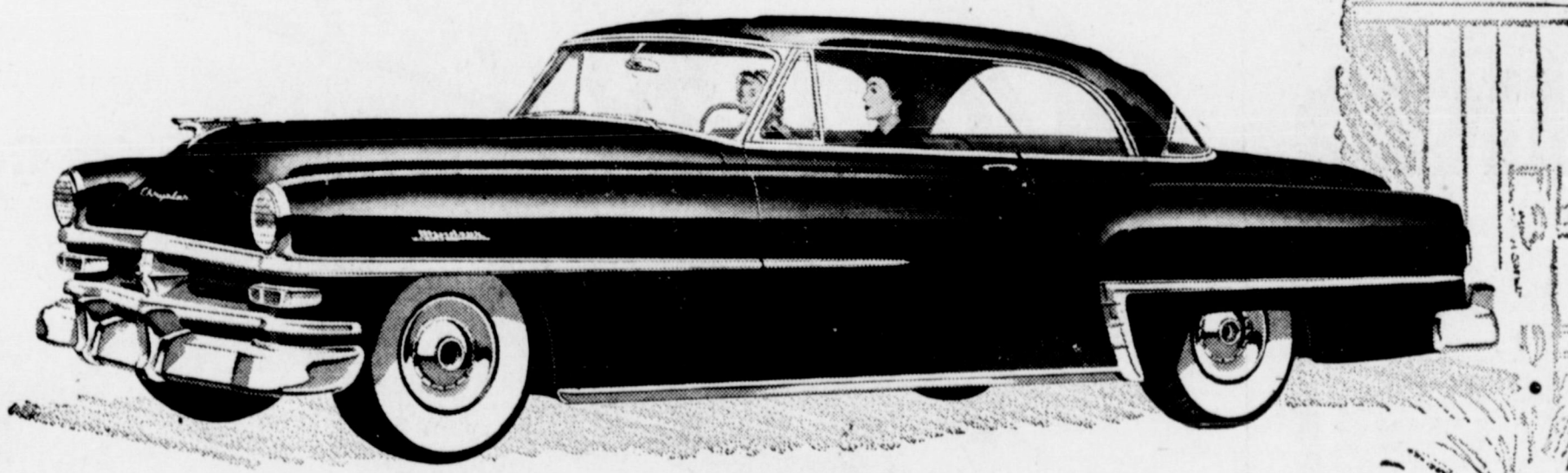

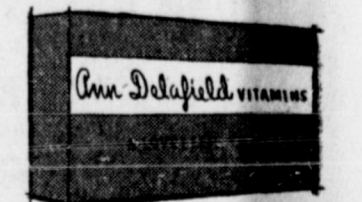

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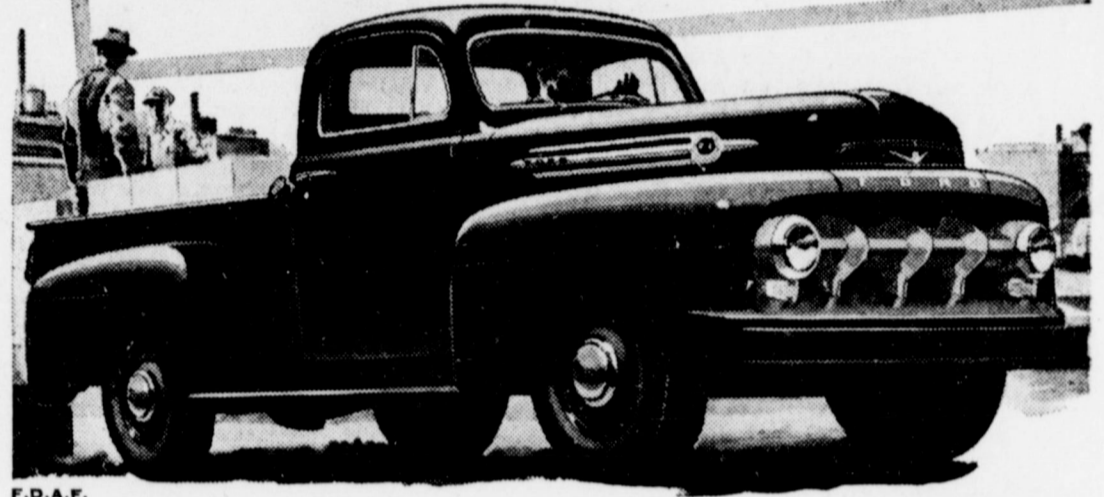

## Rogers Urges Voting Rights For Texas GI's

A constitutional amendment which will allow all servicemen to vote as do their fellow citizens was presented in the Senate this week by State Senator Andy Rogers.

Present law classifies regular armed services personnel with imbeciles, paupers, and criminals, and denies them their right to vote.

"I can see no valid reason why a man who dons the uniform to serve his country should be denied the privilege of voting," Rogers declared.

Under Rogers' proposed constitutional amendment, a serviceman, in order to vote in Texas, would have only to show he had been a citizen of Texas when he entered the service. Whatever county he was living in at the time he entered the service would be the county in which he could exercise his suffrage.

Those being denied voting privileges other than regular servicemen are persons under 21 years of age; idiots and lunatics; all paupers supported by any county; and all persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

Rogers' proposal would not

change the status of these other restricted voters.

## Census Records Used As Substitute For Birth Certificates

Persons lacking birth certificates or other legal evidence of citizenship, age or family relationship can obtain transcripts of their personal census records which are, in most instances, acceptable substitutes, according to District Supervisor James M. Hamilton of the U. S. Census Bureau.

More than 100,000 Americans turned to the Census Bureau for such evidence in 1952. They needed proof of identity or age for Government and defense jobs, Social Security, passports, the Armed Services, and in connection with insurance and estate cases.

Supervisor Hamilton pointed out that personal information recorded by the Census Bureau is entirely confidential and may be furnished only upon the written request of the individual to whom it relates or his legal representatives. The normal fee is \$3.00 for searches of two censuses for one individual, each application being handled in regular turn which generally requires approximately 30 days to complete service. Expedited handling is furnished for a \$4.00 fee.

Governor Shivers honored west Texas when he reached to the Panhandle for a new highway commissioner. He named former Senator Marshall Formby of Hereford, West Texas, in particular and the state of Texas in general, will benefit from this appointment.

Charles Tennyson of the Texas State Teachers Assn. told his members the fight is going to be rough, that full backing from teacher and parent forces will be needed to put over the \$600-a-year pay raise in view of Shivers' resistance to most of it. Shivers took his side to the people when he started a series of newspaper articles explaining the complicated school financing system and why he thinks more tax money should be raised by the local district and less by the state as a means of "maintaining local control." The Education Agency put out for legislators a big book showing how much more would have to be raised locally under the increase to \$55 million in local schools' share of minimum foundation program costs. But the effect of other phases of the three-way fund stretch proposed by Shivers and Kilgore wasn't given in the book. Both sides are still gathering information for the

fight, so committee sessions are being delayed.

Committee hearings really got under way in both houses this week, after organizational sessions this week, and then floor action can begin on the first bills. The major measure with a real running start is the constitutional amendment by Rep. Charles Murphy for legislative pay of \$25 a day for 120 days and \$5 a day thereafter. It won committee approval, and was ready for floor action right away. Murphy's proposal won Dallas News endorsement, but the News, wanted a snapper attached to prohibit members taking retainers from persons interested in legislation. Murphy wants no trimmings, but merely the pay increase. He would have the amendment election on the first primary day in 1954. A few minor bills were out of committee, on floor reports or on routine committee sessions, but major hearings weren't scheduled until this week.

A number of bills with special interest to the public have been introduced. These include the following, grouped by subject matter, using the House bill numbers, the first named author and a brief description:

**SCHOOLS:** H. B. 3, by Kilgore, requiring local districts to pay 25% of minimum foundation program costs and transferring certain sales taxes from the available School Fund to the Foundation School Fund, is being considered. Letters indicate that a great deal of sentiment is being generated against this bill. H. B. No. 41, by Yezak permitting children to enter school in the fall if they are 6 by September 30, was killed in committee on Education. H. B. No. 170, by Crouch, prohibiting school officials from making membership in

**FARM NEWS**  
From the County PMA Committee

In this week's News Article, the practice to be discussed is Practice 2, "Construction of Diversion or Spreader Terraces to Control Excess Water." The payment is 70% of the cost, not to exceed 8 cents per cubic yard.

**PURPOSE OF PRACTICE**—This practice is used to divert excess water from cropland; from gullies in pasture land; to bread up the concentration of water on long, gentle slopes; and to make use of runoff water by spreading on grassland. It may also be used to divert water into or away from earthen reservoirs or into a system of water spreading terraces on cultivated land. Diversion terraces should not be substituted for standard on land requiring standard terraces as an erosion control measure.

**SPECIFICATIONS**—Necessary protective outlets or waterways must be provided. All diversion or spreader terraces must be constructed to meet the requirements of Soil Conservation Service.

**FARMERS URGED TO FOLLOW THROUGH ON CONSERVATION WORK:**

Farmers of Donley County who have signed up to participate in the 1953 Agricultural Conservation Program are urged by Ross Springer, Chairman of the County PMA committee, to follow through on the conservation practices planned for this year. He refers not only to practices approved under ACP, but to all conservation work which Soil Conservation Service plans and farm experience reveals as being most needed.

As the chairman sees it, the nation has reached that stage in population increase where every effort must be made to protect land from washing and blowing away and to build up the soil to meet future production needs. The production to meet the increasing needs must come largely from the land now being farmed.

The assistance provided under ACP, he points out, is being directed at the most needed conservation on the individual farm. The purpose is to center attention on conservation practices over and above what the farmer would carry out on his own initiative and with his own resources. Approval of certain practices should not be taken to indicate that these are the only conservation measures which are needed on

the farm.

Chairman Springer also stresses the need for farmers to make arrangements in advance for the use of such equipment as may be needed to carry out conservation practices planned for the season. Attention to this before the work season starts will give added assurance that the practices can be completed and it will give owners of equipment a chance to work out effective operating schedules.

The County Committee has gone over all of the requests for assistance under the 1953 program and where assistance has been approved farmers have been notified.

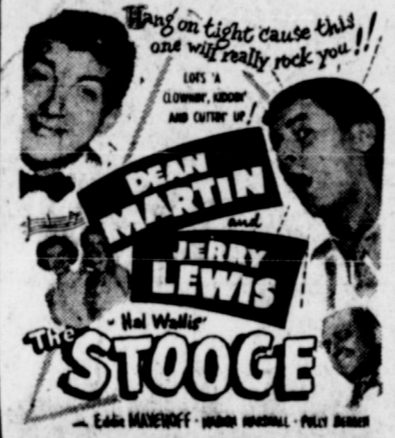

The boys were sent to bed and they remained there for several days taking shots and other medicine with the doctor coming every few hours to look in on them and make sure there were no serious complications.

Maybe the physician and the nurses never had quite so many patients at one time, but they did a wonderful job in helping the boys to recover. The epidemic of flu was stopped at the Ranch in an amazingly short time with none of the boys seriously ill or having to be hospitalized.

There are only a few sniffles left at the Ranch now, all the boys are up and back in school and they deeply appreciate what the small medical group from Dumas did for them in their time of need.

### Chlorophyll Not Deodorant

NEW YORK—Chlorophyll, as used commercially in everything from toothpaste to dog biscuits, has no value as a deodorant and if ingested may cause bodily

harm, according to Dr. Alsoph H. Corwin, head of John Hopkins University Chemistry Department.

Dr. Corwin, who spoke recently at a meeting of the New York section of the American Chemical Society, also said that the substance does nothing as a topic, against germs or heals wounds, as has been claimed.

About the only purpose for which chlorophyll has any value, Dr. Corwin said, is for photosynthesis in plants for aesthetically "coloring the vistas visible from hills and mountains" and for furnishing scientists with "a lot of good clean fun."

As used in wick-type and spray devices for deodorizing rooms, chlorophyll cannot possibly chemically perform any deodorization, Dr. Corwin said. He said that what probably happens is that the devices contain some pleasant pine oil smells to mask more unpleasant fumes and small

amounts of formaldehyde to paralyze the sense of smell slightly.

To be effective as a body deodorant, the chlorophyll would have to get into the blood stream. No appreciable absorption by the blood of chlorophyll taken by mouth has ever been shown, he said.

### TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

By Congressman Walter Rogers

The President of the United States is entitled to the full support of both parties in carrying into effect his campaign promises which were approved by the voters:

The National Capital is alive with gossip and rumors as to the meaning of some of the early actions in Congress. Actually, very little has been accomplished in the Congress outside of organizational work. I had hoped that operations would get into full swing immediately after the 20th of January. However, it seems that there has been additional delay awaiting the President's message to the Congress, which will be delivered on the Monday following the writing of this letter, which will be before many of you have occasion to read it. The reason for this added delay seems to be the strife between the factions inside the Republican Party. Much of it is due to differences between the factions concerning the dispensing of patronage. It

has already reared its ugly head in several of the House and Senate committees. President Eisenhower is obviously doing his best to reconcile these differences and to bring about a spirit of cooperation that will expedite the fulfillment of his campaign promises to the American people. Certainly both parties owe it to this country to cooperate with him and his administration to honor and carry out the wishes of the American people. The two major flare-ups that have occurred and have caused the greatest disturbance are:

1. The curtailment of presidential powers in reorganizing the Executive Branch of the Government.
2. The proposed tax reduction before balancing the budget.

Under the present law, which expires April 1st, the President has the right and power to reorganize the bureaus, agencies or departments in the Executive Branch of the Government by setting up his reorganization program and submitting it to the Congress. If the Congress fails to veto such reorganization program within sixty days by a majority of the full membership of one of the Houses of Congress, the program automatically goes into effect. That is, such a proposed pro-



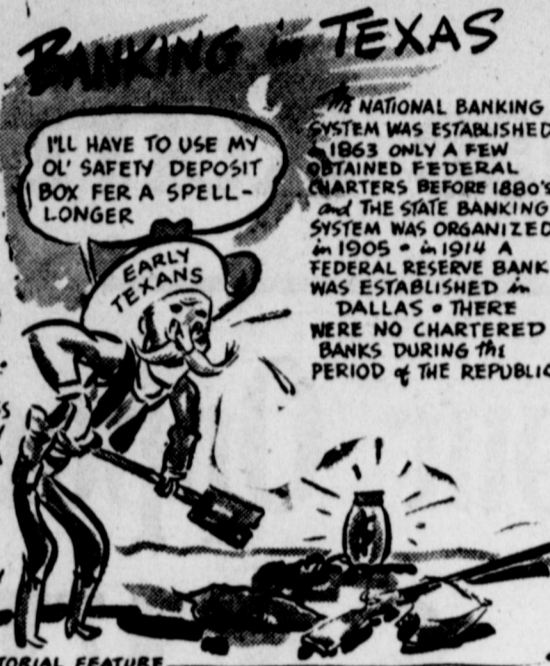

gram could be defeated by either House of Congress, the House of Representatives, or the Senate, but it must be remembered that in order to defeat such a program, more than 50 percent of the entire membership of one of the Houses must be opposed to it. In order for this power of reorganization to remain in the President, it is necessary that Congress extend the law. Since one of the major campaign promises of President Eisenhower was the consolidation and simplification of the Federal Government to bring about order and system, it was presumed that the extension of the Reorganization Act for at least two years would be re-

quired. Extension was requested and was advocated by ex-President Hoover, who as you know headed the Hoover Commission and made many recommendations toward the simplification of the sprawling federal system. It did not occur to many of us that any controversy would arise concerning this. The bill was introduced and promptly taken up by the proper committees in the House and the Senate for early action so that the new administration could get under way with the least possible delay. The new budget director, Mr. Dodge, appeared before the House committee and stated his position clearly and concisely, and I might say

ably. He sought a two-year extension of the present law with no changes. The testimony before the committee included the letter from Herbert Hoover insisting that such powers be continued in the President. However, when the smoke had cleared, the committee had voted an amendment to the law which measurably cut down the presidential powers. This amendment provided that a presidential reorganization could be defeated on the Floor of either House by the vote of a simple majority. This simply means that should the matter come before either House at a time when only a few members were on the Floor, a presidential reform or reorganization of a department or agency which could save the taxpayers of this nation many dollars, could be defeated and sent back to the White House. Every member on the Democratic side of the House committee voted to sustain Eisenhower and to carry out his wishes in this matter. Every member on the Republican side with the exception of one, who voted present, voted against the expressed wishes of President Eisenhower

delivered to the committee by the Director of the Budget, Mr. Dodge. What the overall results of this parliamentary maneuvering will be is difficult to foresee at the present time, but there is one thing for sure: President Eisenhower will receive almost unanimous support from the Southern democrats in Congress and many other democrats in reorganizing and reforming the boards, bureaus and departments of this Government if such reorganization will result in better efficiency, less federal jobs and less cost to the taxpayer. Such proposal should have the unanimous support of the Congress in

both Houses. The Subcommittees of the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee have been organized and I have been named on the following: Irrigation and Reclamation, Territories and Insular Possessions, and Mines and Mining.

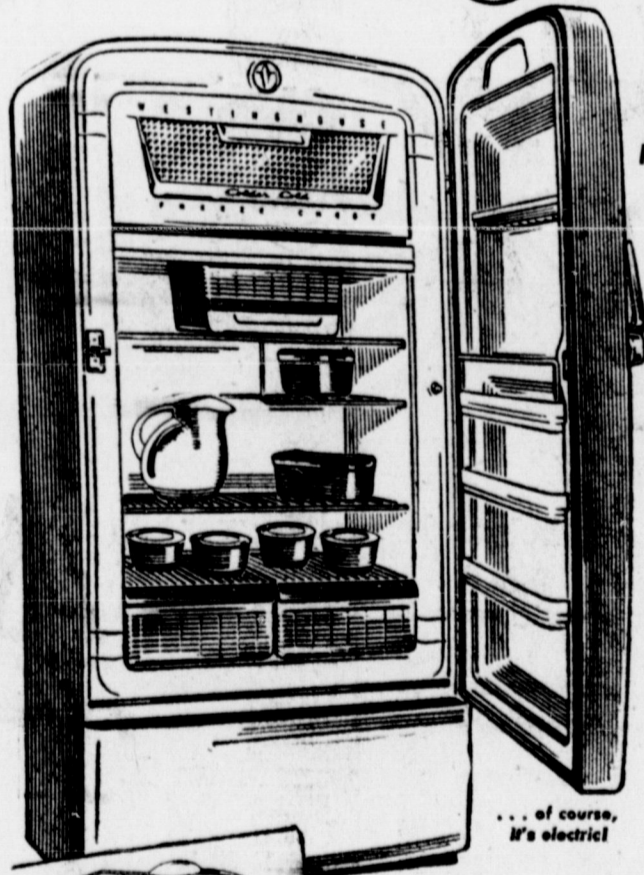

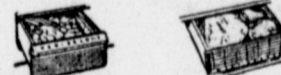
